HORSESHOE PUBLICITY

The May 2 issue of THE NATION, a well known current events magazine with a national circulation carried an article in which complementary comments on the game of horseshoes occupied a considerable portion. The article was written by Robert

Coulson, member of the Illinois legislature from Waukegan.

National NHPA Secretary Bob Pence wrote a letter to the magazine commenting on the article which was printed in the May 30 issue. As a result of Bob's letter he has received several requests for information about the game from well known New York newspaper columnists. One of these, Earl Wilson of the New York Post, who has also written for The Sat. Eve. Post, Coronet and other magazines as well as being author of a number of books, has indicated he wants the material for an article on the game to be carried in his syndicated column.

SIXTH ANNUAL CORN BELT OPEN TO BE HELD AUGUST 22-23, BURLINGTON, IOWA

Plans are being made to hold the sixth annual cornbelt open tournament on the Crapo Park courts in Burlington, Iowa, Saturday and Sunday, August 22 and 23.

After five years of qualifying and playing on the same day, a new plan will be used this year. Change of plans was necessary due to the fact that lights will not be available for night play.

ALL QUALIFYING WILL BE DONE ON SATURDAY, AUGUST 22 START-ING AT 9:00 A.M. AND CLOSING AT 6 P.M. THE SAME DAY. All entries will pay a fee of \$2.00 to qualify, plus an additional \$3.00 to pitch in Class A.

CLASS A will be made up of 12 men divided into 2 groups of 6 each. They will play a round robin starting at 1 p.m. Sunday, August 23. CLASS B using the same procedure as Class A will start playing at 9 a.m., Sunday, August 22. Those playing in Class B will pay an additional \$2.00. CLASS C will have 8 players divided into 2 groups of 4 each playing a round robin and \$1.00 additional fee for this class will be charged.

The winners of each group will play in the finals, one game each of 50 points.

The prize list will be \$168.00 cash based on 50 entries, plus \$150.00 in merchandise prizes. The high qualifying prize will be a steak dinner. There will also be trophies for all three class winners.

This is an unsanctioned affair in an attempt to attract some new blood into the Iowa Tournament circuit. A new champion will be crowned as last year's winner. Glenn Anderson of Moline, Ill., was killed in an auto accident last fall.

"From Out of the Mailbag"

Ellis Cobb, Editor The Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest Aurora, Illinois June 12, 1959

Dear Mr. Cobb:

A lengthy article on horseshoe, complete with a three by four inch picture, recently

appeared in the employees' newspaper of a nationally known industrial firm.

Written for the personal glorification of a single individual employee of this company, the article contained so many mis-statements and false information as to be injurious to the game when read by people not familiar with the facts, especially those

who are recent devotees of the game.

Among other things the article claimed this individual is now manufacturing an official horseshoe with his own personal grip built into it and bearing his name; that he is the originator of the "Count-All Scoring System"; that almost all associations now use the "Count-all System"; that he was voted the title of "Mr. Horseshoes of 1958"; that he is a member and former head of an association with a high sounding name which implies a nation-wide membership; that he once came within ONE SHOE OF WINNING THE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP.

It is hoped he applies for official sanction of the horseshoe bearing his name so it can be used in officially sanctioned tournaments of the NHPA. So far he has not

done so.

Old timers know the "Count-all Scoring System" was devised many, many years ago, possibly before this individual ever tossed a shoe. It was probably devised by D. J. Cowden, of Iowa, with Dave Chess of Ohio as its chief exponent, back in the 1920's.

Contrary to the claims of the article it is a known fact that almost no tournaments use the "Count-all System", and that its use is confined almost entirely to a few local handicap leagues. Although the NHPA recognizes the system, its use is scanty, and to

claim otherwise is misleading.

The personal organization belonging to this individual came about ten years ago when two men tried to cram their ideas down the throat of the NHPA, and make it exclusively a "Count-all" group. Not being successful in the open convention, they picked up their horseshoe, and went home to form a local group which has never extended its boundaries in the ensuing ten years, and which cannot make legitimate claim of being nation-wide, as is implied in the name. It is not even state wide in either of the two states it is confined to.

There are many other purely local groups without NHPA affiliated members, but none of these claim to be something they aren't, and they are all friendly with the NHPA

and recognize its role in the game.

It is presumptuous for anyone to claim the title of "Mr. Horseshoes of 1958" when one considers the excellent work of national scope done by such men as Elmer Beller and Archie Gregson of California, Ellis Cobb of Illinois, and Bob Pence of Indiana. For the record, last year at the World Tournament, Elmer Beller was given the Arch Stokes Memorial Award for his outstanding contribution to the game.

Fernando Isias and Ted Allen will be amazed to learn this individual, in some mythical year, came within one pitch of winning the World Championship, especially since his name most certainly is NOT Don Titcomb of California, or Casey Jones of

Wisconsin.

It all makes sense, however, when one reads the complete article, and finds that he, no doubt, comes from another world. He must be "from out of this world", for the article says the distance between stakes is 40 YARDS, and at this distance, he is beyond doubt the Champion of all Champions.
