WORLD TOURNAMENT QUALIFYING

NHPA President Reinhard Backer has made the following announcement about the method of qualifying to be used at the 1961 World Tournament to be held in Muncie, Indiana, July 18-26.

"The 200 shoe qualifying round used last year will be retained for 1961 with the addition of a time and court assignment plan to give all entrants equal and ample time for practice, warm up and qualifying.

equal and ample time for practice, warm up and qualifying. Provisions in Article VI, Section 1 of the NHPA constitution make it mandatory to retain some form of the 200 shoe "solo" type of qualifying until such time as it is changed by action of the delegates at the annual conventions.

The Chairman of our Regional Directors, Lee Davis of New Jersey, has submitted a plan for a new type of qualifying which deserves our serious consideration. This plan has been circulated among all NHPA officials, Regional Directors and State Secretaries with a request for comments. The response has been both startling and gratifying. A flood of letters has indicated much support for the Davis plan and has also brought forth many other thoughtful and worthwhile suggestions. These are too numerous and lengthy to be mentioned or discussed here individually, but the response does indicate a healthy interest in the affairs of the NHPA.

It must be stressed that the NHPA convention to be held during the World Tournament can change the form of the qualifying round and other features of the tournament if the delegates so vote. The Davis plan has been placed on the agenda and all members and state associations should study it and make known their views at the convention.

it and make known their views at the convention. One of the suggestions generated by the study of the Davis plan by various NHPA officials is the plan for assigning courts and qualifying times at the 1961 World Tournament. This plan has been adopted for use this year. It was suggested by Jim "Pop" Johnson of Kentucky.

1960 INDIANA SCHEDULE

The Indiana Division of the NHPA held a meeting at Muncie in March at which its 1961 officers were elected and a program of tournaments were scheduled.

The season will open May 19-20-21 with the entire membership eligible to make its choice between three Spring Special Tournaments to be held in Muncie, Frankfort and Kokomo. National Card or state card is required along with a \$1.00 entry fee. Qualifying will be until 4 p.m. Saturday, May 20 with the finals that evening and the next day.

U. S. Road 31 will be the dividing line for the Eastern Indiana and the Western Indiana tournaments to be held at Muncie and Frankfort in June. Players living on or near the dividing line will have their choice of tournaments. Qualifying will be June 17-18 with the finals to be held the following weekend.

The Central Indiana and Southern Indiana tournaments will hold qualifying rounds July 8-9 with the finals one week later at Connersville and Ko-komo. U. S. Road 40 will be the dividing line. Connersville has recently installed eight new courts.

Following the World Tournament at Muncie, July 18-26, the Northern Indiana Tournament will be held at Wabash with qualifying August 5-6 and the finals on August 12-13.

Qualifying for the Indiana State Tournament will be held August 19-20 at four or five regional locations to be announced later. The championship finals will be held at Heekin Park in Muncie over the Labor Day weekend.

The State Women's tourney will be held at Connersville, August 26 and on August 27 the State Left Handers, Old Timers, Boys and Juniors, will meet at Dorner Park in Frankfort. The annual Indiana-Ohio Open will be staged at Muncie Sept. 16-17.

Early season tournaments are also being planned for June 10-11 at both Connersville and Lafayette and possibly Goshen.

Many Indiana players indicated they planned to attend the Chipwood Memorial Open at Grand Rapids, Mich., May 27-30; the Greenville, Ohio Open on June 3-4; the Lakeside, Ohio Open, June 30; the Greenville, Ohio Fourth of July tourney; the Midwest "Ringer Round Up" at Peoria, Ill., July 1-4; and the Norwood, Ohio Open in September. These dates were all left open on the Indiana schedule.

ST. PAUL, MINN. MAJOR LEAGUE ADOPTS NEW SCORING RULE

By BEN TROLLEN

The St. Paul, Minnesota major league consists of six teams with four men on each team. These teams are set up so that each team has the same total ringer percentages at the beginning of the season. Totals are based on last season's averages. Because of this arrangement the lower percentage pitchers lose most of their games to the higher percentage players and win only those from players of their own caliber. Our new system will tend to

keep the lower percentage players in the game by trying to get more points for the team effort. Following is the new arrangement. After the first round of play the total points of four players on team #1 are compared with the total points of team #2. The team with the highest total points will get one point toward winning the match. This same procedure will follow for all four games and the score could end up with scores of 1-3, 2-2, 3-1, 4-0 for either team. Then when all 16 games have been played, the total number of wins determines which team gets the extra point. For intoward winning the match. Then the score could be 1-4, 2-3, 3-2, 4-1, 5-0 for either team. In case of a tie in points or games won a 1/2 point would be given.

No provision is made for scratch or byes as all 16 games must be played according to our rules. Since this is the first time we are trying this system, comments or suggestions on improving it will be welcomed.

FOREIGN TOUR POSSIBLE

The NHPA has succeeded in interesting the People-to-People Sports Committee, Inc., in considering horseshoe players in the organization's future program of internatonal sports exchanges. People-to-People Sports Committee, Inc., was formed some six years ago to

People-to-People Sports Committee, Inc., was formed some six years ago to promote a better understanding and relationship between people of diverse nationalities, backgrounds and languages by a program of exchanging sports figures in various fields between this country and foreign countries. More than 400 athletes took part in these exchanges and foreign tours last year involving many different sports.

Now through the efforts of the NHPA horseshoe is being considered seriously by the group and Bob Pence, NHPA Secretary, has been asked to furnish a list of horseshoe players who speak foreign languages.

So far, inquiry has revealed 48 players who fall into this category scattered all over the U. S. There are too many to name individually, but between them they speak some 14 different languages including Russian, Polish, Slovak, Croatian, German, French, Spanish, Portuguese, Italian, Swedish and such unlikely tongues as Iranian and Tagalog.

Ed Stancik of Durham, N. C., can toss ringers in more languages than any other NHPA member, six in all. Of course, former World Champ Fernando Isias is one of the Spanish speaking players.

Being able to speak a foreign language is not a necessary requirement for being chosen by the People-to-People Inc., but, of course, it is a factor. Meanwhile the People-to-People organization has requested that any

Meanwhile the People-to-People organization has requested that any horseshoe pitcher interested in taking a foreign tour, especially those who speak a foreign language, contact them direct to let them know how long a period of time they could spend on such a tour, what foreign languages they speak if any, and what portion of the expenses the individual could contribute towards his expenses on the tour if any. JOHNSON COURT ASSIGNMENT PLAN

The 200 shoe qualifying method used in the past will be used at the 1961 World Tournament in Muncie along with the court assignment plan developed by Jim "Pop" Johnson of Covington, Ky.

The Juniors and Women will hold their tournaments on Tuesday, July 18 with unused courts free for practice on a catch as catch can basis by the men.

The men will pitch their 200 shoe qualifying round on Wednesday, July 19 and Thursday, July 20. Until the middle of the afternoon on both of these days all courts will be open for practice, warmup and qualifying on a firstcome first-served basis.

On both of these days courts will be cleared and put into shape in the middle of the afternoon. Six courts, those on the ends and near the gates, will be assigned as warm up courts and the remaining 12 as qualifying courts.

As the players sign in they will have their choice of warm up and qualifying courts and of the time they wish to qualify. By this means each player will be assigned a specific warm up court, qualifying court and time for both.

will be assigned a specific warm up court, qualifying court and time for both. The six warm up courts will be occupied as assigned by 12 players for 45 minutes, two to each court. At the end of this time they will move to their individual qualifying court where they will have a maximum of 20 minutes to get accustomed to the court and start qualifying pitches. While they are on their qualifying courts 12 or more players will move

While they are on their qualifying courts 12 or more players will move on to the warm up courts to start their turn. Thus at all times there will be a maximum of 12 players actually pitching qualifying shoes and 12 other players in warm up.

This plan gives each entrant a choice of available courts and times when he signs in and gives him approximately one hour for warm up and one hour for qualifying. They will have July 18 and the forenoons and early afternoon hours of July 19 and 20 for free practice.

The tournament committee will reserve a small percentage of the courts during the late hours of July 20 for late arrivals.

LEE DAVIS' WORLD TOURNAMENT QUALIFYING PROPOSAL

NHPA official have under consideration a new plan for the qualifying round of the World Tournament which has been submitted by Lee Davis, Chairman of the Regional Directors.

The present 200 shoe "solo" type qualifying originated at the 1933 World Tournament at the Chicago Fair and has been in use ever since. That year the players pitched 100 shoes. In 1935 at Moline they pitched 200 shoes with the best 100 being official.

The Lee Davis plan under study would work as follows:

1. All entries to be divided into groups of six players each. Entrants who were in the 1960 World Tournament would be grouped on the basis of their record in the 1960 Tournament, the six ranking players in group one, the next six in group two, etc. Those who failed to qualify for a class in the 1960 tournament would be grouped on the basis of their qualifying score in the 1960 tournament.

2. Entrants who did not play in the 1960 tournament would be grouped in sixes on the basis of their known ability by the tournament committee.

3. Each group would play a round robin schedule of five regulation games. Games won and lost WOULD NOT COUNT. Players would advance to the 36 man championship division, Class B and Class C on the basis of their ringer percentage in this six man round robin. A PLAYER COULD LOSE ALL FIVE GAMES AND STILL QUALIFY FOR THE CHAMPIONSHIP DIVISION.

4. There would be an entry deadline — 12 o'clock noon on the first day of qualifying — for all entries by which time all entry fees would have to be paid. Entry and entry fee payment could be made in advance by mail, but in this case the player would be responsible for being on hand and ready to play when his group was scheduled.

5. The first day of the tournament, July 18th, would probably be devoted entirely to the Junior and Women's division, both qualifying and finals. July 19th would be the first day of the qualifying for the men's division with 12 noon of that day as the deadline for all entries.

6. When the deadline for entries came the tournament committee would place all entrants in their groups and post the schedules. The qualifying round robins would start at once with those players who did NOT play in the 1960 tournament being scheduled first and working up to the top ranking players of the 1960 tournament who would play their games on the evening of the second qualifying day.

7. Each group winner who failed to gain a place in the final round robins would receive a trophy or prize.

The advantages of this plan are these:

1. All entries would get to play at least five regulation games in the World Tournament instead of pitching 200 shoes "solo" and then sitting out the remainder of the tournament if unsuccessful.

2. Qualifying would be under the normal circumstances of playing a regular game instead of under the unnatural conditions of a "solo" 200 shoe qualifying round.

3. Qualifying would be on a definite time schedule basis with everyone having equal and ample warm-up time. More players could qualify in a shorter period of over-all time and there would not be the last minute "rat race" of qualifying. It would do away with the practice of some players warming up for two days and monopolizing the courts while others were waiting for a chance to get on.

4. It would take far less scorekeepers and would be far more interesting to the spectators.

Some of the disadvantages are these:

1. Some players would pitch their games at night under the lights and some in the afternoon.

2. Weather conditions might vary with the conditions on the second day being different from those of the first day.

 Some players who fail to qualify for the finals would feel that they would have made it if the old 200 shoe "solo" round was used or if they had been scheduled at a different time or in a different group.

The Kansas Centennial Horseshoe Pitching Committee is moving rapidly in all phases of action necessary to bring to Kansas at Gage Park horseshoe courts in Topeka the largest, as well as the most unique, horseshoe Tourna-ment ever held in the State — The Kansas Centennial Championship—Kansas Professional Championship — combined into one. The American Legion is sponsoring the contest and will spend \$25.00 for medals, etc. for the con-testants. The Kansas Centennial Commission has a County Chairman in every county in the state. All horseshoe pitchers of Kansas are urgently requested to become active and do your part in seeing that as many pitchers as possible come to this fine Centennial tournament in Topeka on Sept. 2-3-4.


PLANNING COMMITTEES OF PEORIA, ILL. CLUB, HARD AT WORK
