GLYNDEN MOORE NEW TAR HEEL STATE CHAMPION

After several years of trailing close behind the winners in many tournaments, Glynden Moore of Burlington, North Carolina put together one of the finest performances of his career to win the North Carolina state championship. In a field of 12, Moore and defending champion, Woodie Thomas together with the "always tough" Darrell Eller finished the regular round robin play with each having 11 wins and 1 loss. All three averaged better than 70 percent in ringers. Moore's only loss came at the hands of Eller. Thomas' only loss was to Moore. In the final game of the round robin Thomas beat Eller to set up a 3-way tie for the title. In the play-off Moore defeated both Thomas and Eller for first place while Eller defeated Thomas for second place honors. In the class B division, Melvin "Pete" Seagraves made his NHPA debut by sweeping the field of 10 without a loss to pick up the honors.

The Corning horseshoe club, sponsoring its first major tournament, went all-out to provide one of the most colorful tournaments in the history of State competition. At 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 2, immediately following qualifying, Miss Faye Emerson made an appearance at the courts, and following welcoming remarks by Mayor Joseph Nasser, threw the first shoe to officially open the tournament. She was then presented with the shoes she

was using by club president Ted Callahan.

Among the "dignitaries" introduced by president Callahan were Mayor Joseph Nasser, defending champion Carl Steinfeldt, and State Association president Wilbert Hyland, along with Miss Emerson.

The Corning club had worked feverishly to get the approaches to the courts blacktopped, 1500 watt bulbs in the six floodlights in place of 1000 watt bulbs, malls between the courts seeded, and bleachers erected for spectators, so that Corning was, in effect, a "little Muncie" when the contestants and guests arrived. It was still "little Muncie" during the two days of competition, for an estimated crowd of some 3,000 kept the bleachers filled to capacity over the entire competition, and on Friday evening Carl Steinfeldt and Joe Zichella put on an exhibition game followed by one by Natale and Vitto Feliccia. Vito then delighted the crowd with an exhibition of trick shots. After 10:00 p.m. all adjourned to the Baron Steuben hotel for an informal "get acquainted" party, where all percentages, past and present, jumped from 10% to 25% as the evening closed.

All contestants who qualified for actual competition were given a Pyrex glass teapot courtesy of the Corning Club, and all trophies were made of

The Barker Lumber Company donated materials for a four by 16 foot scoreboard which again resembled the one at Muncie, and facilitated the scoring for the benefit of the spectators and contestants alike.

Horseshoe Pitchers' News Digest Aurora, Illinois

Dear Mr. Cobb:

During the past few years, we in New Jersey have noticed a slow decrease in the membership of our state association. This past winter the members decided to put on a campaign to increase the popularity of horseshoe pitching throughout our state. The state association was completely reorganized with abandonment of some out-dated offices and the establishment of new vital ones.

Plans were made to establish a major league under the supervision of the state and this league turned out to be a tremendous success. Teams were composed of three men with combined averages totaling 150%. Each man played the regular 50-point cancellation game with each of the men from an opposing team, but instead of counting wins and losses, just the total points were recorded. The winning team was the one who accumulated the most points in its nine games. This method had two good features, in that it was not necessary for a weaker player to actually defeat a stronger player in order to aid his team and that there was no reason to lose interest in a game because of a lopsided score. Both the stronger and weaker players must try to score as many points as possible at all times. The league was composed of top A and B players, and everyone participating in it appears to have enjoyed themselves.

Another encouraging event was an increase in membership this year when the Bergen County Handicap League joined the state association. The Bergen County League is a 100% Handicap league and was organized a number of years ago with the hope that it would develop new players. Apparently it was a good idea for this year 40 new members were added to the state

association when this league joined the state.

However, I believe that one of the best ways to promote the sport of horseshoe pitching is to provide the public with courts. For just as the old saying, "where there's smoke, there's fire," I say, "where there are horseshoe courts, there are horseshoe players". With this thought in mind our association contacted Mr. Alfred Walden, the Freeholder from Bergen County, and before long the Bergen County Park Commission installed 22 new regulation courts, four in each of the four county parks and six in another one. Already plans are underway to organize a league of novice players in one of the parks, so our efforts appear to be worthwhile.


All in all we are very pleased with the progress we are making in our
