Once again the hand of our Creator has touched one of our staunchest players and supporters. J. Harry Nielson was stricken with a heart attack and passed away in Oakland, California, on May 15. He was laid to rest in Veterans' cemetery in San Francisco, California.

Harry, as he was known, was one of the most active members of the Mosswood club of Oakland despite the fact that he was not able to pitch in his later years above Class D competition. For being a grand sportsman and a fine gentleman, he was many classes above in that respect. Seldom was there a Class A, B or C tournament in the Bay Area that did not find Harry Nielson helping out in some capacity, either as scorekeeper, grounds keeper, brewing coffee or any other job that makes for a successful tournament.

Harry had been a member of the Northern association for 30 years with the past 25 as treasurer of the Mosswood club. He was chairman of the Northern California Class A championship tournament for the last 10 years. He was 72 years of age at the time of his sudden passing. He is survived by a daughter and three grandchildren. He will be greatly missed by the Northern association and the Mosswood club. The sympathy of the NHPA and the Northern and Mosswood association is extended to his loved ones.

Turning Back the Pages of Time.

The following article submitted by Leland Mortenson of Des Moines, Iowa and Frank Lundin, former world's champion, living in New London, Iowa, will be carried in subsequent issues of the News Digest. It is a very historical article and has many interesting items throughout.

THE 1922 NATIONAL FALL TOURNAMENT

Second Installment

As we turn the pages we learn that Fred Ashley, at that time 41, would more than likely enter the tournaments as scheduled and would be present at most of the meets in and around Des Moines for probably the next 20 years; however, fate willed it otherwise, as Fred passed on a few years ago.

The year 1922 found Lyle Brown, age 17, as the third best player in Iowa and who in the 1940 World tournament finished in fifth place. Even though he was of frail build, he was determined to be active even if it were only at intervals. He became a victim of tuberculosis in 1942. He was a resident of Des Moines.

About 1924 Frank Campbell of Waukee was doing his best work when he placed fourth in the World tournament. He was also of championship calibre in the sport of trapshooting. He passed away about the same time as

In 1927, John Garvey of Boone, Iowa, set a World record at that time of 13 straight double ringers. He with his brother Bill were 18 and 17 respectively. Another 17-year-old chap was soon to make his presence known among the horseshoe pitchers and he was Hansford E. Jackson, son of Frank Jackson. It was the general opinion that he was second only to his father among the Iowa players. In 1931 he captured the Iowa state title, which he held for a year. Following him on the scene was his brother Carroll, age 20. Although he was not nearly as good as his brother Hansford or his father, Carroll teamed up with Guy Zimmerman of Sac City, Iowa in 1934 and toured the west giving exhibitions. Later, Carroll and his wife travelled widely and pitched exhibitions advertising themselves as world champion trick pitchers.

From Hubbard, Iowa, and later Eldora, Iowa, came Putt Mossman and his brother Warren. Both of these fellows played in state tournaments in Iowa. While he was yet 18 years old, Putt became World champion. Putt added a number of sport specialties to his horseshoe accomplishments, such as motorcycle stunt riding, boxing, tumbling, rifle and revolver shooting and many others. He spent five years travelling in Africa. He is the only professional horseshoe pitcher who gains his livelihood from horseshoe pitching or other sports and is still active in this field at the present time.

As we go on turning the pages, we come to another of Iowa's famous sons, in the person of Frank Lundin. We find him first as a lad of 15 who had been given a pair of horseshoes made by a blacksmith in Winfield, Iowa. Young Frank became quite adept at dropping ringers around the pegs. When the family moved to New London, he obtained another pair of blacksmith horseshoes and in 1921 he and his partner, Clifford Johnson, won the Henry county tournament and then went on to the State Fair. He had not discovered how to pitch an open shoe, but after playing in the state tournament that year he decided to learn how. From the fall of 1921 until August of 1922 he practiced the 1% turn, often spending at least four hours in daily practice. He had now acquired regular pitching shoes and soon was to prove how well he had mastered them when next we find him at the State Fair. Lundin defeated everyone in his groups and did so by lop-sided scores. The best ten players went into the finals and on August 29 won the state title with 9 victories and no losses. Lyle Brown was second while Hansford Jackson, who was the favorite to win the championship, failed to qualify. (To Be Continued)



Juliet Coker, Seminole Indian from Seminole, Okla., won the 1961 women's

title with her sister Martha in second place. Another Seminole, Flora Emar-

thla of Oklahoma City, was third.

The tournament is open to any Indian in the United States or Canada. Anyone with one quarter Indian blood is considered Indian.

GROVER C. HAWLEY, FORMER TOP PITCHERS DIES
