ROGER VOGEL, FORMER NAVY VETERAN, TORPEDOES ART DUGLE TO WIN ROCK RIVER VALLEY OPEN TOURNAMENT

Roger Vogel of Manito, Illinois, who recently returned to civilian life from a tour of duty with the Navy submarine service, won the play-off match in Class A from Art Dugle of Chicago to take the trophy and championship of the annual Rock River Valley Open tournament held on the Lawrence Park courts in Rock Falls, Illinois. This tourney is always one of the highlights of the Sterling-Rock Falls club. Clint Van Dusen of Galesburg upset Ellis Griggs in the play-off for second place honors hitting 78.0 percent to win from the Illinois state champion 50-33. Don Grove nosed out Fred Hart 50 to 49 to win Class B trophy.

1961 was a very successful year for the Sterling-Rock Falls club. Four new courts were installed with prospects of an additional 4 courts for the 1962 season. A special thank you is given to all pitchers and friends who travelled many miles to take part in the club's tournaments. 

In his victory run, he had a high game of 92.5 per cent ringers. He also was involved in the longest game of the tournament against Ed Fishel pitching 124 shoes before Fishel succumbed. In this game they had all 4 shoes on the peg 24 times, six of these being consecutive. Monasmith, 98 ringers, Fishel, 95 ringers. For the records total ringers by all players in Class totalled 8336. Rudy Allones topped Class B with 10 and 1 with a ringer percentage of 59.0 for the course. In the play-off for first in Class C Swenson clipped Girt 53 to 37 to win. Class D title went to B. Foss of Tacoma who swept his class with 7 straight wins. E. Hendricks also of Tacoma latched on to Class E title with a run of 7 straight victories. The Junior Division was decided in a 2 out of 3 match between Dale Roe of Seattle and his brother, Neil Roe with brother Dale winning 50-33, 33-51, and 54-44.


Class B title and Bob Dennis the Class C.
