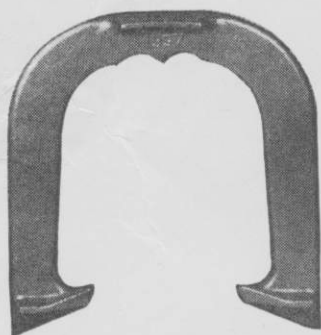

Nebraska State Title Honors Go To Don McCance

One of the highlights of Don McCance's campaign for the Nebraska state title was his victory over Sam Somerhalder of Minden, Nebraska, a veteran "ringer man" of many years standing. Their game went 100 shoes before McCance came out on top, 50-43. Somerhalder hit the stake for 42 ringers out of 46 shoes against Joe Foster of Omaha. In another 100 shoe game Foster out-distanced Tom Novacek 50 to 42. The state meeting saw all the present officers re-elected. They voted to have the 1963 tournament at Cozad, Nebraska on Sunday before Labor Day. The association expresses their thanks to the Miller Brewing Company for the beautiful trophy which was presented to the champion at the close of the tournament. Other trophies were awarded by the association.

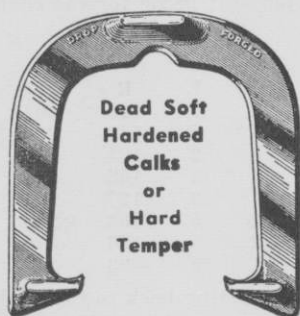

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Prescott Captures Montana State Crown

Phil Prescott of Poplar, Montana was crowned Montana State Horseshoe Champion at the Fourth Annual Montana State Horseshoe tournament held at Wibaux, Montana. At the end of the regular round robin play, Prescott and Ira Jensen of McCabe, Montana, were tied with six wins and one loss each. Jensen is the 1962 National A.A.U. champion, having won this tournament at Helena, Montana, over the Labor Day weekend. Prescott received his only loss at the hands of Morris Wold of Billings by a score of 50 to 45. Jensen suffered his only loss at the hands of Prescott, 50 to 31. In the play-off game, Prescott pitched 70% ringers to defeat Jensen 52 to 20. Jensen pitched the high ringer percentage for the tournament with a 63.2% average. This was a new tournament record. Carl Horn of Miles City, the defending champion, was not entered.

Trophies were awarded at the close of the tournament to the top two place winners in each class, the player pitching the highest qualifying score and Class A contestant trophies to the other six players in Class A, by Roger J. Barnaby, tournament manager. Thirty-one players took part in this tournament under cool and cloudy skies. This tournament was sponsored by the Wibaux County Horseshoe Ass'n and sanctioned by the National Horseshoe Pitchers Ass'n of America.

For the players and their wives who arrived on Saturday, a delicious supper was served at the Shamrock Cafe. This was a no-host get together.

The state tournament will be held at Fort Peck in 1963 and at Culbertson in 1964.

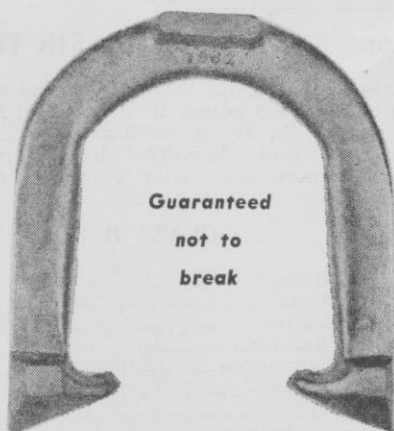

Kolb Wins New Jersey Title For The 10th Time

Bill Kolb of Belleville, New Jersey scored 257 points to rack up the 1962 New Jersey state title. This year's title win was the 10th for the New Jersey ringerman. Tournament was played at Branch Brook park courts in Newark, New Jersey. Kolb was presented the Miller Brewing Company award.

Runners in the Class A division, which was for pitchers with a seasonal ringer average of 50 per cent or better, were Dr. Sol Berman of Elizabeth with 237 points and Lee Davis of Ridgefield with 202 points.

In the Class B event for those with a seasonal ringer average of 49 per cent or below, William Stelenmuller Jr. of Lyndhurst rang up a total of 358 points to defeat Walt Haring of Middleville, 342, and Warren Stockem of Hasbrouck Heights with 317.

Michigan State Championship

In one of the largest entries in the history of the Michigan state association (115 qualifiers) the Roy Smith household of Muskegon, Michigan held all the winning hands. Perhaps pitchers have been wondering what has been happening since they have placed their orders for T-shirts and Sport shirts. Due to the tremendous number of orders received and the delay emanating from the manufacturing source, delivery of orders have been held up.

Mary Craig, who is doing an outstanding job of filling all these orders as fast as she can, now that she has received a supply from the supplier, would like for each one to be just a little patient and she will have all orders taken care of. She has a complete supply of shirts with the exception of SMALL sizes.

Some orders have had to be delayed as much as 5 months due to the suppliers' inability to keep up with the orders. When the shirts finally arrive, Mrs. Craig has a terrific back-log to catch up with. She has lost many hours of sleep trying to take care of shipping the shirts, sorting out the various orders and getting them over to the seamstress who sews on the names on the backs of each shirt. When such large quantities are taken to the seamstress it takes as long as 2 weeks to get them back and ready to ship.

It is understandable that each pitcher wants his shirt within a reasonable length of time and they certainly would have all received their shirts if there were not so many obstacles to overcome.

It is in situations like this that those individuals who give freely of their time and receive nothing for their efforts except sharp criticism, are the ones who are pressed to almost the breaking point. It goes without saying that those who are first to criticize would not accept the same responsibility of those whom they criticize.

Members of this association should be proud of workers like Mrs. Craig and all the rest of the workers who labor behind the scenes for the good of the organization. So, let's all be a little more tolerant.

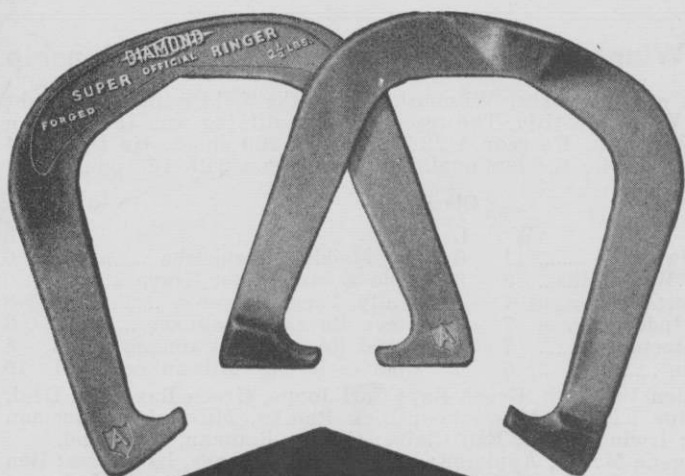

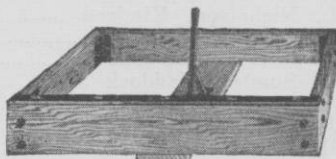
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
