## To Hold Annual Rock River Valley Open, Sept. 1-2

Leslie Long of the Rock Falls, Illinois club, announces the annual running of the Rock River Valley Open tournament to be held at the Lawrence park courts midway between Rock Falls and Sterling, Illinois on September 1 and 2. Ellis Griggs of Plainville, Illinois is the defending champion. Qualifying will start on Sunday, Sept. 1 and close at 12 noon CDST on Monday, Sept. 2. Each entrant will pitch 100 shoes for placement with the privilege of throwing an additional 100 at an extra fee of \$2.00, same as for the first 100. Tournament will start at 1:00 p.m. sharp with regular round robin play. It will be sanctioned by the state and National association and all pitchers playing in the tournament MUST have an NHPA card for 1963. There will be trophies and cash prizes for the top 32 men who play in the final rounds. Tournament will be conducted the same as in the past years. Wilma Long and Mary Wuebben will be the head scorekeepers and Bill Portner will call the close ones in the capacity of referee. Les Long is the promoter.

These same courts will be the scene of the Northwestern Illinois tournament on Aug. 31 for all pitchers living within a 60-mile radius of Rock Falls. The Wisconsin line is the boundary on the north, the Iowa line the boundary to the west. Qualifying starts at 8 a.m. and closes at noon. Tournament starts at 1 p.m.

## 1963 Massachusetts Open Championship

The Mass. Open continues to increase in size every year since its beginning 5 years ago. The biggest factor in its success seems to be in setting a deadline before the meeting and taking all entries thru the mail. 95 entries were received and in spite of the addition of 4 courts making a total of 20 courts, 15 entries had to be returned because 80 entries is all that can be handled in one day. Next year the meet will be divided into 2 sections. Each section playing on a different Sunday. Joe Comeau of Lynn, Mass. (1961 champ) and Joe Zichella of the Bronx,

New York (1962 champ) matched victories right down to the final game when they met each other. After 50 shoes pitched in this deciding game the score was 26 all but then Comeau got hot throwing 38 ringers out of the final 42 shoes, finishing up with 8 straight double ringers to win the game 50 to 33.

Comeau averaged 81% against 75 for Zichella in the final game. In Class B George Collard of Lincoln, Rhode Island surprised everyone including himself by walking off with top honors, averaging a steady 62% by far the best percentage he has ever pitched in tournament competition. Porter Clark of Maine started off slow losing three out of his first four games but he came back strong winning his last five games and finishing in a three way tie for second place.





## PROGRESS - PAST - PRESENT - FUTURE

How important is a decade or more of progress to an organization, or the community or communities it represents? Why do some communities and organizations progress while others stand still and sometimes decline? Is a progressive organization or community, one that has no problems, no emergencies, no setbacks? Most problems perhaps stem from the lack of proper planning and of long range which requires looking far into the future and developing step by step a program fitting and proper and of interest to all would be participants, thus creating the tendency to eliminate certain problems as the program takes root.

Who is responsible for this planning, you say?
