

In Memoriam

Ray Ohms of Salt Lake City, Utah, a prominent figure in the world of horseshoe pitching for many years, died suddenly of a heart attack on June 22. His passing comes as a severe shock to the NHPA which expresses its

deep sorrow to members of his family.

Ray was a past Vice-President of the NHPA and took an active part in making arrangements for the many World Tournaments held in Murray 1947 through 1959. He managed many of the NHPA dinners and parties held during these World Tournaments.

Ray was also a great horseshoe pitcher, having won the Utah state title seven times and he also placed well up in the championship division of many World Tournaments.

He was also active as a bowler and was a well known bowling proprietor, having managed a number of the largest bowling establishments in Utah, and was a past president of the Utah Bowling Assoc. He was 51 years of age and was born in Milan, Ill. He is survived by his widow, two sons and one daughter.

West Virginia Centennial Open Tournament

The West Virginia Centennial Open tournament will be held on the City park courts in Parkersburg, West Virginia on Saturday and Sunday, August 17-18. It will be sanctioned by the NHPA and conducted by the West Virginia state association together with the Parkersburg Recreation Commission.

ELIGIBILITY: Open to any member of The National Horseshoe Pitchers Association.

REGISTRATION: Registration will be open until 11:00 A.M., Saturday, August 17. All contestants must have their 1963 N.H.P.A. membership cards with them or be able to prove their membership. Anyone who is not already a member may join the day of the tournament and be eligible to play.

RULES: Rules of play shall be laid down by the N.H.P.A. and the tourment committee.

QUALIFYING: Procedure for qualifying shall be 100 shoes pitched individually for maximum score. Qualifying will be judged by members of the West Virginia State Horseshoe Pitching Association appointed by the Tournament Committee. Players will be permitted to qualify on Friday, August 16 to 12:00 P.M. and Saturday morning, August 17 from 7:00 A.M. to 11:00 A.M.

METHOD OF PLAY: Players will be classified according to their qualifying scores. The 16 highest qualifiers will make up the Class A division. The next 8 highest qualifiers will make up the Class B division. Classes C, D, etc., will be made up of either 6 or 8 players, depending on the number of entries and time factor, in the order in which they qualified. All players who enter the tournament will be allowed to play.

At 1:00 P.M., Saturday, August 17, the lower classes will take the courts and play their round robin matches to their completion. At approximately 5:30 P.M. the Class A and Class B divisions will take the courts. The Class B division will play its 8-man round robin match to its completion. The Class A division will play either 7 or 8 games of its 16-man round robin match, depending on the time factor. At 1:00 P.M. Sunday afternoon, the Class A division will return and play the balance of their 16-man round robin match. If the number of participants exceeds 48 and time will not permit the completion of all the lower class matches on Saturday, these incomplete matches will be played on Sunday morning, August 18. Ties in the lower classes will be determined by percentage.

PRIZES: Trophies will be awarded to first place in each class. There will also be cash prizes. Any player who fails to complete all their games shall forfeit all games as well as any prize money they may win.

ENTRY FEE: The entry fee will be \$5.00, payable on the day of the tournament before qualifying.

Toney, Ballowe and Burnette were tied at the end of regulation play with 8 wins and 2 losses, each. Ballowe outpitched Burnette 52-45 (averaging 62% ringers) dropping Burnette to 3rd spot.

Most ringers thrown in single game was 49 by Toney against Burnette, Highest ringer percentage in single game was 83.3 by Childress against Perdue (25 ringers out of 30 shoes pitched.) Highest qualifier was Thomas Ballowe 240 points (72 ringers out of 100 shoes).

Illinois State Tournament Site Changed

As has been the custom in the past years the annual Illinois State tournament will be held in conjunction with the running of the Illinois State Fair. Dates for the men's division will be Tuesday and Wednesday, August 13 and 14. The annual Boys' tournament will be held on Wednesday, August 14.

Qualifying for the senior division will start at 8 A.M. on Tuesday, August 13 and closing at 11:30 A.M. with all qualifying to be finished at 12 NOON. All qualifiers will pitch 200 shoes and taking their best 100. All entrants must be bona fide residents of Illinois and hold a 1963 National and State card. Also All players who are in the top 24 and play for the championship, MUST purchase an exhibitor ticket. This is a rule of the ILLINOIS State Fair association. There will also be other classes for those who do not qualify for the finals. These classes will pitch Tuesday afternoon IMMEDIATELY following the first round of the semi-finals of the Men's division and continuing until finished under lights. Trophies and cash awards will be made in all classes.

The Boy's tournament will start Wednesday morning, August 14 with each entrant pitching 50 shoes for placement. The top 8 will play for the championship. All boys 17 or under are eligible. Trophies and cash awards

will be given.

The tournament will be conducted in a NEW LOCATION this year. The courts will be located immediately NORTH of the building formerly housing the poultry exhibits. The move was made necessary due to the expansion of the farm machinery exhibit. According to fair officials, ample parking will be available around the courts.

The annual convention of the Illinois association will be held previous

to the start of the tournament on Tuesday, August 13.

Of special interest is the fact that a couple of former active pitchers are again taking to the courts, namely Alvin Gandy of Topeka, who was rated as one of the top players in the nation and participated in several world tournaments where he gave a good account of himself. Another familiar face is that of Frank Knouft, who has resumed action after an absence of several years. He recently played in the Heart of America meet at Kansas City, Missouri where he had a 6-9 record. He practices regularly with Gandy and it is anticipated that these two fine pitchers will make a real campaign for the Kansas State title this fall.

Arch Stokes Memorial Open, Murray, Utah, July 27

Players on their way to the World Tournament in California will have a chance to stretch their legs and play on the famous Murray courts, scene of

many past World Tournaments.

The Utah Association announced they will conduct an Arch Stokes Memorial Open on these courts on July 27, and it is expected that many players who have appeared in Murray in the past will stop off and compete as a warm up to the World Tourney. There will be no qualifying round.

Tenth Annual Cornbelt Open Tournament — August 17-18

The tenth annual Cornbelt Open tournament will be held on the Crapo park courts in Burlington, Iowa on Saturday and Sunday, August 17 and 18. Qualifying will start on Saturday, August 17 until 10 P.M. Pitchers will be allowed two 100-shoe rounds on Saturday ONLY with a qualifying fee of \$2.00 per 100., taking their best 100 shoe count. Qualifying will continue on Sunday until the deadline of 9:30 A.M. Players will pitch 100 shoes ONLY

with fee of \$2.00.

The top 11 qualifiers together with the defending champion, Clint Van Dusen of Galesburg, Illinois will make up Class A. The next 12 will form Class B with both A and B being divided into two groups of 6 men each. Class C, D, and E will have 8 men in each class being divided into 2 groups each. Those men playing in Class A will pay an additional fee of \$3.00 when the tournament starts. Class B men an additional fee of \$2.00 and Class C, D, and E men an additional fee of \$1.00 per man. Classes C, D, and E will start tournament play at 10:30 A.M. DST on Sunday, August 18 with Classes A and B starting at 1:00 P.M.

Top man in each group will play for first and second. Cancellation method will be used, playing 50 point games. Runner-up in each group will play for third and fourth and etc. There will be a trophy for first and second in Class A. Cash prizes to the top 8 men in Class A. Trophies to first and second in Class B with cash prizes to the top 6 men in Class B. There will be a trophy to the winner of Classes C, D and E. High qualifier will be awarded a \$10.00 grocery order. Also there will be a special award for the

pitcher coming the farthest distance.

There will be movies on Saturday evening, weather permitting.

We want to give these clubs the recognition they deserve.

York County Club in eastern Pennsylvania operates a team league of 12 teams. Each team has two courts in different locations in the county. Team dues and raffles are used to finance the league. Milt Beck of Wrightsville is the President who organized the group with six teams in 1959. Earl and Glenn Brown of Felton are the Vice-Presidents and Eugene Mundis of Winsdor the Secretary-Treasurer. The individual county championship was won by Glenn Brown in 1962. This group is the most outstanding organization in the eastern end of the state and works closely with the Pennsylvania State Association and the NHPA.

East Dayton, O. Horseshoe Club, is one of the most co-operative clubs in the country, having always donated to the World Tourney and worked closely with the NHPA and the Ohio Association. All the members have individual courts and the club itself has two courts. Glen Riffle, former National A.A.U. champion, won the individual title in 1962. 
section of U.S. 34, Sunday, August 11.

Phil and Ira each broke the Tournament record for the number of ringers pitched by a winner and a loser in a single game.

Warren Hedman of Gascoyne, North Dakota took the Class "B" Championship with 7 wins and no losses. He pitched 50.8% ringers. Herbert Sand of Glasgow, Montana took second place with 5 wins and 2 losses. He pitched 41.5% ringers. Herb was the youngest player entered in the Tournament.

Arbogast Gives Views On Handicap

A handicap system is used in such sports as golf, bowling and horse racing and has not reduced the excitement, thrill and incentive to win by either or any of the participants. In fact, I'm sure that the handicap system has greatly expanded these sports perhaps more than any single factor. There is still the open competition in these sports with a huge following of rooters and backers which is essential to any sport. Knowledge of the game is another big factor in the enjoyment of any sport and knowledge of any sport comes mostly by participation. People will come to see a sport which they are not too familiar with just out of curiosity but to keep them interested they must feel the game and to feel the game you must know how difficult it is to pitch a ringer, a double ringer, 50%, 60%. They must feel the tension a pitcher faces when he tries to top a ringer. They must feel the agony a pitcher goes through when his legs ache, his arm is tired. They must know of the handicaps, of the burning sun, the gusting wind, and numerous other noises and distractions. I firmly believe that a handicap system is one of the ways of getting people to pitch horseshoes and to feel and suffer and enjoy those thrilling moments which come to every horseshoe pitcher. There are many people of all ages who have never pitched a horseshoe but given the proper incentive and a chance to win would and could develop into perhaps even greater horseshoe pitchers than we now have.

If horseshoe pitching is to progress competition must be very close and not in the hands of a few especially in the local clubs who we know are going to win the big tournaments. I am definitely not against open competition but we must develop more horseshoe pitchers if there is to be keen competition in all classes and the handicap system seems to me to be the answer to stim-

ulate the beginners with the will to win on a nearly equal basis.


