CREDIT WHERE CREDIT IS DUE

This issue of the "Digest" is dedicated to all the local horseshoe clubs and groups of players across the land who co-operate with the NHPA and strive to promote the welfare of the game.

It especially honors the average players and those in the lower ringer percentage brackets who as members of their local clubs and the NHPA receive little or no mention in the "Digest", but play the game for the fun, recreation and good fellowship our sport brings to all its participants.

Specifically the NHPA wants to pay tribute to those officials and boosters of the game in the local groups who give so much of themselves in organizing, directing and promoting the game on the local level, many of whom never play themselves but devote themselves to the task of administrating.

Men like Percey Howe of Massachusetts and Roger Barnaby of Montana who are physically handicapped and local officers and boosters such as Randall Jones of North Carolina and Phil Luoto of Washington, who seldom toss a shoe, and to old timers who are no longer active as players such as Art Niemann of Wisconsin and Ben Raskopf of Tennessee, but nevertheless devote time and energy to the game. We also want to give credit to the likes of Jim Weeks of California and Charlie Stephens of Florida who are top players in their own right but sacrifice much of their ability in the interest of organizing and directing activities.

There are many more in each of these categories — too many to mention personally in this article. Some, but not all are listed in the notes on local clubs which follow. There are also many who merit credit who are not known by name to the NHPA for the National officers can not possibly know the details about all local groups.

To all of these players, officials, promoters and boosters on the local level the NHPA expresses its genuine thanks and appreciation.

PERRY SESQUI-CENTENNIAL EASTERN NATIONAL

The Perry Sesqui-Centennial Eastern National tournament will be held at the Glenwood park courts in Erie, Pennsylvania on June 21-22-23. It will be part of the celebration honoring Oliver Hazard Perry's victory over the British at Lake Erie in 1813.

The Erie club has been conducting a fund-raising campaign during the past few weeks and are posting \$700.00 in prizes.

LOCKPORT, N. Y. HAS ACTIVE LEAGUE

A few years ago the NHPA Secretary received a letter from Lockport, N. Y. stating that a number of individuals were interested in forming a horseshoe club in that city. The letter requested information concerning different types of league and team competition and methods of organizing. In addition films of the World Tournament were made available.

Today some four or five years later this is one of the best organized and successful local clubs in the country, and congratulations are in order to the officers and promoters, both present and past.

The club has six teams in the league, each one sponsored by a firm paying a fee of \$25. Contest fees of 10 cents per game are also played and the money is used to pay the Secretary for his work and to hold a big banquet at the end of the season. The banquet was attended by 125 people and New York State champ, Carl Steinfeldt of Rochester was the guest of honor — T-bone steaks being enjoyed by all.


The Club also has a very active Women's League with six teams, the ages of the players ranging from 15 to 50 years. Team entry fee is \$10 and the individual fee is 15 cents per game.

Five lighted courts for both men and women are located in Outwater Park. Home and home team matches with Mt. Morris, N Y. and Delaware Park of Buffalo were played during the season.

Officers of the Men's league are Ted Domanski, President and Paul Thomas, Secretary. Officers of the Women's league are Dolores Herberger, President and Lorraine Thomas, Secretary-Treasurer.

NHPA AND LOCAL CLUB PROBLEMS

Neither the NHPA nor the game of horseshoe could exist very long without organized activities and a maintaining of interest by local clubs and groups.

By the same token local clubs and the game itself would soon disappear if there was no National Association to maintain interest, stabilize competitive procedures and playing equipment and to serve as a means of communication.

Therefore it behooves both the NHPA and all local groups to co-operate and work together for the good of the game.

Our biggest asset is the character of the game itself — a fine old American sport which is far more inexpensive than other pastimes and provides a moderate amount of healthy outdoor exercise and good fellowship which can be enjoyed by all ages and requires a playing skill which is a challenge to everyone.

Our most pressing problem both on the National and the local level is a lack of adequate financing for our activities. Solve this and the other problems will prove much easier to cope with.

The NHPA has made a start with the Miller Brewing Co. Championship Trophy sponsorship. Our sale of various accessories, particularly that of trophies, is designed to provide money to promote the game.

Membership dues is not enough, but individual players should be willing to contribute more in this respect for horseshoe dues, local, state and national, are TINY compared to what participants in other sports pay for each hour spent. Many clubs, such as the Muncie, Ind., Seattle, Wash. and Erie, Pa. groups raise

funds by the sale of horseshoe accessories and raffles. The Muncie and the Greenville, Ohio club do quite well with ads in program brochures for their outstanding events.

Noteworthy is the Pike County Ohio group which sold certificates of ownership to buy land, build courts and erect a clubhouse and indoor courts. This idea could well be used by many clubs. The Lockport, N. Y. club's feat of obtaining substantial sponsorship of league

teams on a financial basis is another means which local clubs would do well to emulate.

Co-operation is another key problem. Individuals should support their local clubs and officials and show their appreciation. You can not expect your officers to administer and direct activities and also do groundskeeping, scorekeeping and maintenance chores. Help with these chores, contribute ideas, but don't grumble and criticize. No officer can design a program to satisfy everybody.

Bob Pence once remarked "I have made out many tournament prize lists, but have never yet designed one that completely satisfied myself, so how can I expect to satisfy all the players?"

Local groups must also co-operate with the NHPA. They can not expect the NHPA to solve their problems for them, but co-operation is the only thing which will make the NHPA effective.

Leadership is another problem which plagues the game. Group after group report that lack of good leadership is all that they need on the local level. No one makes any money out of the game, not even an occasional and easy "fast buck". Therefore we do not attract any outside support or leadership. Local clubs should find men who are willing, capable and have the time to serve as officers. They should be given the authority to act and the membership should see that they are not burdened with too much detail.

The public image of the game. This is a problem which can be solved. Publicity on the local level is the key. Make sure your local paper receives news of your activities. Assign one person to this detail. Typewrite and double space news items. Weekly items do more good than one big splash. Success may not come at once, but persistence will gain the desired end.

Neat dress on the courts by the players in league or tournament events is also essential to a good image. NHPA sport shirts and T-shirts can provide an answer.

More Junior and Boy's participation is needed. The average age of horseshoe players is high and is increasing. Development of younger players is needed. Working with Park and Recreation departments is the best answer.

Women's competition is needed. We need more like Sue Gillespie, Nancy Henton, Wanda Ditmer and Esta McKee to go with veterans like Vicki Winston and Anna Lindquist. Golf and bowling prosper because the ladies as well as men take part. The Lockport, N. Y. and Pike County Ohio clubs with their Women's leagues and the Lafayette, Ind. club with its Ladies Auxiliary are effective groups. Interest by the women is higher now than ever before and we should all keep it increasing.

WORLD TOURNAMENT MAY BE ON TV

The very strong possibility that ABC Wide World of Sports may televise a segment of the World Tournament may make it necessary for a slight change in the scheduling on the final day, Tuesday, August 6.

The Ladies and the Juniors will definitely play on Monday and Tuesday, August 5-6. Under advisement is the possibility that we will use a four man playoff in the championship division of the men on the final night.

1963 World Tournament cash prizes will duplicate last year's awards and total \$5,233.00.

SPRING WARM-UP MEET AT STERLING-ROCK FALLS, ILLINOIS

The fifth annual Spring Warm-Up Open tournament will be held on the Lawrence park courts mid-way between Rock Falls and Sterling on the beautiful Rock River on Memorial Day. There will be five classes with 12 men in Class A and B being divided into groups of 6 men each. The winner of Group 1 and 2 will play for first place with the runner-up in each group playing for third place. There will be five trophies awarded and cash prizes for the top 4 in each class. Entry fee will be \$1.00 and an additional \$1.00 from each of the top 32 men qualifying for the finals. Qualifying round will start at 8 A. M. with the tournament round robin beginning promptly at 1:30 P. M.

The hard work and preparations being made by The Darke County, Ohio Horseshoe Club, coupled with the cooperation of the Greenville Park Board, should assure a successful tourney conducted by The Ohio State Buckeye Association over the long July 4th week-end.

This will be an "OPEN", sanctioned by the NHPA, and an \$800.00 Prize Fund is guaranteed. The entry fee is set at \$5.00. Each entrant must qualify by pitching 100 shoes at the courts. The Qualifying time schedule is: Thursday, July 4th — 10:00 A. M. - 7:00 P. M.; Friday, July 5th — 9:00 A. M. - 9:00 P. M.; Saturday, July 6th — 8:00 A. M. - 12:00 Noon. The pitchers will then be classified as soon as possible and the Round Robin tournament play will begin Saturday afternoon, continue in the evening, and resume on Sunday morning July 7th, until completed.

As an additional attraction, on July 4th, a Ladies Division sanctioned tournament will be at 2:00 P. M. in the afternoon. (Entrants must be registered by 1:00 P. M.) Entry fee for the Ladies is \$3.00.

TENTH ANNUAL LAKESIDE, OHIO OPEN, JUNE 29

The Ohio Buckeye State Association has completed arrangements for this year's Open Tournament at Lakeside, Ohio on Saturday, June 29th, at The Methodist Church Conference Grounds, just outside Port Clinton, Ohio, on Lake Erie. This, of course, is an NHPA sanctioned meet.

As here-to-fore, this is a ONE DAY affair and all who expect to enter are to sign in at the courts by 8:30 on Saturday morning June 29th so that play can get under way as soon as possible. (Those who can come in Friday afternoon or evening are urged do so.) Again, there will be NO QUALIFYING, instead entrants will be classified by their most recent past year's sanctioned tournament Ringer Percentages. Players from other than Ohio are asked to bring records showing at least 3 sanctioned tournaments they pitched in, listing Shoes Pitched, Ringers, and Ringer Percent. By reason of the limited time and courts, it is planned that only 50 players in all can pitch in this tournament, so far this season they will be the 50 highest Ringer Percent pitchers selected from the total entry list. The entry fee is \$5.50. Cash prizes and nice trophies will be awarded. Paul Focht, of Ohio, is the defending champion.

The entry fee will be \$1.00 for each 50 shoes pitched, there being no limit set for number of qualifying rounds for any entrant. The Paris and Kansas courts are lighted. Byron Cline of Kansas, Ill. is the 1963 League Secretary. Oakland, Ill. won the team championship in 1962 with Paris in 2nd Place. Gilbert Bancroft of Oakland had the high individual average, 111.7 points for each 100 shoes. Karl Van Sant of Cayuga was 2nd with a mark of 110.2 and Merle Tirey of Oakland was 3rd with 105.3. Merle Tirey won the League tournament held at Paris at the end of the season. 
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THE HORSESHOE PITCHER'S NEWS DIGEST

IDAHO



REMINISCING . . . with Alvin Dahlene

Ted Allen, one of the greatest horseshoe pitchers of all time, won his first national championship in 1933 at the Century of Progress (World's Fair) in Chicago. At that time Ted was practically unknown but he tied with C. C. Davis of Kansas City, Missouri for the crown. In the ensuing playoff Ted won the title from the Missouri wizard and, as we all know, he has continued his interest in the game since that time. Just how many pitchers who took part in the 1933 classic are still pitching in National meets? In checking over my August 1933 Horseshoe World, I find that Ted is the only one of the group still on the firing line. C. C. Davis, who is now around 75 years of age, is still living in Kansas City. Three of that group are no longer in this world— Duryee of Kansas, Nunamaker of Ohio and Hawley of Ohio. Maybe there are others who have passed on. The next official National meet was in Moline and we find that Ted is

The next official National meet was in Moline and we find that Ted is the only one of that group still pitching in the finals of the 1962 group. There was a meet in California in 1934 and Ted won it — but cash prizes as listed were not forthcoming. In the 1940 meet at Des Moines the names of two pitchers appear (Dixon and Robinson) who pitched in the 1962 along with Ted.

Believe it or not, after all these years Ted Allen is pitching better ringer percentages than he did almost 30 years ago; but the game has advanced so much in that time with better shoes, courts, more interest in the game by younger men, that despite the fact that Allen can still average 80% ringers he finds it hard to win the crown. I have seen and pitched against some of the finest pitchers of all time — Allen, Isais, Zimmerman (deceased), Casey Jones and a host of others, but Ted stands out like a BEACON LIGHT in the sea of shoe pitchers. He has a phenomenal record and it may never be equalled in our time. Only Isais who has quit pitching approached the records set by Ted for durability. Of course, Isais has one record that is really great — that of 6 consecutive National titles with an almost unbelievable average of around 83.5% ringers. The years from 1933 to 1959 were truly the Allen— Isais years. They ruled it with an iron fist with only one player breaking the string — Guy Zimmerman did it in 1954 at Salt Lake City. Modern day pitchers like Curt Day, Harold Reno, Focht and Hohl are great pitchers but the law of averages say they will never rule the game with the fierce competitive ability of Ted Allen. Even in the last National

Even in the last National at Greenville, Ohio, Ted vanquished Focht, Reno and Day; a man-sized job in any meet. Ted's age is against him in keeping "KEYED UP" for every man in the tournament; he has to rest once in a while and then he gets slipped up on by some pitcher who probably never will approach his greatness. Ted is a SHOWMAN. Put him before a large audience and against the best the game has to offer and I think Ted could still win the series in best 4 of 7-50 point games. That's just how I evaluate Ted Allen over the years. He was terrific and, though he has slipped somewhat, it takes a great pitcher to beat him.

Canadian Horseshoe Pitchers Association

The Canadian Association held a meeting recently with the following excerpts being passed on to the membership and others who will be interested in the activities of our friends and neighbors in the Dominion of Canada.

SCHOOL OF INSTRUCTION — As was pointed out last year, this is not a committee to teach members how to play horseshoes. This is a committee, to teach instructors, the methods of instruction so that they, in turn, can instruct beginners not only how to handle the shoes, but actually everything else necessary to take part in the game — such as laying out a court, how to keep records, how to set up a tournament, etc., etc.

So, the Executive has appointed five well known members to our "Board" and when they have been contacted and select their own Chairman, their names will be released to you, and your cooperation requested.

TEAM PLAY — A concerted effort is going to be made this year, to get team play going on a wide scale throughout Ontario, with a view to it's spreading to the other provinces as soon as possible. There are letters going out to some well known members, requesting them to contact others playing in their district, for the purpose of forming teams, who will take part in a schedule of play which will be drawn up after the entries are in. Every team will play on the same day, and the day selected is Sunday. The results are to be sent to the Secretary immediately so they can be edited and returned to you before the next match.

A team consists of FOUR players from a Club. You are not restricted to any particular 4 men, when you need an alternative to fill in for someone who just cannot make it for a scheduled match, you are allowed to find another man. WE DO NOT WANT ANY POSTPONED GAMES, for any other reason except weather conditions. In this manner, we expect to develop a good fellowship among players all over the Province. You will meet and make friends with other players, and the results will show the comparison between the districts.

This is an "OPEN" league, there are no restrictions on players ability, no handicapping. There need be no apprehension regarding losing to a packed team, for no man can keep you from becoming the best player that ever lived, your ability is governed by your training habits.

The Team is made up of TWO PAIRS, one will be known as the "A" double and the other the "B". Therefore a match consists of 2 games, as each pair plays against each of ihe other teams. 1st game A vs. A and B vs. B, and the second game A vs. B and B vs. A. Total of 4 points, most points winning the match — Yes, there can be ties.

A game is 50 points. However, when either pair reaches 25 points, one pair CHANGES ENDS so that a player only plays half a game against any opponent. You may toss a shoe or coin to decide which pair changes ends but you must take the change at approximately 25 points.


