N.H.P.A. MEMBERSHIP HISTORY

The NHPA can look back at 1963 with the satisfaction of having gained more than 125 members and look forward to 1964 with the prospects of establishing an all time membership record.

1963 membership totals were exceeded only twice in previous NHPA history, 1937 when the dues were only $15 \, e$ and 1949 when annual dues were $50 \, e$.

The dues were so low in 1937 when the highest total was registered that the NHPA was so weak financially it was ineffective during the next few years.

Arch Stokes, Harvey Clear, Archie Gregson and others did a yeoman job of rebuilding following the war. Dues were raised to 50ϕ and the second highest membership total in history was attained in 1949.

Dues were again raised to \$1.00 in 1953 and this plus the fact the World Tourney was held in one location for many years began to kill off interest in other sections of the country combined to bring about a substantial loss in membership.

Under the leadership of Elmer Beller the NHPA began to build on a solid basis and regain membership. During these years there was no official NHPA publication, although Byron Jaskulek of New York City published a small monthly magazine independently until his death in 1956.

The NHPA took over and began publishing the present "Horseshoe Pitcher's New Digest" in 1957, making its subscription a part of the dues which were raised to \$3.50. This resulted in a loss the first year, but a huge gain in readers compared to Jake's magazine.

The monthly magazine under the editorship of Ellis Cobb, Illinois State Secretary, soon proved its effectiveness providing a means of communication, information and stimulation which has resulted in a steady gain in membership each year since.

Even more important than membership is the fact that today there are far more tournaments, both the big opens and the smaller local type. The entry lists are larger and come from a much wider geographic area. There are more strong local clubs with good weekly programs for the average player and the beginnier. The NHPA now has members in states and areas it never touched in the past.

With the monthly magazine now established firmly the NHPA has made subscription optional and with the mandatory dues lowered to \$1.00 we have an excellent chance of signing up hundreds of new players.

Illinois State Tournament Set for August 18-19

Word has just been received that the Illinois state tournament held in conjunction with the annual Illinois state fair will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, August 18 and 19. Boys' tournament will be held on Wednesday, August 19. For a time it was thought that the meet would conflict with the annual World tournament scheduled for Greenville, Ohio, August 1-11. More details will be issued in a later issue of the News Digest.

SHADES OF THE PAST

A glance at the 1963 membership roster of the NHPA reveals that a number of outstanding figures of the past have reunited with the NHPA after a long absence. Included in this list are the following;

Jim O'Shea of Brocton, Mass., a former New England and State champ. O'Shea first appeared in the 1935 World Tournament, but his best mark was in the 1947 tourney at Murray when he posted a 29-6 record with 79.4% ringers to finish 5th, one notch above Guy Zimmerman.

Andy Stolarik of Canton, Ohio, former NHPA Vice-President and one of the top Buckeye players of the 30s and 40s. Andy made an excellent showing in the 1946 World Tournament at Des Moines, Iowa.

Jim Leckey of Phoenix, Arizona, one of the really great players of the 1930s. He finished 2nd with a 74% ringer average in the 1934 World Tourney in Los Angeles and has appeared on the Art Baker TV show "You Asked for It" in the role of a horseshoe pitcher doing trick shots.

Hansford Jackson of California, son of the famous World Champion Frank Jackson, and a great player in his own right who last appeared in the 1947 World Tournament.

Frank Lundin of New London, Ia. 1922 World Champion who also placed 2nd in 1923, has been a faithful member of NHPA, although he has not been an active player for many years.

WE'RE OFF AND RUNNING!

NHPA memberships which came in during January were far heavier than ever before for the first month of the year — a time when horseshoe interest is usually at its lowest point.

This indicates that the NHPA is "off and running" towards a new all time membership record and the various state associations are in a position to have banner seasons.

Part of the reason is the new membership policy which separates the membership fee from the magazine subscription making the latter optional.

Already there has been a sizeable number of brand new members turned

in from cities never before in the NHPA fold.

New Jersey which experienced a drop in NHPA membership last year has already exceeded its 1963 total. 15 of these were brand new from Middlesex, a town without previous NHPA members. A half dozen others were new members from other cities signed under the new provision. All this indicates New Jersey officials are on the ball and on the way to a big year.

Other new members signed under the new provision include groups from

Northern California, Nevada, New Hampshire and Michigan.

In addition there has been the usual number of early renewals by old members from Indiana, Ohio, Southern California, New Jersey, Massachusetts,

West Virginia, Florida, Michigan, New York, Tennessee and Washington.

There have been very few renewals of old members who dropped their "News Digest" subscription, the one element of the new provision about which

some misgivings were expressed. States and State Secretaries who do not take steps to increase their own and NHPA membership by means of the new setup will be missing out on a golden opportunity.


