

We Salute . . .

Stanley Hill, of Tower, Minnesota

recipient of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce SPC Physical Fitness Leadership Award.

For his outstanding accomplishments in promoting and organizing sports in Tower and Soudan, Minnesota and specifically in the organizing of the Tower-Soudan Horseshoe Pitchers' association and the Men's and Boys' Leagues, Mr. Stanley J. Hill was nominated to receive the annual Jaycees award. He was just one of the individuals in the United States, who have by their own efforts and example, made significant contributions to the country's physical fitness movement. Each year in cooperation with the President's Council on Physical Fitness, the Jaycees all over the country work in conjunction with the Standard Packaging Corporation of New York to provide awards on the local, state and national levels to those who strive to improve physical fitness standards.

Through his constant and untiring leadership and guidance, Stan was able to bring Tower and Soudan from out of nowhere to one of the bright spots on Minnesota's horseshoe pitching map. He was able to secure what was a public eyesore in Tower and transform it into one of the finest and most attractive horseshoe courts in the state. He organized and personally supervised the boys' league which is one of the strongest in the state. Both men's and boys' leagues had winners in the state tournament.

In his own personal playing career, Stan has won seven trophies in eight tournaments. He was named vice-president of the Minnesota State Association. He has also promoted basketball and softball in Tower and Soudan. He has only been playing in competition for two years and pitches a rather unorthodox shoe, it being a "double flip-flop" shoe which he has averaged 50% with. He is at present heading a drive to install lights on the courts that are already equipped with scoreboards and bleachers.

It was pointed out that in the space of two hours of pitching horseshoes, a sport that is often underestimated, a horseshoe pitcher throws a total of 700 pounds, walks one mile and does 150 knee-bends while picking up the horseshoes.

In commenting on the award, Mr. Hill remarked that he owed all of his accomplishments to the Tower-Soudan Association without whose help it would never have come to pass.

He contends, and has proved, that the youngsters will take to the game if enough adult pitchers will just take the time to start them out and supervise some kind of a horseshoe pitching program.

New York State Tournament Cancelled at Hornell Club Site

Due to circumstances beyond their control, the Hornell, New York club has had to cancel their plans to hold the annual New York state tournament in that city.

The Hornell club has worked hard for the last six months making plans for the meet and now finds that proper lighting cannot be furnished which makes further planning inadvisable under the conditions that now exist.

It is with deep regret that the decision was made but with the feeling that perhaps the 1964 championship tournament can be arranged for some other city in the state.

Second Annual Bremen Open To Be Held July 18-19

Qualifying will be held at Bremen, Ohio on July 1-11 from 6 until 10 p.m. Deadline for all qualifying will be 10 p.m., on July 11. "From Out Of The Mail Bag"

Dear Mr. Cobb:

I wish to submit a little information on a new club that has been formed in northwest Indiana. The new club was started 3 years ago. Pitching in sand, but with a growing interest each year, we decided to put four regulation courts in. The work and material was all donated by the members of our club. Last year we had pitchers from as far as 30 miles coming for our weekly league.

We have a doubles league which plays one night a week and all classes play in the same league. As the team enters the league they are put in a class, although they will play all classes "A" through "F" at the end of the first round of league play the team having the most wins in each class gets a trophy. In our last half of league season the winners in each class have to move up to the next division giving some other team a chance to win. We feel this way there is less bookkeeping and it gives the poorer pitchers a chance to play better competition and thus improve.

To raise money this year we made six scoreboards; on each side of the scoreboards we sold advertisements to the local businessmen for five dollars. This brought in sixty dollars to get our first meeting started. We have ordered the NHPA 1962 National movie for our meeting and are hoping for a large turn-out. We have purchased a used pop cooler and will sell pop on league nights and at tourneys. This money will go for upkeep on our courts and for

our annual picnic.

I am very happy to announce we attended our state meeting this year at Wabash, Indiana. We met with the state officers and a nice group of shoe enthusiasts throughout the state. Our national secretary, Mr. Robert Pence, was on hand to help guide our program for the coming year. We accomplished getting a NHPA tournament to initiate our new membership in the NHPA. (It will be May 23-24.)

We have added two more courts and are anticipating about 60 pitchers to enter our league play this summer. We are very thankful and proud of our new membership in the NHPA and hope to be a helpful and worthy club.


The league plays every Tuesday night with eight teams entered, all from Fargo except Grandin Garage. The league increased handicap from 80 to 90 per cent from the 1964 season. Sheyenne Bar of Horace and Lein Insurance of Arthur dropped from the league but replacements are being securd.

Iowa Hawkeye Group Uses New System In Special Match

Having a strong desire to try out a new system, Ernie Danielson of Burlington, Iowa decided to use a new system of scoring during a special match game between his Burlington team and that of one from Oakville, Iowa. Comparing the cancellation system, which was time consuming, they played a round robin with four men on a team, using the regular 50 pt. method of cancellation, the total time was two hours. They then switched to the new style, as follows: Each man pitched 20 shoes or ten innings in round robin fashion. Each ringer counted 1 point, two ringers, 2 points, closest shoe to stake, but no ringers, 1 point. The time for this way of pitching for four games was one half hour. Total points were counted. Total difference in points was only 28, whereas in the cancellation system there was a difference of 265 points. For the purpose demonstrated, only 20 shoes were pitched, but 50 shoes could very well be used.

Danielson figured that this system could be used in qualifying and be able to play every man that came to a meet. The top men could be put in Class A and so on down until all were placed. In that way it was contended that every man would be satisfied, in that the weaker player would be on an equal with all others. The style of scoresheets would remain the same.

Herm Gilpin reports that the city has built 10 new courts for the Keokuk, Iowa players and a banner season is expected.



Prices include all shipping costs and the first 25 letters of engraving per trophy, each additional letter of engraving being only five cents. There will be no delays in handling orders and United Parcel Delivery Service will be

used whenever possible and all shipments are fully insured.

The NHPA has made special top quality horseshoe trophies available for a number of years as a service to affiliated clubs. As a non-profit organization all revenue derived from these sales is used to promote the game. More than \$6000.00 of trophies were sold last year including many repeat orders which indicates how well NHPA clubs regard these trophy values.

Source of the trophies are the Bowling and Trophy Shops of Hal Leiber, an NHPA member and booster of the game who has donated many trophies to the World Tournament and the Indiana State Tournament.

He has nine shops in the Chicagoland area, makes his own trophies, does his own engraving, has his own woodworking shop, imports marble direct from Italy and molds his own figurines. All of this eliminates the middleman, enables him to select the very best materials and substantially lowers prices compared to other trophy sources.

The horseshoe figurine used was designed especially through the efforts of an NHPA member cooperating with a manufacturer, and is the only one available which is a replica of an actual horseshoe player. It has now been

copied by many trophy companies.

NOTE: The horseshoe figurine is available only in the number 5 size. The illustrations in the regular catalog will show some other size figurines and they are designated by the number following the / in the trophy number. When the number 6 follows the / the figurine used is smaller than the horseshoe figurine and 50¢ must be added to the price. Generally speaking number 7 and 8 size figurines are used on trophies too small to use the horseshoe figurine. Victory eagles will be substituted for the bowling pins shown in the illustrations.

LADIES. JUNIORS. SENIORS! MORE WORLD TOURNAMENT ACTION PLANNED

World Tourney action will be increased for the ladies, junior players under 17 and senior players over 60 in the 1964 event at Greenville, Ohio, Aug. 1-11.

Junior players will qualify with 50 shoes anytime during the first four days. The top eight will play for the title under lights the fifth night while the remainder of the field will be divided into six man classes for play that afternoon. All eight of the finalists will receive trophies donated by the various horseshoe manufacturing firms. Winners of the afternoon classes will also receive awards. This is strictly an amateur event with no entry fee or cash prizes.

The Ladies will qualify with 100 or 50 shoes during the first four days. The top six or eight will play for the title on the fifth night under lights

with a Class B playing in the afternoon.

The Senior division for players over 60 will also be split into a Class A and B, with the championship group playing at the same time the Ladies and

Juniors decide their titles.

Qualifying for all classes and divisions will start at noon on Saturday, Aug. 1 and end at noon on Wednesday, Aug. 5, with the lower classes of the Ladies, Juniors and Seniors taking the courts that afternoon.

Wednesday night, Aug. 5, will witness the opening ceremonies and the championships of the Ladies, Juniors and Seniors.


