Minnesota State Boys Horseshoe Tournament

DATES: September 4, 1965 — Saturday, Duluth, Minnesota. Four classes of six each — A, B, C, D — Three trophies for each class. Total of 12 trophies. Winner of Class 'A' is State Champ.

QUALIFYING: Qualifying is done on home courts. Pitching 30 shoes—walking back and forth. If there is less than 6 qualifying for 40 feet distance, they will combine with 30 feet pitchers and can pitch 30 feet or 40 feet. Deadline for qualifying — August 20, 1965. Qualifying sheets should be in the hands of the Tournament Secretary by August 23.

FINALISTS: Top 24 boys. No Entry Fee.

SCHEDULE: Saturday from 1:00 p. m. on Classes A, B, C, D. Five game round robin in each class.

COURTS: Wheeler Field in West Duluth, West of Ore Docks 35th Ave. and Grand Avenue. Grand Avenue is also U. S. Highway 61 and Minnesota State Highway 23. Twelve courts with concrete platforms. We might have clay this time.

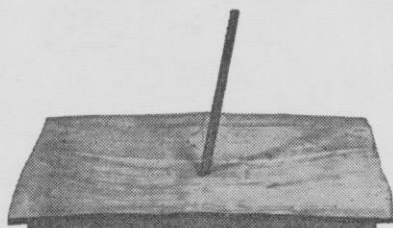

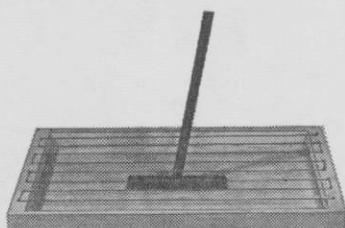

Ohio State Championship, Greenville, Ohio Sept. 3-6

Ohio pitchers will for the ninth straight year meet at City Park, Greenville, Ohio to determine the Ohio Championships over Labor Day week-end.

ENTRY FEE AND QUALIFYING: Entry fee \$5.00. Qualifying (100 shoes) on Friday afternoon and evening, Sept. 3rd from 2:00 to 9:00 P. M., and on Saturday morning Sept. 4th to 12:00 noon, the deadline for entries. All contestants must be Ohio residents and hold an NHPA 1965 card. (Cards will be available at the courts.)

CONVENTION: The annual meeting of The Ohio Buckeye State Association will be held early Saturday afternoon Sept. 4th as soon as possible after all entrants have qualified for the tournament.

ROUND ROBIN: Begins Saturday afternoon Sept. 4th, after the convention, continues on Sunday morning Sept. 5th, and finishes on Labor Day Sept. 6th. Classes will be arranged, as usual, according to qualifying scores.

LADIES TOURNAMENT: Saturday afternoon Sept. 4th, after the convention. Limited to residents of Ohio and holders of NHPA 1965 card. Entry fee \$5.00. No qualifying. Entries close Sept. 4th, at 12:00 noon.

JUNIOR TOURNAMENT: Saturday afternoon Sept. 4th, after the convention. Limited to residents of Ohio, age 16 and under. Will not require NHPA card, no entry fee, no qualifying. Entries close Sept. 4th, at 12 noon.

AWARDS: As an NHPA sanctioned tournament, in addition to certificates, both trophies and cash prizes will be presented.

GENERAL: Harold Reno is the defending champion, Ruth Bennett the defending Ladies champion and D. Riffle the defending Junior champ. James Solomon Wins Eastern National Horseshoe Crown

Jimmy Solomon, the Pennsylvania State Champion, became the 1965 Eastern National Champion by going undefeated in the round robin competition. Jimmy appeared to be in serious trouble only once. That was when he was nudged by George Mahalic of West Virginia 50 to 47, with both pitchers throwing a relatively low 64.9%. Even with this low game, Jimmy managed to compile a phenomenal average of 81.0%. Jimmy's best game of the tournament was with Al Zadroga when Jimmy threw 89.0%, winning 51 to 21. The highest percentage game of the Class A competition came when Zadroga defeated Ted Allen 51 to 20 while throwing 89.4%.

Class B honors went to Glenn Riffle who also had the distinction of throwing the highest percentage game of the entire tournament, a 93.3% against Robert Bird. In this game Glenn only missed two shoes.

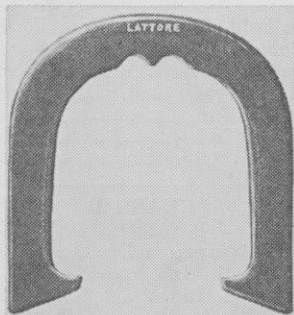

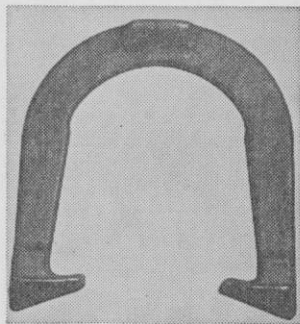

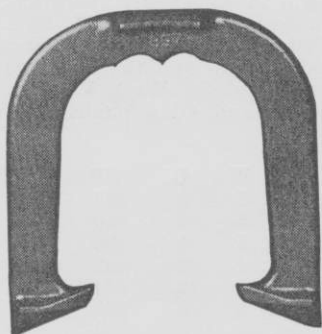

Bellingham, Washington — Having a club membership of 30 members which was the average over the past several years, we organized a league using the "count-all" system. We play on Thursday evenings and play 4 games pitching 60 shoes per game. Players alternate first pitch. As the league progresses, all players develop an average as in bowling. As an example as to how the system works — Johnson plays Smith. Johnson's average is 120 and Smith has 90. To begin the game, Smith will have 30 points on the scoreboard right away. As a result of this handicap, the stronger pitcher can not let up and keeps him playing his best so as to be in competition for the weekly traveling trophy for winner of the most games in the week's play. If several men win all 4 games, as it sometimes happens, the trophy goes to the man with the most points. There is a second trophy that goes to the player having the most points in four games without any handicap. Interest in the game has increased greatly. When we play other clubs using regular scoring, we know without a doubt as to who are the best pitchers. We hope to increase membership in the state and NHPA next

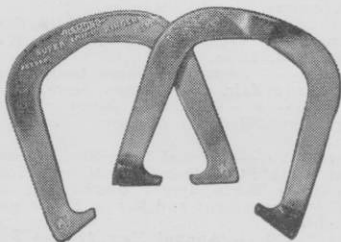

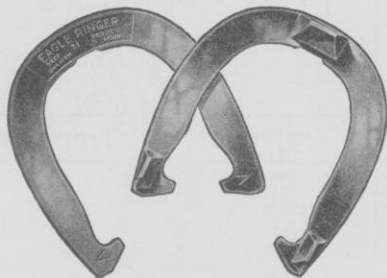

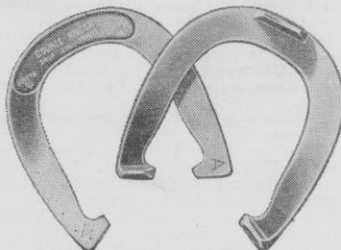
