
#### **DIXON PORTABLE HORSESHOE COURTS**

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
Dixon Portable Horseshoe Courts (Patent Pending) are now available. I have received many inquiries on these courts, but have not been able to present them at a price I felt would be attractive. I have been able to purchase the rubber pads in large quantities and can pass the savings on to you. The new nylon suspension system has eliminated some cost and improves the efficiency of the rubber pad greatly. The life of these pads should be at least ten years and are guaranteed for two years.

I have eliminated painting to keep the price down, so you will have to paint them to suit your own taste.

Each end of the court is boxed separately and weighs approximately 38 pounds - 76 pounds for the complete court. They are available in 2" and 4" heights, and a conversion that can be used to set over your present clay court. The same pad is used on all styles and is interchangeable, which means that it can be used on clay and boxed in the portable for mobility.

The 4" portable will give you maximum performance and can be converted to any desired height by ripping off the top side.

The 2" is not as effective in holding close shoes, but will hold the ringers about the same.

The convertible will be as effective as the 2" portable, but the rigid stake will not hold the ringers nearly as well.

Either of the portables are easily stored in the trunk of your car, and can be set up ready to go in 5 minutes in your yard, on your drive, at the park, on the beach, at the lake while you are waiting for the fish to bite, in your basement (if you have enough room), in the barn (if you are on the farm), in gymnasiums at school, or anyplace where there is enough room.

I qualified on these courts at the state tournament at the **lowa State Fair** and threw **84 ringers in 100 shoes and never lost a ringer.** Practically every pitcher in the tournament tried them and admitted they were better than clay courts.

I hope these courts will make you a better horseshoe pitcher and I will guarantee the ringers you throw will stay there. Every shoe will feel the same every time you pitch it. No mud - no dirt - no maintenance - no more, "barnyard golf."

He attended the 1964 World Tourney in Greenville and plays in the Red River Valley League of North Dakota.

#### N.H.P.A. Championship Insignias

1965 NHPA Championship shoulder insignias will again be awarded to the winners of all classes in sanctioned NHPA events.

These awards can be obtained after a tournament is played or in advance

for presentation at the tournament itself.

Applications must be made by State Secretaries through our NHPA Vice President, Lucille Hopkins who is in charge of these awards. A letter from a State Secretary listing the name, date and location of the tournament and the number of classes played or expected to be contested is all that is necessary. The letter will serve both as a request and as a certification that the tournament is officially sanctioned.

A sanctioned tournament is one in which all players are NHPA members. Tournaments in which the top classes only require NHPA membership can be

sanctioned and receive insignias for those classes.

The number of officially sanctioned tournaments has increased considerably in the past few years. Some tournament managers are reluctant to make NHPA membership mandatory, feeling that it will cut down the number of

Experience has proven these fears unjustified by results. Tourneys which switched to sanctioned affairs such as the Indiana-Ohio open and Northern California events suffered no loss in entries. Many other tourneys which were not sanctioned ended up with large entry lists.

States with the greatest amount of horseshoe activity are also the states with the largest number of N.H.P.A. members and all events are sanc-

tioned — Indiana, Ohio and California.

Get your tournaments sanctioned this year. Have your State Secretary contact Mrs. Hopkins for N.H.P.A. Championship insignias. State Champions receive a special insignia.

The first issue back in 1956 was only eight pages. Now a 16 page issue is a small one and many contain 32 pages. Even so we often suffer from a lack of space to accomodate all the news we would like to print. Costs of both printing and mailing have risen considerably since that first issue, but so far subscription rates have remained the same.

The size, number and scope of tournaments have increased by leaps and bounds since the "Digest" came into being and NHPA membership has also

increased. The magazine must receive major credit for this growth.


Considerable fear was expressed a year ago when NHPA membership and magazine subscriptions were seperated with the magazine being optional to membership. Many felt that the number of subscribers would drop to a level too low for the magazine to be effective.

This was not the case for while membership increased, subscriptions had only a small decrease. Most of these were the result of only one magazine going to families where formerly two and three people were members and therefore had to be subscribers in order to be members.

If the magazine did not fill a vital need the number of our subscribers

would have decreased considerably.

Reflecting further, we see John Taylor of Dover, Illinois as he won the Northwestern Illinois tournament, and Don Grove of Rock Falls as he returned triumphant from the Whiteside County meet and as our reflections fade slightly we see Francis McBride of Sterling as he enters the winner's circle in the Twin City tournament. Finally the total standings loom up in the closing reflection.

#### **Butler Takes Vermont State Title For Seventh Time**

Vermont state horseshoe pitching champion Fred Butler of Bennington has made it seven in a row.

In close play against Ted Sausville, a former champion, also of Benning-

ton, Butler came out on top again at the 1964, state tournament.

Butler and Sausville each won six games and lost one in regular play to tie for first place; in a play-off game, Butler won 51-41.

Butler's only loss was to W. Chamberlain of Brattleboro; ironically it was also Chamberlain's only win, losing his six other games in the Class A competition.

Butler's seventh consecutive championship makes him the first man to do so since the state tournament play began in the early 1930s. Butler had been tied with Maynard Brown of Brattleboro, who had won six consecutive championships from 1950 through 1955. Butler's string began in 1958.

Winner of the Class B trophy was Frank Kamel of Springfield; winner of

the Class C trophy was M. Belargen of Perkinsville.

1965 plans call for a horseshoe tournament and barbeque on the 4th of



#### The State of Horseshoe and the N.H.P.A.

The N. H. P. A. gained more than 800 members during 1964 to reach the highest total in history, surpassing even the 1937 figure when annual

dues were only 15c.

More tournaments including sanctioned events were held than ever before and the entry lists were larger coming from wider geographic areas. The NHPA handled an increasing volume of requests for information about the game from sources outside the NHPA. This is an important function

which reflects a growing interest in the game.

The World Tournament at Greenville, Ohio had its largest entry list ever and the caliber of competition during the 11 day event was on the fan-

tastic side.

The most pleasing development during the past year was the formation and affiliation with the NHPA of many vigorous and progressive local horse-

shoe clubs with many more in prospect during 1965.

Subscriptions to the monthly magazine held almost even with the previous year despite the fact that 1964 was the first year memberships and

subscriptions were separated with magazine being optional.

Almost every state either equaled its 1963 membership totals or showed a gain. Most states showed substantial increases in membership. Members came from 46 states and two territories of the U.S., four Canadian provinces, Australia and one from the British Crown colony of Hong Kong These members included the first ever from the Canal Zone.

Three new official N. H. P. A. State Chapters were formed during the year. Ottie Reno brought Alabama into the official fold, Waldo Hagy organized the Nevada chapter and Major Jack Adams qualified the Canadian Province of Quebec. We are greatly handicapped in the latter by the fact

that most players are French speaking.

The states of Georgia, Nevada and Rhode Island were represented in World Tournament competition for the first time.

Prospects are excellent for the formation of official chapters in both Georgia and Kentucky during the coming season.

Top membership totals were posted once again by California, Indiana

Here are some of the more outstanding State Chapter performances.

Northern California deserves first place in any review of 1965 NHPA membership, for this chapter was the author of the present system of NHPA dues which separates membership from magazine subscriptions by making the latter optional. Earl Davis, Czar Marcevich and others from Northern California pushed this plan and promised their group would be 100% NHPA with a big increase in membership.

The promise was kept in a sensational manner for Secretary-Treasurer W. Ray Williams and the other officers increased membership sevenfold and at

the same time increased the number of "Digest" subscribers.

Northern California has now jumped to third place in membership behind Indiana and Ohio, and together with Southern California the Golden State now

has more members than the two leaders.

New England States. Under the guidance of Regional Director Ralph Forsstrom and stimulated by prospects of being host to the 1965 World Tournament, everyone of the six New England States showed a membership increase and the total of these six small states was tremendous.

Tournaments in the area had huge entry lists. A Junior program has been started and three states had players in the Women's division of the annual

New England Tournament.

Massachusetts jumped to 4th place in NHPA membership.
Connecticut led by Ervin Van Dine had a big increase in members.
New Hampshire where the Keene club has a battery of 24 courts also increased membership. The Manchester club is one of the most active in the country and 20 courts are being built at Nashua.

Vermont increased membership and the 16 court Brattleboro club is located only 20 miles from Keene.

cated only 20 miles from Keene.

Rhode Island increased membership and was represented in the World Tournament for the first time.

Maine went 100% NHPA in its state tournament with a big increase in members and much indoor activity with Dixon portables is reported there.

British Columbia. Secretary Bernie Lepper turned in the largest membership ever given the NHPA by a Canadian Province and our only regret is that we haven't had more detailed news of their activities, particularly their fine indoor program.

Southern California. Jim Weeks and his cohorts always turn in a fine record and 1964 was no exception. Already high on the membership list Southern California actually increased NHPA membership slightly.

Illinois. Turned in the largest gain ever in both memberships and magazine subscriptions.

Indiana. The Hoosier state retained its rank as the largest NHPA chapter which means it is harder to show an increase in membership. Nevertheless Indiana showed one of the largest of all increases.

Johnson County (Franklin) and Richmond with large and well organized local clubs came into the NHPA fold for the first time and will be important assets in 1965. Richmond has 20 courts and Franklin eight. Porter County with six fine courts at Kouts and a progressive and active group was another fine addition. New clubs have been formed at Batesville, Jeffersonville and Columbia City and others are in prospect. All Indiana tournaments are NHPA events except purely local and county affairs.

Iowa. There is always a lot of activity in the Hawkeye state and both membership and subscriptions showed an increase.

Idaho. The addition of the fine Lewiston club where the 1965 State tourney will be held augurs well for the future.

Kansas. Showed a membership increase and held a number of fine tournaments.

Michigan. One of the brightest spots in the NHPA picture, the Wolverene Association headed by Ruth Hammond, Vern Fuller and Roy Smith, made progress on the excellent base established by its former head, Irv Carlberg. The result was a huge increase in memberships and subscriptions and the group has voted to go completely NHPA in all tournaments in 1965. The annual Michigan Water Wonderland Open will again be an outstanding event.

Muskegon has started construction of 16 courts. Vern Kinzer and Detroit players have a fine indoor program which "Digest" readers would be interested in reading about.

Montana. This fine group continued to make progress started only a few years ago by Roger Barnaby and the Wibaux club. There are now many fine clubs and groups in the state and interest is on the increase with more activity in 1964 than ever before. A new slate of officers consisting of President Bing Burns of Ft. Peck, Secretary-Treasurer Mel Chadwick of Culbertson and Vice-Presidents Earl Brown of Miles City, Morris Wold of Billings and Ira Jensen of Culbertson. Willson Hubbard of Baker is the retiring president. Roger Barnaby will continue as NHPA Regional Director.

New Jersey. The state had a big revival in activity and a huge membership and subscription increase after a letdown in 1963. The group played host to a successful National A. A. U. tournament under the guidance of Doc Berman. The newly formed Middlesex club headed by Hal Hannia turned out to be one of the most valuable additions to the NHPA during the year. We look forward to hearing more from this local club in the future.

New Mexico. Interest increased during its first full year as an NHPA chapter. Still in the formative stage this association has a bright future with excellent leadership.

New York. The state showed another big increase which has largely been generated by fine local clubs in Corning, Westchester County, Yonkers, Falconer Rod and Gun, Buffalo, Hornell, and above all the Lockport club headed by Paul Thomas. This club with the largest Women's league in the country will be host to the 1965 state meet, There are a number of smaller clubs in the process of formation in Plattsburg, Rome, Montrose and other points.

Ohio. The Buckeye association always has an active season and 1964 was no exception with both memberships and subscriptions showing an increase. A special issue could well be devoted to the activities of the many fine local clubs in Greenville, Wauseon, Norwood, Columbus, Pike County, Youngstown, Clinton County, Bremen and many others.

Oregon. Showed an increase in NHPA membership but State Secretary Gil

Hamman expects a much better record in 1965.

Pennsylvania. The Quaker state had another busy year and increased its membership. With many fine players and clubs in the western section the state would probably rank first if the eastern end could be organized.

Tennessee. The state jumped into the ranks of the leaders in NHPA membership in 1964 and several of its players made excellent records in the World Tourney. Ben Raskopf has done an excellent job in the state, and Knoxville held the largest state tournament in history. John Walker's Jefferson City club is still active. The Greenlee family of Rutledge is the largest single family from a membership standpoint with enough to form their own local club. The Tri County group in eastern Tennessee centered around Elizabethton, Bristol, Johnson City and Piney Flats supplied the impetus for the membership increase.

Utah. Maurine Cook and Reiny Backer have the Utah association on the way back towards their former prominence in NHPA circles and hope to host the 1966 World Tournament. Roger Parsons took the state title from Clive Wahlin with an 80% plus average giving the state another nationally ranked player.

West Virginia. Activity and membership both increased during the year. Logan is scheduled to host the 1965 State Tournament.

Washington. One of only three states to show a loss of NHPA members. The state more than made up for it with an outstanding group of representatives in the World Tournament in Greenville, O., placing three, Monasmith, Krauft and Fishel in the top 15.

Wisconsin. Showed only a small membership increase but had the biggest state tournament in many years and has excellent prospects for 1965.

## 66 From Out Of The Mail Bag"

#### "Try To Top This One"

The following article was sent into the News Digest by Mr. J. B. Lowe of Logan, West Virginia. It should alert all tournament managers to the pitfalls of conducting tournaments.

We were preparing for our annual County Tournament one time. We had three Classes, A, B and C. We purchased 32 trophies and, had a trophy for each of eight pitchers in each class in the round robin whether a pitcher won a game or not. We also had eight trophies for the eight highest qualifiers. There were three expensive trophies for the three highest qualifiers in the "A",

We took two weeks to qualify all who wanted to pitch. Three of the Club officials were on hand at the courts four hours every evening for two weeks to qualify the pitchers. All pitchers who intended to pitch came and tried several 100 shoe rounds, except one "A" pitcher. On Saturday, the last day to qualify, this man came out and looked the highest scores over, which were listed on the bulletin board, and then pitched 100 shoes keeping his own score, as no one was there to keep it for him. Yes, you guessed it; he made a higher score than any other pitcher who had pitched with an official keeping the score. When the officials appeared this man told them that so and so, one of our pitchers, the officials appeared this man told them that so and so, one of our pitchers, had kept his score and since it was raining and time was running out no one questioned his score. But, since any pitcher could pitch as many 100 shoes as he desired, so long as he paid a small fee for it, one of the highest qualifiers tried again and made the same number of points, 232, as the "Self-Scorer" had made, but made two ringers more so the club officials followed the County, State and National policy giving the highest qualifying trophy to the picher who had made the same number of points but two ringers more. The man who had kept his own score argued that he tied and that he was due a trophy the same as the other pitcher but the club refused and, guess what; this man purchased a trophy like the one awarded the highest qualifier and presented it to himself.

But, it was not known that he had kept his own score until a week after the tournament when he admitted that he had kept his own score. But, that is not all. This same "Self-Scorer" went on fussing and stalling on the courts while pitching, and froze every "A" pitcher cold and won the County Tournament as no one reported his wrong doing until after the games had been pitched. The County, State and National authorities claim that this man didn't win anything because he had never been qualified as his score sheet had no signature on it. This man won two other titles also: "SELF-SCORER," and "STALLING TOM," as the pitchers called him.

STALLING is the UNPARDONABLE SIN IN HORSESHOE PITCHING. And our Club regards it and treats it as such ever after the foregoing incident. Our Club now checks and double-checks every score sheet looking for the signature of the score keeper.

## PROPERLY

The purpose of a scoresheet is to make a written record of every pitch in game in such a manner that the result can be tabulated and checked for accuracy.

Different symbols are used in various sections of the country and some scoresheets are of a vertical type and others a horizontal type. The system illustrated here is the one the NHPA has found to be the most satisfactory.

Ringers which score points—that is, "live ringers"— are indicated by a 0 in the ringer column of the player who threw the ringer.

Cancelled ringers are indicated by an X in the ringer column. For each X registered in the ringer column of one player there must be an X in the ringer column of his opponent.

No count is indicated by a dash (—).

Points scored in a frame are listed in the point column of the player scoring the points, and a running total is kept in the score column. Horizontal type scoresheets usually do not have a point column, having only the column for the running score.

It is possible to score 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, or 6 points in any given frame.

Scoring under the "Count All" system follows the same pattern except that there are no cancelled ringers and all points score by both players are tallied.

Reproduced here is the scoresheet of a game in the 1963 World Tournament at South Gate, Calif., between Bill Blexrude of San Francisco and Frank Stinson of St. Paul, Minn.

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
