#### Engebretson in Successful Defense of North Dakota Title

#### Alabama Association Shows Growth in 1965 — **New Officers Elected**

The Alabama Association held its 1965 Convention and tournament at Robertsdale on Labor Day.

Total membership for 1965 was a 40% increase over the 1964 membership, and all other signs point to a growth of the sport in Alabama.

In the election of officers T. V. Abercrombie, Jr. of Robertsdale was elected President of the Association, Albaugh Lewis, First Vice-President, Ottie Reno, Second Vice-President and Clopton Jones, State Secretary-Treas-

The site of the 1966 State Convention and Tournament were set for Robertsdale. As an indication of their increased interest in the sport the Robertsdale Town Council agreed to furnish and install four lighted courts

in time for next year's meet.

In tournament play a doubles meet was staged for the first time. Charles Armstrong and J. Gill teamed up to win the event with the team of T. V. Abercrombie and B. Runyan finishing second. The combinations of Clopton Jones - Barney Kilgore and V. Buck - John Lassiter went out in the semifinals.

Ottie Reno, who held over as the individual champion played and won

five games.

Enthusiasm was at its highest point to date. The new officers plan to expand tournament play in the coming season so as to provide needed competition for all players.

#### Maynard Brown New King of Ringermen in Vermont State

Maynard Brown of Brattleboro, Vermont set a new record of 70.5 percent ringers, to clinch the 1965 Vermont state championship. His round robin record was seven straight wins. Fred Butler, reigning champion for the past seven years finished third. Tournament was played on the Memorial park courts in Brattleboro. A new record of 30 entrants was established.

At the annual state meeting previous to the tournament it was voted that all pitchers would have to have an NHPA card to take part in future state tournaments. The vote was unanimous, after Fred Butler and Lester Georginia explained the advantages of being in the National Association. By

its action, New England is 100 percent NHPA.

#### George Hilst

For the Illinois State Association, the passing of George Hilst of Pekin, Illinois, will be keenly felt. He had been in failing health for the past several years. Up until his health began to fail, George was a keen competitor in



any tournament that he participated in. He was a former Illinois state champion, having held the title for a period of five years. He played in many World tournaments and gave a good account of himself in each one. In the Mid-West Open tournament held at Rock Island, Illinois, he was one of the most formidable opponents of any of those competing. His pitching in any Illinois state tournament will long be remembered by those

who played against him.

George had a great interest in teaching the youthful players in and around the Pekin area, the fine game of horseshoes.

As a result of his endeavor, he soon had a group of boys that

he always brought with him to the Illinois state tournament at Springfield each year. From this nucleus of young players the Illinois association has been left several pitchers that will make outstanding progress in the years to come. Illinois can be justly proud for having had within its ranks, a fine gentleman and sportsman which George Hilst was.

The sympathy of the Illinois State association together with the National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association is extended to his wife, Dorothy, three daugh-

ters and three sisters in their bereavement.

#### Clude Green

Death claimed one of the most loved and respected figures of the horseshoe world on Oct. 5 when Clyde Green, 65, died at his home in Portland, Ind.,



after an illness of more than two months. Clyde loved the game of horseshoe and thoroughly enjoyed every personal contact he made in the game, but more than that he gave unstintingly of his services in every way he could.

He served as the unofficial head scorekeeper at World Tournaments in Muncie, Greenville and South Gate, being in charge of the scoring devices and the player's name plates. His absence because of his illness at the 1965 World Tourney in Keene created a void which could not be filled.

He spent the winter months in Florida where he served as tournament manager for all the big events in that state and was a member of the Bradenton, Fla., club where


he helped manage both tournaments and weekly league play.

in Duluth, Minnesota.



The Auditing Committee consisting of Martz (Penna.) and Buskey (N.H.) reported they had inspected the books and found them in excellent order and recommended that the financial report be approved. Marino (Ariz.) made a motion to that effect, seconded by Allen (Colo.) and the motion carried without dissent.

A special committee on rules and regulations for Junior play consisting of Wilmore (Ind.) and Cobb (Ill.) made a report read by Wilmore. The various provisions were discussed by the convention at leigth and resulted in the following provisions being added to the N.H.P.A. by laws and playing rules by a vote of the delegates:

Playing rules for Juniors are the same as for men with the single exception that the pitching distance shall be a minimum of 30 feet between stakes

(27 feet from foul line to the opposite stake).

MODAL DESIDENTIAL

A player will be considered a Junior for the entire season if his 17th birthday occurs on or after the start of the calendar year, Jan. 1st.

Junior players may compete in the Men's division of sanctioned NHPA tournaments which have no Junior division without injury to their Junior standing in future tournaments as long as they do not accept any awards of cash or monetary value. If a Junior does compete in the men's division of a sanctioned tournament he must pitch the men's distance of 40 feet.

#### World Tournament Minutes — (Continued)

All Junior tournaments will be conducted strictly on an amateur basis with the only awards being trophies, ribbons and medals or other such awards having no monetary value.

It shall be the responsibility of each Junior player to make certain his participation in NHPA tournaments does not jeopardize his amateur standing in sports or activities in which he might be interested.

Discussion then centered on the question of women pitching in men's tournaments at the women's distance of 30 feet. Because the situation varied greatly in different states, some not having enough women players for a tournament, a motion by Dixon (Ia.), seconded by Winston (Mo.) provided that each state association could make its own ruling regarding the participation of women in men's tournaments. The motion carried.

Carl Steinfeldt (N.Y.), Chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee consisting of Mortenson (Ia.), Beller (Calif.), Chrisman (Ind.) and Pence (Ind.) presented the committee's recommendations. These called for establishment of a permanent Hall of Fame with three players and three non-players to be installed at the 1966 World Tournament and two players and one non-player to be selected each year thereafter. The original Hall of Fame Committee will serve during the coming year with replacements being appointed by the NHPA President in each succeeding year. The committee will make the final Hall of Fame selections based on recommendations by the NHPA membership.

A motion calling for adoption of the Hall of Fame committee report was made by Whitaker (Mass.) and seconded by Henton (Ia.) and the motion was approved.

Dixon (Ia.) reported on a tournament which used his foul line idea of the line being drawn even with the stake, the pitcher being required to start his delivery back of this line and allowed one step forward in the delivery. He asked that state associations give this plan a trial during the coming year.

President Harold Craig announced that Utah had confirmed their bid for the 1966 World Tournament and that it would be held in Murray, Utah. No other bids were made for the 1966 tournament.

Greenville, O., presented a sealed bid of \$3,000.00 for the 1967 World Tournament. A vote by the convention rejected the Greenville bid in favor of deferring the selection until the 1966 convention.

Steinfeldt (N.Y.) brought up the question of the weight of official horseshoes.

President Harold Craig appointed a committee composed of Ottie Reno (Ohio), Beller (Calif.) and Von Der Lancken (N.Y.) to check the NHPA constitution, by laws and playing rules and bring them up to date at the next convention. A special committee composed of Steinfeldt (N.Y.), Jacobs (Mich.), Allen (Colo.), Manker (Ohio), Schneider (Calif.), and Bennett (Ohio) was appointed to check the provisions regarding weight and measurement specifications of the official shoes.

A special committee on tournament qualifying procedures and rules consisting of Berman (N.J.), Marvin Craig (Ind.) and Marino (Ariz.) was appointed.

Dale Dixon announced that he was giving the NHPA  $50\phi$  for each portable court he sold.

A motion by Sebring (Penna.) was adopted thanking the Keene Horse-shoe Club, the city of Keene, and the various individuals and organizations responsible for the success of the 1965 World Tournament.

The nominating committee, May (Ind.) and Henton (Ia.) presented the names of Harold Craig for re-election as President, Elmer Beller as 1st Vice President and Ottie Reno and Reinhard Backer for 3rd Vice President. There were no nominations from the floor. Ottie Reno was elected 3rd Vice President, Beller re-elected 1st Vice President and Harold Craig President.

The convention thanked Mrs. Glen Henton for her work as the convention recorder, and the convention was then adjourned.
