Donnie Roberts wins Pike County (Ohio) Crown

Twenty-two-year-old Donnie Roberts won the 1965 NHPA Sanctioned Pike County Horseshoe Tournament. This was the third time that Donnie has won the Pike County Championship. Gary Roberts, Donnie's 17-year-old brother was the runner-up.

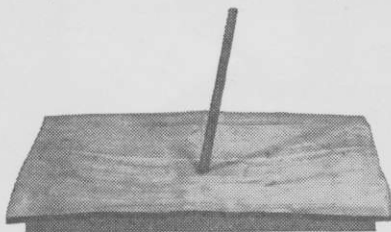
To win the title Donnie had to pitch a 3 best of 5 game set with his brother Gary. In the first game Gary pitched 72.7 per cent ringers to defeat Donnie 54 to 27. Donnie got a better start the second game to edge Gary 51 to 46 with 65.8 per cent ringers. This made the set even with one win each. The third game Gary beat Donnie 51 to 36 firing a record 73.4 per cent ringers. This gave Gary a 2-win to 1-win edge over Donnie in the set. In the fourth game Donnie pitched 70.7 per cent ringers to defeat Gary 51 to 41. The set was now even at 2 wins each. The next game would decide the championship. The game was close all the way but Donnie set a 70.0 per cent pace that edged Gary 52 to 45 and gave Donnie a 3 to 2 edge in the set for the championship.

In Class B, Eli Reno took three straight games from Roy Jennings by scores of 50 to 18, 50 to 38, and 50 to 14 to win the class.

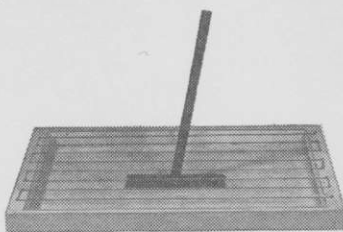
Verda Hickman became the women's champion by defeating Dora Vance 2 straight games by scores of 50 to 12 and 50 to 22 in a 2 best of 3 game set. Verda pitched 41.3 per cent ringers to win the class.

H. Reno Winner of Manchester, N. H. "World Warm-Up" Meet

The "Warm-Up" meet held at Manchester, N. H. provided a sample of the skill and competition scheduled for the world tourney at Keene, N. H.

As expected, midwest pitchers predominated, but growth of the game in New England was obvious as many local players did well in the middle and lower classes.

Four win and one loss records were posted in class 'A' by world champ Harold Reno, Floyd Toole, of Arkansas, Curt Day of Indiana, Ray Martin of Illinois and the popular Canadian champ, Elmer Hohl.

Based on total points and percentages, cash was divided among the top two in each flight with 1st, 2nd and 3rd place trophies awarded to Day, Reno and Toole.

Day bested Martin in 154 shoes for the longest game while high percentage honors went to Hohl as he threw a 93.4% at Gale.

Fred Lavett won 53-38 in the class 'B' playoff with Lee Jacobs. A couple of local favorites, George Sylvain and Brian Burke, tied for top place in Class 'CC' with Sylvain copping the playoff win.

Amos Whittaker of Orange, Mass. was the top New England pitcher while Art Wayne of Manchester took New Hampshire honors.

Surprise of the tournament was the strong showing of the sixteen year old Canadian, Ross Stevenson as he swept thru class 'CC' without a loss.

The tourney also marked the return to good health of Ed Paquin, ex New Hampshire champ, after a lengthy layoff.

With every tournament much necessary, but, "behind the scenes" effort is required, thus many thanks to all who contributed.

The committee is particularly grateful to Indiana's Mrs. Wilhoite, Curt Day's daughter Margie, Sandy Spain and Lucille Ballard who so efficiently maintained the tourney records.

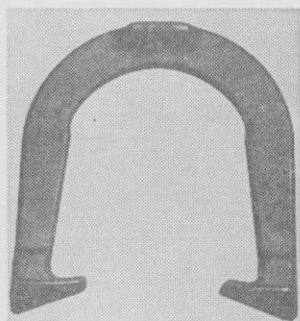

Gullickson Scores High In Red River Valley League

Grandin Garage, second-half winners, beat Fritz Sporting Goods of Fargo in the best-of-three championship series in the Red River Valley Horseshoe League at Fargo, N. D.

Grandin dropped the opener, 225-221, before winning 226-224 and 269-229, in the three-man team, 50-shoe count-all event.

It was Grandin's first title since 1962. Fritz had won either the regular-season or playoff title the last five years. Reidar Haakenson led Grandin with 107, 89, 98 followed by Marvin Howard 75, 57, 56, Willis Wiger 62, 55 and Harold Oien 67.

Will Gullickson hit 93, 83, 75 for Fritz followed by Erling Erickson 75, 70 and 64 and George Nordstrom 77, 66, 66.

Gust Magnuson of the Black Co., team took the Class A league handicap tourney by edging Gullickson. Both hit 5-1 records, but Magnuson collected more points. Division winners include Erling Erickson, Class B; Julian Larson, Class C and Lyle Olson, Class D. Magnuson was the top average pitcher for the season and Wes Myhre was the most improved, jumping his average 12 points over a year ago.

Bruce Twedt of Fargo and Mike Kovash of Moorhead won titles in the first all-city Fargo-Moorhead tourney. Twedt, 14, posted a 3-0 record in the division for 13 and 14-year-olds. Ron Anderson of Fargo was runnerup. Kovash, 8, took the 8 to 12-year-old division by defeating Roger Gullickson in the last game of the round-robin tourney.
