Chairman Sol Berman Reports on Qualifying Procedure

The New Jersey Association voted on a modification of the third type of qualifying.

The top 108 ringer percentage pitchers attending the World championship would be seeded and play a five game round robin. The first and second place winners would qualify for the 36 man finals.

The 18 groups of 6 men each could finish their 5 game round robins in two days. The finals could start on the third day. (Thus shortening the tournament by two days).

If you decide that 35 games are too many, than two groups of 18 players each could play a 17 game round robin. The top 8 men in each group would then play each other for a total of 25 games.

If thirty games are desired, then the top 13 of one group would play the top 13 of the other group.

The 72 non-qualifiers would make up Class B.



Although I did not have a great deal of time to engage in pitching in any tournaments during the season, I did manage to play in two and was

present at two other major tournaments.

It was my pleasure to attend the Michigan Water Wonderland tournament held at Battle Creek, Michigan, June 13th. It was a beautiful day and ideal for pitching. Although I was only able to stay for a couple of hours, I did meet some very nice Michigan folks, among whom were Mrs. Ruth Hammond, Phil Shively, Vern Fuller, Lee Jacobs, Hubert Gross and many others, all of whom were busy helping make that tournament a success.

Over the July 4th weekend I travelled to the Red River Valley Open at Fargo, North Dakota. While in the Northwest area, I made a stop on my return trip at the Cloquet, Minnesota courts but their tournament had been played at the same time as the Fargo event was being played. They have a wonderful court layout, much the same in quality as those at Fargo.

My next port of call was at Connersville, Indiana, July 17th, where I participated in the annual Mid-West Ringer Round-Up. Again I was tied for first place in Class B, only to emerge as second runner. Although the Indiana group conducting the meet was beset with heavy rain conditions, a fine tournament was the net result. Bob Clark, Harold Craig and Bob Pence handled

most of the details in this outstanding ringer event.

Another important major tournament which I attended, but only as a spectator, due to limited time, was the highly rated Galesburg Open tournament held annually at Lincoln park in Galesburg, Illinois. Andy Horn, one of Galesburg's ranking insurance men, spends many hours arranging and promoting the midwestern ringer events, which draws players from all over the nation. It was here that I met many more fine players and others who enjoy

the game of horseshoes.

The placid flowing Grand River that meanders serenely through south, central and western Michigan, witnessed another epochal year in horseshoe pitching.

The year 1965 is almost certain to be vividly remembered as the one whereby the W.S.H.P.A. attained its' greatest fulfillment in horseshoe pitch-

ing popularity and membership.

With the season recently terminated, outdoors, that is, it's appropriate and expedient to not only reminisce, but also inventory the factors relative to the associations' success in general, and the organization of local clubs in

particular.

The W.S.H.P.A. has enthusiastically fostered and encouraged the development of local horseshoe clubs, with the realization that they are the real foundation of a state organization. Several localities, convinced by the phennomenal successful development of the Dimondale Horseshoe club, rolled up their sleeves, so to speak, and enthusiastically went to action. The Sturgis and Burr Oak communities under the tutelage of Claude West and Frank Borgert and ample assistance from Del Terhune, Bill Kehoe, Jack Gillan, Gordy Sites and the Thramm brothers, to name a few, organized clubs and working cohesively built regulation courts.

They conducted in coordination with the W.S.H.P.A. four excellent tournaments, excluding one at nearby Colon. This was a fine example of what interested and dedicated people can accomplish once a decision has been finalized and a definite goal determined.

The Lake Orion area, a few miles north of Pontiac, Michigan, is another fast developing horseshoe club. They overcame a very serious situation, the club had to completely relocate their courts, but they were not to be deterred by such adversity. The Lake Orion club proved their dedication to the horseshoe pitching sport, by moving and building more courts and enjoying a more superior site than they previously possessed. Their nine splendid, shaded courts hosted a very successful W.S.H.P.A. tournament in August. Joe Holland, John Vittner and Marion Collins deserve a lot of credit for the achievements at Lake Orion.

hovering around the freezing mark. The temperature slowly rose and resulted in a fairly pleasant day by afternoon. Fifty six entries were recorded, a very gratifying turn out

Earl hadn't felt good all spring and finally at his wifes' insistance, spent eight days at Lansing General Hospital. We were all relieved to learn that outside of acquiring some badly needed rest, the 1964 Class B Champion, was in good condition.

June 12th and 13th witnessed the big Water Wonderland Annual N.H.-P.A. tournament at Battle Creek. Carl Wood, chairman, and W.S.H.P.A. director, along with Jim Davis, Vern Fuller, Willie Preston and Vern Snyder, plus the McElraths, father and son performed a terrific job in making this meet one of the three most memorable events, competitively, in Michigan this season. Trophy wise, Dimondale picked up four at the Water Wonderland tournament, more than any other individual club.

July 10th saw the largest open W.S.H.P.A. tournament of the season at Dimondale. They were literally flooded with 75 entries, plus ladies and junior boys, to almost out rank the State Championship tournament. This tournament wound up at midnight, the longest one day tournament in recent history.

Additional publicity was the most contributory factor in this tourna-Additional publicity was the most contributory factor in this tournament's success. William J. Duchaine, Mid Michigan feature writer of the Lansing State Journal, wrote a terrific pre-tournament article, which was very instrumental in activating the mid-Michigan Area interest. Public announcements over two area radio stations, WILS in Lansing and WCER Charlotte, in close cooperation with the Dimondale Clubs' director of Publicity, was a new achievement in which results were obtained far beyond anyone's expectations. You will take note at this time, of the importance of successful tournaments. adequate publicity, in assuring the guarantee of successful tournaments. Conclusive proof of this will be exemplified, when we arrive at the State Championship tournament on Labor Day weekend.

The world tournament at Keene, N. H. caused a two week adjournment in seasonal play. Michigan representatives of the W.S.H.P.A. at Keene were the Hammonds, Earl and Ruth, Roy Smith (our State champ four times consecutively), Lee and Helen Jacobs. Lee is a former State Champ three times. The Joe Leonards, Frank Gyorkas, Vernon Kinser and the Irwin Carlbergs. Irwin also is a former State Champion. The Vern Fullers plus Earl and Irene Grable. Earl is the 1964 State Class B champion who tied for third place in

the men's senior division of Class A.

Ruth Hammond of Ada, Michigan proved her horseshoe pitching prowess

by winning the ladies World Class B Championship.

Irwin Carlberg received the highly valued Stokes Award and deservedly so, in the opinion of the entire W.S.H.P.A. The Michigan delegation certainly gave the W.S.H.P.A. the excellent representation it deserves. The association now enjoys full delegate membership to the N.H.P.A.

This is the first year that Michigan has sent its' State Champion to the Worlds' tournament with expenses paid by the association. This undoubtedly

will be continued from now on.

The Dimondale club, due to the fact that no one had placed a bid for the state championships, was prevailed upon by the association to host it. The Dimondale boys had planned to bid for the championship state tournament in 1966. They decided to accept it, despite the fact that it would mean a tremendous amount of preparational labor on their part.

The Dimondale club held another meeting. The previous one being mainly

an acceptance meeting for the state tournament.

Certain work committees were formed. The first committee for example was one consisting of Vic Benson and Bob Marsh. They undertook the task of constructing three temporary courts. These were boxes consisting of a sheet of 3/16 inch sheet steel for the bottom, the sides were 2 by 6s attached to the bottom by lag screws. After a 24-year lapse between state championships, Frank Stinson of Minneapolis, Minnesota, believes that the situation is now corrected. Stinson

won the 1965 state title at the Cloquet, Minnesota courts. His last claim to state title honors was back in 1941. It was not through any lack of endeavor, because he has been pitching horseshoes regularly with the exception of the World War II years.

He completed the regular season in the Minneapolis club major league with a clean slate of 40 straight victories. He came through with flying colors to win Northwest Open tournament at Ramsey fairgrounds in St. Paul, competing against players from five states.

In commenting on the reason for the long lapse between titles, Stinson had this to say, "I have been playing in the state meet all through the years, but I guess this year I was really determined to do something about it, so I changed my delivery from a 1¾ turn to a 1¼ turn. I just felt that this was the year."

Stinson keeps in trim by pitching during the wintertime by using a court in the basement of a local school in Minneapolis. He competed in the 1965 World tournament at Keene, New Hampshire where he compiled a 77.3 ringer per-

centage — the best he ever had in world tournament competition.

After 40 years of pitching horseshoes, he has visions of lifting his ringer percentage up to the 80 mark or better during the coming season.

N.H.P.A. and A.A.U. Officials Hold Meeting **Discuss Future Relationships**

The nebulous relationship between the A.A.U. and the N.H.P.A. may soon change to a more concrete understanding which will result in benefits to the game of horseshoes as a result of recent meeting in Chicago between NHPA Secretary Bob Pence and AAU Vice President David Riveness of Montana.

Whereas the NHPA is the only national organization devoted solely to horseshoe and makes no distinction between amateurs and professionals, the AAU (Amateur Athletic Union) is the governing body of amateur sports of all types and is also in charge of the Olympic Games program in this country. The AAU's main concern is with swimming, track and field and other Olympic sports where it does an exceptionally good job, but it is also interested in other amateur sports including horseshoes.

The AAU does have an amateur horseshoe pitching program and conducts a number of tournaments each year including a National Amateur championship. In those areas where it is active the AAU is a real asset to the game.

Practically all entrants in AAU tourneys are also NHPA members. This is particularly true in New Jersey, North Carolina and Virginia and to some extent in Montana. In these areas AAU officials and NHPA clubs generally work together.

NHPA members who head the horseshoe committee of the various AAU geographic divisions include Dr. Sol Berman and Paul Puglisle of New Jersey, Randall Jones and Joe White of North Carolina, John Snyder of California, Clarence Giles of Utah and Cecil Monday of Virginia.

The meeting in Chicago between Mr. Riveness of the AAU and NHPA

Secretary Bob Pence brought out a number of areas where the two groups can join forces. Increasing horseshoe participation by youngsters in the junior age brackets is one area. The NHPA has the know how and the contacts in the game of horseshoe while the AAU has the outside contacts with Park and Recreation departments, schools etc. There is a possibility that horseshoe can gain a place on the Junior Olympics program under the sponsorship of the Quaker Oats Co.

Another possibility is the joint sponsorship of a comprehensive Horseshoe Handbook which would find its way into the hands of athletic and recreation

A working agreement between the AAU and the NHPA could possibly result in horseshoes gaining a place on the Olympic Games program the next time the event is held in the United States.

The host country of the Olympic Games may if it chooses add one new sport to the program in the form of a game native to that country. Japan

added Judo in the 1964 games under this provision.

Mr. Riveness of the AAU feels that Horseshoes is a possible choice the next time the games come to the U.S. Towards this end the NHPA is working with Canadian players and clubs in an effort to have Horseshoe placed on the program of the 1967 Pan American Games to be held in Winnipeg, Canada. These games will be a prelude to the 1968 Olympics.

1965 N.H.P.A. Membership Highest Ever Thanks to Michigan and Minnesota

Credit must also be given to the Dimondale Club and the state wide publicity director Pat Smith. The Michigan effort was a team effort and all the clubs and members in the state gave 100% co-operation to lift them to 3rd place in the NHPA membership totals behind Indiana and Ohio.

1966 Michigan officers include Earl Grable of Domondale who will be the new President with his wife Irene the Treasurer. Vic Benson of Dimondale is Vice President while the new Secretary and membership director is Marguerite Buhler of Bryon City.

Minnesota's jump in the membership is due primarily to the dedicated work of Andy Paglarini of Hibbing. His big boost came from the Hibbing and Duluth clubs, both becoming 100% NHPA. Duluth with a big Municipal League is led by Jim Newland and Hots Anderson. The Hibbing club is guided by Charles Strafaccia and Will Charles.

Indiana again led the NHPA in membership, breaking its previous high, and was followed by the Ohio Buckeye Association. Others in the top ten besides Michigan and Minnesota were Northern and Southern California, Massachusetts led by Ralph Forsstrom, Pennsylvania with more top players
