

Over 500 Attend Erie, Pa. Testimonial Dinner Honoring Danny Kuchcinski, World Champion

It was a gala night on October 26 in Erie, Pennsylvania when more than 500 persons jammed their way into the Erie Shrine Club to pay homage to one of their local youths, who has already made a big impression in a man's world.

Danny Kuchcinski, who won the World Horseshoe Pitching title last summer in Fargo, N. D., heard the praise of his elders, and got a standing ovation from his friends at the affair.

It started with a motorcade from the Stadium to the club where a host of

dignitaries and fans were on hand for the occasion.

They were there to honor the Harborcreek High graduate, who represented the Erie Horseshoe Pitching Club and attained the sport's highest honor when he fired 84.4 per cent ringers to win 34 of 35 matches over the six-day grind toward the world title.

By doing so, Danny not only gave the city national recognition but also enabled it to be selected as the site for the 1969 World Championships slated

for the Glenwood courts.

Judge Thomas W. Barber was the evening's principal speaker and saluted Danny as a true champion who had the necessary determination and self-discipline.

Uniontown's Jim Solomon, himself one of the country's best pitchers, told how he had competition until he became the best. He predicted even greater

accomplishments for him in the future.

Awards were plentiful. Mayor Louis J. Tullio presented a certificate of merit and a key to the city in the form of a tie clasp. Robert Pence of Gary, Ind., secretary of the National Association, presented a certificate of accomplishment from that group.

A proclamation on behalf of Erie County was given by County Commissioner Louis Rzymek, Joe Abbott of Erie, N.H.P.A. Vice-president, presented

a trophy on behalf of the Times-News.

In addition, Paul Beer, president of the local group, gave Danny another trophy and City Councilman Bernard Harkins, who acted as master of ceremonies, read a long list of gifts from various business establishments in the area.

Harkins concluded the presentations by giving Danny a wallet from the

committee which planned the dinner.

Among those introduced to the audience were Congressman Joseph Vigorito, Herb Pinch, of Sharon representing the Pennsylvania Horseshoe Association, Park Director Ted Amendola and Danny's parents.

Paul T. Allen served as general chairman of the affair and opened the program. Msgr. Francis J. Turner gave the invocation and Rev. Karl Schnei-

der the benediction.

D. Roberts Wins Ross County League Championship

The Ross County, Ohio Summer Horseshoe League ended with Donnie Roberts of Pike County winning the Class A championship. Donnie posted 38 wins and 4 defeats and averaged 68.9 per cent ringers. Roberts posted the high game of the season with 35 ringers out of 38 shoes for 92.1 per cent ringers against Paul Roll of Chillicothe. During one stretch against Roll, Roberts threw 28 consecutive ringers. Kenny Dawes of Good Hope was the runner-up with 30 victories and 12 defeats. Lawrence Henkle of Chillicothe took third and Clark Johnson of Lyndon was the most improved pitcher.

Wayne Daily of Chillicothe won 38 and lost 4 to capture the Class B title. He was also the most improved pitcher. John Turner took the runner-up spot and his brother Pete finished third. Carl Blevins of Chillicothe ran away with Class C winning 41 games and losing only 1. Plummer took Class D with 42

wins.

Westchester County, N. Y. Host To Big Time Horseshoes As Jack Giddes Of New Jersey Wins Invitational

For the first time since the late Thirties, when a state tournament was held at Rye, N. Y., Westchester County has hosted a major horseshoe pitching event with top pro pitchers. In late September, at New Rochelle, 15 of the greatest pitchers of the New York-New Jersey metropolitan area, all New England, along with three leading Westchester pitchers, took part in the first Westchester Masters Invitational Tournament. The winner of the finals was Jack Giddes, Martinsville, N. J., the New Jersey State Champion. The next two places also went to Jerseyites. Dr. Sol Berman, an Elizabeth physician, took second spot, and William Kolb of Belleville captured third. Both are former New Jersey state champs. Louis Gancos, Brooklyn, was fourth; Melvin Merritt, the top player of Massachusetts, fifth; and Rene Sirois, the Maine champ

and 17 year wonder, came sixth.

Trophies went to all six finalists, donated by the Westchester County Dept. of Parks, Recreation and Conservation, the sponsor. All participants received medallions donated by Joe Colarusso of Mt. Vernon and a luncheon offered by the Westchester Horseshoe Pitchers Association at the Glen Cove Restaurant, Pelham Rd., New Rochelle. Irwin "Red" Klein the County Athletic Director, supervised the all day event. Joseph Sharkey, president of the New Rochelle Horseshoe Club acted as director, and Walter Barker of Mt. Vernon was the statistician. William Rogers and Jerry Heim were chief judges. Members of the New Rochelle Recreation Commission, a cooperating group, were introduced, and greetings were brought by Councilman Hughie Doyle. Several hundred fans packed the new bleachers set up for the occasion. Though the weather was clear, coldness and some wind held the ringers down somewhat.



Note that no pitcher plays more than two games in one day on a single court and does not repeat two games on that court the second day. Also note the crucial games among the top qualifiers are saved for the last 3 games and during the last two games they all play on the center courts where you can watch them all at once.

A very fine advantage of this schedule is that from a spectator standpoint you can sit in one spot at the center of the 8 courts during the last two games and witness 4 top games at once, two in each class. More often than not these are the climactic and deciding games. We think it is such a popular and practical schedule we are passing it along at the end of the article.

One of our greatest successes and in many ways greatest surprises was our Winter Open Classic tournament.

Due to our extremely mild winters and the growing interest in pitching horseshoes it was felt we should have an informal type of round robin gettogether of pitchers every two weeks during the formerly quiet winter period until May when our major sanctioned tournaments normally begin.

One of the prime considerations of the Winter Open Classic is to introduce new pitchers to an informal type of tournament play.

Washington State Shows The Way!

Our State Tournament has a class AA as the highest class. We formerly had a 16 man round robin but cut it to an 8 man double round robin as there was too much spread among 16. The games are really competitive now with climactic games each day. It is a great honor to get in AA. BUT except for the current State Champion who is automatically seeded as the number one qualifier in AA, the only way a pitcher can get in this coveted group is to earn it by actually pitching one of the top 8 percentages in the state for a tournament since the last State Tournament the year before. This puts the pressure on our very best pitchers to get out and pitch during the year in tournaments.

Here again we differ from systems I have known. We deduct a certain number of ringers from his total thrown in the 100 shoes to classify him with the others, however the number deducted is not an arbitrary number but one computed from past records in this state. Perhaps yours may very slightly. We

We considered averaging a pitcher's tournament percentage but rejected the idea for several reasons. Too much bookkeeping. Some pitch in more tournies than others. Those pitching in bad weather would be handicapped for turning out. A pitcher with a high percentage might not attend the next tourney for fear of lowering his average. The way we have it if he doesn't pitch he risks others passing him and getting reduced to a lower class.

A newcomer may pitch 100 shoes to qualify and have his ringer total adjusted downward as per table previously described.

BUT no entrant is allowed to enter what we call class AA, our highest class of 8 pitchers by means of pitching a 100 shoe qualifying effort. Except for the current State Champion who is automatically seeded as the number one qualifier.

In the State Tournament class AA plays an 8 man double round robin, one complete round robin each of two consecutive days. Each day provides many games of decisive and climactic championship caliber. If a pitcher is down a game or two at the end of the first day he can recover the second day by beating the leaders himself rather than be forced to depend on someone else doing it for him, as is often the case in a 16 man round robin.

One problem kept bothering us. All known 8 man round robin schedules confine the 8 pitchers to 4 courts, and worse, some pitch as many as 3 games on the same courts in one day. To repeat this the second day would be intolerable. Many 8 man round robin schedules call for the top 3 pitchers to play each other in too early a game. So typically we made up our own schedule and it worked beautifully. At the time class AA is pitching on courts 1 to 4, class A is pitching on courts 5 to 8, and they alternate each game. Prior to tournament time we completely fill out the individual scorecards for each pitcher showing him game by game which opponent he meets and which court he plays on. We just write two numbers to the left of the space for the opponent's name, the opponent and court.

Those who have not established a percentage within the past year may qualify by pitching the 100 shoe qualifying effort, but cannot qualify for class AA.

McKennan Park, one of our 21 parks covering over 729 acres, has 12 excellent courts placed in a picturesque area shaded by beautiful old trees. All

courts are concrete pads and blue clay, lighted for night players. Sioux Empire Fair Grounds west of our city has 12 courts west of the grand stand with concrete pads and blue clay. A fine area fenced and lighted plays host to the Sioux Valley Open Tournament each year during the fair week. This is one of the fastest growing open tournaments in the area that is sponsored by the fair association and run by the Sioux Valley Indoor Horseshoe Pitchers Ass'n.

Six indoor courts are in use all year round in the Old McDonalds Barn located on the west edge of the Sioux Empire Fair grounds. These 6 courts serve not only the club members but clubs from the area as far as 125 miles away, Mitchell, Brookings, Bearsford, Vermillion, Platte and Sioux Falls all pitch shoes during all the cold weather that the So. Dak. area can give. Dues of $25\,e$ a week by the members during the winter help to meet the overhead. What other sport with so much skill and pleasure can be entered into so cheap?


