




### LEE HORSESHOES

# "Operation Publicity"

(This is the first in a series of articles written by Will Gullickson of Moorhead, Minn., in the NHPA's "Operation Publicity" for 1967. It is hoped the articles will serve to give horseshoe pitchers an insight of how to secure improved publicity on the sport throughout the nation. What do you think could be done to improve the game of horseshoe pitching?

Eight out of 10 pitchers answering a questionnaire sent to some of the leading pitchers around the nation answered by saying they believe increased publicity is the game's biggest need.

I have written sports for daily newspapers for 20 years and have pitched horseshoes even longer. In some way I hope to help you give the game a shot in the arm through more publicity by way of all media.

It's not an easy task to secure more "ink" in the newspaper and more time on radio and television stations. But, handled right, improvement is not out of reach.

So, let's get in there and pitch — not only shoes, but publicity too.

Just like the game of horseshoe pitching itself, it takes patience. But it will pay off.

First, take a look at your local, hometown situation and see what can be done. This varies, of course, in regard to the size of city and the newspapers, radio and television stations servicing the city and area.

The ever-expanding professional sports calendar demands more and more space and time for sports pages and sports time. The easy way out of course is for horseshoe pitchers to say the sports writers and sportscasters care nothing for their sport.

This is not the case. Presented properly, the horseshoe program, including weekly reports and tournament reports will usually be used.

In order to attempt to cover all aspects of improved publicity, this series will include the following articles:

# Your Editor Speaks . . . . Reflections of 1966

It is with humility that I acknowledge my gratitude to the many friends and members of the National Horseshoe Pitcher's Association, for the many courtesies that were extended to me during the year just past. I continued on my journey, going to Clinton, Illinois, July 5, where the Clinton club was initiating their new courts with an open tournament, conducted by Bernie Thorpe, a very energetic promoter of the game in that area of Illinois. On August 7, I attended and competed in the Mississippi Valley Fair Open tournament at Davenport, Iowa, Here again was another fine tournament, under the direction of Russell Sheetz and his tournament committee. The Galesburg Open Tournament at Galesburg, Illinois attracts many of the nation's top players, and under the tutelege of that genial personage, Andy Horn. I enjoyed a fine visit with all of these wonderful players during my stay there on August 13 and 14. As this tournament is a prelude to the annual Illinois State tournament at Springfield, Illinois during the Illinois State Fair, I continued on to give it my personal attention, being the state secretary, on August 15-16 and 17. We had a most successful tournament which was culminated with Gary Farnsworth and Ellis Griggs playing in the last game of the tournament, with Griggs being crowned the champion.

Our next stop was at the Cornbelt Open tournament, at Burlington, Iowa, another major tournament, with players from several states taking part. Harold Darnold and his associates conducted this great ringerama on August £0 and 21. For a ten week period during the summer I played in a singles league, at the close of which I was fortunate enough to win the Northern Illinois Open crown. Meet was played at Elgin, Illinois.

On Labor Day weekend, having a further desire to see what was going on elsewhere, I journeyed to the Michigan State tournament being conducted at Burr Oak, Michigan. Altho I was only to stay a few hours, I enjoyed the hospitality of Maurice Hecht and the friendly greeting of many new players, among whom were, Mrs. Irene Grable, Pat Smith, James Compton, Dyke Cowell, Vern Fuller, and many others in that Fine Michigan association. From Burr Oak we continued on down to Greenville, Ohio where the Ohio State tournament was in session, under the supervision of Sam Goodlander, Emma Focht, Leo McGrath and members of the Darke County club. Thus ended my summer travels, until I got the urge to resume my sojourning by going to Florida in late October. While in Florida, I visited the Bradenton Club on one sunny afternoon. While there I pitched a few games with some of the fellows who were on hand, getting ready for qualifying in the Florida State tournament, to be held the following weekend. Hal Porter, the main publicity man for the Florida club was on hand, as was John Davis, Asa Drinkwater, John Ellis, Chris Hansen, Joe Kelly, Horace Kemp, Robert Lavelleur, B. E. Mulhern, Les Peary, Henry Spiess. The entire group was busy getting the new Bradenton courts in shape for their annual state meet.

All in all, it was most inspiring to me to see the progress that is being made in horseshoe pitching activities around the country. I am sorry that time would not allow me to visit more areas, but perhaps as time goes on, I will be able to do so.

Again I want to express my gratitude to everyone for all the courtesies extended to my wife and myself as we travelled the "horseshoe circuit" this past year. May God's richest blessings be with each of you during 1967 and the years to follow.

### Are You A Believer? - Plattsburgh, N. Y. Pitchers Are

For many years inquiries were made in and around the greater Plattsburgh, New York area concerning the activity in horseshoe pitching as to whether there was enough enthusiasm to schedule a tournament. The city Recreation department came to the conclusion that there was. Thus plans and preparations were made to conduct the first "Plattsburgh Open" Tournament.

The tournament, a venture undertaken by Ralph and Larry Lucas of Plattsburgh, and working in close conjunction with the City Recreation department, got the tourney underway on Saturday, August 20, 1966 and concluded it on Sunday, August 28, 1966. Sixty men and eight women took to the courts, on Our Lady of Victory field in Plattsburgh. Altho the courts were of a temporary nature, due to the fact that the field is used for other daily activities the Lucases, together with 70 of their enthusiastic associates are in hopes that in due time the city fathers will support a move to build a battery of courts appropriate to the size of Plattsburgh. The fact that one of the city's enthusiasts is Mr. Frank Steltzer, mayor of Plattsburgh, is one point in the club's favor. Mr. Steltzer is a capable pitcher in his own right and was entered in the first annual Open tournament.

All entrants had to pitch 50 shoes to qualify, with the top thirty being divided into three groups — A, B, and C with trophies being awarded the top two in each division. All groups played a 10 man round-robin, with winners being determined by standings. The Ladies group also played a round-robin.

Ralph Lucas, in reporting results to Joe Pollack, secretary of the New York state association, stated that Class A was won by Larry Lucas: Class B honors went to Leonard Harper while Walt DuFour wrapped up Class C. In the Women's division it was Bernice Miller who turned up in the winner's circle.

As time goes on with the enthusiasm now being generated in Plattsburgh, the upsurge of activity will be felt both by the New York state association and also in the ranks of the NHPA. We extend our heartiest congratulations.

Henry Wisness, president of the RRV League, presented Rislov with the NHPA patch. He also introduced Gene Lykken of Kindred, former N. D.






