Tommy Bartlen Wins Wisconsin State Title

The first completely NHPA Wisconsin tournament in many years was smoothly and efficiently conducted by the officers of the Combined Locks club on the deluxe Jerry Kamp courts in that city.

Tommy Bartlen of Milwaukee won the title in a playoff after finishing in a three way tie with Bill Glass of Vesper and Ben Trollden of Ft. Atkinson. A father-son combination, Mel and Norm Comero of Eau Claire captured the top spots in Class B. Carl Joppe, Green Bay, the 1966 state champ placed 5th.

A total of 95 players took part, the largest entry list in a Wisconsin tournament since the World Tourney of 1948 held in Milwaukee, thereby boosting the state's NHPA membership to an all time high. Myrel Olson of Appleton was the high qualifier with 73 per cent ringers.

NHPA Secretary Bob Pence was a tournament visitor while enroute to the World Tourney in Fargo.

Danny Kuchcinski Crowned 1967 World Champ

Dan Kuchcinski, the 18-year-old lefthander with nothing but ringers, became the youngest modern-day champion by sweeping to 34 wins in 35 games on the Oak Grove courts, in Fargo, North Dakota.

Stripping defending champion Curt Day of his title, the stylish southpaw from Erie, Pa., ran a string of 32 straight wins before being toppled by former champ Elmer Hohl of Canada.

Oldest entrant in the tourney was 79 year old Henry Harper of California and the oldest to take part in round robin play was Frank Kopveiler of Wadena, Minn., who admits to 78.

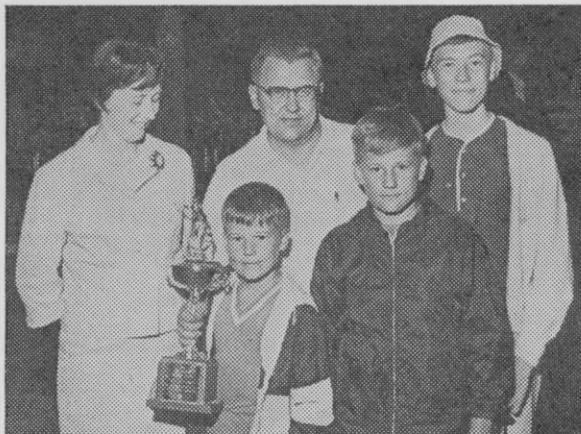

Stokes Award To Will Gullickson

The Arch Stokes Memorial trophy awarded annually by the Stokes family of Salt Lake City, Utah, went this year to Will Gullickson of the Red River Valley Horseshoe League.

The award is given in memory of the former NHPA President, Arch Stokes, who gave so much of his services and abilities to the NHPA and the game of horseshoe for so many years. The purpose of the award is to honor the person who has contributed the most to the game during the current year.

There can be no quarrel with this year's selection for seldom has one person contributed so much as this year's recipient.

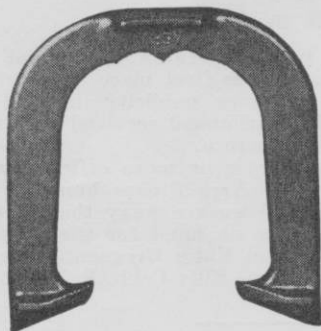

1967 World Tourney Sidelights and Highlights

Mayor Herschel Lashkowitz of Fargo spoke briefly at the closing trophy ceremonies at the tourney. He lauded the RRV League and NHPA officials for a job well done. Later Lashkowitz commended Will Gullickson and his staff during a City Commission meeting.

Gov. William L. Guy, of North Dakota, Robert Forsythe of Minneapolis (representing Gov. Harold Levander) and Mayor Ray Stordahl of Moorhead attended the opening tourney ceremonies.

Ralph Dykes, the new president of the NHPA, was at his scoreboard station throughout the tournament. Dykes kept up-to-date qualifying scores and other highlights posted with the help of his wife. The brilliant green and yellow scoreboard was watched by thousands of spectators throughout the tourney.

The scoreboards and all the other scoring devices and material are the handwork of Ralph Dykes, the new NHPA president of Chicago, Illinois and Jack Stout of Melrose Park, Illinois. Jack also furnished the steel straightedges thru the courtesy of Ace Metalcraft of Melrose Park, Illinois. Together these fellows spent many hours in preparing these many items for the 1967 World tournament. The NHPA is most appreciative of their efforts in its behalf.

Press and NHPA trailers stationed next to the courts provided an excellent view point and meeting place for those running the tourney. The press trailer doubled as headquarters for the host Red River Valley League.

Posting of results on the game-by-game scoreboard was handled by Wally Arndt, Henry Wisness and Hots Anderson. Anderson, an "import" from Duluth, was the likeable handyman around the press office as he served as one of Will Gullickson's chief aides.

A gift of a decorated cake was presented to Anderson by the Red River Valley League during the tournament.

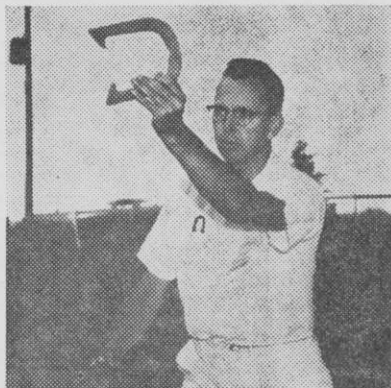

Highlights — (Continued)

A busy tour for 48 tourney visitors was arranged by Fargo Mayor Lashkowitz on the last day of the tourney.

Many tourney pitchers made the 25-mile trip to Kindred, N. D. to practice on the 14-court layout at Mill Site Park. Groups of pitchers made an almost daily trek to Kindred. Rudy Lykken of Kindred kept the courts in good condition.

Probably the best publicized tournament in the history of the sport, the classic received first-hand coverage in The Forum, Fargo-Moorhead's Sunday, morning and evening editions.

The three Fargo-Moorhead television stations — KXJB, KTHI and WDAY—covered the tourney first hand. Radio stations WDAY, KVOX and KFGO also gave the tourney good coverage.

Vicki Winston, the women's champ, was interviewed on Party Line, an afternoon television program originating from the WDAY studios.

Jack Horner, well-known Minneapolis-St. Paul sportscaster, was on hand for two nights of the tourney.

Powell Krueger, Minneapolis Tribune photographer, took numerous photos which will appear in the Tribune's Picture Magazine.

Glenn, Roger and Tedd Gullickson along with Jim Alekson handled the sale of NHPA items, horseshoes and souvenirs at the stand at the tourney.

Sue Gillespie, the former women's champion, was interviewed by Syb Gullickson, women's writer for The Forum. The article and picture received raves from NHPA officials, especially Bob Pence, who said it was the best horseshoe article he had ever read.

Newspapers throughout Minnesota and North Dakota and many around the nation carried pre-tournament stories on the tournament with an accompanying picture of Curt Day.

The Red River Scene, Moorhead weekly, ran a two-page spread on the tournament pictures.

John Krier, manager of the F-M Hotel, which served as hotel headquarters for the tourney, visited the courts several times and visited with officials and players.

Next year the tournament goes back to Keene, N. H. It will be held in Erie, Pa., for the first time in 1969.

The 1967 tournament, hosted by the Red River Valley League, probably was the most publicized in the history of the sport. Three Fargo-Moorhead television stations and four radio stations gave the tournament excellent coverage.

The tourney was covered by Gullickson for the Forum, Fargo-Moorhead's morning and evening newspaper. The Minneapolis Tribune featured the tourney in a Sunday picture magazine article.

Gullickson heaped praise on four of his assistants who worked long hours during the tourney. They are Henry Wisness, Wally Arndt, Wes Myhre and Hots Anderson. Anderson is from Duluth, Minn.

The Fargo-Moorhead group promised improved court, clay conditions if the tourney is ever held here again.

The 11-day tournament drew a record turnout of 324 pitchers from 40 states and Canada. It also attracted a record throng of 26,000 spectators in the first time the tourney has been held here.

It was Kuchcinski who stole the hearts of the crowds, especially when he eked out a 50-49 thrilling victory over Ray Martin of Philo, Ill., in the 36th game. Martin opened the last inning with a ringer and missed on the second shoe. The Kid fired a three-pointer and added a point with a close shoe.

"The last shoe felt like a ton," Kuchcinski declared when it was all over.

For the tourney, Kuchcinski drilled ringers at an 84.4 per cent clip, making the spectators virtually gasp in amazement. He said the ringers came easier for him than at any time during his career.

Larry Geer and Harry Wendt, Californians who were the first tourney arrivals, were interviewed by The Forum's Wayne Lubenow.

Vicki Wins Seventh World Title

Vicki Winston took her 2nd consecutive and an unprecedented 7th World title back to Lamonte, Mo., a record unmatched by any other player in the Women's division. She won her first crown in 1956 and added championships in 1958, 1959, 1961, 1963 and 1966.

Overall this was the strongest field ever, but Vicki won all her games by wide margins and averaged 73.6 percent ringers. Ruth Thomas of Lockport, N. Y. placed 2nd just as she did last year. Ruth Hangen of Buffalo, N.Y. took 3rd place. Both Lorraine and Ruth play in the same local league. Ruth was the high qualifier with 73 percent ringers.

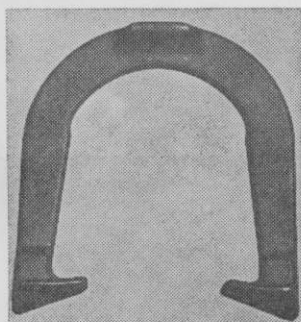

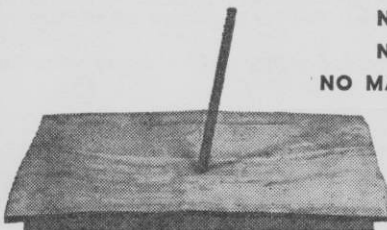

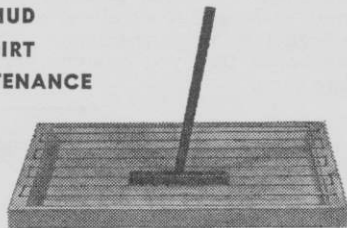

Red River Valley League Overcomes Many Obstacles in Promotion of 1967 World Tournament

Odds were stacked against the Red River Valley Horseshoe League coming out financially in the World Tournament promotion.

But the league finds itself solvent while breaking even in the task which made believers out of many. Over-all the project cost the league \$10,000, which is quite a sum when considering the league started from scratch a little more than a year ago.

League members emphasized far in advance the large number of pitchers and spectators were expected. Listeners for the most part failed to respond, figuring the local group was over-selling its product.

As a result, the league found it was difficult to attract support from the Fargo and Moorhead Chambers of Commerce. Problems followed, such as inadequate bleachers and parking congestion.

Hundreds of inquiries on housing and camping were handled by the four-man league staff.

It was estimated the F-M area profited by more than \$200,000 by the tourney. The league sold 2,050 booster buttons, many of them being sold at the tourney by a group of Boy Scouts.

Final total attendance was estimated at 26,000, figuring participants, officials and spectators.

The league also had a successful fund-raising project and received a cut on concessions. Excellent cooperation came from American Linen, which provided rugs for the courts; a sign firm and the Quality Mobile Homes.

The interest in the tourney resulted in much post tourney chatter. It also meant more action at the courts with many newcomers practicing hour by hour.

The RRV League expresses thanks to all those who played and watched the tourney. It was an extreme pleasure to serve all. League members have received nothing but excellent comments on the high calibre of visitors who came here for the tournament.

It is hoped that you enjoyed your stay and will consider us as your hosts another time.

Westchester, N. Y. Masters Invitational Open Tournament — Sept. 23

The first Westchester Masters Invitational Open Tournament will be held on Saturday, September 23, on the new courts of the Dominick Sharkey Horseshoe Park, Ft. Slocum, New Rochelle, N. Y. Check in time is 9:15 a. m. The first session of play will run from 10 a. m. to 1:30 p. m. The second session from 3:30 to 7 p. m. Rain date will be September 24th.

Of the player field of 18, there will be 15 "at large" and the three top trophy winners in the 1967 Westchester County Tournament. Pitchers will be divided into three seeded sections of six each. They will play a round-robin within their sections in the morning session (5 games). Handsome trophies will be awarded the first three places in the finals. Ties will be resolved by ringer averages, except that a one game playoff will be required to break a first place tie in the finals. In the event of a top 3-way tie in the finals, the playoff will be between those two with the highest ringer average.

It is being sponsored by the County of Westchester, Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation; with the joint cooperation of the New Rochelle Recreation Commission, the Westchester Horseshoe Pitchers Association and the New Rochelle Horseshoe Club.

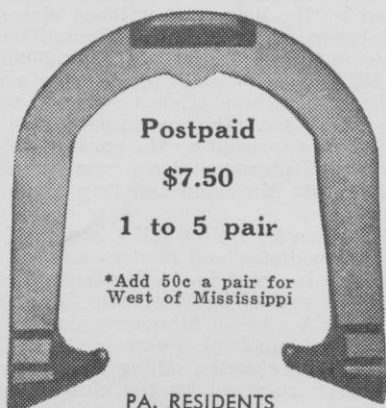

The 1967 NHPA convention convened in the Oak Grove Park shelter house in Fargo, N.D. at 8:30 AM, August 3, 1967.

First Vice President Elmer Beller presided in the absence of NHPA President Harold Craig. All other officers were present as follows; Secretary-Treasurer Robert Pence and Vice Presidents Will Gullickson, Lucille Hopkins and Ottie Reno. Ottie Reno acted as recording Secretary.

A total of 95 voting delegates were seated and a minute of silent prayer was observed in memory of those members who had passed away during the year.

Minutes of the 1966 Convention were read by Secretary Robert Pence and approved as read.

Additional assets in the form of game related items for sale to the membership were reported to be in the hands of Don Koso, Herb Pinch and Bob Pence who handle these items for the NHPA.

The Auditing Committee, Jim Solomon (Pa.), a public accountant, and Mrs. Grable (Mich.), a bookkeeper, reported they had examined the books and found them in excellent order and recommended approval of the report. Approval was given by the delegates without dissent.

Solomon of the Auditing Committee recommended that the Treasurer be instructed to invest approximately \$3000.00 in T bonds. The motion was seconded by Riffle (Ohio) and approved by a vote of the delegates.

Eino Tiilikainen (Colo.) reported for the Hall of Fame Selection Committee and asked that the recommendation of the Committee as presented in the Digest be approved by the convention. The motion was seconded by E. Winston (Mo.) and approved by a unanimous vote, thereby officially placing Elmer Beller, Putt Mossman and Guy Zimmerman in the Horseshoe Pitching Hall of Fame.

A motion by Dykes (Ill.), seconded by Foster (Nebr.) called for the system of Intermediates and Seniors as used in the 1967 tournament be made permanent and inserted in the By-Laws. The motion was adopted unanimously.

It was moved by Herfurth (Mass.) and seconded by McGrath (Ohio) that the NHPA add an Honorary non-player membership at \$1.00 per year with 50¢ of each card sold going to the NHPA and the remaining 50¢ being retained by the state chapter selling the card or in lieu of no official state chapter this 50¢ being retained by the club or group selling the membership card. This motion was approved by the convention with the proviso that it be used on a one year's trial basis.

Many delegates had comments and suggestions regarding various problems of the World Tournament such as qualifying, groundskeeping, scoring, etc. It was moved by Fishel (Wash.) and second by Wisness (N.D.) that the President appoint a committee to look into these matters and report to the 1968 convention. The motion was approved.

It was moved by Herfurth (Mass.) and seconded by Hamman (Ore.) that the NHPA annual dues be raised from \$1.00 to \$1.50. Rising costs of printing, postal rates and other expenses were cited as reasons for the increase. The motion carried by a vote of 68 to 25 and chairman declared the motion adopted.

Sealed bids for the 1969 World Tournament were called for a bid of \$4,500.00 was presented by the Erie, Pa. Horseshoe Club Secretary-Treasurer Joe Abbott. It was moved by Steinfeldt (N.Y.) and seconded by Burgess (Texas) that the bid be accepted. The vote was overwhelmingly in favor of acceptance and the chairman announced that the 1969 World Tournament would be held in Erie, Pa.

The Nominating Committee recommended the following slate of officers for election; President Ralph E. Dykes (Ill.); 1st Vice Pres. James Knisley (Ohio) and 3rd Vice Pres. Joseph Abbott (Pa.). The Chairman called for nominations from the floor and Jacobs (Mich.) nominated Earl Grable of Michigan for President. A secret ballot was taken and Mr. Dykes was elected President. There were no further nominations from the floor and Mr. Knisley and Mr. Abbott were elected as Vice Presidents by acclamation.

Resolutions were offered and approved expressing sincere thanks and appreciation for outstanding services rendered by the following; NHPA President Harold Craig, World Tournament Co-Ordinator Will Gullickson, officers of the Red River Valley Horseshoe League, city and park officials of Fargo, and the NHPA tournament officials. The outstanding publicity work of Will Gullickson received special comment and it was the feeling of the delegates that the NHPA should make every possible effort to continue and expand the publicity program he had started.

There being no further official business the Chairman adjourned the convention.

Svenkerud had the World Tournament visitors vote for the most unusual pair. Finch, who has one of the largest collections of its kind, won in the balloting.

Some of the shoes were brought to the tournament and others were mailed in. Finch will receive a prize for having the most unusual shoes.

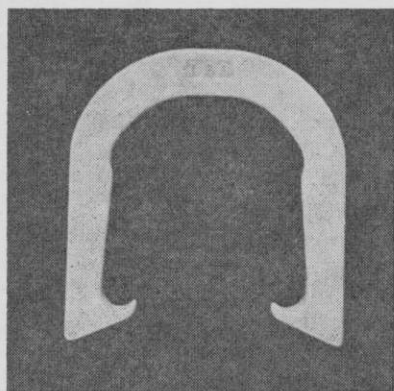
First Girl's World Title Won By Bonnie Seibold

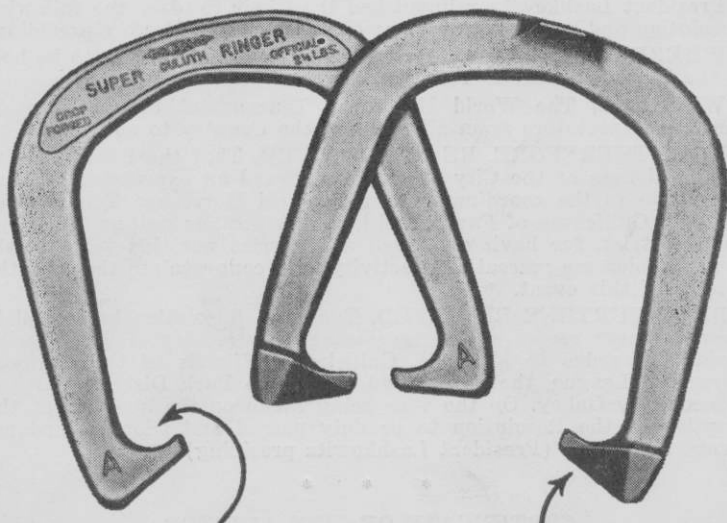
