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1968 World Tourney Plans Well Underway At Keene, N. H.

The Keene New Hampshire club is well underway with plans to host the 1968 World Championship horseshoe pitching tournament here next summer.

In fact, the Keene enthusiasts of the popular and ever-growing sport have been thinking about the world tourney and working to make it the best in history of the National Horseshoe Pitcher's Association since they last hosted the event here in 1965.

Don Pickering, the tall and talented former state champion and one of the friendliest guys you'll ever meet, is club president this year. He heads an organization of veteran pitchers who gained valuable experience before on the "world" operation.

Frank Washer, chairman of the program book committee, has Rene and Lloyd Putnam working with him and their goal is to raise \$15,000. The amount is \$3,000 more than the 1965 figure collected and the extra money will be used to provide the tourney with the best bleachers available.

Fred Melvin and Olive Pickering are on the housing committee. They will soon list in the Digest all the accommodations to be found in the city and the Monadnock Region. This will include motels, hotels, inns, and rooms in private homes; also camping facilities.

George and Alberta Sheldon are co-chairmen of the entertainment committee. They're planning to conduct a tourney program that will appeal to the families of contestants as well as the pitchers themselves. You can be assured that the fun will have a definite New England flavor!

Danny Kuchcinski In Grand Performance At Chicago's Garfield Park's Indoor Exhibition

Sunday, February 25, 1968 was a memorable day never to be forgotten in the annals of Chicago's Garfield park Horseshoe Club. It was the day that the amiable and delightful young World's champion, Danny Kuchcinski of Erie, Pa., staged an exhibition on the club's indoor courts in Garfield park.

He played before a capacity house and delighted all present with his exhibition of ringer skill.

NHPA president, Ralph E. Dykes was the master of ceremonies for the afternoon and did a most outstanding job as he presented the various dignitaries for introduction, among whom were Mr. Melvin Ackerman, Supervisor of Area 6 of the Chicago Park District and Mrs. Jane Dickens, Supervisor of Garfield Park. Also introduced were Robert G. Pence, NHPA secretary from Gary, Indiana and F. Ellis Cobb, secretary of the Illinois State Association and News Digest editor. Will Gullickson, NHPA Publicity Director, was also in Chicago making arrangements for radio and TV appearances and news paper interviews. He did an outstanding job on all facets of the publicity program.

Danny warmed up for the occasion by throwing 50 shoes laying on 40 ringers. His next feat was performing various trick shots, mainly pitching over blanket and ringing the stake, using 3 stakes, ringing each stake as they were called by Jack Stout on the PA system. Pitching ringers thru a hoop, ringing stake with man sitting on stake, ringing stake covered by table, lighting matches and many others. He was truly a crowd charmer. As a final part of his exhibition, he played a 50 point game against Melvin Utley of Chicago, who though playing valiantly, was unable to stem the tide of ringers and lost to Danny, 50-10.

For an affair of this type, it takes many hands to bring it to a successful conclusion, among those who were responsible for this outstanding success were Abe Austin, Walter Crim, Ralph Dykes, Jack Stout, "Cowboy" Pearson and Martin Henney. The Chicago Park District officials are to be commended for the fine cooperation they gave in furnishing the programs, large banners that graced the walls, and in many other ways in brightening up the surroundings for convenience of all the visitors.

To Jack Stout and his associates at Ace Metal Craft for the many hours that they spent in creating the beautiful horseshoe that was presented to Danny by Jack at the close of the exhibition. To Ralph Dykes for setting up all the displays and handling details in general.

Another attraction that was added to the afternoon's festivities, was a fancy rope twirling act expertly done by "Cowboy" Pearson of the Garfield

Club.

We would be remiss if we did not again extend a vote of thanks to Mr. Ackerman and Mrs. Dickens for all their fine efforts in making this event one long to be remembered by all those who use the facilities of the Garfield Park area of the Chicago Park District.

Danny Kuchcinski Spends Ten Days In Florida

Dan and his school-mate, baseball team-mate, Paul Vargo, of Erie, arrived in Bradenton, horseshoe Winter Capital of the World, late Dec. 1, 1967. They checked in at the Downtown Cabana, were welcomed by the manager. Mr. Norton, were picked up and talked at by the Dean of Horseshoe U. until bedtime.

On Dec. 12, 1967, they took off for cold Erie. They left behind them a lot of warm new friends; a lot of folks whose faith in the present crop of teenagers had been greatly strengthened; who really understood that Horseshoes is no longer "an old man's game!" Dan and Paul were everywhere in the area; where ever they went they were respected; we are still answering questions about their next appearance! Al Levine, young sports reporter of the nearby St. Petersburg Times, wrote a feature story about Dan with a large picture of him in action.

In the ten days "The Boys" were here — Dan made sure Paul was everywhere he went; shared all his thrills — the Bradenton Herald's Kent Chetlain gave space for stories with two to five column pictures, on seven days. On the day they left he ran a four picture sequence of Dan throwing a ringer and the Sunday after they left in the regular Horseshoe column, a detailed description of Dan's delivery using the four picture sequence as a guide.

One story was titled "A Day in the Life of a Horseshoe Champ." This began with a visit to the Herald to see Chetlain where the red carpet was rolled out. There they met many of the folks who have done a lot to aid this growing game they are so good at, folks in Kent's department, the photographers and Jay Goins and his gang in Circulation. Appointments were set up with high school and junior college coaching staffs — Boy Wynn and Coach Moffett among others; Cy Still of the Chamber of Commerce and George Kirkley of the Bradenton Country Club who sponsored and conducted a round of golf for the Erieites. Johnny Sines was another interested school-man; wants to see more games like ours included in high school and college recreation programs.

The boys swam in the Gulf; met surfers, were guests in the homes of Horseshoe U. folks. Ole Jack Ellis took them fishing; they caught fish too!

On Dec. 9th at Horseshoe U. Dan, with Paul helping him, put on his demonstration in such a way it will long be remembered by the largest crowd to witness a horseshoe show in Florida for years! He first warmed up with the standard try for ringers in 50 shoes; he admits he has done better, but the crowd was much impressed. He then went into a routine of trick shots: ringers thrown through Paul's widespread feet, circled arms and with his chin on the stake!

He threw'em when the stake was hidden by a blanket and his finale was something you will have to see to appreciate! Dan and Paul highlighted public attention on horseshoes in this area as it has not been done before. Two decent young men, very good at what they were doing, no monkeyshines of any sort on the visit, was a great boost for the young men and women of the area. We expect to see more youngsters at The Campus as a direct result of the visit!

More demonstrations by this pair are being set up all over NHPA territory, don't miss one if you can get to it!

National Park And Recreation Association Horseshoe Pitching Handbook

The National Park & Recreation Association has published a 48 page illustrated Horseshoe Pitching Handbook as a part of its series of management aids for municipal park departments and recreation directors.

As the title page indicates the book was printed with the aid and co-operation of the NHPA and its Secretary Bob Pence. The publication made liberal use of the NHPA's Horseshoe Pitching Manual, gives a description of the NHPA, the News Digest and the NHPA program.

Among the illustrations are pictures of the Heekin Park courts in Muncie, Ind. where the 1960 and 1961 World Tournaments were held and the courts in Lewiston, Maine which were built by members of the Lewiston-Auburn Horseshoe Club of the Maine State Association.

The author was Temple Jerrell, an NHPA member who is an officer in National Park & Recreation Association. "Temp" is a personal friend of NHPA Secretary Bob Pence and was formerly a top ranking player, having won the Maryland state title in 1936 and 37 when he lived in Hyattsville and the Tennessee state title later on when he was Park Recreation Director at Oak Ridge, Tenn. His present home is in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

NHPA Clubs and members using municipal park facilities are advised to call attention of the Recreation Directors and park departments to this handbook and urge them to obtain copies which are designed to aid them in formulating and supporting horseshoe pitching programs. 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A Success Story

The slowly but steadily increasing popularity of competition horseshoe pitching has led to the growth of the Westchester Horseshoe Pitchers Association from 50 members at its inception five years ago to the nearly 130 members it now has under the presidency of Carl von der Lancken, founder of the Westchester group and president of the New York State Horseshoe Pitchers Association.

Mr. von der Lancken's enthusiasm for the sport will see proper fullfillment next Labor Day when his league, based in New Rochelle, will host the official

state tournament.

The courts form the Dominic Sharkey Horseshoe Park, named after "one of the early great players in Westchester," according to Mr. von der Lancken, in tribute to the pitcher now in his mid-eighties. The first "masters invitational tournament" involving many states from New England and the Mid-Atlantic, was held at this park.

The Association has, in addition to its floodlighted cement courts in New Rochelle, clubs in Yonkers, Peekskill, and Montrose, and has proposed two new

clubs in Yorktown and Chappaqua.

Mr. von der Lancken, administrative assistant to the president of Westchester

Community College and assistant professor in history, notes that the interest in horseshoes has "come in waves." Very active in the '30s and '40s.

Interest is on the upsurge now, according to the WPA president, but he feels the sport needs to become "a major reward for professionals," in order to rank it with bowling or golf. Mr von der Lancken feels that there is "more kill in this thought of the professionals," in order to rank it with bowling or golf. Asked what kind of people generally participated in horseshoe pitching, Mr. von der Lancken noted the variety of workers, businessmen, salesmen, and industrial personnel who join leagues. The sport is becoming organized.

Efforts are afoot to encourage indoor pitching courts to be established at the sport palaces which now offer bowling and billiards.

Of much help in the early days of the league, Mr. Von der Lancken notes, were the recreation departments, and many exhibitions have been given in White Plains and Greenburgh to help form new courts and arouse new interests.

1968 WORLD TOURNAMENT


Wheelock Park, Keene, New Hampshire Saturday, July 27 Through Tuesday, August 6

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Michigan Looks To '68 With Confidence

The Wolverine State Horseshoe Pitcher's Association possesses a great degree of optimism as 1968 gets under way. A case in point, among others, is the broad spectrum of experience personified in the new slate of officers who were elected late in 1967 at the state championship tourney at Weston. Jonas Otto, Ann Arbor and Lee Jacobs, Belleville, were elected President and Vice President of the state organization, respectively. These two gentlemen have been a part of Michigan horseshoe activity and participation with combined careers, exceeding 80 years. Had Irwin Carlberg chosen to serve as secretary, he has since resigned due to incompatible views over state constitutional, administrative procedures, this experience figure would approach the 100 year mark.

President and Vice President Otto and Jacobs have furnished dedicated leadership to the horseshoe pitching in Michigan since the late 20's and early 30's. There can be few problems that they have not encountered and solved over that 40 odd year period.

Other officials elected, included, Mrs. Helen Wolf, Hillsdale, to a second term as second Vice President in charge of womens activities in particular. Mrs. Irene Grable, Dimondale, wife of former state president Earl Grable, also was re-elected to a second term as treasurer of the organization. She also possesses extensive experience over the years in horseshoe activity. James Compton, Dimondale, who served the last half of Marge Buhler's two year term in 1967, was reappointed to a full term as secretary of the WSHPA. Compton, as has Earl Grable, is a former president of the Dimondale Horseshoe Club. Incidentally, that club, at it's annual convention Jan. 14th, elected Fred Smith Sr., Dimondale and Oscar Hope, Lansing, President and Vice President, while W. J. Ullenbruch, Dimondale, was re-elected secretary-treasurer. Pat Smith, Dimondale, continues as director of publicity of WSHPA.

Michigan horseshoe activity has enjoyed steady progressive development, particularly since the WSHPA became one hundred percent offiliated membership-wise, with the NHPA. This practice began several years ago, during the administration of Roy Smith and the Hammonds, Ruth and Earl. They also were responsible for holding, among other improvements, such as scoring games each with a scorekeeper. They also started to hold the state championship tournament over the three day Labor Day Week-end in 1964.

The Grable administration's most notable achievement would have to be the complete formation of a new constitution for the state organization. This document was nearly a year in the making and was formally adopted at a meeting at Dimondale in December 1966. This constitution in its slightly over an existence of one year has been tested on several occasions and enabled the state leadership to cope admirably with each situation.

The appointment of Earl Grable as regional Director of the east central states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Michigan, has contributed greatly to our state's optimism for the coming year. His qualifications and available time for travel, no doubt were factors influencing the NHPA appointment.

The development of horseshoe clubs continues in the Wolverine State, adding to the already impressive layouts such as Battle Creek, Burr Oak, Sturgis, Lake Orion, Breckenridge, Ada, Carleton, Detroit, and Dimondale have. The most recently developed layout, Dyke Cowells 22 courts at Weston, enabled Michigan to host the big mid-west Ringer Round-up in 1967, for the first time. Ray's Recreation indoor emporium near Dimondale is not only the finest in the nation, to our knowledge, but held the first NHPA indoor national open last April. Participants from Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Iowa, competed in this outstanding event. The second annual NHPA indoor open will be held April 20-21 at Ray's Recreation, hopefully under the astute conduction of Bob Pence. Presumably, Paul Focht, who won the tourney last year, will defend his title this year.

Lee Jacobs, Belleville is serving his second term as a member of the NHPA

Hall of Fame committee.

Dear Sir:

My analysis and answer to the suggestion by Mr. Sol Berman in regards to the one incident which occurred in the last game between two players as mentioned in Horseshoe Pitchers News Digest Feb. 1968 — page 5.

If given the total points of each player for all the games in the tournament and also the total points their opponents gained against each of them plus their ringer average in the tournament. I would know which player earned

his place.

If the gap between games won and lost of each of the players was not within 50 points of each other then the player with the shortest gap between games won and lost did not qualify for playoff and could not gain enough points to equal the other player in the playoff.

If he qualified he would have to keep his opponent from scoring to be able to pick up enough points in the play off. After the play off, the points would be added to the totals already known to decide the winner.

If we are going to use the point system then we must use it through the tournament completely and qualify the player according to his earnings in

all of his games in the tournament.

Since the complete point system is not comprehended and practiced, then the only cure is to count ringers only and place the players according to their ringer average for the complete or all of tournament, and the only time a playoff would be necessary would be when the ringer averages were tied to a fraction.



Will's Ringer Mill

This is the time of year when horseshoe pitchers start yearning for their first spring practice outdoors.

Some of our warm-weather friends have pitched outdoors through the winter and others have taken winter vacations in sun-land. Also, some have taken advantage of the ever-increasing indoor facilities to keep razor sharp.

There's a conflict in opinion among some pitchers as to whether indoor pitching helps or hinders. Some pitchers feel that unless the indoor facilities are near perfect — with a high ceiling and the right clay or Dixon courts — that there's a chance for your game to deteriorate.

However, unless overdone, it is felt by many pitchers that the year-around

schedule of pitching helps keep the pitcher in condition.

Many pitchers turn to bowling for their winter-time exercise replacement. A large number of horseshoe pitchers have realized success on the bowling lanes. Some horseshoe leagues open their spring season with a get-together

bowling tournament.

While it is felt that bowling does not provide the perfect replacement for horseshoe, it is a sport which requires many of the same motions. The horseshoe pitcher-bowler usually figures it is not a good practice to mix the two sports during the winter season. Again, there's no stringent rule with some enjoying success in both sports during the snow season.

Dan Kuchcinski, 1967 World Horseshoe Champion, is among those who

turns to the bowling lanes for entertainment and competition during the

winter.

Coaches, trainers and others with athletic backgrounds put emphasis on

pacing yourself in preparing for a season.

This holds true in horseshoe where the pitcher will likely experience more success through the season if he prepares himself physically and mentally weeks and maybe even months before tossing the first shoe.

Simple sit-up, squatting and leg, back and arm exercises are beneficial to

limbering a horseshoe pitcher into condition. Exercises to increase stamina

are important.

There are advocates of running or jogging as a prime conditioner for most sports. Since horseshoe pitching requires a lot of "road work" once the season

starts, it is a good idea to get the legs into the best condition possible.

Some horseshoe pitchers make a practice of walking to and from work to keep their legs and feet in best condition possible. It is important to wear shoes which will permit walking distances just like it is important to have the right footwear when pitching horseshoes.

It is generally accepted that pitchers wear a soft-soled shoe, although there

are exceptions. Some pitchers taking a liking to tennis shoes or the new type


shoe which is worn by track stars.

Another important item mentioned by pitchers is their diet during the season as well as the off-season. It is always interesting to watch how closely the leading pitchers in the World Tournament keep a careful eye on their diets during the competition.

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


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
