





Showers Of Ringers Bring Arizona Title To Kamman

The rain predicted for Mesa, Arizona, and vicinity on Saturday, October 21, proved to be only showers of ringers dropping around the stakes at Rendezvous Park where the annual Arizona state horseshoe tournament was held.

Art Kamman of Mesa successfully defended his state title, which now makes

the twelfth time he has accomplished this feat.

Jimmy Lecky of Phoenix was state champion for 22 years, and Stan DeLeary, also of Phoenix, for 10 years. So Mesa's Art Kamann holds the title second longest in Arizona's state history. He finished with a 70.5 percentage average for the day and his high game against Jim Malvern of Tucson was a sizzling 82.4 percent.

Chalmer Laird and Eddie Alldredge, both of Mesa, tied for the runnerup

spot with Laird getting the nod with the higher percentage.

In Class B it was Bill Adair of Phoenix taking top honors and Fred Brown of Mesa the runner-up.

Roy "Red" Cochran of Mesa is the new Class C champion, and Ray Bolinger

of Phoenix the runner-up.

Al Smith, a spritely youngster of age 73 received the high qualifying trophy

and was the oldest participant.

Mesa Parks and Playgrounds will sponsor their Annual Open Horseshoe Tournament, Saturday, December 2, at Rendezvous Park and urges all winter visitors to participate.

The Illinois state tournament was held at the annual Illinois State Fair in Springfield, Illinois, during August. Leck Miller of Brownstown, Illinois set a terrific pace both in qualifying and finally during the semi-finals and on the final day.

Despite a pre-tournament deluge of rain, which left the courts in a submerged condition, the meet finally got under way shortly after dinner on August 15 with the 24 high qualifiers making up the three division semi-finals. The day finished in beautiful sunshine which continued thru the second day.

The Boys tournament on Wednesday, August 16, saw Mike Stout, 12 year old ringer sharpie from Melrose Park, Illinois retain his state title by stopping all comers, among which was a 90 percent ringer game.

For the first time, the Illinois Association staged a Senior Citizens class, which brought out some of the ringermen from days gone by. Among these was Estil McGee of Williamsville, Illinois who came out on top.

In the final days' play, although 12 men took part, each man only played eight games. Schedule was so arranged that no pitcher played the same man twice.

Consequently the title would go to the victor in the final game. Maison held a slight lead throughout the pressure packed match. Sitting on 49 points, he tossed a double ringer, which Smith topped but one came off, permitting Maison to repeat as state champion.



Mass. with 82 percent games.




