



In game 7, Stinson won over Richmond 52-40 with both pitchers really putting them on. Stinson got by games 9 and 10 quite handily. Larye Ambrose was awarded second place on points. He lost 51 to 35 getting 44 ringers in 72 shoes to Marv Richmond's 48 ringers. In the longest game (104 shoes) Ambrose lost a 50 to 46 decision to Gust Magnuson throwing 79 ringers to 81 for Magnuson.

Lloyd Frederickson of Wayzata, won Class B winning all 11 games with a

good ringer percentage of 68.09.


