





Apartment Complex Available For World Tournament Visitors And Players To Eureka, California

The Redwood Empire Horseshoe Pitching Club has made arrangements to use an apartment complex for housing during the 1973 World Horseshoe Tournament. The rates are considerably lower than those charged by the local motels. Because of the large tourist trade, in the area, most local motels prefer not to make advance reservations. Due to the savings and convenience, we feel it would be to your advantage to use these services.

This complex is used for University students and consists of 2 and 3 room apartments. All units include a living room, bath and full kitchen. Linen will

be furnished, but kitchen utensils will not.

The management has agreed to allow additional people using sleeping bags

to be housed in an apartment at a nominal rate.

These apartments have 4 and 6 beds. The 4 bed apartments are \$140.44, and 6 bed apartments are \$181.54. These rates are for the 10 day period. In order to receive these rates, all units must be rented for this entire 10 day period. Additional occupants in sleeping bags will be charged \$1.00 each per night. You must provide your own sleeping bag.

If you desire extra savings by sharing a room, please indicate in your

reservation.

Please include date of arrival and departure, number in party, number of beds desired, names and ages of children, if any, with your reservation. This apartment complex has coin operated laundry facilities and a heated indoor swimming pool.

Redwood Empire Lines, a charter bus service, has agreed to provide shuttle bus service to and from the court area 3 times each day. If there is a charge

for this shuttle service, it will be nominal.

North Dakota Association Holds Meeting

The North Dakota Horseshoe Pitchers Association recently held a statewide meeting and adopted a constitution and held election of officers. A 7-man board of directors was elected to serve terms of 3, 2 and 1 years.

The Board of Directors held their first annual meeting in Jamestown on Saturday, March 24th, to pass on final approval of the constitution, plan a tentative schedule of tournaments for the various clubs in the state for the coming season.

The North Dakota State Tournament will be held at Hannaford, North Dakota on September 1 & 2, 1973, and it is expected to be one of the largest ever held in the state.

Limited shower facilities will be available adjacent to the Horseshoe Courts in the Fairgrounds. No soap or linens will be furnished.

Reservations for these spots must be made through the Housing Committee

by June 1, 1973. These will be filled on a first come first serve basis.

KOA Campground: Located 4 miles north of Eureka on Highway 101. Commercial facilities. Will have been increased to facilitate 128 units inclusive of trailers, campers, tents, station wagons, etc.

Recreation, laundry, and shower facilities are available. Reasonable rates.

Reservations must be sent directly to KOA.

Arcata Commons: Located in Arcata, 8 miles north of Eureka at Sunset and G Streets. 75 places available for parking facilities only. \$3.00 per day charge includes use of kitchen, bathroom, and laundry facilities and use of swimming pool at near by Arcata Commons Apartments. Kitchen and bathrooms to be shared by 5 camper units. No linens or kitchen utensils will be furnished. Reservations must be made through the Housing Committee by June 1, 1973.

We hope that all of you who are planning on making the trip in campers or trailers will be able to notify us as soon as possible on your choice of facilities.



Juniors And Misses Into The "Hall Of Fame?"

The N.H.P.A. Hall of Fame Committee is voting whether or not to recommend to the membership at the annual meeting in Eureka, California, the advisability of inducting one "Junior" and one "Junior Miss" into the Hall of

Fame starting in 1974.

Bernard Herfurth, chairman of the committee, favors the idea for the following reasons: To help create interest and encourage the younger players to stay in the game. They play in tournaments along with the adults, and regardless of what they pay into the game they should receive appropriate recognition for their efforts. It also might encourage younger players to stay at the game as an adult. If a youngster excelled in the game, and won an award, it would be a lifetime memoir, whether or not they remained in the game as an adult.

If the committee votes for this idea, it would only be a recommendation to the N.H.P.A. membership, who would in turn be asked to ratify the recommendation at the annual convention.

one committee was against the plan.

It is now very important that the membership sends in a good history of any "Old Timer" they believe should be inducted. All histories should be sent to Bernard Herfurth, 17 Fort Street, Northampton, Massachusetts (01060), who in turn will make duplicate copies for his committee to judge from.

An offer is going to be made soon to erect a Hall of Fame "shrine" to

exhibit the game of horseshoes.




