



Qualifying begins Friday, August 29th at 12 noon until 9:00 P.M. and continues on Saturday morning, August 30th until 12 noon. 100 shoes to qualify — \$5.00 entry fee. Deadline for entries is 12 noon on Saturday, August 30, 1975. The qualifying for ladies will be the same as for men — 100 shoes — \$5.00 entry fee and N.H.P.A. card.

Round robin begins with the lower classes on Saturday afternoon, after all entries are in. All pitchers will be put in classes according to their qualifying score and starting time will be posted.

All pitchers are urged to attend the convention for the election of new officers and also the Hall of Fame for the state of Ohio.

Entries for boys and girls will close at 11:00 A.M. on Saturday, August 30, 1975; N.H.P.A. card not required.

You must be 17 years old on or after January 1, 1975 to qualify. Pitching starts on Saturday afternoon.

There will be award trophies, cash prizes and N.H.P.A. felt patches in the men's and ladies division; trophies and patches only in the junior division.

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
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Change For Progress

I sent letters to the top 50 pitchers about eight months ago. I asked them to vote on the three proposals listed below. I received 25 replies after four months. I sent the pitchers who didn't answer, a second letter, plus letters to 15 more pitchers. I received answers from 34 of the 65 letters. The results of the voting is as follows:

> THE 48 MAN CHAMPIONSHIP CLASS Yes - 27 No - 6Undecided — 1

The purpose of the 48 man Championship Class is to attract as many of the top pitchers as possible to the World's Championship, and to have as many of the top pitchers as possible in the Championship Class. During the past few years the following top pitchers have failed to make the top 36 at least once: Clyde Martz, Maddox, Kabel, Focht, Knisley, Martin, Roy Smith, Stevenson, Toole, Engle, Schneider, Simmons, Donnie Roberts, Carson, Maylahn, Henn and Riffle.

The top 24 players would play a stronger schedule if the 48 man format

was used.

The 48 men are divided into two groups of 24 men each. Each group would play a round robin of 23 games. The top 12 of Group A would then play the top 12 of Group B for a total of 35 games. The end result is exactly the same as the present format.

> FORMAT FOR TELEVISION No - 17Undecided -

Starting with a 48 man group playing the 23 game round robin as explained above. The top 7 of Group A play the top 7 of Group B for a total of 30 games. The top 5 men would then play on the last nite. Fifth place versus 4th place, the winner playing the 3rd place winner. The winner of that game would play the 2nd place winner, and finally the winner would play the No. 1 man the best 2 out of 3 games for the championship.

SHORTER GAMES

Yes - 18 No - 13 Undecided - 3

Most players agree that our games are too long. This is particularly true when the top pitchers meet. The game can be shortened by 25-30% by increasing the value of the ringer to 5 points. This automatically decreases the value of the single point.

The above proposals, plus the following two proposals will be made at the World's Championship. Read them over carefully so that you have your decision

for voting.

I would like to propose that at each tournament, every pitcher be taxed ten cents. The money to be sent in with the results of the tournament to the News Digest. The money to be used to keep the Digest in the black and to increase the Editor's salary.

I'd like to propose that each pitching group at the World's Championship have its own meeting to discuss changes that they would like, that affect their part of the tournament. The results of the meeting could then be submitted to the executive council for action.

Stockton To Host Calif. State Championships August 29, 30, 31

Louis Park Complex in Stockton will hold the attention of all California horseshoe enthusiasts as the Northern California Horseshoe Ptchers Association hosts this years State Tournament. Qualifying starts Friday, August 29th and the tournament is expected to be the best attended ever held in California.

New innovations this year are:

1. An expanded entry list in that all entrants will pitch, depending only on

availability of courts.

2. The 16-man men's championship division will begin their competition Saturday evening under the lights along with the large women's group and senior men.

3. An expanded prize list up to \$1,080 in cash prizes, due to an increase in prize money for the ladies, and at least 20 trophies for all winners and some

second place finishers.

4. Scorekeepers will be paid by a \$1.00 charge to the qualifying fees. The Stockton-Lodi Central Valley Council of Campfire Girls will handle the score-

keeping chores.

The tournament is sponsored jointly by the NCHPA, the Stockton Parks and Recreation Dept., and the Stockton Horseshoe Club. The local club is going all out to make this the best tournament ever and is providing parking facilities for campers adjacent to the courts, have set up committees to work out all facets of the tournament schedule, and the Stockton Rod and Gun Club Rodettes will serve lunch on Saturday, August 30th, and breakfast and lunch on Sunday, August 31.

Ron Simmons of the Southern California Association will defend his State Championship which he won in impressive fashion last year in South Gate. Flora Jones, Northern California holder of the Ladies Championship and a bevy of enthusiastic Northern California ladies will try to manitain control of the top spots in the Women's Division. Jeffrey and Barbara Williams will defend their California State titles won at South Gate last year also.

Qualifying starts Friday, August 29th; time, 9:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M.; also Saturday, August 30th to 12:00 P.M. Qualifiers must declare before starting, and must have a scorer at each stake. All local pitchers are urged to qualify Friday if at all possible, to allow pitchers from a distance to use the courts on Saturday morning.

The Championship A Class will be a 16-man round-robin; Class B, a 12-man round-robin; Seniors and Class C, two groups of six. Classes D and on, 6-man groups. Junior boys and girls, and ladies per attendance. Class C and seniors, top 2 from each group will play for 1st and 2nd, next 2 for 3rd and 4th.

Starting time will be Saturday, 1:30 P.M. — Classes B, C, D and on; Saturday, 5:30 P.M., Championship A group, women, and seniors; Sunday, 9:00 A.M., Junior Boys, Junior Girls and play-offs from Saturday, plus overflow from Class D and on; Sunday 12:00 noon — completion of Class A Championship group (last 8 games) and Class B Group (last 6 games).



Dear Mr. Shipley:

I am writing you on behalf of the raise in the N.H.P.A. dues from \$1.50 to \$5.00. We are one of the Horseshoe Clubs in the State of Minnesota and surrounding area that are 100% membership in the N.H.P.A. Our club was organized sixteen years ago and we have been 100% for eleven years. Our membership at our spring meeting of April 7, 1975 went on record opposing the raise of 233% because of medicare caliber and don't enter tournaments and are not interested in horseshoe on a National level.

When we joined the N.H.P.A. 100%, we did not think too much of the fair dues of \$1.50, so we joined. This \$1.50 came out of each man's dues for the year. With the raise in the National dues, to pay for this raise, our dues would have to double and that is where our membership objected. If you would have raised it 50ϕ or even \$1.00, I don't think anybody would have objected.

We will still have some members belonging to the N.H.P.A. (about 15). These are members who pitch tournaments and have a fair average. Seventysix of our members will not belong.

Our season in Duluth, Minnesota is short. We play 13 weeks.

First, I want to compliment you on the fine job you do in publishing the Digest. Certainly all the members do appreciate your good efforts.

In going over some figures on the World Tournament I find the following: The 1972 qualifiers had only 16 entrants from the western one-half of the United States.

The 1973 qualifiers had 97 entrants from the eastern one-half of the United States.

The 1974 qualifiers had only 5 entrants from the western one-half of the United States.

Inasmuch as that 67% of the membership is in the Eastern one-half of the United States and the majority of this 67% is in a radius of 700 miles of Indianapolis, Indiana, it seems plausible that the World Tournament should be held in the area where the membership is heaviest, and this would give the Tournament a greater amount of entries, as witnessed by the entries at Greenville, Ohio. Perhaps this would help the financial situation, as well as giving the majority of the membership a greater chance of participating.

In holding these tournaments primarily in the last few years on the east and west coast, it seems this makes a hardship, physically and financially on the majority of our membership. Perhaps, I am wrong, but this is my personal opinion.

I've been pitching and bowling for 40 years and I like the Bowling Tourney Idea of more than one entry (some unlimited), but I don't think more than two would be advisable for Horseshoes, I would strongly advocate two.

My reason for two is that people who travel hundreds or thousands of miles and then pick an off-day to qualify are very sad people. Also the World (and even the state) can always use the extra cash that a double entry will bring.

The cry will quickly arise that there will not be enough time to have double entries, but not all pitchers will want or need to go twice and by having all classes (except Men's Championship) pitch 100 shoes, I think you can keep the time element within reason.

I hope this will be discussed at the Indiana Convention.

Although I'm living in Johnstown on retirement, I'm a charter member of the "Bristol Township Club" and am working for and anxiously awaiting the "World" in 1976.

Whether a horseshoe pitcher who participates in tourneys on a regular basis, or one who probably pitches a large percent of the time at picnics, or just in the back yard, no doubt both types will admit he enjoys pitching horseshoes. But, speaking now of only the first type pitcher, the tourney pitcher, does he really enjoy pitching horseshoes that much, when he wants to get it over with, or at least the tourney directors do with the fifty shoe games.

With the cost of trophies, etcetera, going up, and possibly entry fees, pitchers should want to get as many shoes pitched for their fee as possible. I must admit that tourney directors perhaps prefer the fifty shoe games, making it much simpler for them and less paper work, etcetera. Admittedly also is the argument that it enables pitchers to "get it over with," and get started home.

argument that it enables pitchers to "get it over with," and get started home. Couldn't starting times be advanced a little? In Maine this year, for the first tourney spring round-up, it will be fifty points or seventy shoes. Of course, some will argue, no one will have to come from out of state so there will not be the distance to travel, and no need to "get it over with." But Maine has some long distances, and some Maine pitchers will still have a long road to travel, and no chance to get it over with.

Pro or big league participants in sports: baseball, football, basketball, hockey, golf, tennis and many others I may have overlooked, pride themselves on being in tip-top shape to participate against each other in team and individual sports. I know our very top pitchers country-wide in the Class A Worlds, yes, even the B and C division, must pride themselves also to be able to go through a gruelling tourney of fifty points with the long cancellation method. But I don't think it should be lowered, the quality of our best pitchers should also be the same, just as of the above mentioned sports. True, as has been pointed out, the spectators might get home to a late, cold supper; but, a true dyed in the wool spectator will grab a sandwich, so to speak, and watch the duel to the bitter or sweet end.

This is not a slam against our many fine and dedicated tourney directors, plus the thousands of spirited and greatly devoted horseshoe pitchers, but it is up to the pitchers themselves to make it known to the directors that I'd like to get my money's worth of pitches in, or, "get it over with." As our Governor said in his winning campaigns, "Think about it."

Horseshoe Pitching Not A Spectator's Sport?

Who said so? Let me take you back 25 years. In 1950 the great Fernando Isais was in his string of six consecutive World Championships which began in 1947. In this World Tournament he won his first 32 games. In the thirty-third game Stan DeLeary of Arizona defeated Isais 50 to 43 for his only loss of the tournament.

But, what I really want to tell you about is a play-off game for second place. It was between those great Hall of Fame pitchers, Ted Allen and Casey Jones. Each had won 31 and lost 4 to tie for second place. Casey had just lost 50 to 46 to Fernando. Our Editor, Ellis Cobb, also accounted for one of Casey's de-

feats — a 50 to 43 game.

Ted had lost his fourth game to Fernando in the 32nd game, 50 to 41.

Casey and Ted were to play one game and the winner would finish second. It was about 11:00 p.m. when the game began. There must have been 2500 to 3000 people gathered around this one court. The crowd included all the pitchers. The silence when the pitchers were actually pitching was almost complete. It was as if everyone held his breath. When a shoe missed the peg or bounced off you could hear the crowd sigh or gasp as if there was one giant breath. Ted Allen, you know, had had much experience in entertaining crowds and when he missed a shoe it seemed to shock him. The game was a seesaw affair and very close. Any shoe missed was certain to mean the opponent would get three points because these great pitchers were throwing well over 80%. One thing that happened during the game was unusual. An enthusiastic spectator who probably had visited the "pub" quite often that day shouted loudly "come on Casey" just as Ted was in the middle of his swing. The shoe went awry and Ted just stood there holding the second shoe in his left hand but not making any move to get ready to throw it. Casey questioned Ted about the delay and Ted told Casey he should get to throw that shoe again in view of what happened. Casey agreed and Ted raced down to the other end, retrieved the shoe and then threw a fast double.

When the game was finally over after 140 shoes, Casey had won 50 to 48. Friends, that was the most exciting game I have witnessed in 40 years of

horseshoe pitching.

Horseshoe pitching is exciting when properly staged. The ingredients are: An even match; a game that will affect the tournament outcome; the audi-

ence must know who the players are and the exact score.

Can you imagine a game on television where two great contestants are playing for prize money and the sports commentator has beside him a "color man" like Ted Allen who comments on the game, the players, etc. and you get an instant replay. The audience will see the pitcher reach up and catch a shoe and then throw it again. It could be very exciting!

It is stated in 1974 there were 3996 memberships @ \$1.50 making a total of \$5,994.00. In 1975 there are 1060 memberships @ \$5.00 making a net of

\$5,300.

It was stated that just looking at the above figures prove that raising the 1975 dues definitely accomplished its purpose. Approximately one fourth of the membership in 1975 have produced almost all the fee of the 1974 total. I will grant you are right if you are just looking at the money side of it,

but how about the loss of 2,936 members in 1975? Surely memberships is what the N.H.P.A. really needs. It appears to me money is more important than

ing manner:

1. We have a Constitution and By-Laws that adequately take care of our needs.

2. Our Constitution provides for four elected Officers, namely: President,

Vice President, Secretary Treasurer, and Publicity Director.

3. It also provides for an Executive Board. This is comprised of the elected officers, representatives from each of the major playing areas and a womens representative. At present the board totals fifteen members. We meet as required, normally twice a year during the off season. In general, policy is determined, schedules are established and details pertaining to all subject matter are resolved. We find this to be a very effective way to conduct our state business and it involves more members in sharing responsibilities. This Board has the authority to act on their decisions, this is subject to veto by the general membership at the annual membership meeting. This option has not been used, nor do we expect it will be.

4. An annual general membership meeting is held in conjunction with our state tournament. Minutes of all meetings are read, including actions taken by the executive board. Suggestions from the members are sought at this

meeting, as they are at all times.

5. Records are kept on all players and are strictly used to properly seed tournament participants.

6. At the conclusion of the outdoor season we enjoy an "Annual Awards Banquet" with our wives. All special awards are made at this event.

7. We have a "State Hall of Fame" and in addition we are planning an Annual Award that will pay recognition to worthy members not considered,

at the present time, to be eligible for our "Hall of Fame".

8. Newsletters, to all members, are published twice a year. This provides information on what has happened, what we hope will happen and tournament performances of all members. These are published in April and December and contain membership and Digest subscription renewal forms. Providing this form and encouraging early renewals does work. Seventy-five percent of our memberships are received prior to our first outdoor tournament.

We believe our Association to be a well organized and efficient one. A report from you may enlighten us to areas we have overlooked. Let's hear from you.

An interesting horseshoe personality . . .

Phil Zozzaro of Little Falls, New Jersey

Phil and Rita have been married for thirty two years. Now 53, Phil has lost none of the sparkle and zest for life that I noted when I first met him more than ten years ago. He makes his living operating a trucking business in New Jersey. A good deal of his spare time



in New Jersey. A good deal of his spare time is spent playing or promoting his favorite past-time—horseshoe pitching. Rita, while not a player herself, enjoys meeting people at the various tournaments. She finds it fascinating to talk to the many different kinds of people from the various walks of life who are drawn to horseshoe.

During his school days Phil played baseball, football, and basketball. When he was about twelve he became interested in 'shoe pitching. For a long time he threw the flip, but in 1958 he had the good fortune to meet Bill Kolb and Paul Puglise. Bill and Paul convinced him to change to the 1¼. Since the change Phil has been fairly successful with his pitching and generally averages in the 55 to 60% range. As with many of us, he is still looking for that elusive, extra 10 or 15%.

Always a great competitor and a good sport, Phil's presence adds to any tournament he enters. In my judgment, however, his greatest contribution to horseshoe has been his work as a promoter and organizer. At one time or another he has held all the offices of the Middlesex Club, and he played an important role in bringing the World Tournament to New Jersey in 1971. Incidentially, Phil hopes to see New Jersey host the Tourney again in the future.

In addition, he enjoys helping out at horseshoe clinics in Clifton and Passaic. These clinics are designed especially to promote interest among the younger generation. At the present time Phil is President of the Inter City Horseshoe Club in Clifton. Recently, four recessed clay courts were built in the gym of a local church. Horseshoe pitching is truly getting to be an all year round sport!

Last year, as a result of all this, Phil was elected to the New Jersey Hall of Fame!

Regarding the future of the game, Phil is in favor of a considerably larger championship class. Too often top pitchers have failed to make the top thirty-six. Also, if the top class were larger, many more pitchers would be willing to travel and try to qualify—often a very expensive proposition—especially when the tourney is on either coast. He believes that if a larger group is structured so that the championship remains in doubt to the very end, it would help to generate interest and increase prizes. This could be done by eventually reducing the class to the top eight men and have them battle it out on the last day.

At the local level Phil would like to see larger A classes, also. He feels that it takes most newcomers much too long to gain the opportunity to challenge established pitchers.

Keep up the good work, Phil, and may there be many more ringers in your future!

In Memoriam

North Dakota lost its winningest horseshoe pitcher ever when Art Engebretson died June 10.

The 67-year-old Fargoan won the state title 16 times and captured hundreds of trophies while competing in open tournaments.

All of the championships and trophies were not most important to Engebretson. He cherished the friendships that "his game" brought during a 50vear career.

Engebretson, and his wife Inez traveled to tournaments throughout the Upper Midwest. He competed in the World Tournament here in 1967 as well as the one at Salt Lake City, Utah, in 1956.

Art's favorite tourney was the Red River Valley Open which he originated 28 years ago. Nothing pleased him more than having the tourney named the Art Engebretson Open in 1973.

The sincere sympathy of those who knew him is extended to his bereaved family in their hour of sadness.

It was billed as a classic shoot-out between the best pitchers Oklahoma had to offer and the four top guns of Texas. When the smoke had cleared only Ed McFarland of Texas was left standing and he was declared the victor in the 1975 Arlington AA Open with a 7-1 record. McFarland suffered a near fatal wound in the third round when Bud Hamilton, deputy sheriff from Yukon fired a 71.2% game at him. Bud was nicked early in the contest by Graham when his ammunition ran low but rallied to down six opponnents and force McFarland into a show-down for the title. Bob Graham of Houston adjusted the sights of his trusted 45 Allens after being laid low by the fast gun of Charley Brewer and managed to take third with a 5-2. Hatton, Woodson, Crist and Fitzmorris were all shot up early but managed to finish on their feet and were last seen entering the Last Chance Saloon. Bad Pat Fitzmorris vowed that next year, their group would bring down lighting - fast Andy Mogus of Bartlesville, an evil left - handed gunslinger who is reported to have over 17 notches on his Allens.

In Class A, Merle Miller of New Mexico rode off with the gold dust as he parlayed 6 straight wins for the title. Sid Plott, constable of Shreveport, Louisiana took second with a 4-2. If your Club has the desire to increase its membership and attract new players I recommend that you conduct a novice tournament such as the St. Moritz Club, Quincy, Mass. held recently. The following guidelines, adapted for the use of six courts, were used in the running of this tournament:

1. Notification of the tournament was published in local newspapers. An equal source of publicity would be posting on bulletin boards of super markets,

lodges, churches, etc.

2. This was open to all interested persons except past or present club mem-

bers and state association members.

3. A choice of three consecutive nights was allowed the contestants to qualify. Handouts were given to entrants when they registered. This provided the necessary tournament details and served as a welcome to the club courts. An invitation was extended for the contestant to join with us at the conclusion of the tournament.

4. For qualifying we used the count all system for fifty shoes pitched.

5. The high twelve qualifiers were advanced to the final competition which consisted of two six man classes, namely "A" and "B". At the conclusion of round-robin play, thirty-five point games, the winner of Class A became the 1975 "So. Shore Amateur Champion." The winner of Class B was designated as Class B Champion.

6. Two engraved trophies were awarded in each class. A drawing was held

and two of the contestants were awarded a pair of horseshoes.

7. Awards were donated by the host club with no entry fee charge to contestants.

8. Final results were published in local papers.

The contestants enjoyed this tournament. We enjoyed hosting it and met some interested players that did not know of our existence. We had twenty-seven qualify and as of this date fourteen have joined with us and are actively engaged in our activities. In addition a few have brought in the fellow they used to play with in the backyard.

This can work for you and possibly with better end results. Try it once or twice a year to build your membership. The backyard player is unaware of organized play or of your existence. Do him and your club a favor, let him

know about your club and extend a welcome to him.
