




New Brunswick Assoc. Sets Date For Moosehead Meet

The Maritime Horseshoe Pitcher's Association received two bids to host the 1976 - Sixth Annual Maritime Moosehead Horseshoe Pitching championships.

On October 1, 1975, a written bid was received from the New Brunswick Horseshoe Players Association through its secretary-treasurer, Ron Oliver making a formal application to host the championships in Saint John.

Then, on October 7, 1975 a second letter was received from the Town of Glace Bay requesting that the 1976 event be staged in the Nova Scotia town as Glace Bay will be celebrating its Seventy-fifth anniversary as an incorporated Town in 1976. The letter was signed by Robert McDonald, Secretary of the Seventy-fifth Anniversary Committee.

At the annual meeting of the MHPA held last September in Moncton, and at which time no bids had been submitted, the executive decided to accept the first favorable bid. As of the result of that motion made at that time, the MHPA has no alternative but to award the 1976 Maritime Moosehead Horseshoe Pitching Championships to the New Brunswick Association and to be held in Saint John, New Brunswick on the Labor Day weekend of September 4-5-6, 1976.

Massachusetts — A Year-End Report

Pitching, praise and progress highlighted 1975, a year Massachusetts horseshoe pitchers will long remember.

PITCHING

New records are not common occurrences. Massachusetts had four different World record setters in 1975. Rick Howe became holder or co-holder of eight records as a result of his classic game with John Passmore. Barbara Domey pitched a record-setting 85 per cent game for girls in our state tournament. Bernard Herfurth's 252 qualifying score in Men's intermediates is the new mark of excellence. And, Janice Domey's "hang-in-there-and-fight" 464 shoes in World Girls competition became the new endurance record. Locally, Ed Domey set a new record for New Englanders when he qualified for the Men's Division with a 528 mark, breaking James O'Shea's previous record.

Our state champions, Ed Domey, Barbara Domey, Debby Michaud and Rick Howe also dominated their divisions in the New England Tournament. Not to be outdone, New England class titles fell to Paul Drowne, Dick Shepard, James Wyllie, Jim Taverna, Ronald Howe, and Cam Shepard. It is nice to be at the top of any list. Whenever a list of Massachusetts Doubles Champions is published, Hub Sasse and Ed Harrington will always top it as our first champions.

PRAISE

Two of our members were recognized and honored nationally this past year. Bernard Herfurth was awarded the prestigious Arch Stokes Memorial Trophy. Russell Sweeney was the recipient of an NHPA Recognition and Achievement Award. Both men are to be congratulated for their efforts that resulted in such recognition.

Mel Merritt was inducted into both the Massachusetts and the New England Hall's of Fame as a pitcher. His election was by two independent committees acting without knowledge of the voting of the other. Russell Sweeney was inducted into our state Hall of Fame as an organizer. Both were well deserving of the awards. Cam Shepard received two awards for the most improved woman pitcher in Massachusetts and in New England. William Knowles was the most improved Massachusetts men's pitcher. Cam had some stiff competition for her awards. Four other Massachusetts women improved by more than 100 per cent, Anne Domey, Debby Michaud, Beverly Fontaine and Edith Gadoury. Strong contenders for the men's award were: Tom Cook, Ed Domey, Paul Dumont, Tony Dziuba, Ed Harrington, Bill Progen, Charles Richardson and Fred Simon.

PROGRESS

Our News Digest support was good. 62 per cent of member families subscribe to the Digest. Seven members expressed their positive interest by submitting letters, articles or reports to the Digest — Debby Michaud, Joe Grillo, Bill Progen, Bernard Herfurth, Pete Shepard, Russ Sweeney and Russ Gadoury. We welcomed 33 new members to the NHPA this past year and already have a number of "live prospects" for the coming year.

Promotional and development activities continue. The city of Springfield is constructing 16 new courts with members of the West Side Club acting in an advisory capacity. This may well be the new site of their club, which presently is in need of costly repairs. The Second Annual Amateur Tournament at St. Moritz drew many new members for the club, due mainly to the activity available — the first year of league play. Over half the entrants joined the club and those new members did a lot of recruiting. Ron Prue finally succeeded in getting his group of Haverhill pitchers to travel to the Lowell Club and later to Heritage, and also succeeded in getting them to keep records. They now appear to be enthusiastic future participants in programs other than their own. The newly-formed South Hamilton Club is busy adding to their court layout and will no doubt become more interested in our state association in the near future. Members of the association were on hand to talk and demonstrate horseshoe pitching at the "Do-it-yourself" show at Worcester auditorium. As a featured exhibit we were able to set up a 30-ft portable court, and the sounds of pitching could be heard throughout the building.

In 1975 we began a mixed doubles tournament, which will be continued by popular demand. There is a chance that a state team league will be formed in the near future. 

There was a time, not too long ago actually, when the mental stability of Texas NHPA members who offered a plan of buying land for the good of competitive horseshoes, and for standing a clubhouse on that very same place, was a matter of honest concern. Perhaps pure insanity is an indelicate term, and comes on too strong, but at least it makes clear the expected outcome for such a mad exercise. Down the drain, of course!!

It was just three years ago when NHPA members throughout the State of Texas were approached, and artfully persuaded to offer up hard money for a place of their own. The desperate act of a few, who tired of having the general public out there look on the NHPA as a hayseed game, were determined that a new approach was needed if the image was to be improved. After all, and quite bluntly, organized pitching events are rarely burdened with the problem of crowd control. That's a joke, son!!

But why quitble? Cleverly planned or the luck of a fool, it matters not at all. The

The delightful thing is that a group has finally come together under the banner of the Independent Horseshoe Pitchers Of Texas Association. A legal corporation. Owners of a horseshoe pitching country club near San Antonio. Saying it still another way, there is now a body of NHPA investors that own four acres of beautiful hill country land, and right now are starting to stand, a pice thus story, elubhouse on that four acres

Precisely, the IHPTA, Inc. is made up of some seventy NHPA members who have offered up more than \$20,000 for shares of stock costing \$75 each. Over fifty of these investors are from all parts of Texas, and their outlay exceeds \$15,000. For those who are always looking for ways to please the "little guy" this should be happy news, since Texas has only four pitchers who average over 50%. The rest of the investors, a bakers dozen plus five, are outside of Texas, and their funding of more than \$5000 gives them considerable influence in the corporation.

The names of those NHPA members who would ship a bunch of money to another State because they feel it is good for the game? Ed Domey, Ralph Forsstrom, Russ Gadoury, Bernard Herfurth, and Pete Shepard, all from Massachusetts; and Eston Brown, Bill Cessna, Jerry Schneider and Wally Shipley from California; and Lee Davis and John Rademacher of Florida; and Curt Day, Indiana; Red Henton, Iowa; Lloyd Frederickson, Minnesota; Sol Berman, New Jersey; P. D. Riley, New Mexico; Donnie Roberts, Ohio; and Jerry Kahle, Oklahoma, but now in Belgium. Surprised?

If nothing else, the up to now success of the Twin Peaks Country Club because of

If nothing else, the up to now success of the Twin Peaks Country Club because of the strange inclination of seventy NHPA pitchers to put money into the game should end, once and for all, the notion that all horseshoe pitchers want a cheap game, without frills, and that the destiny of the NHPA is tied to public parks.

The fascinating experiment with a horseshoe pitching country club is not offered as

a magical solution for curing the under populated ailment of the NHPA. Mercy, no!! But it does suggest that maybe, after all, horseshoe pitchers are no different than main-stream America. That given a choice, most would select something fanciful over plain vanilla, and would happily pay for the privilege. Ed Domey knew this when he built the Heritage for Massachusetts and New England

pitchers. And it is suspected that a scattering of others around the country also knew

this. Now the rest of the NHPA knows it also.

Who can tell. It might be something nice to know.


8th Annual Carolina Dogwood Festival-April 9-10-11

South Dakota Independent Athlete Of The Year for 1975

The following article by Jim Young, sports writer, appeared in the Aberdeen, South Dakota American News.

Winning a state title can be a once-ina-lifetime achievement for most people, but not the South Dakota Independent Athlete of the Year for 1975 as selected by the South Dakota Sportswriters Association. He won his 25th state title the past summer.

Leigh Dunker of Warner won the South Dakota horseshoe pitching title in Rapid City. It was the sixth title in a row for the 59-year-old bachelor, who won his first title in 1934.

But what made his effort even more remarkable this year is that he lost only one game all summer enroute to his "silver" win. Pitching doesn't command top priority for his time.

Being a farmer, he spent the week before the state tournament plowing and didn't get a chance to practice. He has yet to compete for the world title because it is held during harvest.

The southpaw is cool under pressure. If it is windy, he is able to switch from his normal $1\frac{1}{2}$ rotation on the toss to a more wind resistant $1\frac{3}{4}$ rotation with ease.

He seems to get just good enough to win each game. The better the competition, the better his ringer percentage becomes.

Dunker averaged 73.3 per cent to win the 1975 South Dakota state title.

"Everyone enjoys playing him," says Ed Schaunaman, a fellow pitcher from Aberdeen. "He's a perfect sportsman in every way. He has an easy-going nature and never has any excuse. Someone can throw eight, ten doubles in a row, but he just hangs in there until the guy cools off."

The 1976 World requires a change in procedures and schedule of events. The important item is extending the Mens Championship group to include 48 men as passed by the 1975 convention delegates, also that we will be required to pitch all scheduled groups to 35 points except championship groups. Qualifying must be concluded within 3 days if we are to have a day time convention. The championship men must be extended to 6 nights because of the type of schedule, 48 men. It will be necessary for the division championships to all be pitched on the same evening, this is not by choice, but is dictated by the courts available and the number of nights to pitch. This schedule will accommodate the following number of pitchers:

4. Horseshoe need not be a seasonal sport. Indiana has several indoor facili-

ties without a doubt some of the best in the country.

5. I have sent the following proposals to John Walker for consideration at 1976 W. T. Convention:

100 shoes for all qualifiers, except Jrs. and Women.

Reduce the number of delegates to convention. We now have 20 Reg. Dir. The hall of fame committee has 15 members, my proposal would automatically include them along with one or two delegates from each state that has a national charter. All major proposed changes in Constitution and By-Laws are presented, and available to N.H.P.A. members in plenty of time for all to let, or make known their wishes to delegates or Dir. Most of the main decisions that most players are concerned with are decided by the executive council at the tourney site, or by majority of the players involved. Why have a convention like 1975?? Let's promote not destroy horseshoe.

Eliminate the possibility of discouraging our junior boys and girls from participating in our sport and perhaps jeopardizing their amateur standing by paying for national card.

Be prepared for an exciting experience in horseshoe pitching when you arrive at the Jersey tournaments this year. "Freedom '76" carries its theme into the realm of scorekeeping as it now exists.

At a recent Association meeting, the New Jersey State players voted to adopt the score-keeping package developed by Leo and Al. Although much refining has transpired since its inception, rudimentally, this system has been used with success at Leo's Mt. Prospect courts in Brooklyn, the Elizabeth indoor pitching site at Dr. Berman's, and at the four year old indoor lay-out of the Clifton Inter-City Club located in Passaic (Phil Zozzaro, President). Incidentally, the Clifton Inter-City Club is undertaking the construction of the system and John Dykstra has us off to an impressive start as he has completed all the carpentry work already.

As Tournament Director for New Jersey activities this year, I look forward to a pleasant, smoothly run operation as a result of the implementation of this scoring system.

If the National A.A.U. tournament arrangements are finalized, a scheduled date will be announced.

Important: Registering one half hour before the starting time of each tournament is mandatory and will be strictly enforced. This will give your tournament directors time to set up the necessary paper work.

To save unnecessary delay and complication, make it a habit to register as soon as you arrive at the pitching site or as soon as the registration desk is in operation.

We, here in Jersey, invite our fellow horseshoe pitchers to come and enjoy the "Freedom '76" spirit that will enhance the pitching atmosphere at our tournaments.

of this amount.

In order to try and get more interest on the east coast I have made up a set of rules and regulations on our type of handicap league for them and they seem interested. I hope by my next report they will have a league

going over there.
