



Wichita, Kansas has submitted a bid for the 1979 World Tournament. They have 16 new courts and 8 more to be installed by January 1979. Their sponsors, backers and supporters are: The Kidney Foundation, Sedgwick County Sheriffs Department, Wichita Police Department, Wichita Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club and Wichita Police Department, Wichita Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club and Wichita Air Capital Horseshoe Association. I have again invited the President of the United States, Jimmy Carter to attend the 1977 World Tournament at Greenville and also the Wide World of Sports.

Just a few words concerning the 1977 schedule. Please keep in mind it's impossible to satisfy 500 or more W. T. pitchers. But, the NHPA Council has to try to the best of its ability to please as many classes and divisions as possible. I feel we have done that this year. We took into account the women's and junior's complaints given to us in 1976. So, the top classes of the juniors, women, seniors and intermediates are set up to provide a chance to watch them at different times. The seniors are played in the evening or at fairgrounds where it's shady.

I realize the Men's Class A is one of our big drawing cards. But, the other classes are just as important to them, especially those pitchers and their families. The Council's job of scheduling the W. T. will become more difficult in the future. For we are on the brink of having to enlarge the Championship groups in the women's and juniors because the caliber of pitching is improving rapidly. We would appreciate your cooperation in allowing us to try the schedule.

Then if it doesn't work we will try and correct the faults in 1978.

COMMENTARY ON THE ANNUAL VALLEY OF THE SUN TOURNAMENT AT MESA, ARIZONA

This year there was an unprecedented number of entries in this popular and important early season outdoor horseshoe tournament held in the Southwest. The winners and various highlights of this event have already been reported, so that the writer's observations will be confined to what he considers to be certain faults in the procedure of admitting players and in the condition of one of the substitute court facilities, the use of which presumably was made necessary because of a limitation presented as to the number of players able to use the main 12-court facility.

The writer feels that the tournament director and his assistants are deserving of considerable commendation in making certain late adjustments to handle the fine turn-out. He raises two questions, however:

- 1) Why were some horseshoe pitchers with low averages, as opposed to those with averages a little higher, not allowed to play in the tournament even though their entry fees were sent well in advance of the tournament date?
- 2) Why was a sub-standard horseshoe court facility located nearly 30 miles from Mesa and lacking in nearby refreshment and restroom accommodations, assigned to some of the lower average players when, during this time, a well-kept and standard horseshoe court facility located relatively near the main one was being used for the tournament, with 4 of these courts remaining idle?

In making these few comments on this fine tournament, the writer emphasizes the non-professional aspect of this event and the extreme caution that should be used to avoid showing preferential treatment for the higher average players. He welcomes any comments or observations which hopefully would not be confined to this particular event, but in the broader sense would contribute in some measure to the worthy cause of the grand old game of horseshoe pitching.

RADEMACHER THREE-TIME WINNER OF CAROLINA DOGWOOD FESTIVAL OPEN TITLE: RUTH HANGEN BEST IN LADIES: SHEILA ROBERTS, GIRLS: ROSS PERRY, BOYS

John Rademacher of Plant City, Florida won his third Carolina Dogwood Festival Men's Class A Tournament title and a five-foot trophy plus \$100.00 at the Lakewood Park courts in Statesville, North Carolina on April 1-2-3. Rademacher, who won the Dogwood Festival Men's Class A title in 1971 and 1973, beat out Larry Griffin of Newport, Indiana, who came in second. Griffin won \$50.00 and a trophy. Other Class top award winners were 3rd O.D. Lebow from Knoxville, Tennessee won \$35.00 and trophy: 4th Harold Darnold from Burlington, Iowa won \$25.00 and trophy; 5th Tony Norwood of Knoxville, Tennessee won \$10.00 and a trophy; and 6th Jack Fahey of Bradenton, Florida, won \$5.00. Ruth Hangen of Getzville, New York, the 1976 World's Women's Champion, won the Dogwood Festival Women's Class A title with a record of 5-0 and 76.4% ringer average. She won \$25.00 and a trophy. Helen Roberts of Lucasville, Ohio was second with a 3-2 record, won \$15.00 plus a trohy, 3rd Katherine Harrison, Hamilton, Ohio, won \$10.00 plus a trophy; 4th Janet Reno, Lucasville, Ohio won a trophy; and 5th Betty Marsh, Pinnacle, North Carolina won a trophy. The turn out of both participants and spectators was the largest in the nine year history of the Dogwood Event sponsored by the Statesville Recreation Department in cooperation with the Dogwood Board of Directors Committee of which Jack Springer (City Recreation Director) serves as chairman of the Festival's Recreation Committee. Others assisting Springer with the Tournament operation were J.T. Goforth, Villa Sloan and Debbie Sherrill, the latter two are Recreation Dept. secretaries and Gurney York (N.C. State Champion). Thirteen states were represented in the tournament: Tennessee, Ohio, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, Illinois, New York, Florida, Kentucky, South Carolina, Michigan, Iowa and Indiana. Iowa with thirty-seven (37) participants won the travel trophy and Harold Darnold won the individual travel trophy (900 miles).

Dear Editor:

We would like to make known some thoughts that have arisen from some opinions expressed in previous publications. Hopefully you will grant us an opportunity to submit those thoughts for the consideration of other readers.

Are We Losing Our Identity?

Suggestions for changes in the game of horseshoe pitching have been related to other games presumably on the premise that closer similarity would add greater appeal.

Having been associated with the game for over 45 years, we must question the wisdom of this approach, citing other sports that stress their individuality rather than similiarities. Horseshoe pitching is unique and is much older than some of these sports with more favor and prestige. Let us all consider carefully before making any radical changes that compromise our identity and traditions.

Handicap systems in any game have been proven to be quite unreliable at best and vulnerable to misrepresentation at their worst. There is no way we would want to watch a match between an 80% pitcher and a 20% pitcher with the gift of a corresponding score potential to "equalize" the contest. Nor would we attend a performance pitting a mediocre talent against a virtuoso, no matter what method of "equalizing" might be dreamed up. We do not see mediocrity, or less, competing for the big titles in any sport. Why should we detract from those who develop their skills with hard work and dedication by elevating those with less dedication to the same plateau of competition? In our opinion the handicap system is a shoddy attempt to claim a victory (?) over a better player which has deceived no one except an inflated ego. Thank goodness for the rating system in major tournaments but let us not be taken in by those who advocate handicaps as being good for the same.

We do not believe that scoring should be changed to resemble that of other games such as bowling. The present system is truly excellent and simple whether employed in a cancellation or count all match. With the exception of championships we agree that a limited shoes pitched game may speed up tournaments in a good cause. Ties in a count all game need not be played off either, if 2 points were awarded a win and 1 point for a tie. It would lessen the chances of ties at the end of a round robin. The lower percentage player could be proud of his tie with the higher percentage player who has not lost and still adds a point to his total. Sort of kissing a cousin, not just a sister.

We believe that lightweight shoes of regulation measurements should be encouraged to involve those who do not have the strength to "toss" the $2\frac{1}{2}$ lb. shoe. Other sports have increased participation by this method with no real loss of skill. We think it is time to have shoes of weights appropriate to developing or declining strengths if we want to interest youngsters and to keep our oldsters pitching.

We heartily endorse more recognition awards and hope that the N.H.P.A. will come up with a more comprehensive set of official patches or insignia.

We do feel that sanctioning fees, etc., if lowered, might well result in greater membership by those with fixed incomes or allowances. Most members wear their insignias proudly.

Let us weigh carefully the wisdom of a national center for our game. The interest and excitement of an area appearance by the top world players is not to be taken lightly not to mention the opportunity to compete in different parts of our country.

STEINFELDT MAKES HISTORY AT HERITAGE NATIONAL

Carl Steinfeldt put on a fantastic exhibition of horseshoe pitching, demonstrating why he is World Champion and Hall of Famer, in the Heritage National Open at Heritage Recreation Center in Sutton, Mass. Carl has never pitched better. He averaged 88.0% ringers for eleven games, his highest tournament in 42 years of pitching. He chalked up his first "clean" tournament - no open boxes. He pitched five games over 90%. His chief tormentors at Heritage in past years, Rioux, Tyson, and Domey, scored a combined total of only 27 points, and Tyson had 15 of them. Truly a great performance by a great champion.

Saturday evening Heritage held a "Salute to Carl Steinfeldt". Russ Gadoury was Master of Ceremonies. After hors d'oeuvres, Wallace Johnson, Chairman of the Sutton Board of Selectmen, welcomed Carl and praised Heritage for its contributions to the community. Then Marge Ouellette summarized Carl's New York pitching career and presented him with a big kiss a one-pound Hershey chocolate kiss - on behalf of the Brooklyn Horseshoe Club. Normand Rioux then had us in hysterics with his story of the pitcher who, in the middle of a tournament, on his wedding, told his irate bride-to-be, "I told you. Only if it rains." Ed Domey commented on Carl's continuous support for Heritage and presented him with a beautifully hand crafted leather horseshoe carrying case.

The best part of the program was "Ask the Champ", when people in the audience asked Carl a number of questions. Gadoury closed the program with the story about two horseshoe pitchers in a tournament already three hours old. A funeral procession drove past the courts. One player stopped pitching, removed his hat, and stood at attention until the procession moved out of sight. His opponent was deeply moved and commented on his thoughtfulness. The first player responded, "She was a good wife."

I also talked to a lot of horseshoe pitchers from all over Allegheny County and everyone agreed with me. I have been to Baseball World Series and other different world sports and have always had to pay plenty for parking and admission; as high as \$10.00 a seat.

Horseshoe pitching is a skill and should be a privilege to watch the world's best horseshoe pitchers perform. I had the honor of meeting quite a few of these men and they were the finest gentlemen and sportsmen you could meet. Perhaps some kind of action can be taken at the convention. Don't depend on the pitchers to pay all the expenses, as they have enough of their


