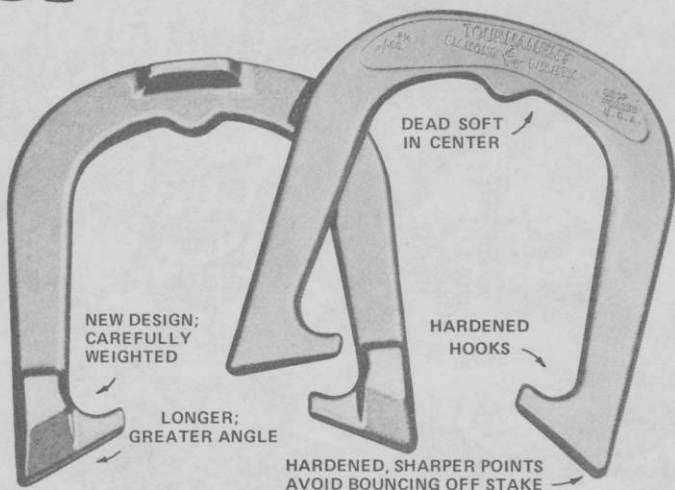

NHPA PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The bulk of this message will concern the Joe Goldstein Public Relations, Inc. But first I have a couple of other items.

Congratulations to all the State Champions in all divisions, California has a new champion, Jesse Gonzales. After running second for many years, Jesse went undefeated winning 15 straight games.

The deadline for any NHPA Constitution and By-Laws changes will be January 15, 1979. Send suggestions to John Walker, 570 Parkway, Chula Vista, Calif. 92010.

I wrote thank you letters on behalf of the NHPA to the Des Moines Club, Iowa State Association, Des Moines City officials, Des Moines Chapter of the American Red Cross, Regional Directors and Hall of Fame committee. Congratulatory message to the Huntsville, Alabama club on its successful bid for the 1980 W.T. and to all World Tournament division champions.

Now the Goldstein subject:

Three years dago the delegates authorized the hiring of Mr. Joe Goldstein to try and promote horseshoes with publicity. The contract was for six months each year starting February 15 through August 15. The cost to be \$1,250.00 per month plus World Tournament expenses. Finally your Executive Council decided as your officers that we had had enough of Mr. Goldstein and the following message was prepared and delivered to the Convention delegates at Des Moines by me before they discussed the subject. I quote:

Before we hear from the floor, let me say a few words as your president, and a closing comment with a unanimous decision from the Executive Council present, regarding our feelings along with our suggestion to you, the delegates representing your charter as to the future of Goldstein, Public Relations.

When we first hired Goldstein I was all for it and might still be if we could have seen some concrete results in 3 years. I will admit we have gotten some exposure and recognition that our sport does exist thru Mr. Goldstein's efforts with the news media and VIP company's and television stations.

But what concerns me is we always get the same statement **wait till next year** for greater happenings. Nothing in writing or concrete, just hear say.

In addition, as I tried to tell you in Greenville, and nothing has changed this year believe me. That is the only correspondence I have received in two years directly from Goldstein is the contract to sign and monthly invoices (results after) or right before.

Paying out \$1,250.00 per month for 6 months each year plus W.T. expenses certainly should entitle we, the membership more than that. How can I inform you without knowledge of what he is doing?

In fact, it was not until a month or so ago that even Sol Berman, our contact for the NHPA and Goldstein, received information on what was possibly taking place. What he got was again pointing a year away.

Also I was told at Des Moines that Goldstein did not call them till one week before tournament time and discussed some things.

PRESIDENT — (Continued)

I realize what has been said today as far as 1979 and some possibilities for the tournament in 1978. But after the council evaluated all the package and the spending of a total of over \$25,000.00 after this contract expires over a three year period. We have unanimously decided on the following suggestion to you the delegates to take into consideration.

"It was a vote of the 6 present without any reservations that the NHPA does not—repeat, does not sign a contract with Joe Goldstein, Public Relations Inc. in 1979."

In closing, let me also state this does not mean we intend to give up on a publicity program. Far from it. We feel we have several qualified NHPA members who can possibly promote our sport with less money and get more results than we experienced in the past 3 years. Our finalized plans and people involved have not been decided, so we can't say more than this for the moment.

Delegates without getting into a big dog fight or a long drawn out decision which I hope is not needed to decide the issue and question at hand need only a few pro and or con statements on the subject.

Should we hire Joe Goldstein, Public Relations again for 6 months in 1979? Unquote.

During the discussion it was stated that Goldstein had NBC (TV) and the Coca Cola Co. interested in the 1979 World Tournament. SO THE DELEGATES AUTHORIZED THE FOLLOWING: IF BY JANUARY 1, 1979 JOE GOLDSTEIN HAS NOT PRESENTED THE NHPA WITH SOMETHING CONCRETE AND IN WRITING THAT IS SATISFACTORY AND ACCEPTABLE TO THE NHPA EXECUTIVE COUNCIL, THEN THE 1979 CONTRACT WOULD NOT BE SIGNED. NEBRASKAN'S OBSERVATION AT WORLD TOURNAMENT

The great 1978 world tournament now being history, some observations about it would seem in order, and lest the reader gain the impression that the writer is a veteran observer of such events, this is not so, these are first time observations.

First the low qualifying scores. More men attained the 36 man championship flight with scores under 500 than those that exceeded that figure. Second, apparently only two men exceeded the 80 % average in the final standings, possibly three as my information is based on newspaper write up of August 7th. If only two then that figure ties the 1963 tournament for a low amount. The 1964 tournament produced thirteen men exceeding 80%.

Since the preceding paragraph may seem somewhat negative, the number of entries, the exceptionally fine weather, the general all around friendly attitude, the opportunity to make new friends and we certainly did do so, created a positive Aura that could not be denied. In no other sport is opportunity to participate offered at one time to all age groups.

The inability of sportswriters in general to understand the incredible ability of the top performers in the game might be improved would they try to learn how it is done. I would predict it would take an awful long time. A person cannot learn to swim until they get in the water.

A thing we noticed that ought to bear mentioning was the fact that players shoes painted white, were more easily followed through the air. Especially was this apparent when under the lights. Of course it would be expected that some would prefer the feel of the bare iron, none the less the white painted shoe showed up better.

While on the subject of color, we would commend Jack Fahey of Kentucky. His attire when on the courts added a bit of zest in contrast to the conventional white clothing.

And about courts. They could have used a greater number of additional practice courts, a fact that hosts of future tourneys would do well to ponder. When there are those attending as spectator-players and according to schedule are required to wait several days to compete and then find there is no place to practice, it is frustrating and discouraging. It would have been an asset to the overall image had temporary courts been set up in parks other than Birdland and the information posted.

One final observation and this one is in regard to playing rules, particularly that rule governing the delivery of the shoe. When a player's momentum in doing so carries him well beyond the foul line and especially if he is a ranked player and such action surely does not set a good example to others, especially young ones on their way up. Consider this; a bowler is forbidden to go over the line, momentum not with standing, in track, a shotputter or discus thrower must

remain in the confines of the prescribed circle and they have tremendous momentum.

Regulations governing this need overhauling; this awkward situation could be eliminated, prevent useless arguments all over the country about whether the shoe had left the pitcher's hand before he stepped on or over the foul line by simply requiring that person to remain ON the pitching platform until the shoe had travelled its course through the air and come to rest or ceased motion whichever one chooses to call it.

WHAT PRICE INTEGRITY!

During qualifying at the World Tournament concluded in Des Moines I was surprised, disgusted and angry at the hanky-panky that was going on by many of the shallow-fibered pitchers and scorekeepers.

I was surprised because I had never thought that cheating took place in the game of horseshoe pitching—disgusted to think that members of my favorite sport would cheat—angry to think that cheating was tolerated in this sport that has been struggling for so long to achieve public recognition. On second thought, IS a sport corrupt to the core deserving of public acceptance?

It is not difficult to understand why this practice has become widespread, for the answer of a roving official was, when informed of irregularities on the courts, "It's been going on for a long time."

Bank robberies have been going on for a long time, too, but continuation doesn't make the practice an honorable one.

Des Moines was my second World Tournament and the first in which I kept score for pitchers when qualifying.

Many pitchers are possessed of the highest degree of integrity and those who called scores to me were in this category. But I could see on either side of me shoes that obviously were not ringers, and points too far out that were counted. I'm not referring to close shoes that needed to be measured, but just to the obvious ones.

Scorekeepers too, during qualifying, are guilty of misconduct. A pitcher called "four" with question in his voice as he looked up at the scorekeeper. One shoe was a half-inch from being a ringer and the other shoe laid a full shoe width from the stake—a shoe was placed against the stake and it did not even touch the shoe being counted. In answer to the "four" question, the scorekeeper, without even having looked at the stake during the pitch or after it, answered, "Sure, 4!" Such incompetence is a disgrace to the game. Of course, the rules said the pitcher was to call his own score, but here he was asking for verification.

Too many times this practice went on; seen while scorekeeping or just as an observer. In discussing the problem with a leading championship class pitcher he spoke with contempt when he said, "It's all the worse if some record should be made!" This same pitcher called my attention to gross irregularities on the part of scorekeepers in the junior boys' qualifying division.

It's hard to believe, but I had help and verification, that one pitcher called five ringers that obviously were not on—how many close ones were not on, I wondered. A skeptic will say, "You can't tell from where you stood whether or not the shoe was on." But, remember, I am referring only to those seen from my position that obviously were not on. In the above case of "five" miscalled, a partner stood near one stake and I near the other.

Sure, this "seasoned" pitcher made the 500, but what of his struggling fellowmen who were trying honestly to make 500—and didn't quite do it.

How sick is the game of horseshoes! Disgustingly sick! And officials admittedly have known of these irregularities, but have lacked the firmness of mind or the courage to clean them up.

We all have read in the newspapers what happens to athletes when caught in an attempt to cheat. In fairness to the vast number of honorable horseshoe pitchers, cheaters should receive the same rigorous treatment that any other sport enacts under similar conditions.

Since officialdom has not taken steps to make horseshoe pitching a sport worthy of respect, it's time to abandon the qualifying system in which these irregularities occur.

A player's placement on the World Tournament roster could be made by using his State record achieved through actual tournament play in the current year—that should be an honest representation of his ability; his opponents won't allow him to cheat in a game!

Those who have followed the dishonorable practices mentioned in this article know well where they stand. No one will point a finger at them, but each will be tormented by the small voice of his own conscience.

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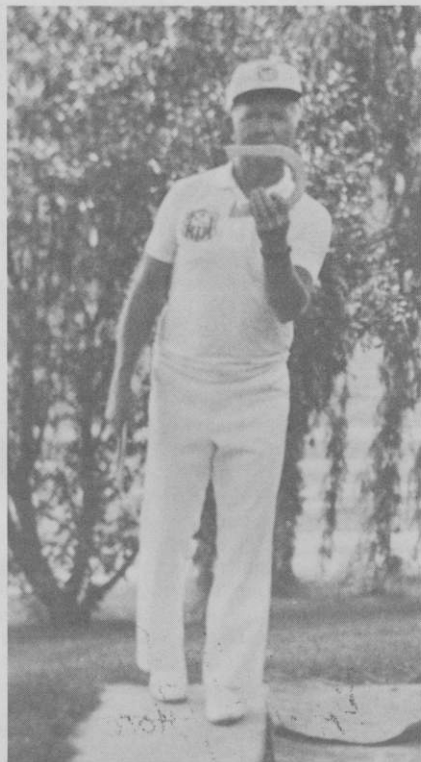
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GLEN HENTON

JOHN MONASMITH of Yakima, Washington... Since 1957 horseshoes has been the biggest part of his life. The many friends that he has made through the United States and Canada he will never forget. Competition and friends have his way to the top.

He won the Washington State Championship in his second year of competition in 1949. He was the first horseshoe pitcher from Washington state to enter a World Tournament in 1950 at Murray, Utah.

He has won the Washington State Championship 15 times. Also, he has held the Pacific Northwest Championship a total of 15 times. Area covered is Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia.

In 1963 he entered the World Tournament where he qualified the highest with 558 points with 180 ringers out of 200 shoes for an average of 90 percent. He then went on to win the title with 32 victories and losing 3 posting an average of 82.3 percent.

In 1964 at Greenville, Ohio he was awarded the Sportsmanship Award. Then in 1974 he became the first player to be inducted into the Washington State Hall of Fame.

Added to his many records and honors he was inducted into the National Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame in 1978 at the World Tournament in Des Moines, Iowa.

GLEN "RED" HENTON of Maquoketa, Iowa... he started playing horseshoe when he was just a kid, but did not compete in sanctioned tournaments until his first Iowa State Tournament in 1960. He was with the Armed Forces in India and Burma for 2½ years during World

War II and while there pitched many exhibitions for the Servicemen in the C.B.I. Theatre.

Played in his first World Tournament in 1962 and received the "Outstanding First Year Player Award." In following years he received the "World Tournament Sportsmanship Award" twice.

He was a member of the delegation of horseshoe pitchers that visited Kroonstad, in the Republic of South Africa in 1974, and pitched horseshoe exhibitions during the Jukskei Tournaments in Kroonstad.

He was presented the "Pride of Iowa Award" by the Iowa Jaycees in 1975.

He has compiled a very enviable record of tournament victories since his first tournament in 1960. His trophy room has approximately 130 trophies, many of them "First Place." He has won many tournaments in the Midwest—the Galesburg National more times than any other player; the Farm Fest '76" in Minnesota, and the Eau Claire, Wisconsin Open several times. He has been the winner several times in the Burlington Cornbelt Open, and has won the Monmouth, Illinois tourney several times. To sum it up, he has competed in approximately 130 N.H.P.A. tournaments, excluding the World Tournaments. He finished First in 102 of these, and Second in 23.

He has won the Iowa State Title 13 times, and holds 13 state pitching records in the Iowa Association; has finished in the "TOP 10" of the World Competition many times and holds several World Records.

In the 1977 World Tournament at Greenville, Ohio, he was tied for First Place and lost in the play-off, finishing Second.

Received, with his wife, a fine award from the N.H.P.A. in 1976 which reads, "For your unselfish efforts in entertaining your friends of the N.H.P.A."

OTTIE W. RENO, Lucasville, Ohio...is the author of three full length books on the sport of horseshoe pitching. These books have world wide circulation and provide resource material for local clubs, individual pitchers and news media. Donating his experience as a lawyer and judge Ottie served nineteen years as legal advisor for the NHPA for which he received a special NHPA award in 1977. He was one of two organizers for two state chapters, Alabama in 1964 and Kentucky in 1965, as well as organizer of the strong Pike County, Ohio club and several other local clubs. He has made many live appearances on television and radio programs

and as speaker at horseshoe functions. He has pitched exhibitions at fairs, festivals, schools, penitentiaries and amusement parks and was one of five Americans who introduced the sport of horseshoe pitching in the Republic of South Africa in 1972. He has been an NHPA member

continuously since 1956 and has entered and qualified at nineteen World Tournaments. In every year since 1956 he has held office in the NHPA, the Alabama Association, or the Ohio Buckeye Association. Seventeen times he has served as a delegate to the National Convention. He won the Stokes Award in 1964, built courts in several communities, coached several junior champions, and wrote many articles about the game and its participants.

FRANK LUNDIN OF NEW LONDON, IOWA. . . he was born in Sweden in 1900, came to the United States in 1909. He now resides in New London.

He started pitching horseshoes when he was 15 years old, but did not pitch the open shoe until several years later when he developed the 1-3/4 turn.

In 1922, after winning several county tournaments, Frank went to the State Fair at Des Moines and entered the State Tournament. After winning over a field of 81 entries, he then played Frank Jackson, the 1921 State Champion from Kellerton, Iowa, who was excluded from playing in the 1922 State Tournament. They played best two out of three for the 1922 State Championship. Lundin defeated Jackson two straight games in a stunning upset to win the 1922 State Title. Jackson at this time was also a National Champion.

A few days later at Des Moines also, Lundin won the World Title over a field of 75 entries again defeating Frank Jackson, National Champion and C.C. Davis of Columbus, Ohio, World Champion, and losing only one game.

In 1923, he lost the World Title to Harold Falor, of Ohio, at St. Petersburg, Florida, but placed 2nd losing only the one game. Later the same year, Lundin returned to Des Moines and won the 1923 State Tournament over a field of 93 entries. However, he injured his pitching arm after this tournament and was unable to play in any major tournaments afterward.

In 1976 he was inducted into the Iowa Hawkeye Horseshoe Association's Hall of Fame at the Iowa State Fair Horseshoe Courts.

He was honored to be inducted into the National Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame in Des Moines where he won the 1922 World Championship.

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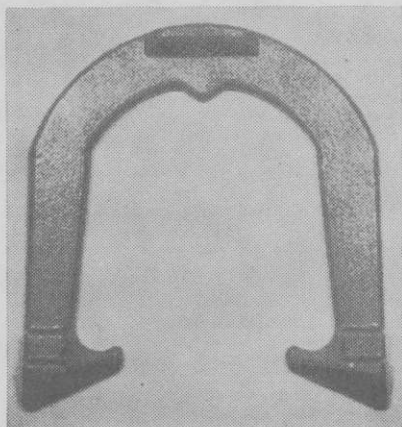
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WALTER RAY WILLIAMS WINS ALLARD OPEN, STAGES FARGO-MOORHEAD EXHIBITIONS

Walter Ray "Deadeye" Williams, 18-year-old World Horseshoe champion from Chino, Calif., was a hit in his first appearance since winning the title as he won the Moorhead, Minn., Allard Open Tournament Aug. 13 and pitched a series of exhibitions in the Fargo, N.D., and Moorhead, Minn., area from Aug. 8-13.

Arrangements for Williams' appearance in the Fargo-Moorhead area were made through the champion's father, Walter Ray Williams, Sr., and Will Gullickson, promoter-pitcher and newspaper reporter at Fargo. The appearances gave Deadeye an opportunity to advertise his new pitching horseshoe and to make many new friends in the horseshoe fraternity.

The Fargo and Moorhead horseshoe leagues sponsored exhibitions by Deadeye at the courts during regular league nights. Deadeye pitched games each night against Fargo's Jerry Black, a four-time top division pitcher in the World Tournament.

Williams averaged 81.7 percent ringers while winning the Allard Open. No pitcher has ever dominated an Allard tourney or any tourney in the Fargo-Moorhead like Williams dominated. He reached a high of 88 percent ringers against Gene Lykken and beat defending champion Leigh Dunker of Warner, S.D., 39-7. Toughest game came against Black with Deadeye winning by 33-19.

Deadeye stayed with the Woody Black family in Fargo during his stay and was provided with a new Buick Regal by Russ Buick of Fargo during his stay. He performed three hours at the Buick firm one day.

Williams made appearances on all three F-M television stations—WDAY, KTHI and KXJB with WDAY filming a segment of the tournament. KFGO and WDAY radio stations interviewed the champion and a televised report of the World Tournament was shown on WDAY during his stay. Deadeye appeared at the West Acres Shopping Center on Aug. 11 and 12 in an exhibition set up by center manager Fred Anderson. Deadeye hit 19 ringers in 20 shoes in one 20-shoe game against Black and also performed his series of trick shots.

On Aug. 12 Williams performed in front of the grandstand at the Buffalo River Speedway near Glyndon, Minn., and he again excelled in his trick routine. He pitched over the sprint car driven by Harry Thurlow of Fargo and tossed ringers while Fargo horseshoe pitcher Ruth Anderson straddled the stake, held her foot on top of the stake, and sat on a chair in front of the stake.

Williams hit a perfect four of four during an interview-exhibition on the Party Line TV show at WDAY and was interviewed by Helen Danielson. The 12-minute program gave Deadeye time to explain the sport and his achievements.

Buttons with the slogan, "Win with Deadeye" were sold for \$1 with the buyer receiving an autographed picture postcard of the new champion. A limited supply of the buttons still remain and may be purchased by writing Will Gullickson, 1608-17th St., S., Moorhead, Minn., 56560. Gullickson, who served as a personal manager of 18-year-old Danny Kuchcinski after he won the World title in 1967, pitched against the new champ in the Allard Open.

The same portable courts used for many Kuchcinski exhibitions 10 years ago were used for Deadeye's performances.

Women made their debut in the Allard Open with 15 tossers on hand for the competition. Phyllis Negaard of St. Joseph, Minn., two-time state champion, won the Class A title with an average of 58 percent ringers. The tourney was organized by Ruth Anderson four days before the tourney date when the number of men entries fell short of the expected 96. For the first time, a delegation of Canadian pitchers took part in the Allard Open in both the men's and women's division. They were from the Manitoba Horseshoe Pitchers Association.

The Allard Open offers \$200 prize money for the tourney from the Allard Trophy Co. of Valley City, N.D. First place in the men's division pays \$50. The tourney was conducted by the Moorhead Horseshoe League. President is Ray Johnson and secretary Harold Diiro. Harry Fillafer, past president of the Minnesota Horseshoe Assn., and former Moorhead league president, was instrumental in the tourney operation.

NEW HAMPSHIRE INDUCTS FIRST HALL OF FAMERS

Jim Guyett, 11 time winner of the New Hampshire horseshoe pitching championship, and Malcolm "Smiley" Georgina, respected organizer and player, were the first inductees of the new state Hall of Horseshoe Fame in ceremonies at Keene.

Dick Doble, president of the N.H. association, gave engraved plaques to the men immediately preceding play in the annual state tournament. "There are many players in our 40 year history who are deserving of this honor, but these fellows are so outstanding we just had to recognize them first," he said.

Guyett, 58 years old and a lifelong resident of Portsmouth, won his first title at the age of 15. Between his second win in 1937 and the last state crown in 1955 his pitching average never slipped below 60% ringers, most years closer to 70%.

The late Charlie Gerrish of Kittery, Maine, New England champion in 1934, sparked Guyett's first interest in horseshoe. He came along at the time when there were several high average players to learn from like Jim O'Shea, Edgar Landry, Joe Comeau, Stanley DeLeary, Sterling Cook, and Howard White, all New England greats in the sport.

"I haven't touched a shoe in the last 15 years," Guyett said, "but I may be back next year," he added with a competitive twinkle in his eye.

"Smiley" Georgina has served the Keene Horseshoe Club in every capacity since 1960, from the job of court tender turning over the clay pits, to statistician, tournament director, and president. He served as publicity director for the 1965 and 1968 world tournaments.

Presently he is vice president of the state association, and secretary-treasurer of the N.E. organization.

Actually, "Smiley" was pulled into the sport by his father, Lester, when he was 15 years old, running tournaments and shop leagues in Brattleboro, Vt.

Lester, a former 3rd vice president of the N.H.P.A., was very pleased that his son received the tribute. "It's not very often that two people in one family get into a Hall of Fame," he said recalling that in 1971 he earned the honor from the N.E. pitchers.
