



OSE VEESEY INDUCTED INTO ALABAMA HALL OF FAME

The Alabama Association Hall of Fame committee consisting of Ottie Reno, Carl Rector and James Johnson having been appointed by the state president, after due and timely consideration, selected Ose Veesey to be the third person to be inducted into the Alabama Hall of Fame.

The Alabama Chapter of the NHPA is very young, this being the fifteenth year of its existence. The Alabama Hall of Fame was formed in 1977. Not many people have had time and opportunity to earn this great honor. Ose Veesey will be only the third to be inducted.

Ose has earned this distinction in five short years. Like most of us he has pitched some horseshoes all his life but did not play in his first sanctioned state tournament until the 1973 state meet at Calera. Since that time he has played in many tournaments including the 1978 World Tournament in Iowa. He has served as a state officer and as an officer of the local Huntsville Horseshoe Club. Under his leadership the Huntsville Club has grown, and on the ten playing courts constructed in Braham Springs Park by a cooperative and understanding city government it has conducted an active tournament schedule that has attracted pitchers from several states. Huntsville has hosted the last three Alabama State Championships.

Ose has gone to the 1977 National Horseshoe Pitchers Association convention at Greenville, Ohio, and to the 1978 National Convention at Des Moines, Iowa, representing Alabama as a delegate. He has kept in contact with the national officers and brought Donnie Roberts, the national secretary to Huntsville in 1977.

His crowning achievement came when he succeeded in bringing the 1980 World Tournament to Huntsville. It began as a seemingly impossible idea, but hard work and relentless pursuit caused others to join him. He led a delegation of six people in making the successful bid at the 1978 convention in Des Moines.

MORTON WINS PERL PEPPLE TROPHY AT TOPEKA, KANSAS

In the annual 7-county tournament held on the Gage park courts in Topeka, Kansas the season drew to a close, Larry Morton eased through all competition with a clean record of 7 wins and racking up a ringer percentage of 68.5.

Larry, having won the previous trophy (donated by Perl Pepple, the man who has done so much for the game in that area through the years) three times, proceeded to put his name on the new trophy, by virtue of his winning the 1978 event. "Pep" very graciously donated the new trophy in his name.

Which means it would not be allowed to be pitched at any NHPA sanctioned tournament, including the World Tournament.

membership fee. If so, we are willing to listen.

I hope all of you will look at this committee as I am — with great enthusiasm. In my opinion, it's long overdue.

Sincerely hope all of you will appoint a representative and send that name, address and

telephone number to Pete Shepard and myself.

I openingly invite any and all of you to the next World Tournament Convention which will be Monday, July 30, 1979 at 7:30 a.m. in Statesville, N.C. Please advise me if you or a representative will be attending.

Would appreciate hearing your comments pro or con concerning this Horseshoe

Manufacturing Committee or the NHPA.

Have enclosed a copy of the Chairman's guidelines and manufacturers addresses.

1979 PROPOSED CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHANGES

Approved by Executive Council and Committee

ADMINISTRATION

ARTICLE II - SECTION 2 (Change)

Any state may acquire a Charter from the NHPA by obtaining 10 or more members. If a Charter acquires ten or more members up to 25 members it shall be entitled to one delegate at the National Convention. Thereafter a Charter shall be entitled to one additional delegate for each additional twenty-five members up to 200 members. Then one delegate for each fifty members thereafter with no maximum.

The above is a clarification by changing the word "State" to "Charter"

JUDICIARY

ARTICLE III - SECTION 1 (Addition)

An officer in the NHPA cannot hold office for more than 4 terms (8 years).

ARTICLE III - SECTION 10 (Change)

The Secretary-Treasurer shall receive an expense allowance of 50 cents per member per year to compensate for personal expenses incurred in the performance of his duties. (Effective January 1, 1980).

ARTICLE III - Section 13 (Change)

Change Regional Director's expense allowance from \$50.00 to \$75.00 annually. (Effective January 1, 1980).

ARTICLE III - Section 15 - (New)

NHPA game related items sold at the World Tournament must come from the NHPA game related personnel. Anyone else wishing to sell anything at a World Tournament must have permission from the majority of the NHPA Executive Council.

CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS (Continued)

ARTICLE III - Section 16 (New)

The NHPA President and Secretary-Treasurer shall each be allowed to attend a maximum of two events per year, with expenses, not including the World Tournament, subject to advance approval by the majority of the NHPA Executive Council. The event must be in the best interest and beneficial to the sport and the NHPA.

ARTICLE IV - Section 1(Addition)

On line 10 the word "not" should follow the word "Have".

ARTICLE IV - Section 1 (Addition)

If a player holds a Canada National Card, he shall not be required to buy an NHPA card to participate in NHPA competition.

ARTICLE VI - Section 1 (Addition)

Add the word "men's" on line 2 after Champion. Add the word "Men's" on line 10 before World's Championship.

ARTICLE VI - Section 1 (Change)

Change 32 or more to 24 or to qualify for the World Tournament.

ARTICLE VI — Section 1 (Change) APPROVE () DISAPPROVE () Delete the words "16 or more" for the "B" Championship.

ARTICLE VI - Section 1 (Change)

Qualifying shall consist of 5 consecutive fifty shoe cancellation games pitched against 5 other entries in the World Tournament. The top 24 or more to qualify for the Men's Championship Class. Class placement will be decided by ringer percentage attained in the 5 games. This same procedure will be used for all divisions at the World Tournament.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE II - Section IV (New) (Forfelts)

A pitcher can remove himself or herself from any competition at any time and for any reason, without being penalized, but he or she must forfeit all games, awards, prizes, and money he or she is entitled to.

ARTICLE III - Section 5 (Change)

In any tournament, ties between contestants for first place in the Championship Classes shall be settled by playoff. Other ties will be settled by ringer percentage and/or total points.

OFFICIAL RULES FOR HORSESHOE PITCHING

RULE 2 — Section A (New)

Provide a 30-foot tournament for those 70 years and older at the World Tournament.

RULE 12-B (Change)

Delete "at the request of the opponent".

Also available are examples of several different league formats that have been used to accommodate various numbers of courts and pitchers. I hope that all of this information can be put in brochure form. As the work is in progress, I would appreciate getting all the different

league rules I can lay my hands on. Please send me yours.
