I will be sending copies of these letters and any others we receive to the state's NHPA Regional Director asking them to please communicate with the Governor's office and get behind this program.

In fact, we encourage all members to write to your Governor's office asking them to honor this program.

Thanks to Bernard for the idea and efforts in getting the program off the ground.

During the 1980 Convention, Carl Steinfeldt has my approval to give a five minute clinic on how to improve your horseshoe game. This will happen during the "Report of Good and Welfare Work". Thanks, Carl!

Ed Yankowski, Regional Director of Wisconsin and upper Michigan, has accepted the responsibility in putting together an NHPA pamphlet. Bernard Herfurth roughed out the idea and sent it to me for approval. After seeing it had lots of merit, I received the Council's approval in its contents, purpose and to ask Ed to take over the project. Thank you both Bernard and Ed.

Elsewhere in this issue is the final report recommendation from the "NHPA Standardize Score Calling Method Committee." Please read, for we will be asking the delegates for their approval at the 1980 convention in Huntsville, Alabama.

NINE AMERICANS TOUR SOUTH AFRICA TO PLAY JUKSKEI

During April 1980 nine Americans toured the Republic of South Africa to play the game of jukskei. Often called a "sister game" to horseshoe pitching the sport is one to which horseshoe pitchers take readily.

The tour was devoted exclusively to jukskei. Only at one city, Standerton, and only on one day did the Americans pitch horseshoes even though courts exist at Standerton, Kroonstad, Springs and other cities. Horseshoe pitching continues to grow in interest in South Africa.

The American team was composed of seven men. Peter Shepard of Massachusetts, President of the American Jukskei Association, acted as Team Manager. Donnie Roberts, Team Captain, Ottie Reno, Gary Roberts, and Allen Smith of Ohio, was the four man team which captured the 1979 National Championship at Huntsvile, Alabama, and they went as a unit. Floyd Hix and Cecil Phelps of the Virginia team which finished in second place in the 1979 tournament rounded out the squad. All participated in the international competition.

JUKSKEI — (Continued)

During the international tournament at Kroonstad they opposed twentyfive teams from four nations, Rhodesia-Zimbabwe, Southwest Africa-Namibia, Republic of South Africa and the United States. They won three matches from Karoo, Natal Coast and Northwest Cape Province while losing twenty-two matches. Their best performance might have been the $5\frac{1}{2}-9\frac{1}{2}$ loss to Rhodesia when the upstart Americans took them the full hour and a quarter time limit. Including matches in Kroonstad, Brackpan, Secunda and Standerton the Americans played forth-four matches winning thirteen and losing thirty-one.

Hospitality in South Africa was outstanding. It included lodging in private homes, native cooking, receptions by the Mayors of every city on the tour, a three day visit to Kruger Game Preserve and a tour of Sasol II Plant where the South Africans are converting coal into oil.

As the game of jukskei continues to grow in participation and interest in the United States it is anticipated that teams will travel annually to and from South Africa to compete. The Internatinal Jukskei Association was formed in 1979 with the four nations mentioned above as members.

In September 1980 a team of South Africans will tour the United States with anticipated matches in Ohio, Virginia, Massachusetts, Alabama and Iowa. The South African Springboks will end their visit at the National Tournament in Huntsville, Alabama, on the last weekend in September. The jukskei meet has been separated from the horseshoe tournament so that each may concentrate entirely on its own game. It will also permit players to compete in both.

Ray Tiili is the Assistant R.D. of Northern Minnesota. Duluth has all new portable courts in a hockey arena. They are constructed so that they are close to the ground and alot easier to set in place. Hibbing started twelve new courts last year; they should be done this year. Roseau, Mn., which is close to the Canadian border, has a fairly new league with good active members. They plan on having new blue clay for this season.

Gene Erickson of Southwestern Minnesota said they are having to restructure their leagues as they have to drive many miles to participate. They have divided up the leagues so they don't have so far to travel. They plan on having a new league in Mankato, also a new league was started last year in Rochester.

Almost at every tournament at Preimesbergers I talk to some person I have not met before. I find out there is horseshoe in their area that I did not know about. It is exciting to report about the good things that are happening to our great sport in Minnesota. Thank you.

PROPOSED NHPA STANDARDIZED SCORE CALLING METHOD

By Chairman, Ed Domey

Committee Members: Ted Allen, Curt Day, Dale Dixon, Elmer Hohl, John Rademacher, Carl Steinfeldt, Don Titcomb and Bob West

The committee agreed on the following proposed method of calling out the scores as standardization.

No score 4 shoes Called as no score 1 point called as one point 2 ponts called as two points

1 ringer called as one ringer three points
2 ringers 6 points called as two ringers six points
1 ringer each no score
1 ringer each 1 point called as one ringer each no score
2 ringers 3 points called as one ringer each no point called as three ringers three points
2 ringers each no score called as two ringers each no score

In each instance the player calling the score must call his name and must be the one scoring. In no score situation the player pitching last shall be the one to call the score.

This system is self explanatory, leaves no doubt and once adopted would become a universal language for Horseshoe Pitching.

If a sign language is to be adopted it should be the standard language as used by the deaf. This is universal in scope.

As your president, I approve of this proposal as did the Executive Council.

In selecting this committee, I felt then and still do they have lots of knowledge for our sport. After all, five are past World Champions. Seven of the nine are in the NHPA Hall of Fame. As I stated before — a very select group.

On behalf of the NHPA, thanks to the chairman, Ed Domey, and the entire committee for your input and efforts to try and standardize the NHPA's score calling method. Ed will present this proposal to the delegates in Huntsville. Knowing it's impossible to please everyone, I personally hope you adopt this method. Horseshoes needs a standard way in calling out scores — it's long overdue.

OPAL CORBETT INDUCTED INTO FLORIDA HALL OF FAME

After 23 years of pitching horseshoes, Opal Corbett of Orlando was the first woman inducted into the Florida Hall of Fame on April 19. Opal was Pennsylvania Ladies Champ from 1965 thru 1970, and Florida Champ from 1971 thru 1974. She has the distinction of being the first person ever inducted for the game of horseshoes in the Pa. State All Sports Hall of Fame. Opal was Sec/Treas. and Tournament Director of the Orlando club from 1970 thru 1976. She has competed in eleven World Tournaments. 1980 PROPOSED CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHANGES

In the page lay-out of the May issue, two paragraphs of the proposed Judiciary changes were left out. We submit the two paragraphs below:

JUDICIARY

ARTICLE 3 - SECTION 6 (Addition)

The duties of the Chairman of the Regional Directors are outlined in the NHPA Guidelines for Regional Directors. The Chairman of the Regional Directors shall be appointed by the NHPA President with the approval of the NHPA Executive Council for the term of two years, said appointment to be held on odd numbered years.

ARTICLE 3 - SECTION 15 (NEW SECTION)

A prize committee shall consist of the President and all four Vice Presidents. Their duties shall consist of determining cash prizes and trophies to be awarded at each World Tournament, or any tournament where the NHPA is in charge. The prize list must be unanimously approved by the committee and shall be published in the Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest at least 60 days prior to the World Tournament or any other tournament involved.



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TIPS ON TOURNAMENTS

By Ed Yankowski

1. Get better consumption of tournament records.

When it comes to tournament scorekeeping, just a single 8-party round robin produces 28 game sheets, 1 tournament sheet and probably 1 master summary sheet. If your tournament is fortunate and all your scorers are volunteer, they have given about 14 hours of time, at a minimum. If scorers are getting 50 cents per game, you are getting labor at less then \$1.00 per hour, but that 8-party round robin is still costing \$14.00.

It becomes readily apparent that any tournament with 6 to 26 round robins has considerable time, and possibly expense, invested in essential record keeping.

It is traditional, after tournament tabulations are taken and a Tournament Results sheet is prepared, to throw the records out. Maybe they sit around for a while (possibly years), but the end result is the same — they do get thrown out.

After your next tournament, why not distribute this relevant material to the players instead? This is a chance for players to look at some of their score sheets at leisure, an opportunity they don't often have, as exposure to game results on the court is usually brief and final.

Here is a suggested way to split up an 8-party; Start with the low-man-on-the-totem-pole, number 8 "winner." Consult the tournament sheet and pick number 8's best two games. Do the same for number 7, 6 and so on down through 2 (but not 1). As there are 14 game sheets left, go back to number 8 for another cycle of the best two remaining. Number 1 gets the tournament score sheet.

If it is your big annual open tournament, out of town players will be getting the Tournament Results mailed to them. Will adding sheets increase the mailing cost? Highly improbable. Six stapled letter-size sheets or five such sheets in an envelope weigh less than an ounce and will travel for the first class minimum of 15 cents.
