





### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE — (Continued)

The new revised NHPA Constitutions and By-Laws book should be available 1-1-82 with all 1981 changes and ones we missed in 1980. Thanks John Walker for a job well done.

April 1980, I set up a Committee of three. Chairman Jim Weeks, Ca. Norm Gaseau, Fla. and Russ Gadoury of Mass. Asking them to come up with what the "NHPA Can Do To Better Support Horseshoes". The committee submitted several suggestions.

The NHPA Executive Council selected the following. Effective January 1, 1982, the NHPA will give each charter .25 cents for each NHPA membership for them to use as they see fit. Keep in mind we will not reimburse the charter until we receive the final membership report for the entire year of 1982.

I just received notice the News Digest labor and paper increased effective 1-1-82 \$300.00 per month. As you know postage also just increased, unfortunately, the Council had to approve. EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1982 the News Digest will be \$8.00 for Third Class and \$9.00 for First Class.

### LOS ANGELES COUNTY FAIR INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENT

Walter Ray Williams, Jr. pitched his way to 1st place and \$800.00 during this 4th annual event. Total cash prize was \$3,100.00.

This tournament was held September 25-26-27.

3 portable courts were set up in the PICNIC HILL PAVILLION under the sun roof. This  $40' \times 100'$  covered area was a nice location and the 12' height of the roof did not cause any problems.

The portable courts were placed on the asphalt floor. Walkways and Pitching platforms were put in place. This completely portable unit can be used anywhere Indoors or Out. Installation time was 1-½ hours and the time to disassemble was only 20 minutes. The crew consisted of Art Amador, Jim & John Dow, Doyle Brawley, Arnie Mortenson, Stan Standard, Jonathan, Nathan & W. Ray Williams, Sr.

A Boy's Exhibition was pitched on Friday & Sunday. Jonathan beat his twin brother Nathan both games each day. Jonathan averaged 76.0%, Nathan averaged 59.6%. The boys pitched 50 point cancellation games.

A Women's Exhibition was pitched on Saturday. Dorothy McAllister won all 3 of her games and averaged 56.9%, Mary Van Sant averaged 50.0% for 2nd spot, Jo Vickery averaged 48.4% for 3rd spot and Barbara Dow averaged 46.2% for 4th spot. The ladies pitched 21 point games counting all ringers as 1 point.

The format for the Men's Championship group was 50 point games counting all ringers as 1 point and using alternate pitch. There was great spectator interest as the games were all very close, and the games averaged 64 shoes pitched. There was only 1 game tied at 50 points and Ronnie Simmons won the 4 shoe tie breaker over Don Titcomb.

Don Titcomb conducted a "How to do it" clinic each day and the spectators enjoyed this added activity very much.

Master of Ceremonies was Jerry Kloepfer, President of the S.C.H.P.A.

Statistics were handled by Kay Brawley and Esther Williams.

Bob Bliss, El Centro, CA., was in charge of the beef B-B-Q held after the completion of the tournament. Bob and his crew fed 74 people and this was an excellent meal enjoyed by all.

Scorekeepers were: Bill & Norma Robb, Gene & Mary Van Sant, & Jim Dow. Judges were Art Amador and George Ferrell.

In summary I want to say that it is very gratifying to be part of a Tournament of this quality and my special thanks to all involved for their help.




