



FEBRUARY PUBLICITY — NOVICE SPRING TOURNAMENTS

March and April will see the beginning of Spring for those of us in the "snow belt" and the beginning of the outdoor season.

Our sport has been greatly in need of more organized participants. However, our NHPA sanctioned handicap leagues have been gaining each year. It is the most promising system of getting the "back yard players" and absolute beginners into organized activity.

It has been suggested that "Novice Tournaments" be held early in the spring in an attempt to get more new faces into local clubs, state associations and the NHPA. It should be planned along the lines of a "clinic" using the following suggestions: a minimum of 4 courts can be used and conducting 4-6 or 8-man round robins. Participants should not have previously been in any organized pitching. It is permissible, however, to have women, boys and girls pitching 30 feet, to pitch against me at 40 feet, after watching them throw a few shoes. Also you may put those who are throwing some kind of a "turn" into one class and those who are unable to keep their shoes in the clay area into a second class. Remember, have it understood that it is a "fun tournament" to get them started. Have experienced pitchers around to offer suggestions and tips to the novice pitchers.

Plan to play short games of 15, 20, and 25 points to start with. Teach the new players how to keep score. The player that does not make a score can mark down the score as the game proceeds. It has been tried and works reasonably well.

It is urged to have the novice tournament early so as to get the new players into the NHPA handicap leagues. If you do not have a NHPA league in your area, plan to start one. The NHPA gives back more in awards than it takes in, but the results are worth the cost in new players.

O'FALLON, MISSOURI LEAGUE SEASON REPORT FOR 1980

The O'Fallon Horseshoe League of Missouri consists of 41 members distributed among 6 teams. 6 to 9 members per team. League play was conducted on Tuesday evenings for 15 weeks on 6 lighted clay courts. 10 games per team were played each Tuesday utilizing doubles play. Method of play was 50 shoe count-all, 80% handicap (each player pitched 25 shoes per game).

Most improved player award was determined by the most points per game improvement each player attained after first establishing an average after 15 games pitched.

A league tournament was not conducted, but members were assigned to 8 classes based on their ringer percentage established after pitching 15 games. Players then competed in their assigned class based on their own merit during normal league play.

Area tournament achievements by league members include - Wally Dunlap First Place Class E Wellsville, MO.; Don Moore First Place Class D Wellsville, MO.; Don Moore First Place Class J Missouri State Championship.

He was an extremely willing worker. Of all our pitchers, and as you know we are a strange breed, he was the only one who never complained and constantly strove to give encouragement where needed and praise those for jobs and projects well done. He has an undying loyalty to our club and our state association. The word "Sportsmanship" could have been made up strictly for him. We didn't use the improved player routine because all of us went from dirt to clay courts midway through the summer, but if we had, we would still have chosen Dick because his average went up over 20 points. We chose him because he is our best representative to the game and also because he wins and loses with the same good character that is in all good people."

There were many other deserving candidates, but, on the basis of all that was written, my vote goes to Dick Beard. Thus, it gives me great pleasure to declare DICK BEARD the NHPA Sanctioned League PLAYER OF THE YEAR for 1979.

SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT OF REGIONAL DIRECTOR CHAIRMAN

Archie Roach, our Texas RD writes that he thinks that the average pitcher has neither knowledge of, feeling for, nor the appreciation of the Region as part of the NHPA. Because of this, the States remain separate entities. He believes a Regional tournament would generate Regional consciousness and give the pitcher a title to aspire to. We now have World and State titles, and recently, League titles. A Regional title wouldn't hurt and it might help. (Paul Gibson first suggested to me last year that he thought a Regional tournament for Illinois, Indiana, and Michigan would take shape, but it has never materialized). Archie is saying that we might even go a little further and divide the Regions into four Divisions. We would then have this hierarchy: World Division-Region-State-Club-League. He is interested in holding the first Regional tournament in his area. Texas gained three new clubs this year; Mount Pleasant, Stephenville and Crowley, a Lions Club promotion, which just comleted a new building. They would like to hold a tournament in 1981. In the past few years we have lost Houston, Sequin and Twin-Peaks, San Antonio. At least we are now even. The Texas tournament directors are going to start checking all pitchers for their national cards. As for Oklahoma, Tulsa and Oklahoma City are lost to the OHPA. Now, their officers are quite serious about raising their membership from 100 to 200. They are dividing the State into Districts, appointing District Directors and getting set for a big drive. Don Walrod, Assistant RD is to coordinate. Their new clubs are Wynoka, Ponca City, and Sallisaro, Enid and Ames.

Rich Paul, from Montana, reports that his closest tournament is 90 miles away in Western Montana; the closest one in Eastern Montana is 350 miles away while the closest Wyoming tournament is 684 miles away. The past year has gone fairly well for the WMHPA. He helped start a new club, complete with new horseshoe pits and a tournament under their belts. They are a very enthusiastic group and it is hoped that it spreads within their area. It could mean several new clubs along with horseshoe courts and additional tournaments. We have had three seasons of winter indoor tournaments for the WMHPA, which are

received very well. Rich had to drive 185 miles in order to attend these tournaments. They have a new trophy system in that they now hand out plaques in the shape of Montana, to the first three places in each class. If any of these people win again at any of the succeeding tournaments, they will get an inscribed plate to put on the plaque. Rich made a trip to Havre, a town about 100 miles North of Great Falls, to help set up another horseshoe club. They already have over 20 members. The Parks Department there is going to help them put in 12 courts with fence, lights and just about anything else that they may need. There is also a small college there and they have expressed interest in putting horseshoe pitching into their Physical and Education Program.

Barry Chapelle, our RD from Oregon, reports that Mount St. Helena had caused a stir and forced the cancellation of one tournament in Yakima, Washington, but all in all, they are surviving. Portland and other areas have received some good, local coverage (T.V. and newspapers). Mt. St. Helena erupted and Tom Gadwa, son of a Washington member, Thor Gadwa, was lost. His body has not yet been recovered. John Pratt, a top Oregon pitcher, was killed in an accident in California this past summer. The Port Orchard Washington Club sponsored a raffle to help send Peter Clark, a top junior pitcher, to Huntsville, this past summer. The Herminston Oregon Open, to which the NHPA donated \$500 was a resounding success and had its most entants ever. Rick Rebman and the Hermiston Club are to be commended for thier hard work and thanks to the NHPA for its generous assist. Prize money totalled just short of \$4,000, counting a 100% return of entry fees. Cletus and Barry Chapelle were featured in a sports special on one of their local TV stations in June. PHPA 1st V.P. Bell Hulshof had his picture on the front page of the sports section and had a nice article written about him in May. Barry says that Seattle has a strong league program but he can't get them to go NHPA yet.

Kelly O'Brien reports that members of the Spokane Club sponsored a CPR class and received their certificates from the class instructor, also a club member. The Spokane Association took the iniative in fulfilling their State's suggestion that local clubs participate in some type of life saving class.

In Idaho, Assistant Walt McGarvey reports Boise first received their State Chapter in 1951. 1952 was the first sanctioned State tournament which was held at Boise, and for the next 12 years the State tournament moved back and forth between Boise and Nampa, with E.J. Wiley of Nampa, holding the State Championship all those 12 years. The State of Idaho has a lot of interest but is hampered by a wide separation in terms of miles. Many cities and towns have local clubs. They are hoping for more NHPA affiliation and membership from them. Both Oregon and Washington have strong tournament schedules and good newsletters.

From New Jersey, Assistant Al Ward writes that all is alive and well there when it comes to the Horseshoe game. Publicity in this area had a banner year; three newspapers carried news of our various tournaments throughout the season, consistently, namely: The Herald News, The Record and the South Bergenite, with The Herald News really catching fire with several feature articles, a weekly standing report of our league activities, and culminating with a grand feature article about our State Champion, Bill Kolb. In Northeast New Jersey the Clifton Inter-City HPC is dominate and this year was no exception. The club sponsored one tournament a month from May through August, and then Al Ward, Bill Kolb, Phil Zozzaro and Jim Furman put their talents together in September and held eight pitching clinics functioning on Monday and Tuesday of each week. The program in its entirety attracted close to 100 participants, but more importantly, especially from the clinic action, we'll have some excellent pitchers on the horizon here in the very near future. The club will have winter indoor pitching as usual in the Old First Church in Passaic. The courts at Branch Brook Park, Newark, that battleground of many State Championships, is due for a facelifting and modification in the spring of 1981. 16 courts are to be installed, with a guard fence between the bays. Active in that cause was our President Phil Zozzaro, Claude White and several of the area regulars, including Bill Kolb, Bernie Mullady, Chet Bosiak and others. These last three men and the group they represent make sure we get as much as possible out of the park department throughout the season as well as doing plenty of upkeep work themselves on a regular basis when tournaments are due to be played there. As a result of the publicity, the Parsippany Board of Recreation is including ambitious plans for the game of horseshoes in its sports schedule for next season. This should include another 100 pitchers when it gets off the ground. Attending a September meeting with the board in this regard were Jim Furman and Al Ward, at which time these two State members made the members of the board aware of the skill needed in our grand old game. They were impressed to see how much the was to the sport. The foregoing report shows quite a potential for the growth of horseshoe pitching in New Jersey, particularly the Northeast. Within a few years, this area should become a real hot-bed of activity.

Jim Perkins, Assistant RD from the TwinCities area (Minnesota) reports that Bloomington has 12 new courts with a fast growing league. Fridley has eight brand-new courts in a nice park area with room for eight more courts later. There are nine leagues in the Twin Cities area with the City of Fridley being very helpful to us.

Dale Evenson, Assistant in Western Minnesota, states that they have four portable courts at Donnelly and they are trying to get horseshoes started in their schools. The club members also think of the older people and demonstrated this fact by building a court at a home for senior citizens. Seems like very nice people.

REPORT — (Continued)

Ray Tilli, Assistant from Northern Minnesota, reports that Duluth has all new portable courts in a hockey area. They were constructed so that they are close to the ground, which makes them a lot easier to set in place. Hibbing started 12 new courts last year which should be completed now. Roseau, which is close to the Canadian border, has a fairly new league with good, active members. They are planning on having new blue clay this year.

Gene Rickson, Southwestern Minnesota, said they are restructuring their league since they have to drive so many miles to participate. A new league was started last year in Rochester, and they are planning on having a

new league in Mankato.

Central Minnesota Assistant, Jim Aleckson, is the one who really was the cause of horseshoes being started in this area. It seems that most of the people who pitch in the agressive Tri-City League started at Jim's tournaments. Dick Leyks, who owns the Tri-City courts has some new portable courts that he designed. They had a very successful exhibition at the Crossroads Mall in St. Cloud, with some of the top men and women in the State competing. The boy's class was also very good, with three of the top boys playing. There were many interested spectators. They are hoping to use the portable courts in some of the schools. When Jim was asked by Gene Anderson, RD for Minnesota, to be his Assistant for Central Minnesota last February, he felt that he had one of the most exciting areas in the country on which to report. 10 years ago, organized horseshoes was nearly non-existent here but since then it has grown beyond anything he might have dreamed. Two couples have been largely responsible for the rapid growth within the past four years. One couple is Henry and Delores Preimesberger of Genola. I guess everyone knows that they built the Preimesberger Arena in Genola, the finest indoor horseshoe pitching building in the country. They have held 11 successful major tournaments at the Arena, including three State tournaments. Next summer, the Arena will be the site of the 1981 World Tournament, The other couple is Dick and Rosie Levk of Sauk Rapids, They built Levk's 3&1 Courts behind their service station two miles east of Sauk Rapids. The 12 court complex has been the site of four successful major tournaments. They also helped organize the Tri-County Horseshoe League which just completed it's fourth season. In 1979, the Tri-County League had 175 members, which was the largest NHPA sanctioned league in the country. They also have organized a horseshoe clinic at the Crossroads Shopping Mall in St. Cloud the past two winters, bringing horseshoe pitching to the public. At the 1980 Minnesota Statate tournament for the first four places in Class "A" Women were from the Tri-County League. They were Phyllis Negaard, Sandy Karasch, Rosie Leyk and Lu Cave. There were two others from Central Minnesota in this class, Beverly Nathe and Debbie Gall. Phyllis, Sandy and Beverly are sisters; how about that. Others who have helped in the growth of horseshoes in Central Minnesota are Ronn and Phyllis Negaard of St. Joseph with Phyllis bringing a women's World Championship to the area last year. She has also won five consecutive State championships. Also, Don Slomkowski of St. Cloud has been President of the Tri-County Horseshoe League since it started and has coordinated a couple of tournaments at Leyk's 3&1 Courts. Dennis Carlson of St. Cloud has been very active in the Tri-County League and he did a fine job of coordinating the Minnesota State Tournament this past Labor Day weekend. There are many others, too numerous to mention, who have also helped in horseshoe's growth in Central Minnesota. This past year horseshoe courts have been springing up around the St. Cloud area with St. Joseph building eight courts, Rice six courts, and Waite Park four courts. Another horseshoe club that has been operating for a number of years. They are now using the Preimesberger Arena as their home base. Elk River has had an active club for a number of years under the leadership of Jack Klein. There have been numerous small tournaments that have been held at summer festivals in towns around the area this summer such as Princeton, Cambridge, Foley, and Big Lake. Also, the Benton County Fair in Sauk Rapids has held a tournament for the past 10 years. The news media has given horseshoes a real boost in the area with Bob Wright of the Morris County Record in Little Falls giving excellent coverage of all the tournaments at Preimesberger Arena with pictures and stories. Ralph Wolak and Don Madison of Radio Station WVAL in Sauk Rapids have been at Preimesberger Arena the past two tournaments and have given live coverage and interviews. They have done a fine job. In summation of his report, Jim uses a headline that was in a St. Paul newspaper sports page a couple of years ago, "Horseshoe Pitching is Alive and Kicking." In Central Minnesota, horseshoe pitching is not just alive and kicking but it is "Up and Running." With a World Horseshoe Tournament coming here next summer, it's hard to say how far it will go.



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NATIONAL PROMOTION COMMITTEE COMMENTS

Harold Craig, 1965 NHPA President appointed me as chairman of a committee to study alternate methods of qualifying.

We submitted the following plan.

Each state was to keep a record of ringer percentages of all tournament pitchers. The averages would be reached by using the averages of their best tournaments consisting of at least 20 games total. We figured that this would be the fairest method. This would eliminate tournaments that were held in bad weather or on poor courts.

A pitcher would bring his signed card with him to the world championship. The pitchers would be seated according to their aveages. The top 102 would be divided into 17 groups of 6 each. The top 17 would be seated number one in each group, the next 17, number two in each group. A round robin would be played (5 games). The first and second place finishers plus the defending world champion and the high percentage third place finisher would form the 36 man championship class.

The 36 man group would be divided into two groups of 18. Each group would play a round robin (17 games). On the last two days the top 9 or one group would play the top 9 of the other

group for a total of 26 games.

A plan to eliminate qualifying and to cutdown the number of games played at the 1981 tournament will be a necessity since Mr. Preimesberger will almost guarantee over 1000 entries. If any of you doubt this statement, try to get a reservation and you'll find out that close to that number have already done so.

In Memoriam

On November 5, 1980, Massachusetts Horseshoe Pitchers Association members were saddened by the passing of Ed Courville at the age of 54. Ed was a long time member who, just 10 days earlier during our awards banquet, was presented with a Recognition Award for his years of service as secretary and prime mover of the Worcester County Horseshoe League.

Ed was in retirement because of diabetes and a heart attack a few years earlier, but continued to pitch horseshoes actively. Only the Monday prior to his passing he had posted high game, 70%, in the Heritage American League and held league high average. He was a tournament pitcher of note. He invariably averaged in the mid fifties and he was never an "easy" win.

Among Ed's memories of times past was that he served aboard the battleship Missouri when General Douglass MacArthur accepted the Japanese surrender which ended World War II.

Ed Courville was extremely well liked by all who came in contact with him. Our heartfelt sympathies are extended to his wife Ellie, his four children Bruce, Brian, Barry, and Anne Marie, and other members of his family in this time of bereavement.

The Indiana State Association reports the passing of Ed Sharp of Rossville, Indiana on September 17, 1980 at the age of 72 years.

Because of a heart condition, Ed had to forego horseshoe pitching in his late years.

Ed was state champion of Indiana in 1958 and 1959. He placed third in World Tournament competition and during his career broke many records which are recorded in the Guiness Book of World Records.

He was a member of the Clinton County Horseshoe Club at Frankfort, Indiana. Together with Curt Day of Frankfort put much effort into organizing the local club there and constructing the first courts in Frankfort.

He had a son who pitched horseshoes and died suddenly about two years ago while talking with his father.

The sympathy of the Indiana State Association and that of the NHPA is extended to his loving wife Louise and family in their sad hour.

It is in regret that we report the death of Pat Fitzmorris of Yukon, Oklahoma who passed away March 27, 1980 after a long fight of cancer. Pat was a member of the NHPA for many years. He had pitched in several world Tournaments in the senior division. He was a past president of the Oklahoma Horseshoe Pitchers Association and also the Yukon Horseshoe Club. He was the organizer of the first Yukon Banks & Merchants Horseshoe Tournament back in 1976.

The Yukon Horseshoe Club with the donations from his many friends in the state of Oklahoma have placed a flagpole and plaque in his memory at the court sight at the Yukon city park. The Oklahoma State Association and that of the NHPA extends its sympathy to his loving wife and family in their great loss. He will be sadly missed by his many friends.

The Wisconsin Horseshoe Pitchers Association was saddened by the sudden death of Swen Bowman on November 22, 1980. He was president of the WHPA from 1969 to 1972. He started horseshoe leagues in Green Bay city parks, ran tournaments in Green Bay and Mountain. He started tournaments on his own property in Mountain before building new courts at the Armstrong Community Building where he held one of the larger Open Tournaments having many players from surrounding states enter. He was also involved in building clay courts in Green Bay where league is still held.

Swen was also active in the Bradenton, Florida area where he spent his winters. He will be missed by his many friends.

The sincere sympathy of his pitching friends, the Wisconsin State Association and the NHPA is extended to his wife, Clara and family.

Tony Nacewicz has been on something of a tear since September and pitched his third fine tournament in succession, good for the Class 7 title. Dave Baillargeon pitched one of his finer tournaments to pull in Class 8 honors. Young Chuck McNeill continued his winning ways (he was Junior Tournament of Champions winner) by taking the Class 9 title. And last, but certainly not least, Jim Styles, who is a strong contender for NHPA League Player of the Year, swept Class 10 with one of his best averages.

The chairman of the NHPA Standard Score Calling Committee ought to know better, but Ed Domey has been using a new call for ringer each, one point. He calls it, "Dink, dink, one."

THE NEW ERA — The Heritage Turkey Shoot marked the beginning of a new era (Equalized Ringer Artists) in horseshoe pitching. For the first time in a sanctioned tournament, permitted by a new NHPA rule, we held a mixed open, wherein women pitched with the men at their own distance. The overall level of competition in Class 1 was increased with the addition of Debby Michaud and Vivien Deuster. Debbylost some seat squirmers but hit class high game of 85%, her highest in about 2 years. Vivien said she was weak from being sick earlier in the week but was going to finish the tournament if she had to crawl; her last two games crawled into the 70's! Edith Gadoury had high average in Class 6, but finished fifth. She found it easy to get to 32 points but couldn't seem to close out the games. It is this kind of "seasoning" that the women do not get using handicaps or playing mis-matched groups of their own. Brenda McNeill turned in the best finish, second spot in Class 7. Lisa Deuster and Barbara McNeill couldn't get their pitching acts together this time out, but they'll get their share of wins in the future.

How did people react to this change? A couple of non-pitching women said they didn't like it. A couple of men weren't overly fond of the idea either. One, who did not express an opinion pro or con, was heard to say, "This is the toughest game I ever pitched." He wasn't referring to the ringers he was trying to cover. However, the overall reaction was favorable. We believe that after a few more trials a man-woman mathup will simply be regarded as another game in the quest for top spot. Bernie Herfurth was highly in favor of it. His three wins were over Debby, Vivien, and his "automatic", Ed Domey.
