

DATES FOR THE 1981 WORLD TOURNAMENT ARE JULY 30TH THRU AUGUST 9TH AT THE 18 INDOOR COURTS IN THE PREIMESBERGER ARENA

Now that you have read and digested the fantastic Los Angeles County Fair World Invitational Tournament in the November issue, here is my personal comments and observations.

GAMES WERE TOO LONG!

I had never observed a contest of this nature where we had so many "EXTRA LONG" games. Being the announcer, I found myself searching for new descriptive words for two ringers—each no score or (4 dead) and other comments.

We always had a fantastic crowd watching; but, when the "non-horshoe crowd" was observed coming and going during the games without watching any game to completion, you knew something would have to be changed in our sport.

Now, IF we as an association are not interested what the general public thinks of our sport—then, I guess we should leave our games at 50 points and stand still.

IF we want the world to be interested and watch our games with interest to their completion, then we need to change.

OK, I hear all of you 50 point flag wavers. I am not saying the club or state associations would have to give up the 50 point games. I am suggesting we need to shorten the games in the future Invitationals and World Tournaments.

At least let's prepare ourselves in the evennt television or a sponsor says we need shorter game to fit within their coverage times.

A few years ago, I had a conservation with Fernando Isais concerning shorter games.

Fernando's comment, "Someday, games will need to be shorter. Don't have a 'Shoe Game'. Shorten the points (35 points). This way if I am behind I always have a chance to win by stringing out 50 or so consecutive ringers."

Another widely talked about method in shortening the game is giving one point to each player for two ringers each (4 dead)—up to 40 points each then regular cancellation to 50.

At the 1981 Convention I am going to ask for the delegates consideration in shortening the game.

Please....Please—Dont' tune me out—THINK AND GIVE our sport a chance and give it the credit it deserves.

Let's start advancing horseshoes. After all, many other sports have changed from their original format and their forefathers rules.

Why shoud we be different?

LINDA PATENEAUDE IN BRILLIANT PERFORMANCE, WINS LADIES' TITLE IN VERMONT OPEN; MIKE SYLIVA TOPS IN JUNIORS; JOE SCHULTZ CLOSE WINNER OF MEN'S

In the annual Vermont Open tournament held on Sept. 20-21, Linda Pateneaude of Oxford Maine played masterful horseshoes to win the Ladies title with brilliant 80.9 ringer percentage with 5 wins and one loss. Liz Downer was the runner-up. Mike Sylvia outdistanced his opponents with a perfect record of 5 in a row and 50.4 percent. Joe Schultz of Brentwood, New York, edged out Ed Domey of Sutton, Mass. to win the Men's championship posting a 6-1-77.4. Domey was second with 5-2 and 80.1 percent. Art Tyson of New York was third with 5-2-73.4 percent.

"HORSESHOE PITCHING—THE YEAR AROUND SPORT"

The sport of horseshoe pitching has become a year around sport. Many indoor facilities have recently been built, with areas not enjoying the "sun-belt" year around pitching, the indoor courts now allow horseshoe pitching twelve months of the year. Many indoor facilities house from 1 court up to and including 18 courts.

The 1981 World Horseshoe Pitching Tournament will be held at an 18 court indoor facility in Genola, Minnesota, about 100 miles north of Minneapolis, Minnesota. Approximately 1000 to 2000 entries which will include men, women, boys and girls are expected to compete the last week of July and the first week of August.

The indoor facilities offer handicap leagues which allows players in all categories to pitch together. Many indoor facilities offer monthly championship matches for all classes during the indoor season.

Many horseshoe pitchers prefer indoor pitching, as they do not have to contend with the weather elements of rain, wind, sun or cold.



Harold Craig, 1965 HHPA President appointed me as chairman of a committee to study alternate methods of qualifying.

We submitted the following plan:

Each state was to keep a record of ringer percentages of all tournament pitchers. The averages would be reached by using the averages of their best tournaments consisting of at least 20 games total. We figured that this would be the fairest method. This would eliminate tournaments that were held in bad weather or on poor courts.

A pitcher would bring his signed card with him to the world championship. The pitchers would be seeded according to their averages. The top 102 would be divided into 17 groups of 6 each. The top 17 would be seated number one in each group, the next 17, number two in each group. A round robin would be played. (5 games.) The first and second place finishers plus the defending world champion and the high percentage third place finisher would form the 36 man championship class.

The 36 man group would be divided into two group of 18. Each group would play a round robin (17 games). On the last two days the top 9 or one group would play the top 9 of the other group for a total of 26 games.

A plan to eliminate qualifying and to cut down the number of games played at the 1981 tournament will be a necessity since Mr. Preimesberger will almost guarantee over 1000 entries. If any of you doubt this statement, try to get a reservation and you'll find out that close to that number have already done so.

CENTRAL IOWA 1980 TRAVELING LEAGUE

The Central Iowa NHPA Approved Traveling League for 1980 consisted of eight fourplayer teams, playing a round robin (home and home) schedule. This year, our second, all teams had local business sponsors. Each week the teams played 4 50 Shoe count-all games against their opponent. Player averages were kept and updated on a weekly basis. A 100% handicap was used. At the midseason break all player averages were recomputed for the second half. This method helped make those who started out badly or those who had improved greatly have an average that was more realistic.

The enthusiasm engendered by the team play resulted in a State Team Championship held in conjunction with the other Iowa Horseshoe Championships during the Iowa State Fair in August. Ten teams were invited to this experimental Championship and all judged it a huge success. The teams were divided into two groups of five teams each. Play was 50 Shoe Count-All on a 6-player round robin schedule with each team playing one team from the other class to make the schedule complete. A 90-95% handicap was used with averages being computed &by an excellent clerical staff) at the end of each game. The winner of each class played off to determine the State Champion. All play was completed in one evening.

It appears that the Central Iowa League will expand in 1981 to ten or more teams. This has

become a popular method of play in Central Iowa.

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ASHFORD, DEUSTER, MC NEILL WINNERS IN MASSACHUSETTS TOURNAMENT OF CHAMPIONS

A record 93 pitchers competed for the honor of winning the 8th annual Handicap Tournament of Champions last October at the indoor courts of Heritage Recreation Center in Sutton, Massachusetts. Thanks to the generosity of St. Pierre Manufacturing Company, sponsors of this tournament since 1975, over \$500 in prize money was awarded.

Three new champions were crowned—Lee Ashford of New Hampshire, Vivien Deuster of Long Island, and Chuck McNeill of Massachusetts. All proved their mettle under the fire of some inspired competition. While there is always an element of luck involved in winning, these fine champions won primarily because they pitched great and kept on pitching great, game after game.

Dick and Frances Carnahan journeyed the farthest, driving all the way from western

Pennsylvania to compete, and giving good account of themselves.

The tournament was again played as count ringers only, 50 shoe games, 80% handicap. In a poll of the entrants, regular cancellation scoring received a slight majority, but once they found how close and thrilling the games could be—27 games ended in ties; 57 were decided by a single ringer—several changed their votes to the method used.

CHUCK NC NEILL TOPS IN JUNIORS

Chuck McNeill won the junior championship by pitching well over his entering average of 26%, averaging 32.6%, a new personal high. He won his first game with $34\Box$, tied his second with 34 again, won his next by a point at 26, then rattled off three more wins with 38, 40, and 36% before dropping a meaningless final game. Ray Gokey took second with 4 wins and a tie, edging out Bob Deuster by half a game. (Tie games were not broken by a tie-breaker; each player credited with half a win). Pitching in his final event as a junior, Deuster made a strong bid for the championship. His first four games were 68%, 80%, 72%, and 82%. Unfortunately, the competition was such that when he dropped "way down" to 68, 60 and 60%, there were three L's on his record. However, he can take pride in his 70.0% average.

LEE ASHFORD DOWNS JOE SCHULTZ IN MENS' TITLE SHOWDOWN

To win the Mens' championship, one has to finish first or second in a qualifying group of 8, has to win one of the four finalists groups to become one of the "Final Four," has to win a

one-game semi-final match, and, finally, has to win the championship game.

Lee Ashford did just that. Lee entered the tournament at 46%. In reaching the finals he won his qualifying group with a 55.7% average and 6 wins, the only undefeated finalist. He then won a very tough Finals Group with $2\frac{1}{2}$ wins, $1\frac{1}{2}$ losses, a 52% playoff victory over Ed Domey, and a 52.5% average. In that group all five pitchers (Domey, Wayne, Ashford, Nacewicz, and Benton) exceeded their entering averages.

Meanwhile, eventual runnerup Joe Schultz, in at 76%, qualified by averaging 82.6%, tied his lowest game (72%), lost an 82% game by one ringer, and won five games including a 92% shot. Joe was equally spectacular in his finalist group, winning 3 and tying 1 (at 82%). His low

game was 78% and he averaged 80.5%.

Rounding out the "Final Four" were Russ Sweeney and Charlie Bonani. Russ qualified with a 2nd place finish, Charlie with a tie for 1st. Russ then walked through his finalist group with four victories, averaging 57.0% (in at 51%) and finishing with a 72% flourish. Bonani won 2 and tied 2, averaging 66.0% (in at 63%) and fired a 68% playoff game against Dennis Labednick to make the "Final Four."

Thus, after approximately 12 games, the "Final Four" were known. The semi-final matchups were Ashford-Bonani and Schultz-Sweeney. Ashford added 33 live ringers to his 7 ringer spot and won his game 40-34. He simply was not to be denied. Bonani dropped on 14 ringers in his first 20 shoes and picked up only one point. He then tossed 9 for 10 and managed to pick up 4 more points, closing the gap to 2 after 30 shoes. Ashford came right back, however, missing but 4 times in his final 20 shoes, for a 6 point vitory margin and the right to play for the championship.

Schultz spotted Sweeney 10 ringers. After 24 shoes the gap was still a big 6 points and Russ was starting to hit his stride, running three consecutive doubles. But Joe covered all six and ran five more doubles of his own, closing the gap to 2 points at 40 shoes. At 48 shoes Joe led by 1. Russ failed to convert either of his last two pitches, and so did Joe, so Schultz won 41-40 with 82% to Sweeney's 60%. Until the ending double miss, Schultz had tossed 28 ringers in final 30 shoes.

The stage was now set for the grand finale, a showdown between two hot pitchers—Ashford had finished his final game with 16 for 20 and Schultz with 26 for 30. So, as so often happens, the tension or whatever pulls down the percentages, but not the excitement of the match. Ashford started 13 points up on the spot. Schultz closed the gap to 4 at 28 shoes, mostly on the strength of a run of 8 ringers. They both pitched 8 for 12 and the pay was still 4 points at 40 shoes. Then the ringer touch got lost. Ashford hit 3 of his next 8, Schultz snagged 5. At 48 shoes the spread was only 2 points. Knowing Joe, and knowing that a double miss puts the game into overtime, Ashford dropped on one clean ringer to salt the game away. With the game beyond reach, Schultz missed on his last pitches. The final score was 37-34, with Ashford hitting 48% and Schultz 68%.

Sweeney won the 3rd-4th place playoff over Bonani 37-31. Both men seemed to spend more time watching the "big" game on the next court.

Space does not permit further mention of the fine pitching to get back in next year.
