
JOYCE DAHLBERG SUPERLATIVE IN CAMDEN, N.Y. LEAGUE

1981 CHANGE FOR PROGRESS

In 1976 Pres. Wally Shipley appointed me as chairman of a committee called "Change for Progress." The two things we concentrated most of our effort on were: finding a better method of qualifying and do away with the time consuming, boring, inaccurate 200 shoe qualifying method, that due to point padding had become a disgrace. Our other main objective was to find a way to shorten the game.

These two changes were made in 1981. This year will go down in history as the year that the NHPA made the most progress.

In 1962 Harold Craig NHPA Pres. appointed me as chairman of a committee to study alternate methods of qualifying. We submitted a format that was very similar to the one used at the 1981 tournament. It only took 18 years to make that change.

We now need a better method of seeding the players. About 8 or 9 years ago I started a list in the digest of the top 100 players. I turned the job over to Walter Ray Williams. He enlarged the list to 200 and added the boys, girls and women. The averages were calculated by taking the pitchers' best 2 or 3 tournaments (at least 20 games) and using them to get one's average.

The best 2-3 tournaments were used because facilities vary, bad weather, especially windy days would cause the averages for a tournament to be very low.

Now that we have shortened the game to 40 points, I'd like to suggest another change that would improve the game.

When the count-all system is used or when we qualify, all shoes within 6" of the stake count one point. That is, they are all of equal value. As soon as we start our games, only the closer shoe counts a point. The point I'm trying to make is, why should one poorly thrown shoe be worth more than another poorly thrown shoe.

The change that I'd like to suggest is that all shoes within 6" of the stake be of equal value.

The game between Walter Ray Williams and Ben Wiedrich reached the score of 49-49. Each one had the same number of ringers and each had scored one single point. On the last pitch each one had a ringer and a shoe within 6' of the stake. Ben's shoe was closer and thus he scored a point. Under the suggested change, the two shoes within 6' would be of each value and thus no score. The game would continue and most likely be won by a ringer.

Ray Martin and Danny Kuchcinski had a game at Fargo, N.D. in 1967 that reached the score of 49-49. Ray had a ringer and second shoe that needed measuring. Danny's first shoe was a ringer. The second shoe was at least a foot short but it rolled up against the stake for the winning point and what proved to be the deciding game for the 1967 title. Using the suggested rule change the game would have remained a tie.

The change would also speed up the game since fewer shoes would be measured.

DENVER METRO CLUB DOUBLES TOURNAMENT A SUCCESS





After being chairman for ten (10) years Bernard Herfurth is stepping down and will be replaced by Ruth Hangen. Ruth has been a faithful member for many years. This will be the first time that a lady member will head a committee for our association.

REGIONAL CHAIRMAN'S SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT

Archie Roach, our RD from Texas states that Texas has kept to her schedule and that they have had very good tournaments; in Stephenville they had six full men's classes and two women's classes, the latter particularly reflecting increased participation by the women over previous years. Four leagues that are doing very well are Arlington, San Antonio, Del Rio and Stephenville.

Rice University has asked for information on how to install eight lighted courts. This will be a boon for the Houston pitchers as well as for the intramural program for the University. Stan Smith, Assistant RD is handling the details and has an appointment to meet with the responsible officials on the campus. Archie has located a site, Arlington, that he has a mind to host the first Regional Championship tournament for Region A, which is now scheduled to be held next year. Archie is asking for patches (Regional) for this tournament. He hopes to generate some money from this tournament to replace the \$75.00 the NHPA sends to RDs, or just add to it for their own activities. Archie, yo see, gives out part of this money to his Assistant RDs for postage, etc. Good idea, Archie!

Jim Burrow, the Assistant RD from North Texas has been extremely active this year. Jim, who is also State Coordinator, has written letters to the State Division Directors of the various clubs asking them for reports on their activities, plus he is trying to start a newsletter. The following is a report on club activities which Jim sent to all State Division Directors:

Blackwell, Oklahoma had nine tournaments in 1980 with only 25 members in their local club. Jim received reports that they had pitchers from Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Missouri and Arkansas pitching in their tournament which indicates that they may have had good turnouts.

Waynoka, **Oklahoma** with 25 to 30 local club members in 1980, may have had three tournaments with pretty good turnouts; also had some pitchers from Kansas competing.

Poncia City, Oklahoma has about 30 members in their local club; they also have a handicap league. They hosted the 1980 Oklahoma State Tournament and the Annual Donut Open, which to Jim's understanding was the biggest tournament in the country this year, with cash and prizes worth over \$10,000. Jim says they had pitchers from Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, California, Oklahoma and Canada. It would be nice if you could make this tournament next year.

Marshall, Oklahoma, to Jim's knowledge, has not organized club, although they held one tournament there last year with a pretty good turnout, about 54 pitchers. Jim held their Annual Spring business meeting there. The City of Marshall was having a celebration of Prairie City Days and the local pitchers of Marshall built a float for the Oklahoma HPA. The State Champions, Officers and Jim rode this float in the parade with the rest of the pitchers walking behind as a group with their horseshoes. Marshall has no regular courts at this time. They just drive stakes in the ground and build boxes and fill them with sand, and they had a lot of fun. Their local pitchers go to a lot of work for this one event. They believe after the good turnout that they had, that the City will now build them some official courts.

Bartlesville, **Oklahoma** has no organized club and held one tournament in 1980 with a good turnout. Not known if they had any out of state pitchers or not.

Guthrie, **Oklahoma**, to the best of Jim's knowledge, has no organized club. They held two tournaments in 1980 and in their spring tournament they had a good turnout with about 25 pitchers, although due to lack of communications, their fall tournament had a very poor turnout.

Sailisaw, Oklahoma has a local club although Jim does not know how many members they have. They had three tournaments last year with no word on the kind of participation they had.

Yukon, Oklahoma has about 13 local club members. In 1980 they had a handicap league with about 24 pitchers. They also had two tournaments in 1980.

Edmond, Oklahoma is interested in horseshoes, according to Larry Fordyce, the West Central State Division Director, who is trying to get something started in that city. Good luck, Larry.

Recently, cooperation has developed between North Texas and Oklahoma by Archie Roach and several Texas HPA officers. For the first time in history, the Texas and Oklahoma pitching schedules were coordinated so that no dates are in conflict. This should mean a better turnout for the tournaments in both states.

Arlington, Texas (Ironbenders) is a very strong club that is now participating for the third year in a row in the Fort Worth "May Fest". This is a charity event and the Ironbenders run a horseshoe pitching booth. The past two years they made more for the charity than any other game's booth in the May Fest complex. More than 300,000 people attend this fun festival each year.

Jim believes we are off to a good start this year and also thinks that we will be having more sanctioned tournaments than ever before. The NHPA will be helping to sponsor two of their tournaments. Yukon, along with Ponca are planning to have Handicap Leagues again. Jim says that they have many more tournaments this year and believes that, with their newsletter concept being approved, they will begin to have better turnouts for each tournament.

REPORT — (Continued)

Ed Severs, our Assistant RD from South New Jersey says that Bridgeton is putting in four horseshoe courts and that Vineland is considering installing lights for their courts.

Lee Davis, our RD from Florida writes that their season was a complete success, with tournament participation running from a low of 24 pitchers to a high of 104 entries, for an average of approximately 60 players. The highlight of their season was the U.S. Invitational, which was a wonderful tournament and a complete success. The Clearwater Club can be very proud not only in holding this tournament but in the way it was conducted. The Club was grateful to Chief Charlie for making it possible. This tournament was an experimental one with the top eight men and top eight women in the world competing; the men played a double round robin and then an eight-person round robin. The ladies played just an eight-person round robin with Opal Reno winning the Championship. In this tournament, only ringers counted and only for one point. Mark Seibold bested Walter Ray Williams, Jr., the World Champion by one point in the final, in overtime. "Dead Eye" averaged 91.1% for his 14 games but only hit 82% in the final game of the ladder, ending up in a tie at 50 shoes. To break the tie, four more shoes were pitched and Mark had four ringers to "Dead Eye's" three to win by one point!

Even through this was an experimental tournament, all seemed to enjoy the type of play. The spectators also enjoyed it as it seemed easier for them to understand what was going on. By the way spectators kept going and coming, there was an average of over 2,000 most of the time. The Florida State HPA elected Carl Steinfeldt President for the coming season. Carl won the State Championship and was third in the Invitational Tournament. Carl has done more than his share for the Florida Association and under his guidance as President, the Florida Association is looking forward to a greater season than ever.

Barry Chapelle, our RD from Oregon reports that the Northwest area is off to its usual busy season. Idaho is having three sanctioned events, including the State plus some other ones. Oregon has a sanctioned event every weekend between May 3 and Labor Day, except for two, so Barry says he will be pitching quite a bit. Also on the Oregon calendar was an Old Timers Day (unsanctioned but well-attended and a lot of fun. They had 40 guys over 60 and all prizes were donated. Everyone received a prize and there was no entry fee) held on May 16, their annual State Doubles Tournament and a special North-South team match featuring the best six pitchers in the North against the best six pitcher in the South. In that one they played for \$200.00 which is donated every year by a lumber mill. One of their pitchers is a foreman there. Our big money event is held in the end of June each year and we are looking forward to it in Hermiston. Last year over \$3,900 in cash was given out -- this year should be just as good. The NHPA donated \$300; our State put in \$100 and the rest is raised by Rick Rebman of the Hermiston Club. He would be a good candidate for some kind of NHPA award for his efforts. I'm sure that this is the largest money tournament, except for the World, anywhere. That \$3,900 given out was all cash - no merchandise. Dead-eye Williams will once again be in attendance. Barry has had some trouble with Washington Secretary Herb Okeson, in publicizing this tournament. Washington has a tournament the same weekend in the far opposite corner of the State, over 350 miles from Hermiston, but Herb still wouldn't publicize this event in their newsletter. He's fiercely protective of his State and thinks we will hurt the attendance at this other tournament but Barry is sure both events will go well. There are plenty of pitchers in Northwest Washington who have no interest in Hermiston and they will support the Washington event. Barry says that Herb is a crusty old goat, set in his ways, and unwilling to change, but he's also one of the hardest and most dedicated workers I've ever seen. We'll get good support from Washington anyway because Rick gets out a lot of publicity on his own and Washington has always attended well, anyway. Once again, Wally Shipley designated Barry as the official NHPA Representative at this event. Barry says that he is especially pleased to have his father elected to the NHPA Hall of Fame. Washington also has a packed schedule this year and things are going o.k. up there. The only thing their area needs is better weather. It's been a very wet spring.

Walt McGarvey, our Assistant RD from Idaho reports that they had two sanctioned tournaments in 1980. There is a new club forming at Sandpoint, the North part of Idaho is really waking up. Priest River and Samuals are now together, with Priest River having one small tournament last year. Walt wishes they could get more sanctioned tournaments but the people are hard to convince. He stuck his neck out a few years ago and had a Boise tournament sanctioned but ended up having to pay the State and National dues for a lot of them out of his own pocket. Boise had two tournaments there, plus the State. Buhl also had two tournaments, as well as Idaho Falls. Idaho Falls and St. Anthony are now together, too. The largest, most active club in South Idaho now is at Fairfield, and they showed up en masse at the State Tournament. They would like to get the State Tournament for Fairfield in 1982. Pocatello had a club started, but it never got off the ground very far. Nampa caved in completely; there has been no horseshoe activity there since the later 1960s.


