We are into the beginning of a new year and, I hope, a bigger and better one. For 1984, the 'name of the game' is one word...MEMBERSHIP. With your help, the NHPA can double in one year! Preposterous? Not really.

What programs do we have going? Publicity Chairman Bernard Herfurth has many. He outlined two ways (pg. 4, Dec. & Jan. Digest issues) that *you* personally could help. Did you? I suspect not. If not, don't wait any longer. Sit down right now, do what has been asked, and feel proud that you're doing your share in promoting our sport.

Committee Chairmen Claude White, Herman Wieser and Jack Springer have 'membership' programs in being. Claude's Regional Directors have received a complete 'How-to-do-it' membership package, copies of which will be distributed to every club. If these directions are followed, our membership can't help but increase. My sincere thanks goes to San Jose's Don Titcomb and to Verdan Zelmar, the President of the Northern California H.P.A. for offering this complete package to the NHPA.

Along with this overall program, Herman and Jack are working to increase our Junior membership dramatically. Youth is the life blood of any organization and if the NHPA is to become a great, continuing one, then we must have a successful program to recruit Juniors. Under our program, every club will receive a letter asking them to write to a minimum of 6 churches, private schools, public schools, Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops or Boys clubs about our NHPA program. These letters will be followed by *personal visits* to thoroughly explain the Junior program and to organize Junior leagues. Each club will be required to report back as to its success.

In the first paragraph, I said, "With your help, we can double in one year." It is cliche to say, "Every member get a member!" But, is there a better way to double our membership?

#### PRESIDENT'S NOTES...

Upon the advice of many senior NHPA members and the Exec Council, the 1st prize for the National Handicap 'Mail-in' Tournament will be changed from 'Any member can win a *possible* \$5,000' to 'Any member can win a possible \$2,000.' Members felt (and convinced your President) that it would be much better to give many more prizes and give that many more NHPA members a chance to win. The prize list which follows is based upon 2000 entries. If 1500 entries, then each place would be 75% of that listed, etc.

1st — \$2,000, 2nd — \$1750, 3rd — \$1500, 4th — \$1250, 5th — \$1150, 6th — \$1000, 7th — \$900, 8th — \$800, 9th — \$700, 10th — \$600, 11th — \$550, 12th — \$500, 13th — \$450, 14th — \$400, 15th — \$350, 16th — \$300, 17th — \$250, 18th — \$200, 19th — \$150, and the next 22 winners at \$100 each. This is \$17,000. If 2,000 enter, the other \$3,000 will be used for expenses and further promotions.

#### FIRST THREE TOURNAMENT PLACEMENT RULE RESCINDED

Due to members' requests, the rule passed by the previous Executive Council that only the 1st three names of each class of each tournament be listed in the Digest has been reviewed and is thereby rescinded. All other rules as listed on the bottom of page 3, October 1983 Digest remain in effect.

To refresh your memory they are as follows:

- All tournament results must be sent to the Digest within two weeks after the date of the tournament otherwise they will be not be published.
- All tournament results must have the date tournament was played and the city where it took place. Otherwise they will be returned.
- EXECUTIVE COUNCIL also voted that ONLY SANCTIONED tournaments will be published in the future.

Word has been received of the passing of Joe Moore of the Shasta Club of Northern California in late August.

Joe was the type of member that makes a local club function. He received a special award at the Open Tournament in 1982 for his long and dedicated service as Facilities Director of the Shasta Club.

He was always present always competitive at local club activities. Four days before his untimely death at 72 years of age, he won his weekly games in the club meet.

He was chosen "pitcher of the year" by the club members in 1978, 1982 and 1983. The 1983 award was presented to his wife who survives him, early in October. He will be sorely missed by those who knew him.



#### NHPA PROMOTION COMMITTEE NEWS

DO YOU REMEMBER 25 YEARS AGO - 1959

Ted Allen won the World Championship with a 35-0 record and an 84.4 ringer percentage. Fernando Isais, the 1958 titleholder was unable to defend his crown because of business luties at home.

Curt Day of Frankfort, Indiana finished in 8th place despite having an 80.4 ringer percentage. Vicki Chappelle, a 20-year old from Portland, Oregon won her third World Women's Championship.

Little Donnie Roberts, 15 years old won the Boys World Championship.

Thirty-four delegates from 15 states were seated at the NHPA Convention. There were none from the entire East Coast.

Archie Gregson, NHPA president, suggested that something should be done to help reimburse Ellis Cobb for his fine work in editing and publishing the Horseshoe Pitchers News Digest. At present, it is being done at cost and Ellis receives no remuneration for his work.

Above excerpts taken from the NHPA minutes of the Convention, 25 years ago.

#### SPRINGER-ROBERTS CONCERNED ABOUT OUR YOUTH

As Secretary-Treasurer of the NHPA our low number of young people participating has always been of concern. Jack Springer and I have a proposal before the council which may help but in order to improve our youth program we need the help of all of you. I guess to evaluate ourselves we simply need to ask, "What have you or I done in the past year to help young people get involved in horseshoes?" The answer is probably our problem. Jack Springer has written down some ideas that I want to share with you. I will simply title his material:

OUR YOUTH!!!! OUR FUTURE????

1. I am sure you will all agree that the NHPA badly needs more junior boys and girl members! The help of all NHPA membership is needed to enlist more junior members for 1984. Horseshoe Clubs and their officers throughout the USA and Canada must put forth a special effort in 1984 to enroll more junior pitchers for our Association. Our NHPA officers, regional directors, state and club officers can help in building up our junior membership. A united effort by all of us, in a positive manner, is needed to build up and promote our junior boy and girl NHPA membership in

1984.

2. Our youth pitchers of 1984 and the next few years will be our adult men and women pitchers

in the near future years.

3. In every state, county, city, town or village we must do this: (1) make plans to hold and promote — Learn to Pitch Horseshoe Clinics for Jr. Boys and Girls ages. (2) Our present members must instruct them (the juniors) on how to pitch horseshoes and how to keep score for horseshoe tournaments. (3) We must hold NOVICE horseshoe tournaments for juniors with awards for top pitchers. (4) Our present junior members can help and assist the adult members in our promotion and instruction clinics and novice tournaments. (5) The clinics and novice tournaments must be given advanced publicity by flyers and in local newspapers, radios and TV stations. Also flyers in our schools, business, mails and other business store locations.

4. We must promote junior boy and Girl horseshoes in our school systems home rooms and physical education classes; in boy and girl scout troops; in church youth groups; in our state and national agricultural departments; in national organizations - in schools - The American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (office — 1900 Association Drive, Reston, VA 22091); The National Recreation and Park Association (office — 3101 Park Center Drive, Alexandria, VA 22302). Most of States have a State Recreation and Park Societies, made up of members of the city and town Recreation and Parks Departments; most cities have Recreation and Park Departments and summer playground programs; in the YMCA; any and all youth organizations, etc.

5. We can transport the juniors to our courts, for clinics and tournaments, by cars, school

buses or recreation department buses, and we can build a court or two on the elementary school, Jr. High or Senior High School grounds. With courts on school grounds, junior tournaments can be promoted within the school or between schools.

6. Each of our Horseshoe Clubs should be willing to build a 30 foot court (blocks and stakes — 4 each) at one or more elementary or Jr. High School in your city, town or county, and donate a

couple pair or more of horseshoes, the smaller - lighter horseshoe, to the school.

7. We could even start the younger pitchers in a Little League Horseshoe program! The pitching distance for all ages 6 years thru 11 years could be shortened to 15 or 20 feet and leave the 30 feet distance for ages 12 years to 17 years as it is now organized. Maybe a still smaller and lighter shoe can be built than the smaller shoe now available by one or two of the Horseshoe Companies.

8. Since money award prizes are forbidden for youth we could award more scholarships of money for future schooling at our state and local tournaments and as the NHPA does now and Springfield, MO is doing for the 1985 NHPA Tournament. More valuable money scholarship will help increase more interest in juniors and their parents participating in the NHPA Junior

Horseshoe Program.

A parents association could be organized for the Youth Leagues to help out, for transportation, minor expenses, to raise money and public relations and backing for the Youth Horseshoe

League or program.


10. In our promotion we must stress — that pitching Horseshoe is not only a lot of fun, but a

great youth sport for good health and physical fitness for our youth!

11. All NHPA members, youth and adults, mail me any ideas you have on how we can build up our youth boy and girl membership! Also let us know of any good youth promotions you are doing now. Your ideas will help others. When you conduct any of the projects in paragraph 3, let me know your results! Our NHPA is now a successful organization, to make sure it will be successful in years to come is to build up our youth membership now — in 1984!

#### HORSESHOES ON THE LAS VEGAS STRIP

December 11th thru 15th, 1983, this just might have been one of Horseshoe pitching's most important times. This was the week that the Superstars and Bright Lights of the Las Vegas Strip competed with the clang of Horseshoes, in what has been touted as being, the first one of an anual event which will lead the way to major sports status for horseshoe pitching. Teaming up with the NHPA officials, the executive staff of the Hacienda Hotel did indeed put on a major horseshoe pitching event. It was interesting, it was different, and it was mostly fun! Although pretournament publicity for the sport was good, it gave a starting date of December the 11th (there was no information sent to the contestants prior to the start of the tournament), but nothing actually happened until late afternoon, when registration was started, then a cocktail party following that evening, during which the NHPA Secretary Donnie Roberts outlined procedures for the next day's qualifying rounds. Although your entering percentage, as per your state record, was used to put you in a 6 man round robin for qualifying, the percentage which you would make in the qualifying games was the only one to be used to establish which class you would be pitching in for this tournament.

Donnie Roberts and Ralph Dykes did a fantastic job in setting up the classes as fair as possible. This was a difficult task due to the type of courts being used. All pitching was to be done on portable indoor practice courts (of the rubber mat, spring cushioned type). Most of the contestants had never seen these, let alone pitched on them before, and Donnie's job was to find out, at the outset just what type of horseshoe pitching was going to be done. The answer was soon apparent HORSESHOES were ROLLING, BOUNCING and FLYING everywhere, however everyone soon made a few adjustments and went on with the business of pitching horseshoes and trying to make as many ringers as possible stay on. Everyone's percentage suffered due to the courts. No one and I mean no one pitched their entering percentage the first day, the pitching did get better as the mats on the courts got more flexible. GOOD REGULATION COURTS ARE A MUST before

this event will come up to the expectations of everyone.

There were 14 pitchers entered from Washington and Oregon. They all qualified as follows: Ben Wiedrich and Willard Napier Class A, Ray Sexton and Jerry Gorton Class C, Art Lund, Len Weisdepp and Ron Ferguson Class E, Bob Beesley and Bob Hughes Class F, Marv Herridge and Frank Green Class H, Skip Schilperoort Class I and Wendell Roberts Class J, Elaine Weisdepp, The only lady entered from Washington or Oregon was in Class A. After the qualifying percentages were established, classes were set up for the semi-finals. All contestants were rearranged into groups of 16, which were then sub-divided into 2 groups of 8 for round robin play (only 1 or 2 byes were necessary). The 2 groups of 8 were termed #1 and #2 for identification purposes only, they were actually equal in their qualifying percentages. In order to get into the finals you had to win one of the groups, or be one of the two top percentages from either group. (If there was a tie for 1st place in a group, there was no play-off, they had to take their chances against the others, and hope to make it on percentage.) There were only 4 finalists from each group of 16 pitchers. A lot of people felt there should have been more than the 4 in the finals. Five from our Washington, Oregon group made it to the finals. Wiedrich-Oregon class A percentage winner, Gorton-Oregon Class C percentage winner, Hughes-Washington Class F 1st place winner, Green and Herridge-Washington Class H percentage winners.

At the Awards Banquet Thursday evening, after the finals were pitched, cash awards were made to all finalists, with trophies going to 1st through 3rd places in all classes, as per NHPA rules. The banquet was good, more than 200 people were there. Good speakers presented a few jokes as well as some serious stuff about Horseshoe Pitching. The food was plentiful and good. All in all, we have to say that the plans and ideas presented by some expert Las Vegas promotors

and NHPA officials may result in a much needed boost for our sport.

Donnie Roberts ran this tournament in an outstanding manner, everything was right on time, crowd control was good, and horseshoe pitchers from 21 states and Canada showed Las Vegas


how to have good healthy fun.

Here is how the pitchers from our group finished: Ben Wiedrich Class A - 3rd place \$500, Jerry Gorton Class C - 4th place \$50.00, Bob Hughes Class F - 2nd place \$150.00, Frank Green Class H -1st place \$200.00, Marv Herridge Class H - 3rd place \$100.00 (not too bad for a bunch of webfeet).

The big money winners were Kevin Cone (a 21 year old sensation) from lowa, and Lorraine Thomas from New York. The Men's World Champion Dale Lipovsky was eliminated in the semifinals, while the Ladies World Champion Phyllis Negaard ended in second place after a 3-way play-off. Walter Ray Williams placed 2 in the men's Class A. We can be proud of Oregon's Ben Wiedrich, he was pitching against the best in the world and placed third. He gave Kevin Cone his toughest match.

We do hope Las Vegas fulfills its promises, for the future growth of Horseshoe Pitching.

#### NHPA PROMOTION COMMITTEE

BY-LAWS — ARTICLE 3, Section 5 — In any tournament, ties between contestants for first place shall be settled by play-off. Other ties will be settled by percentage and/or total points.

At the 1983 convention a motion was made to delete — "or total points." The delegates voted not to delete "or total points."

If the delegates had spent five minutes to consider why "or total points" should be deleted, they would have voted to delete it.

EXAMPLE: Joe McCrink, Jr. won the New Jersey State title with an 11-1 record and a 70.5 ringer percentage. I had a 10-2 record. Joe had a total point count of 568, while I had a total point record of 576 with a 60.2 ringer percentage.

Note total points has nothing to do with how well a pitcher pitched. It represents how well one's opponent pitched.

If I pitch 80 percent and my opponent pitches 100 percent I will not score any points.

Total points are only important when the Count-All system is used.

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#### ELMER, THE GREAT

(excerpts from Des Moines, Iowa Register & Green Bay, Wis. Press-Gazette, July 29 & 30, 1978) "The World Horseshoe Pitching Championship begins here (Des Moines) Monday but defending champion Elmer Hohl refuses to practice.

"I never have praticed and I never will," says the 59-year-old farmer from Wellesley, Ontario.

"The way I see it, horseshoe pitching should be fun."

Nevertheless, Hohl is one of the most amazing pitchers in the sport's long history. If you put a chair over the stake, he will throw a ringer around each leg and then throw another around the stake. If you tie a bunch of balloons to the stake, he will pick them off, one at a time.

Once a beer company asked Hohl if he could throw a ringer around a bottle of their product for a television commercial. "You can stand just out of camera range," the advertising man said. But Hohl moved back 40 feet, the standard pitching distance, and hung a ringer on the bottle on his

first try.

In sanctioned contests, Hohl does equally well. He has won the men's title in World Championship six times. In 1968 he threw ringers 88.5 percent of the time — a record for the world tournament. On the way to that average he tossed a perfect game (100 percent ringers) — something that had only been done once before in the World Championships and has not been done since.

"I don't need to practice because, basically, horseshoe pitching is a matter of strength," notes Hohl, "The hardest part is simply lasting through World Championship tournament. I guess we'll

throw at least 3,000 shoes before we leave Des Moines."

Yet he sais that he can feel himself slowing down. He is now in the process of turning his farm over to his son, who will be the fifth Hohl to raise crops on the same land. And he wonders how long he can hold off the younger generation of pitchers who, he says, are probably the best ever.

"When I entered my first World Championship in 1960," Hohl recalls, "you could win with a ringer average of 75 percent. Now you need 85 or 86 percent. No doubt about it, the players are

tougher."

Hohl began pitching horseshoes as a youngster. The first shoes he threw were actually equine footwear — not the competitive "throwing" shoe that virtually all serious practitioners of the sport use today.

He did not enter organized competition until he was 39. "I didn't know there was such a thing as big-time horseshoes," Hohl says. "Then I beat this fella who claimed to be a big-time horseshoe pitcher."

Hohl says he doubts there are any horseshoe hustlers, because the game does not attract a betting crowd.

"It's fun and it's a great game but there is no money in it," says Hohl. "A guy is lucky if he can make expenses. That's a great shame too, because pitching horseshoes requires a great deal of skill."

Pressed on the point, Hohl will admit that a man of his skill could indeed make a little money in a betting game.

It seems a group of doctors had a summer retreat where, on occasion, they pitched some horseshoes. A couple of the doctors were consistent winners. A doctor friend arranged to take Hohl, then defending world champion, to the place where the games were played. Hohl was introduced as "Dr. Gill," and was paired with his friend against the other two doctors.

Hohl was perfectly terrible in the warmups. "We blew the first couple of games," said Hohl. "We finally played a game for \$2 and lost. I was throwing the shoes so they didn't open at the

stake."

Hohl said a second money game was arranged for \$3 and this time he pitched a little more skillfully, but still lost.

Now, said Hohl, they were ready for the sting. A \$10 game was arranged.

Hohl pitched two straight ringers. "The guy told me later he knew right then he'd been had," said Hohl.

But to really rub it in, Hohl tossed ringers steadily until the game was called.

Hohl's doctor friend was gleeful at what he had pulled off. One of the losers pulled out a cigar and Hohl offered his lighter. The lighter had an inscription: "Elmer Hohl, World Champion."

Marvin Falk of Roseville, Michigan had this to say:

"Each year, Michigan and Ontario, Canada hold a "Friendship Tournament." The top 12 Canadian and Michigan men, along with 6 such women players, hold a round robin tournament. One year it is held in Wellsley, Canada, and the next year at a Michigan site. A large traveling trophy is awarded to the winning team. Needless to say, Elmer Hohl has been the dominant pitcher from Canada. A few years ago, I asked Elmer: "Why don't you take it easy on our Michigan men?" Elmer's reply was, "I do, I keep the games short."

Being a low average pitcher myself, I also asked Elmer: "How do you throw so many ringers?" His reply: "Throw the shoe far enough, straight enough and open the shoe at the stake." Sounds

reasonable, doesn't it?

This story about Curley Seibold (Bonnie's husband and Mark's father) is one that needs to be told. Reluctantly, Curley sent it to me. His story is as follows:

d. Reluctantly, Curley sent it to me. His story is as follows:
 "I went into the Air Force on Feb. 5, 1943 and after basic training, gunnery school and radio

school, I was assigned to a B-17 Bomber Crew and sent to England to serve with the 94th Bomb Group, a part of the 8th Air Force, 331st squadron.

I had flown 17 missions with my original crew but on Mission #18 I was assigned to another crew because they were short a crew member. This was on Oct. 5 and we were to bomb Munster, Germany. Our plane was hit by flak, caught fire and we were forced to bail out. Our co-pilot was killed and I had a piece of shrapnel in my left foot which earned me a "Purple Heart."

German storm troopers captured me and sent me to Frankfort, then to Gros Tychow where we stayed until Feb. 6, 1945. We were told the Russians were getting close and we evacuated the camp and walk from East to West and were close enough to hear the English guns in the distance. They turned us around and we headed East. After 3 days, I and a "Buddy" from Nebraska escaped. We were caught twice by

members of a Hungarian Army who were wearing white arm bands and enroute to surrender. They had us write a note to the English telling them our location, how many men, etc. On April 13, the tanks rolled in. We rode the tanks to the next town, got a car and drove it to Brussels, Belgium. We were shortly on our way home, by way of France to England and finally the U.S.

I lost track of my original crew but recently learned there was a 94th Bomb Group Memorial Assn. paper published every four months to which I subscribed. This paper lists all of the names and addresses of the 94th Bomb Group. I found some of my original crew listed and called a couple of them — one of which was my pilot. He was really surprised to hear from me, for he thought I was dead. We are looking forward to seeing each other soon at a reunion being held.

I don't know what happened to the men I got shot down with. After we were captured, we were sent to different places."

The next time you pitch horseshoes with Curley, give him an extra hand shake — he deserves it!
