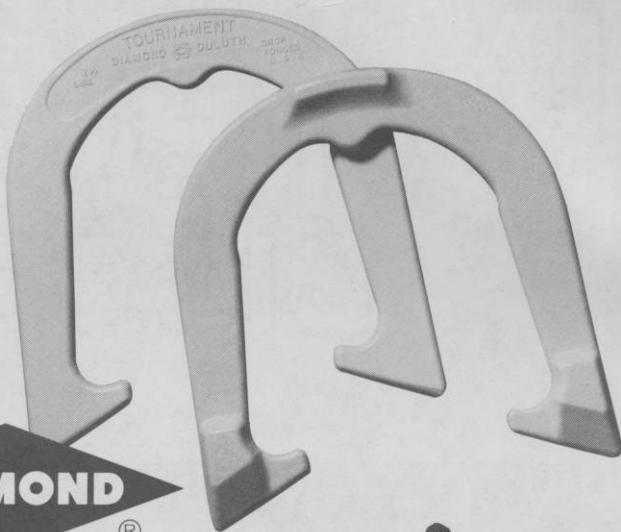

Palmer, Alaska is a far piece away, but how about those avid NHPA members, Norman Rouseau and John and Janie Pendergrass, who made it all the way to pitch at the Hacienda? With them were other Alaskans, Marilyn Grasser, Wendell Lewis and Floyd Ehman, owner of the E & E Construction Corp. Floyd is planning an indoor facility, which would be a first for the 49th state.

Putt Mossman? Most of our younger pitchers may have never heard of this legendary Hall of Fame member, but all the old-timers have. Let's go back to the year 1925 . . . and the W.T. held at Lake Worth, Florida. It was in that tournament that Mossman and Bert Duryee pitched a game, which was at that time headlined as the "Greatest Game of Horseshoes Ever Pitched." Mossman set two world records by throwing 9 consecutive doubles and a 67.9 ringer percentage in the final round robin. He won the World Championship. This year on February 23, Lake Worth will be conducting a tournament extravaganza and celebrating its 60th year (1925-1985) of horseshoe competition. Don't miss this one.

The NHPA finished in the top 50 in the Wheaties Search for Champions contest recently completed. This means that the NHPA will receive \$1.00 for every ballot we submitted for Boni Boser who is one of the six finalists. One of these will be selected after the judges review their histories. The winner's picture will appear on the Wheaties box.

In other promotion activity, Mr. Richard Moore, Vice-President of the International Management Group was informed that an article on horseshoe pitching would appear in the September issue of Sports Illustrated. Also a copy of my book, "Horseshoe, Film Facts and Fun" was sent to him, along with information concerning our next five World Championships.

Mr. Douglas Pierre, Mr. Moore's assistant, called me and set up a meeting with Mr. P.J. Johnson, Vice-Pres. in charge of Marketing and promotion at which time I met with him at the IMG headquarters in the GM building in New York city in Arnold Palmer's office. After the meeting which lasted about an hour and a half, Mr. Johnson asked if I would sign a contract with them (the usual fee is 20-25% of all monies received from TV and sponsors). He asked me to send him a video-tape that would be of interest to potential sponsors and TV. He also requested reprints of the publicity articles generated by Joe Goldstein Public Relations during the three years (1976-79) that he handled for the NHPA publicity. Glen Portt was briefed and he arranged to meet with Mr. Johnson the latter part of October.

NHPA PUBLICITY NEWS RELEASE FOR JANUARY

Doctors throughout the country are taking a closer look at horseshoe pitching in that it is a sport that men, women and boys and girls can play in their own backyards.

A director of ambulatory care and chief of evaluation at a California Veteran's hospital says, "Playing horseshoes is a great form of exercise in that it enhances one's physical sense of well being and is a minimal risk and can be a great family sport."

Another doctor now serving as a professor of family medicine believes that in his judgement, horseshoe pitching is an excellent exercise because there is a lot of stooping, bending, walking, arm and leg and back motion requiring coordination and concentration and is a good mental health relaxer.

A doctor member of the American Board of Medicine and Cardiovascular Diseases states that the sport of horseshoes may be more beneficial when compared to a typical aerobic workout in that tendon and bone stretch are more noticeable by pitching horseshoes.

A California doctor was asked by a heart surgery patient as to being able to pitch horseshoes to which he answered that it would be great for him as it involves walking, bending arm exercise which he would need.

A well known chiropractor says, "It is important not to exercise too strenuously, that is why I recommend pitching horseshoes for the young and old as it develops the body without being physically strenuous."

Dr. Sol Berman from Elizabeth, NJ, has pitched horseshoes in competition winning many titles over the years. He recommends horseshoe pitching that while pitching by oneself for one hour, you will have pitched 400 shoes, walked about three miles and bent over 200 times to pick up the shoes.

 ABOUT OUR COVER PICTURE. . . Lafayette, Indiana now has 12 of its 24 court layout under a roof equipped with a lighting system observers claim is the best they have ever seen on a horseshoe court setup.

The lighting system consists of 52 fluorescent bulbs eight feet long. There is absolutely no glare, shadows or dark spots anywhere under the roof. There are also numerous camper and trailer hook-ups.

First action on the new setup was the Indiana State Tournament last Labor Day weekend when six solid hours of rain did not stop play.

The construction of the roof was a joint effort by the Lafayette Horseshoe Club and the City Park Department. The club has 160 members and operates two weekly leagues in addition to its tournament schedule. Don Stivers is the club President and Bob Pence, former NHPA Secretary-Treasurer, the club Secretary.

The park department has promised to cover the remaining 12 courts with a roof in the near future. These are the same courts which were the site of the 1975 World Tournament.

A big open tournament with cash prizes all up and down the line has been scheduled for June 22-3 in 1985 with the intention of making it an annual affair under the title of the Midwest "Ringer Round Up."

SPOTLIGHT ON THE LADIES

Our spotlight this time is on Jeannie Spaller from Painesville, Ohio. Jeannie comes from a horseshoe pitching family, as her mother, father, sister and brother all pitch. Her 13 yr. old niece will be starting in a junior league next spring. Jeannie says her coach, and sweetheart, Oscar Manns, sparked the interest for her whole family in horseshoes, as he is an avid pitcher, averaging approximately 70% ringers.



After attending the World Tournament in 1980 and realizing that women even pitched horseshoes, Jeannie, Shirley Spiesman and Betty Dunlap helped form a handicap league for women with 10 participating. They started their league in the spring of 1981 and have been pitching ever since.

With the help of her coach, Jeannie is now averaging about 60% ringers. Her highest tournament was 72.5% and her highest game was 84%. She says her first, but not her last 90% game is her next goal.

She has several championship titles such as N.E. Ohio District Champion (4 consecutive yrs.), Fairport Harbor Mardi Gras Champion, Lake Co. Fair Champion, Geauga Co. Fair Champion and News Herald Tournament Champion (a local newspaper-sponsored tournament).

She has pitched in several tournaments out of state including the Eastern Nationals in PA.

Jeannie pitched in the Ohio State Tournament held in Greenville, Ohio in 1983 & 84, qualifying to pitch in Class A both years and finishing in fifth place both years. She hopes that will not be a continuing pattern.

She has pitched in the World Tournament the last 3 years, in 1982 in Class D, 1983 in Class B and 1984 in Class D.

She has accumulated approximately 80 trophies in the past 4 years.

She also pitches in a winter league at the N.E. Ohio Indoor Courts located in Newbury, OH. They hold tournaments there once a month all winter long.

Among Jeannie's other interests in sports, she enjoys bowling and at the present time carries an average of 160. In her spare time she enjoys crocheting and loves to cook and bake. She is a collector of salt and pepper shakers (250 sets) and bells (about 70 bells).

Jeannie is the Assistant Manager and Mortgage Loan Counselor at the Mayfield Heights Branch of Ohio Savings Association (10 years). Keep up the good pitching, Jeannie!

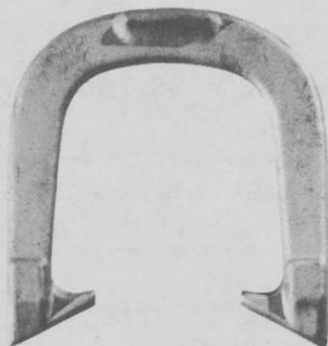

A PRO'S VIEWPOINT

By WALTER RAY WILLIAMS JR.

I personally feel there should be more articles regarding news and ideas on horseshoes published, so I am going to write several articles for upcoming issues expressing my views and thoughts on this great sport of horseshoe pitching. Since I didn't see any articles pertaining to the 1984 World Horseshoe Tournament, I thought I would start with my views of the event.

The tournament was again held in Huntsville, Alabama for the third time in 4 years. The court layout in Brahan Spring Park is very nice and convenient to access.

The first couple of days of competition were mainly the under 60% players battling out for their respective class championships and trophies. The advancing system used gave the opportunity for about 50 players to play about 20 games of competition against players who they had probably never played before. The junior girls had their championships on Friday night. The competition was close enough that the eventual winner had the fourth highest average among the junior girl competitors. In the game which decided first and second place, Debbie Bestul had a 30-6 lead over Kristi Farris only to have Kristi tie the score at 30-30. Debbie then scored 12 straight points to win 42-30. Some of the girls felt that they should play more than 4 games to decide their championship. I think that a double round robin would have added excitement to the Girls Division.

The championship men prelims were held all day Saturday with 108 seeded players and the top 36 percentage players from classes E, F, G, H and I. The tough Huntsville courts took their toll on the percentages as only 1 man was able to average over 77%. The top 24 men included 9 rookies who had never made the class A Men's division before. Two of the rookies were junior boy standouts with one of them being a 3-time Jr. Boys World champion. This year's top class was probably the youngest ever as 7 of the top 24 were under 25 years of age. The low qualifying percentage was 69.4% to get in the top class. Kevin Cone had 69.3% in the preliminaries and had to work his way into the championship class by winning a tough B class.

I did not get to watch the junior boys compete as they pitched the same time as I did. I do know that Alan Francis throws a reverse 3/4 turn very easily and got stronger the last day when he played the tougher boys in the group. The second and third place finishers had the 2 highest qualifying scores (79% and 82% resp.) and have played against each other quite a bit.

There were 8 boys who averaged over 70%, so there should be some more good pitchers joining the men's division soon.

In the women's division, it took a 65.3% and a playoff to gain a spot in the championship ladies class. There were only 2 rookies in the women's A class, Beverly Nathe, older sister of Phyllis Negaard and Jean Myers who won the class B to earn her way into the championship class. Lorraine Thomas, 2 time Women's World Champ, had one of her lower averages for a tenth place finish. Fran Carnahan, who finished 3rd in 1983, lost a little bit of her accuracy from the year before. She was still the only lefty in the women's finals. The ever tough 5 time Women's World Champ, Ruth Hagen was a bit off her pace of victory years in the finals play. Bonnie Seibold made a comeback after a wrist injury 2 years earlier at Huntsville. Her percentage was her best in world competition and she will surely work to improve upon that. 10 time Women's World Champ Vicki Winston had a relatively low percentage for her, but still managed a sixth place finish. Sandy Karasch was one of three sisters to make the women's finals this year. She is the younger sister of Phyllis Negaard and could probably be one of the ladies to win a title from her sister. Connie Still was the only one to beat Phyllis Negaard in round robin competition and seems to improve a slight amount each year and could be the one to beat in years to come. Debb Michaud had a very respectful third place and 75% average and has been a top contender since 1974 which includes a win in 1977.

In order for Phyllis Negaard to hold on to her title, she had to beat Tari Powell in the last game of the regular round robin to force a playoff, and then beat Tari in a best of three playoff. In the regulation game, Phyllis had Tari 20-0 to get control of the situation and had a very nice 87% plus game to force the playoff. Phyllis gained control of the playoffs by winning the first game very handily with over 87%. The second game went to the challenger as Tari came back with her own 87% game. In the final game, Phyllis pitched over 80% ringers but scored only 16 points as Tari pitched an incredible 89.5% to win her first Women's World Championship. The 1976 junior girls champ had become the 1984 women's champ.

Kentucky Jack Fahey made his way into the finals after missing last year's competition. He withdrew after his knee was giving him problems due to the compacted schedule from the rain. Long time player Harold Darnold made the finals again after recovering from an accident last year. The 1984 men's Class E world champion and local player Walker Shaneyfeldt made his first appearance in the Championship class. Kenneth Pogue, also making his first appearance, is from the state of next year's world tournament and beat 2 former World Champions. The easy throwing Bob May made another appearance in the top flight and has the distinction of having finished with the most consecutive wins. Greg Bean was one of the rookies and after qualifying with over 75%, shows promise for the 19 year old. Art Tyson's high shoe was a little off his sixth place showing of last year. Steve Kuchcinski made a very good showing for his first world tournament and at 23 should be a major player for a lot of tournaments to come. Ralph Maddox made yet another championship class. That is not too bad considering Ralph had a heart attack a couple of years ago. 3 time junior world champ Mark Dyson decided to join the men's division early and at 16 was the youngest of the group. Ronnie Simmons had the steadiest average as he averaged 70.9% in both qualifying and the finals competition.

Don Kuchcinski's soft landing shoe earned him the lucky 13 finish. Roger Vogel, pitching his best horseshoes in a couple of years, was the first to defeat Carl Steinfeldt. Marvin Grubb sneaked into the championship class with a 69.4% prelim average and had a good 11th place finish for his championship debut. Merlin Potts was the first to defeat the defending champion and also defeated Jim Knisley. Dale Lipovsky stunned the horseshoe world when he won his first World Championship and proved it was no fluke the next year when he won his second championship. Dale wasn't quite as smooth as he was when he won. Mark Seibold had only his second finish below fifth place in 14 straight appearances. Mark had the most 90% games in the tournament, but a couple of lower games at the wrong times gave the former world champ 5 losses, more than the eventual champ,

even though mark out-averaged him. I managed a few good games but I'm still looking for the form that I had a couple of years ago. And with a little more practice, I'm sure I can be a major threat next year. Alvin Perry had the distinction of having the highest losing percentage game with a fine 84.7% effort, only to be beaten by young Peter Clark. Alvin also beat Kevin Cone in the last round of competition to drop Kevin out of a three way tie with Jim Knisley and Carl Steinfeldt. Winning the Greenville Ringer Classic the month before shows that Alvin has the potential to be a World Champion in the future if he keeps his percentage in the 80% range and gets the breaks. Mike DiMartino made a very good showing for his first World Tournament. Being New York's state champion is credit enough to place Mike as one of the top players in the world. Kevin Cone was the winner of the Las Vegas event held last December and even though he had made the top class in last year's world tournament, showed the horseshoe world that he is a contender for any major event. If Kevin had managed to overcome Alvin Perry's 87.5% the last game, he would have been in a 3 way tie for the championship of the world after already winning the class B title. Peter Clark was the second youngest of the group at age 18, but pitched some of the best games including back to back wins against opponents who pitched over 80% at him. Peter's reverse 1/4 and smooth high backswing worked very well on the clay even though he pitches in sand in his homestate of Washington. Carl Steinfeldt made an incredible comeback after being very ill last year and pitched very smoothly before and during the tournament. Carl was my pick for the man to beat before the tournament started. I think Carl might have won this year's event had there not been a rain delay so that all the games (23) were pitched in a 48 hour period. I hope I am able to pitch as well as Carl when I'm his age. He is an inspiration to younger players like myself who would like to be able to compete on a top level for many years to come.

There is an old saying which goes, "Always a bridesmaid, but never the bride." Well, Jim Knisley had finished second on 3 different occasions including last year when he had the high men's average. Jim has been one of the top percentage players for the last fifteen years and pitched very well to beat one of the true masters of the sport of horseshoes in a best of 3 playoff with over 87% for the deciding match.

I expect, along with others, that the years ahead will produce records in every category of the World Tournament. I think that we can also achieve some national coverage of upcoming World Tournaments and hopefully increased prize funds beyond those promised for the next five years. I can hardly wait until next year to see what unfolds. But we should still work together in promoting horseshoes where we are so that we can become a stronger organization and see a real growth in our sport.

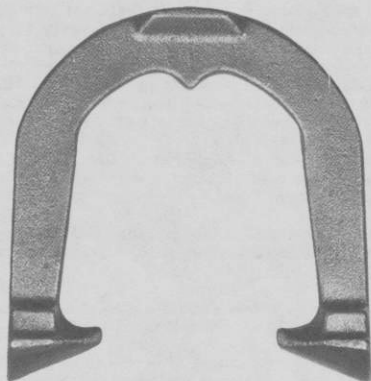
