

From Your President — Glen A. Portt

The Springfield Story — To be brief...nothing but a dream...a dream which is still out there on the horizon...but a dream which at this time appears to have little chance of coming true.

May, 1983. Earl Winston, 4th V.P. and the NHPA's Sec-Treasurer was invited to Springfield. They met with Mayor Scruggs, Barbara Morgan (Chamber of Commerce representative), Lee Elbe (Public Relations Director), and many other dignitaries. They were told that Springfield wanted the 1985 W.T. and that a bid of \$37,000 would be presented.

July, 1983. Springfield representatives appeared at the Statesville W.T. and presented their bid.

It was accepted.

October '83. Springfield asked for a meeting at Springfield. Earl Winston, Donnie Roberts, Bob Booe (Regional Director), Jim Acock (State Secretary), and myself attended. We were represented with a proposal for the NHPA to hold the W.T. in Springfield for 5 consecutive years. In return, Springfield would build a 'Sports Center' in which space would be provided for our National Head-quarters and Hall of Fame, both of which we would agree to move there. Architectural plans were shown and copies given to each present. Springfield personnel present were Barbara, Lee Elbe, Cindy Tabor (Howard Johnson's), and Bob Martin, owner of the Repair Shop Horseshoe Courts. At the meeting, Springfield was informed that the Council members present were in favor of the proposal but that the rest of the Council would have to approve plus the proposal would have to be presented to the W.T. delegates for their approval. A contract for \$2000 for advertising the 1985 event was signed by Barbara Morgan for the Chamber of Commerce. This was subsequently paid.

May 25-27, 1984. At Springfield Barbara gave briefing on overall plan to the entire council and

passed out further drawings of project. Everything seemingly on target.

July 31, 1984. Barbara presented the Springfield proposal to delegates at the W.T. Delegates voted to accept the package with the provision that a contract must be signed within 60 days.

Aug. 13, 1984. A 'Letter of Commitment' was sent to the Springfield C of C outlining the main points of the proposal and stating the NHPA accepted the 5 year package.

Oct. 1, 1984. 60 days up. Springfield granted more time.

Oct. 29, 1984. Letter sent to Lee Elbe (after several phone calls) stating a contract had to be

signed for the '85 event guaranteeing the \$37,000. No reply received.

Nov. 16, 1984. Call received from Barbara Morgan to the effect that Springfield did not want the '85 tournament and would like to be released from any commitment...that Lee Elbe and his financial backers had withdrawn their support...that no money was available. Barbara was informed there was no way Springfield could back out...that the W.T. had to be held there if at all possible. Barbara (now the P.R. Director for St. Johns Hospital) said that even though she was no longer with the C of C, she'd do what she could. She also informed us the 5 year plan was not on schedule and was doubtful.

Nov. 16—Jan. 18, 1985 — Council worked continuously with Barbara trying to get things back on course. She held many meetings but could not put the package together. At one time it appeared as though she would be successful. She obtained a commitment to use the University Trade Center.

On December 12, 1984, Earl Winston met with Mr. Pete McMahan, Convention Bureau and three others, they toured the proposed facility and reported to the Council that it was acceptable. However, financing of the World Tournament had not been resolved.

Jan. 18, 1985 — Council felt no more time could be given. Decision was made to forget Springfield for 1985 and notify everyone that 1985 A.T. was open for bids. Springfield was told the 5 year plan was out for the present, but, if it could be finalized it could again be presented to the delegates, and if accepted, Springfield would have to sign a contract at that time.

Jan. 18, 1985 — The 1986 tournament was awarded to Ainsworth, Nebraska. Ainsworth's bid

was \$25,000.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE — (Continued)

Jan. 21, 1985. NHPA secretary mailed blank W.T. contracts to every State Secretary, all Regional Directors, and all NHPA Committee Chairpersons as well as making several phone calls to cities which might be interested in and able to handle a W.T. Deadline for bids for 1985 is March 31st. Site will be selected by Council by 10 March and will appear in Digest in April issue. However, clubs etc. will be informed right after site selection.

All clubs interested in hosting a W.T. should remember that the bids for the 1987 event will be opened at the '85 W.T. Contract must be signed at that time and 10% of the bid deposited as

earnest money.

NHPA STATISTICIAN & HISTORIAN

President Glen Portt announced the appointment of Dave Loucks, Rancho Murietta, California as the new Statistician and Historian for the NHPA.

Dave comes as no stranger to the NHPA. As a Junior pitcher, he was the first to win three con-

secutive World championships, 1951-53.

Because of his business career in the corporate world, he had little time to indulge in his favorite sport. However, after spending 20 years in electronics, primarily in the marketing and international sales end, traveling extensively, 7 years as the international sales manager for a division of Ford Motor Company, and then as the Western Sales Manager and Military Marketing Manager for Microna Division of Intel, Dave felt it was time to settle down.

He presently owns his own sports publishing business, "WHAT'S THE SCORE" which specializes in statistical forms and scorebooks for baseball, basketball, and softball. He decided on this business after 16 years of managing Little League and High School baseball as a sideline to his electronics career. He also started pitching again in 1980 and makes many tournaments

each year.

Dave is married, and has 4 grown children. The NHPA is indeed fortunate to have him accept

these two very important positions.

In addition, because your President feels that the Historian should be a member of the Hall of Fame Committee, Dave was also appointed to that position.

ASK SUSIE! BY GLEN PORTT

The place? The Pitchin' Palace, Sturdevant, Wisconsin, the site of the Canadian-American International FRIENDSHIP OPEN. This is an oasis where a person can just sit around, talk to friends, have a drink, relax, and listen to horseshoe talk going on all around. That's what I was doing on Jan. 12, 1985.

As the talk flowed and ebbed around me, I became aware of a certain repetition of words. I kept

hearing, "Ask Susie." My curiousity finally impelled me to ask, "Who's Susie?"

"Who's Susie? Why, Susie Pritzlaff, of course. She's the one who designed our Wisconsin Hall of Fame plaques, typed up all the data on each person elected to our Hall, put together 3 complete volumes of statistics, records, and history of Wisconsin horseshoe pitching, and does just about everything for everybody. Who's Susie? Ask anyone."

"Want to know who the Wisconsin State Champion was in 1968?" "Ask Susie!" "Want to know the name of the junior who pitched a perfect 50 shoe game at the Priemsberger Arena...and the

year?" "Ask Susie!"

Digging a little further, I found that Susie, Ron, and their 4 sons have played a prominent part in Wisconsin horseshoe history and are undoubtedly one of Wisconsin's premier horseshoe pitching families. It all started back in 1925 with Susie's father, Ed Wing, an avid pitcher. His love for the game throughout the years inspired him to build courts behind his Lone Star Tavern in Germantown in 1972 and to organize the Goldendale Horseshoe Club, a club which has been active since that date. In 1978, Ed was elected to the Wisconsin Horseshoe Pitcher's Hall of Fame.

Of the six Pritzlaffs, Rick, Bret, and Ron remain as active pitchers with Susie extremely busy in the administrative end of the game. Three of the four sons have won the Wisconsin Junior State Championship, with Bret winning it 6 times plus finishing second in the 1984 W.T. with an

outstanding 78% ringer average.

So, if you're traveling in Wisconsin, or just sitting at the bar of the Pitchin' Palace pitching talk...and you want to know anything at all about Wisconsin horseshoe pitching...ask Susie!

When I was asked by several people to run for the Presidency in 1983, I said that if elected, I would take it for two years. My position on this matter has not changed.

NHPA HALL OF FAME REQUIREMENTS

All resumes and histories of candidates for the NHPA Hall of Fame, must be received by me no later than APRIL 30 to be considered for the election. Please send 15 copies to: Ruth Hangen, 630 Heim Road, Getzville, New York 14068.

Following are the guidelines that the Hall of Fame Committee will use in their selection of the candidates.

GUIDELINES FOR NHPA HALL OF FAME VOTING

PLAYER CATEGORY: Those who with distinguished, outstanding performance on the courts have brought prestige to the art of horseshoe pitching.

HALL OF FAME — (Continued)

QUALIFICATIONS: NHPA Titles won: National, State, Regional etc.

Consistently one of the top finishers in the World Tournament.

Consistent high ringer percentage.

Demonstrating ability on T.V. or other exhibitions.

ORGANIZER CATEGORY: Those who have made significant and beneficial contributions to the game in an administrative capacity, such as a promoter, an organizer or an officer in the NHPA.

QUALIFICATIONS: Offices held; Club, State, National.
Promotion of the sport in game and tournament.

GUIDING PLAYERS: Especially the younger players.

Devoting a great amount of time to organizing and helping.

Support of the NHPA.

Traveling to promote and organize.

Sportsmanship.

Personality — ability to attract new members and generate interest in pitching.

PLAYER-ORGANIZER CATEGORY: This is a combination of a good player and a worthy, conscientious administrator, organizer, or an officer in the NHPA. One that through his devotion to the game has contributed time and effort to the advancement of the sport of horseshoe pitching.

QUALIFICATIONS: One who has excelled in both categories.

Ten (10) years minimum membership in an adult division of the NHPA required in all categories.

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DARKE COUNTY OHIO CLUB MAKES EARLY PLANS FOR 1985

Horseshoe pitchers who have looked to the GREENVILLE RINGER CLASSIC as the outstanding attraction in the yearly competitive activities of the sport will find the 1985 CLASSIC a banner event.

Since this year marks the 25th consecutive staging of the RINGER CLASSIC at Greenville City Park, the Darke County Horseshoe Club is planning to make the Silver Anniversary event more

prestigious than ever with the prize monies exceeding \$5,000 for the first time.

Top prize money for the Men's Champion will be \$750, and Women's Champion \$250. 6 person adult class winners will receive \$25. The Classic will be a four day event commencing with a full day of competition on Thursday, July 4th and continuing through Sunday, July 7th, when the Men's Champion will be determined.

The Women's Champion and Junior Boy's and Girl's Champions will be determined earlier in

the weekend.

Among special activities being planned will be recognition of the past 24 Tournament Champions and developers of the event.

SANCTIONED CLUB/LEAGUE NATIONAL PROGRAM

Since November of 1983, I have been your League Coordinator. How I have done must be left to you, but the effort and work that was put into this program in the last 15 months was left to me. I have worked very hard to do things I felt were needed to give the program new life, I have pushed and received full cooperation from Donnie Roberts, our secretary, and a pretty good go-getter himself.

I must state that very few can come close to contemplating the magnitude of organization, work load and effort involved in maintaining this program, even though my aim as director is to make the membership in this program larger than that of the National tournament program.

The only viable way for the NHPA as an association to grow now is with the picnic pitchers, with reaching those who have the idea NHPA means Pro. or unattainable.

To those who do not believe this as fact, I invite you here to answer my phone and talk to people I talk to, to see people's faces when you state if they can throw a shoe they can be a part of the NHPA.

Every single person who enjoys pitching iron can and should be a part of the NHPA, and there should be and now is a program for them. This idea must be sold and promoted on a state to state basis, and the promotion of this program is the way to do it.

The following changes have been made to the program to promote in just that way.

The program title is now "NHPA Sanctioned Club or League Program." The "and State" has been dropped from the title as it was misleading, since it is a national sanction program totally run and funded by the National Association. All titles will now include states as affiliated with the program, since as NHPA state charters they are.

My title is now, "NHPA Sanctioned Club National Director," since that is what I am. I in no way, nor did Russ, coordinate leagues. I sanction, and promote the sanctioning of clubs. I direct them and help in any way they need me. I have designed and now wear a patch that bears our national logo, the bars of our national tournament patches, and my office title.

All sanctions and sanction numbers are now permanent, with awards sent on an annual basis. Only a club, by its own decision, or the NHPA, may revoke this sanction. We've got the best sanction program of any sport in the world, and we should tell people about it.

Also, new to the program are new patch award designs, verification sent to clubs and leagues

on all ringer awards, all new forms bearing the NHPA logo, patches for all Top Ten members making the listing, certificates of verification, new buckles for most improved and new women's most improved awards, new sanction certificates, new sanctioned club cards, plus yearly reports to all clubs and state associations on the program and the National Top Ten program.

I have just finished and sent to Donnie a draft for a new NHPA program for our junior pitchers, based on scholastic averages, which I call the "NHPA Junior Scholar Pitcher Program." The basis of this program, if approved, will be on participation and promotion by all state charter

associations and sanctioned clubs or leagues.

I am now starting to draft a booklet, giving full information on how to start a club, create leagues, write a constitution, by-laws and playing rules, the building of official courts, club fund raising, and ideas on how to get community involvement. This booklet will be a first step in the NHPA helping to create clubs with the object of sanctioning them.

As you will note, I feel the NHPA as a National Association should be promoting the game of horseshoes at all levels and in all areas, creating and making it hard for people not to want to be

NHPA.

It is, also, the conclusion of both Donnie and myself that many within the NHPA do not read material available to them. All state association officers, NHPA Officers and Office Holders should know the total NHPA program. The responsibility of all NHPA members should be and must be the total promotion of the NHPA. We have to realize that people are not going to just "come to us." We have to go get them and give them good reasons to get involved."

I just today received a letter from the North Carolina HPA wanting information on the club program. This state does not have a sanctioned club as yet, Information sent out by this office

created an interest, and so far this year I have 5 brand new clubs.

I, also, want all to realize that to have a Sanctioned NHPA Club, you must hold a club certificate of sanction, holding the NHPA seal, and signed by the President, Secretary and myself. If you do not have this certificate, YOU ARE NOT A SANCTIONED CLUB OF THE NATIONAL HORSESHOE PITCHERS ASSOCIATION. No state charter association has the autority to award or state the fact that a club is nationally sanctioned under the NHPA. National Tournament sanctions and state tournament sanctions have nothing to do with a club sanction, nor do they in any way sanction a club.

Thanks for a great response in 1984, now let's work like crazy in 1985.

THE CANADIAN-AMERICAN FRIENDSHIP OPEN STORY

This was a first for the Pitchin' Palace. Ten teams pitched for the green...with Minnesota edging out Indiana in the final game. The format? Each 4 man team pitched each of the other 4 man teams. A team could win 4 games each time or a maximum of 36 games by defeating all opponents every game. The top three teams then had a ladder playoff. lowa's Red Henton, Harold Darnold, R. Burgess and L. Grant fell to Indiana's Leroy Rowe, Clarence Bellman, J. Mills, and C. Grothe. Indiana then had to play Minnesota's very tough team of Dale Lipovsky, Phyllis Negaard, Dave Hughes and Sandy Karasch. This team had rung up two 86% games by Negaard, three 84% games by Lipovsky, one 84% game by Hughes and one by Sandy. The prospect for the Indiana team did not look promising. It wasn't. Minnesota rang up the most points, three of the four games and the green.

A new twist was introduced in the playoff games which were 50 shoe count-all with total team points determining the winner. If a player threw a double on his last throw, he could throw again. If he threw another double, he could throw again. (Similar to striking out in bowling). Thus a player could pick up an additional 12 points and win the game after being beaten at the end of 50 shoes. Although it didn't happen, a team could win 3 of the 4 games and be leading by 10 points, yet lose

the match by an opponent 'pitching out' for 12 points at the end.

Bob Fanjoy's (Hamilton, Ont.) plans for bringing a top notch team of Elmer Hohl and company fell through but he put together a team of Bob Lamb, G. Tait, O. Tait, and K. DeMerchant. Although badly outclassed, these Canadians showed true sportsmanship...no complaints...just great fellowship.

Top pitchers? Phyllis Negaard, 79.1%; Dale Lipovsky, 78.0.

Will this event be held again? Definitely. Tom Roanhouse, genial host of the 'Palace,' plans on making the next one bigger and better. Get your state team together now. You'll have a good time and meet a great bunch of people.

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OFFICIAL SCORE CALLING METHOD

In my trips around the country, I have become aware of the various methods of calling the score in our great sport. I have also found that many people were not cognizant that *there is an official way*. For those who have a rule book dating 1982 or later, the official way of calling scores is shown under the By-Laws, Art IV, rule 14, sec d.

For those who don't here they are:

No score 4 shoes 1 point

1 ringer 1 ringer, 1 point

2 points

1 ringer, 1 point 2 ringers, 6 points 1 ringer each, no score 1 ringer each, 1 point 3 ringers, 3 points

2 ringers each, no score

Called as no score Called as one point Called as two points

Called as one ringer, 3 points Called as one ringer, 4 points Called as two ringers, 6 points


Called as one ringer each, no score Called as one ringer each, one point Called as three ringers, three points. Called as two ringers each, no score.

In each instance, the player calling the score must call his name and must be the one scoring. In a no score situation, the player pitching last shall be the one to call the score. (end of rule). Many feel that the above can be improved upon...that the call '4 dead' will never go away, etc.

However, at the present time, this is the official way. Everyone is asked to abide by the official method...which is the one required at the W.T.

SOL BERMAN COMMENTS ON W.T. DELEGATES

Our system of delegates needs re-evaluation. When I attended the 1950 World Tournament, Byron Jaskulek, the Editor of the Horseshoe Pitcher and I were the only delegates from the entire east coast from Maine to Florida (taxation without representation).

The states are at least getting better representation at present as a rule, but at the 1979 tournament, lowa was entitled to eleven delegates but only had three. AT the 1983 tournament all the NY delegates were from upstate NY. The New York City area wasn't represented.

At the 1984 Convention NJ with two members on the executive council only seated one

delegate and he left before the election of officers.

Many of the constitution and by-law changes were not voted upon at the 1984 convention because many of the delegates were not familiar with the proposed changes. A large percentage probably hadn't read the changes before coming to the convention.

I also found many of the delegates at the 1984 convention hadn't heard about the Wheaties

Contest and many didn't know who was running for office.

Delegates should be required to get the Digest so that they know what's going on, so that they can vote intelligently and not rely on their state's chief delegate to tell them how to vote.

As a U.S. Citizen I get to vote for President, as an NHPA member I only get to vote for the NHPA

President if I'm a delegate.

I think that all the constitution and by-law changes should be voted upon at State meetings. I also think every NHPA member is entitled to vote for the national offices.

If we're to have a viable organization we need more than a handful of members interested in the NHPA's future.

NHPA DRESS CODE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Council approved the following Dress Code based upon the Dress Code's Committee's recommendations. It is presently published **as a guide**. Every NHPA member is requested to comply.

Horseshoe pitching is an individual sport and therefore each person's dress need not be standardized. At the same time a person's dress should lend to all participants enjoyment of the game and should not be objectionable to anyone taking part or to any watching.

All clothing should be neat and clean.

Men's shirts should have sleeves. NO tank tops.

Women should not wear halters or bare midriff type clothing.

Shorts may be worn, but should not be short shorts.

Pitcher's name and state should be on back of shirt or blouse in neat fashion. (Last name a must but think first name is nice, too.)

No cut-off shorts or trousers.

Shoes must be worn.

NEW FACES BREAK WHEATIES TRADITION

The prominent sports figures who have graced Wheaties cereal boxes for decades are being replaced by relative no-names such as orienteering champion Peter Gagarin.

Gagarin, a five-time U.S. open national orienteering champion, and five other amatuer athletes later this year will replace the likes of Olympic stars Mary Lou Retton and Bob Richards on covers of the 61-year-old cereal.

The new cover personalities were nominated by cereal eaters and selected from a field of the top 50 vote-getters.

"It deviates from Wheaties' years-long tradition of recognizing well-known athletes. It gives a chance for the little-known amateur athlete to be recognized," said the contest's coordinator, Mary E. Tickle, of General Mills Inc., which manufactures Wheaties.

Ms. Tickle acknowledged that the bearded, 40-year-old Gagarin marks a change in the types of athletes who have appeared on the cereal boxes since 1933.

She said each member of the new group will appear on 3 million boxes.

The St. Louis-based U.S. Orienteering Federation sponsored Gagarin in the contest in order to

gain publicity for the sport, in which competitors run over rough terrain, using maps and compasses to find their way past checkpoints along a specially designed route.



Above: Player #1 won 3 games in game #1 because his 158 beat the other 3 scores. In game #2, his 132 beat 2 players; in game #3, his 145 beat one. Therefore, he won overall a total of 6 games.

If 2,000 had entered, the 158 score would have been compared with 1999 others.

Ties: If 50 tie for first place, those 50 scores will be re-run thru the computer the same way to determine the final winners. In above example, player #2 won 2 games against #1. Therefore #2 is the winner.

4. Sanctioned League Players.

A. Use league point average converted to 50 shoe point average. (If league pitches 40 shoe games and your average is 80 points, then your 50 shoe average is 100. If 20 shoe games and your league average is 13 points, your 50 shoe average would be 33.)

B. Use 90% handicap table in Sanctioned League book. Example: If point average is 60,

you would receive 81 points handicap per game.

C. Players with a well-established league average must use it but it cannot be lower than the previous year's. If so, use previous year's.

D. New players. League officers will determine average to be used. As this average must be fair to all their other league members, average should be a fair one. Otherwise, they could be hurting their own selves, or the other league members.

E. Each Sanctioned League club should have a special 'Mail-in' tournament night or nights. All entries pitch at one time. An NHPA member must score each game and certify scores as

correct. Club secretary will audit and retain all score sheets.

Tournament manager may return any score for review when there appears to be a discrepancy in handicap usage.

7. NHPA non-league members

A. To enter, a player must have a 'well known' average and have that average certified by his/her state secretary club secretary. Known State averages should be used where possible. Players with a well established '85 average must use it but it cannot be lower than the previous year's. If so, use previous year's.

B. Each state, in its state schedule, should schedule one or 'Mail-in' Handicap tournaments under rules in paragraph 1 in order to give their members a chance to enter the Na-

tional 'Mail-in' Tournament. Official scorers must be used.

C. Tournament manager will convert ringer percentages into point averages by using chart below. Example: 50% ringers equal 88 point average. Using the Sanctioned League book 90% handicap chart, an 88 point average gives the player a handicap of 56 points per game. Audit all score sheets and retain them.

D. Report same as par. 5 above. Deadline in par. 2.

 All entries must pitchin some type of club or tournament function under strict supervision of club officers, state secretaries, or tournament managers. No other type scores will be accepted.

9. Prize money. The amount depends upon you. No one, not even our very best pitchers, have had a chance to win any real money. Right here, we can 'help ourselves.' Any NHPA member can win a possible \$2,000. Several others, \$1,000; several others, \$500; and so on down the line... IF we can get 2,000 members out of 10,000 to enter. Winning Junior pitchers, if any, will be awarded scholarships in the amount won.




