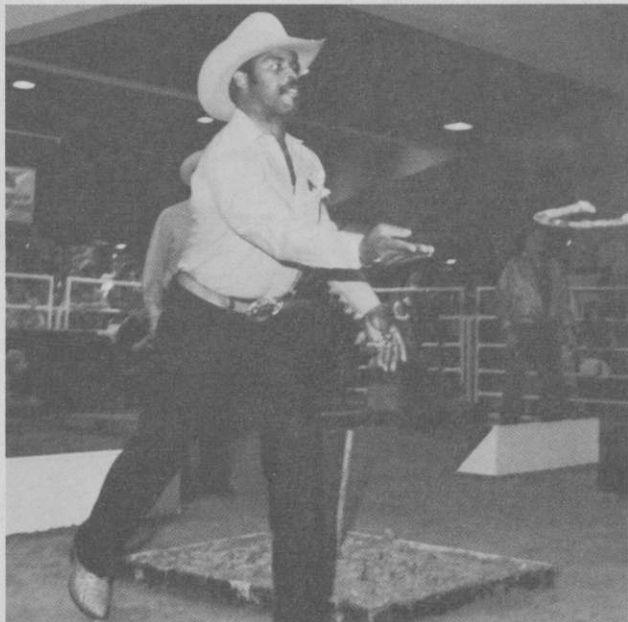




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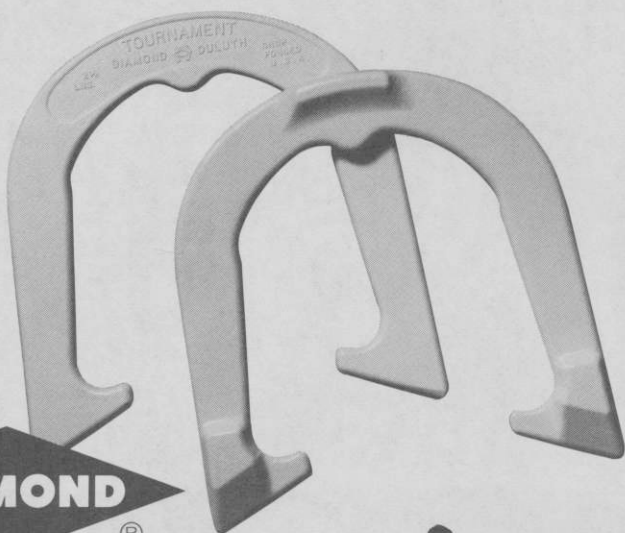

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT — GLEN A. PORTT

In these times, with lawsuits the 'order of the day,' and where a person could lose everything he or she owns, *other NHPA State Associations might do well to take this step.*

With Statistician Billie Sue Pennington, a computer whiz, leading the way, 1985 saw the NCHPA institute its project of computerizing all 'stats'...thus joining Colorado, Minnesota and others in our computer world.

On March 23rd and 24th, the San Jose Club had tournaments honoring Vincent Mauricio, a member of N. California's Horseshoe Hall of Fame, and, the legendary Don Titcomb, an NHPA Hall of Fame members. This is a fine way for every state every year to recognize one or more of those 'who make it.'

During this visit I attended 3 conferences with various civic officials to discuss the aspects and possibility of hosting the 1987 W.T. One thing I learned was that within Don Titcomb there is an inherent skill for promotion. *He is a promoter, 'par excellence.'* At one conference, after just a few words, the President of large corporation spoke up and said, "Look, Don, you don't have to say anymore. I think you could charm the skin right off a snake. I'll pledge \$1,000 to start." So, to Don Titcomb, who gives over 100 exhibitions every year, who continually works on promoting our sport, thanks from this president and a grateful NHPA.

In closing, my sincere appreciation to San Jose's club president, Si Sauer...to Bill and Paula Carns...and to the many others for the wonderful hospitality and friendship shown me, and to Verdan Zelmar, the NCHPA's dynamic and progressive leader, a salute for doing a great job.

LAFAYETTE, INDIANA WINS BID FOR 1985 WORLD TOURN.

The Lafayette, Indiana Club won the bid to hold the 1985 World Tournament. Four bids were received. Each one was reviewed individually by each Council member. Items considered were the dollar amount of bid, the availability of motels in a reasonable proximity, RV hook-ups, price of both tourist attractions, good restaurants, pitching courts presently available or to be built, support promised by local authorities and many other miscellaneous items.

Bids were received from LaFayette, Indiana; Wau Claire, Wisconsin; The Pitchin' Palace, Sturtevant, Wisconsin and Hamilton, Ontario, Canada.

After reviewing each bid closely, Council members phoned their vote to NHPA President Glen Portt. Each Council member was on his own. There was no attempt to influence anyone's voting, one way or another.

President Portt expressed the thanks of the Council and the entire NHPA to those cities who worked so hard to come up with a bid when it was so badly needed. *They were there when we needed them.*

President Portt also expressed the hope that each of the cities would re-group and go for the 1987 W.T. or one of the Big 3 the NHPA is trying to get on the board. The U.S. Open. . . the U.S. Eastern Open or the U.S. Western Open. The Council suggested \$7500 for the U.S. Open and \$5000 for the other two. However, any bid will be considered. The Council has already voted to support these three by adding additional money for two wins in a row, etc., as an incentive. What city will be the FIRST?

Constitution and By-Laws changes to be voted on at the 1985 N.H.P.H. Convention

Several proposed changes were submitted to the Executive Council and Constitution and By-Laws Committee for consideration to be presented to the 1985 convention delegates. Six yes votes were required for a proposal to be placed on the convention agenda.

The following items will be voted on at the 1985 N.H.P.A. Convention.

1. Proposed by Donnie Roberts of Ohio.

Page 4, Section 9 — Third Vice-President, Fourth Vice-President and Fifth Vice-President. At least one. . . Delete Chairman of Regional Directors.

Page 5, Section 10 — Secretary-Treasurer, Five Vice-Presidents. . . Delete Four.

Page 6, Section 13 — Add the Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Vice-Presidents. . . appoint a new fifth.

Page 7, Section 6 — Turn over to Page 8, the 4th paragraph — The duties of the Fifth Vice-President are as. . . Delete Chairman of the Regional Directors and delete the entire last sentence of that paragraph as it no longer applies if this passes.

Page 8, Section 9 — The N.H.P.A. First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth. . . delete Chairman of the Regional Directors.

Add to Section 4, Page 7 — The Fifth Vice-President shall be in charge of the Regional Director Program.

For: Winston, Roberts, Thomas, Standard, White, Seibold, Portt.

Opposed: Chapelle, Yannetti and Nick.

2. Proposed by Ruth Hagen of New York.
Page 6, Section 15 — The President with the approval of the Executive Council shall have the power to dissolve the existing committee and approve a new committee.
 Any committeeman may be removed from office by the **President with the approval of the Executive Council.**
 For: Chapelle, White, Seibold, Winston, Yannetti, Roberts, Thomas, Nick.
 Opposed: Portt and Standard.
3. Proposed by Glen Portt of Georgia.
Article IV, Section 1, Page 10 — Add new paragraph. It is mandatory that all N.H.P.A. Council members, committee members, the Assistant Regional Director Chairman, Regional Directors, Assistant Regional Directors, Officers of State Organizations and officers of individual charters be members of the N.H.P.A.
 For: Roberts, Portt, Standard, White, Thomas, Winston, Chapelle, Nick, Seibold.

4. Proposed by Claude White of New Jersey.
Article III, Judiciary, Section 13 — The Regional Director Chairman shall receive an expense allowance of \$150.00. The Assistant Regional Director Chairman, \$125.00, and Regional Directors, \$100.00 annually to help compensate them for personal expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

Page 23, Rule 15, Section C — A player having both shoes within six inches of the stake and closer to the stake than both opponents shoes with no ringers, scores 2 points.
Page 23, Rule 15, Section D — A player having (1) one ringer against opponents no ringers while opponent has either a shoe closer to the stake than the player's missed shoe or the missed shoe is more than six inches from the stake scores 3 points.
Page 23, Rule 15, Section E — A player having one (1) ringer and shoe within six inches of the stake which is closer to the stake than both of the opponents non-ringer shoes, scores 4 points.
Page 23, Rule 15, Section F — A players two (2) ringers against opponents two (2) non-ringers, scores 6 points.
Page 24, Rule 16, Section D — The player having the first pitch at a designated inning shall pitch two shoes in succession before the other player pitches two shoes.
Page 24, Rule 16, Section E — The player scoring points shall pitch first in the next inning. In case of no score, the player who pitched last shall pitch first for the next inning.

 Opposed: Portt, Standard and Yannetti.
Item 4 — Addition — The designated National tournament average shall be the last three sanctioned tournaments played and the highest sanctioned tournament in the last 12 months averaged together.

 Opposed: Portt, Standard and Yannetti.

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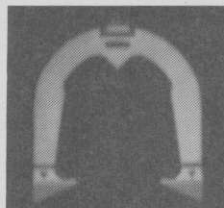
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DAVE'S COURT REPORT

Most of us who follow tournament results in the News Digest become familiar with the names of the top men and women pitchers in the country. While many pitch in the World Tournament, there are always several top pitchers who are unable to do so for one reason or another. Since various States use different methods to determine a pitcher's percentage, there exists no standard guide for establishment of a yearly ranking of the top pitchers. I therefore thought it would be interesting if such a ranking could be determined.

Unfortunately, due to space limitations, most tournament results posted in the News Digest list only the games won, lost and percentage by individual. There is no indication of ringers or shoes pitched. How then could a ranking be established in which everyone was judged in the same manner? Certainly, there could be no absolute without knowing exact ringers and shoes pitched. Since this information was not available, I set out to find a formula that would be more accurate than merely adding percentages and dividing by tournaments pitched. Fortunately, I found a fairly accurate determination could be made by the following method.

I took the total games pitched by an individual in a tournament and multiplied that number by the percentage averaged for the tournament. Doing this for each 1984 tournament where the Digest listed the pitchers games and percentage, I then added all the totals for that individual and divided the grand total by the sum of all the games they pitched. The result is an average percentage ranking for the top pitchers for all 1984 tournament games the News Digest published thru March 1985. To double check the accuracy of this system, I made many comparisons to tournaments where ringers and shoes pitched were known. The difference was generally less than 0.5% which I consider accurate enough for the following list which ranks men above 70% and women above 65%.

IF AT FIRST YOU DON'T SUCCEED

This has been the motto of Jim Knisley. He has had full faith in it as his guiding principle in horseshoe pitching since age 16. It has paid off at last in his achieving the World Championship at Huntsville, Alabama in 1984.

"I like the challenge of the game," he said, even as a teenager back in 1958, and he's kept at it ever since. He played then, for his first experience in the game, with shop mechanics on noon-hour recess behind the Bremen Chevrolet garage in Bremen, Ohio. This experience fascinated him so much that he went back day after day to pitch along after others had returned to work.

Those amateur pitchers had no desire to instruct this lad, Jim, if at all they had the capability to do it. So, he studied the handbook that came with his new Diamond shoes, and with increasing enthusiasm learned rudimentary rules of the game (self-taught, you might say).

Increasing confidence in his progress brought him to return day after day to pitch by himself on those, the only set of stakes around. He learned the 1¼ turn, the hold that became his favorite, most effectively controlled shoe. For best results today he holds the shoe with a full hand bringing fingers tightly along the blade of the shoe and locking the last finger in the hook slot. After three years of conscientious practice he began to throw ringers with confidence. He then joined a league in Columbus, 40 miles away.

His ability to make ringers prompted him to start tournament play late in 1961. From then on he has been going steadily to tournaments and, at that time he joined the N.H.P.A. and subscribed to the Digest.

Loren Crooks, a 70-75 percent pitcher from East Fullerham, Ohio, impressed young Jim with the competitive desire to strive for higher goals. He was by then pitching in 20 to 30 tournaments a year. Each year he got better and better, to the envy of those who weren't progressing, and bringing surprise to those who pitched against him. Surprise, because older opponents were pleased to see a young, new pitcher working his way up to the top division.

In top division he is today with an 80 percent ringer average in over 200 tournaments. More than 300 trophies attest to his consistent proficiency in throwing ringers. Most of the trophies have been given away, he said.

After just ten years of pitching he earned, in 1968, second place in the World Tournament and second in '79 and '83. Third was the best he could do in '81. In the meantime he was Ohio State Champion eight times (87.7% seven-game average, '82) and came in second seven times.

Think of the old adage "If at first you don't succeed, try and try again!" This, Jim has done with determination and true success came his way with the 1984 World Championship trophy—why shouldn't one have that honor when he pitches so many games in the high 80's?

Jim is one of the most consistent top pitchers. Twice he has thrown 71 ringers in 72 shoes, and high achievement was apparent for both pitchers when he and Ron Simmons, California State Champion, had 14 straight 4 deads in a game a few years back. Jim's most ringers in a row were 56; one could go on and on, his opponents all know this too well—they saw him throw 48 ringers in a 50 shoe game against the 1982 World Champion.

Jim's two idols are Curt Day and Harold Reno from whom he attributes much of his success through pitching against them and studying their flawless forms. "Some of their pitching technique has rubbed off on me," he quips.

"I feel my attitude in playing has been a plus factor; I have never lost my temper, even if I did lose a game. I never put too much pressure on winning or else——." By "or else" he means he could lose his concentration, his balance and hence, his accuracy.

Jim thrives best in hot weather and hot competition, and like most pitchers, wind bothers his high shoe, but unlike many, however, he has learned to throw a lower shoe in wind with practical-

ly equal success.

Horseshoe pitchers (men and women) come in all shapes and dispositions and from most any walk in life: There are doctors, lawyers, musicians, Boeing 747 pilots, foresters, ranchers, farmers, factory workers, home makers (women), etc. etc. Jim falls into one of these categories having been employed as a layout man for sixteen years at the Mirror Installation Company. He owned and operated a pool room for ten years and now in his part time, services pool tables. Jim is 41 years old, married and has a nine-year-old daughter.

A champion is a case of one man and one mind and one game. Jim had one desire and one qualification and one rising star of good fortune in his perseverance to try and try again, and that effort brought him the title "World Champion."

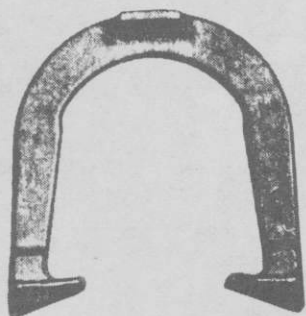

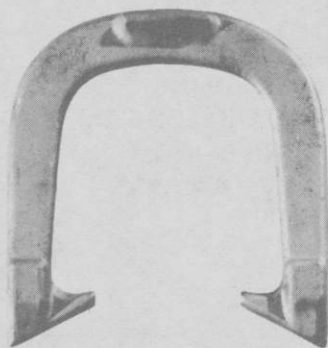

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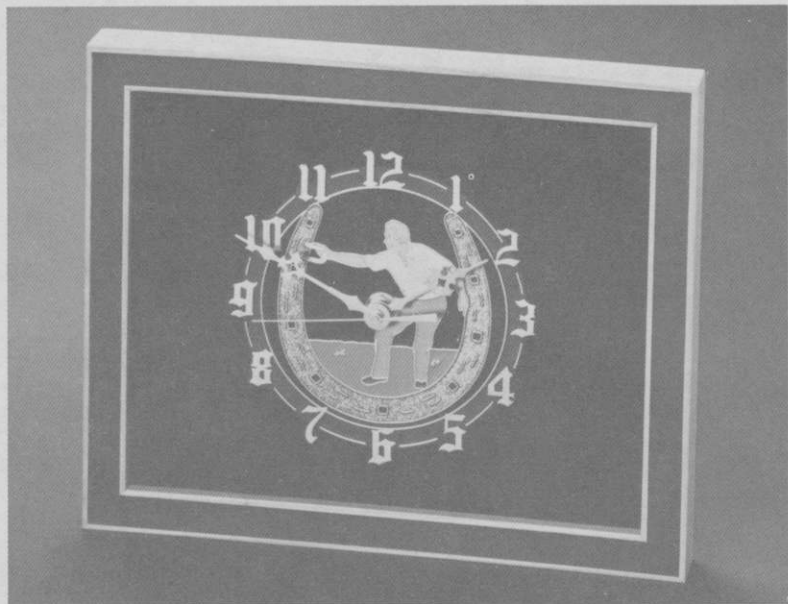

If you have wondered for some time, as I did, what the "Three Cheers" Brochure and the Schummer System being promoted by Glen "Red" Henton is about, wait no longer and call "Red" or write for the "Three Cheers" brochure.

The Schummer System will add as much to the sport of horseshoes as did the addition of caulks on the original horseshoe. What is so exciting about the Schummer System, I believe is the fact that the beginner or low ringer % player is shown how to improve his % to the 30% level quite quickly. This is done by moving a person as close to the stake as necessary to be quite successful and then gradually moving back to the full distance for your age and sex. If you obtain success at what you attempt, you will be quite likely to keep doing it (positive reinforcement as the psychologists say.)

Portable clay courts and a unique scoreboard which are easily transported and allow play virtually anywhere, inside outside, are described. The brochure also describes some exciting new horseshoe games to be enjoyed by all. Also described are some good suggestions for improvement of horseshoe play and player conduct.

Participants at the 1984 S.D. State Tournament were quite impressed by all described by Glen "Red" Henton who was our guest during the weekend. I believe you will be impressed, too.

I read with amusement the recent article on score calling by Stuart Snyder. I have been pitching horseshoes for sixty-seven years, forced to keep score countless times for lack of experienced scorekeepers or otherwise. There were always people willing to keep score but didn't know how. Have had to keep score many times for two or three courts, and having the score called out by four or six players at the same time. Would have been happy to have called out by the score calling method on page twenty-two of the official rule book. If every player would call that way, anyone that had never seen a horseshoe would be able to keep score.

Does Mr. Snyder know that we have indoor courts for quite a few years in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois and Ohio in the midwest, also back East there were Ed Domey's fine indoor courts in Sutton, Massachusetts which had to close after twelve years. Also Leo and Helen Ouellette's indoor courts in the National Guard Army at Brooklyn, N.Y. They have about six big tournaments every winter, have players from Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Jersey and New York.

In my opinion the score calling method on page twenty-two of the rule book would cause less errors and speed up the game without delaying it.
