#### FROM YOUR PRESIDENT ... DAVE LOUCKS

Just over one year ago, shortly after taking office, I used this publication to mention some of my ideas on how we might improve Communication. One of those thoughts was a newsletter that would be sent to State Officers but, primarily, directed to Charter Presidents. The time and opportunity to initiate such a newsletter is now at hand.

Webster defines communication as "a process by which information is exchanged between individuals." That statement very well says what I want the newsletter to accomplish. However, pay particular attention to the key word, "exchanged." The newsletter, to be successful, has to be a two-way street of communication. It will not become the intended forum for communication unless you, the Charter Officers read and, from time to time, contribute your comments and ideas to the newsletter.

Initially, the plan is to publish about 6 times annually. The actual frequency and content will for the most part, be dependent upon you, the Charter Officers. If you support and use the newsletter as it is intended, it can be a very valuable and informative tool for all State Charters and the NHPA. To get the first issue off the ground, I not only need your support, but your input as well. One of our first subjects is to be the discussion of a pitcher's average; how it is established and maintained. Many states arrive at a pitcher's average by a method not used by a neighboring charter. The NHPA hopes to change this by starting a centralized Stat Center where all NHPA Members will have their average established and maintained in one format common to all Charters.

I have now given all Charter Officers a subject on which to reply. This is a test case and the reply of all Charters is important to determine the extent of your interest and support for the Newsletter. By December 30th, please send to me, as a minimum, your reply to the following: 1) the most recent name and address list of your current Charter officers and when they change; 2) How does your Charter determine a member's current average? 3) How do you think it should be established? 4) Would your charter support an NHPA central Stat Center and abide by averages that it published for interstate, regional or national tournaments? Charter Presidents, let me hear from your or your designee.

#### MINUTES OF THE 1986 NHPA CONVENTION

The 1986 Convention was called to order by NHPA President, Dave Loucks. The meeting was held in the Learning Center of the Ainsworth, Nebraska school buildings. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 a.m. Tuesday, July 28, 1986. 218 delegates were seated.

Visitors were seated in the back of the room with delegates seated in front by state and/or charter. A TV monitor was placed in the smoking area outside plus the entire convention was on cable TV throughout the area. This convention was recorded on cassette tape and video tape.

Barry Chapelle led the Pledge to the flag. NHPA member Marvin Burgess gave the

prayer.

President Loucks recognized our hosts. They were Al Hodge, Jean Brammer, and Larry Rice. Larry Rice addressed the delegates on behalf of Ainsworth.

Curt Bestul welcomed everyone to 12 Indoor courts in Eau Claire, Wisconsin for

the 1987 World Horseshoe Tournament.

MOTION by Wally Shipley, SECONDED by Phil Zozzaro that the minutes of the 1985 NHPA Convention be approved as written. MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION by George Nick, SECONDED by a seated delegate that the financial

report for fiscal 1986 be approved as presented, MOTION CARRIED.

RESOLUTION by Glen Portt that the NHPA Officers prepare a statement of purpose for the \$80,000 balance in the NHPA account be presented to the delegates at the 1987 Convention. President Loucks stated that said document would be provided.

President Loucks called for reports from the representatives of the divisions participating in World Tournament play.

1. Kevin Cone representing the men made the following statements:

a. Have white pegs and blackboards.

b. We want a chance to move up on the schedule.

c. Announce High Games and point out upcoming big games.

d. Too many games for Class B men.

e. 3, 4, or 5 to move into top 32 out of B.

f. Enforce all rules, not just a few.

g. One day of rest during Men's top class finals.

h. Old pitchers should not be played in the heat of the day.

i. Some pitchers are tired after turning courts.

Two members stood and spoke about wanting the opportunity to move up on the schedule. President Loucks explained the council decision to eliminate the move ups for the 1986 except the B champs.

2. Vicki Winston representing the women made the following statements:

a. Explained the Connecticut event for six top ladies.

b. Congratulated Lori Oberbillig on her good work.c. Requested help with turning courts in the heat.

d. Have a class for senior and intermediate women in 1987.

e. Pitch older pitchers early or late.

f. 8 is too many games in one day.

g. Expressed appreciation for increased lady prize money.

- 3. Steve Barnes representing the boys made the following statements:
- a. Indicated that the junior party was really great.
- b. Wants no locals at the junior party unless invited.

c. Wants trophies the same size as the men.

d. Wants a certificate showing scholarship money is coming.

e. Suggests shoveling the court you go to.

- f. Wants pre-lims for boys just like everyone else.
- 4. Georgia Henry representing the girls made the following statements:
- a. Wants pre-lims like other top classes.
- b. Wants same size trophies as the men.

#### MINUTES — (Continued)

President Loucks explained the trust for juniors and the lack of entries.

Publicity Chairman, Bob Champion, addressed the delegates going over the names of his committee members.

Ed Domey, NHPA Nation Buyer, addressed the delegates and called for NHPA members to buy all game related items from NHPA dealers. Please do not buy from others as the NHPA gets no benefit. Several national ads were mentioned plus a more visible NHPA in the form of a motor home to travel nationwide.

President Loucks discussed subjects. He pointed out that the world entry fee was up but so was the prize money. This was the first year for prize money in all classes. More pages and increased type size were mentioned as improvements in the Digest.

The trust fund for juniors was explained.

President Loucks explained a new voting format to the delegates. A ballot for each state chairman was explained with all seven Constitution and By-Laws changes listed on it. After the changes are presented and discussed the state chairman will tally the vote for his state and record the vote.

The Constitution and By-Laws proposed changes were presented to the delegates

with the following results:

 ARTICLE II, Section 3, Delegates...added the statement that the Charter spokesperson must be a current subscriber to the NHPA News Digest. The vote was 186 Yes, 32 No.

2. ARTICLE II, Section 4, Delegates... The Proxy Vote passed 178 to 40.

3. ARTICLE II, Section 7, Delegates...related to the Proxy Vote, each Charter will now be allowed to vote its maximum delegates providing it has a spokesperson in attendance. The vote was 201 Yes, 17 No.

4. ARTICLE VII, Section 17, Tournaments...all future bids for a World Tournament must be in the hands of the NHPA Secretary by the 15th of April. All bids will be published in the News Digest by the July issue. All bids must be for at least \$40,000 in cash and trophies. The vote was 165 Yes, 53 No.

 ARTICLE IX, Section 6, Compensation Allowance...The amount allowed Vice Presidents is increased to \$400 annually. The VP chairman of RD's and the Publicity Director are to receive a \$400 allowance. The NHPA President will

receive \$100 a month. The vote was 196 to 22.

 ARTICLE IX, Section 7, Publications...The 12 month subscription cost of the NHPA News Digest was raised to \$12.00 for non-members; \$11.00 for a member and \$10.00 for a household with 2 or more related adult members. The vote was 196 Yes, 22 No.

Although it received 144 votes in favor and 74 against, the proposal to separate the country into three regions and rotate the World Tournament failed by 2 votes.



#### MINUTES — (Continued)

Pleasanton, California won the 1988 World Tournament bid with a \$40,000 bid. Huntsville, Alabama bid \$30,000 and Sports Enterprises, Inc. bid \$75,000. The vote count was California 118, Ohio 87, and Alabama 3.

Walter Ray Williams expressed concern that we had no waiting list this year for late entries to replace drop-outs. He, also, expressed concern over the Deadeye Flip

Shoe which the officers had failed to approve.

Another delegate stood and spoke about the ability to move up. A Donnie Roberts statement about no limit to how far you can go if you pitch well enough was the source of his concern.

President Loucks asked for bids for Regional Tournaments. No interest was

shown

Barry Chapelle to a two year term as Second Vice-President, Bonnie Seibold to a two year term as Fourth Vice-President, and Donnie Roberts to a two year term as Secretary-Treasurer were the NHPA Offices up for election. All three candidates were elected unanimously and ran unopposed.

The meeting was adjourned by President Loucks.
