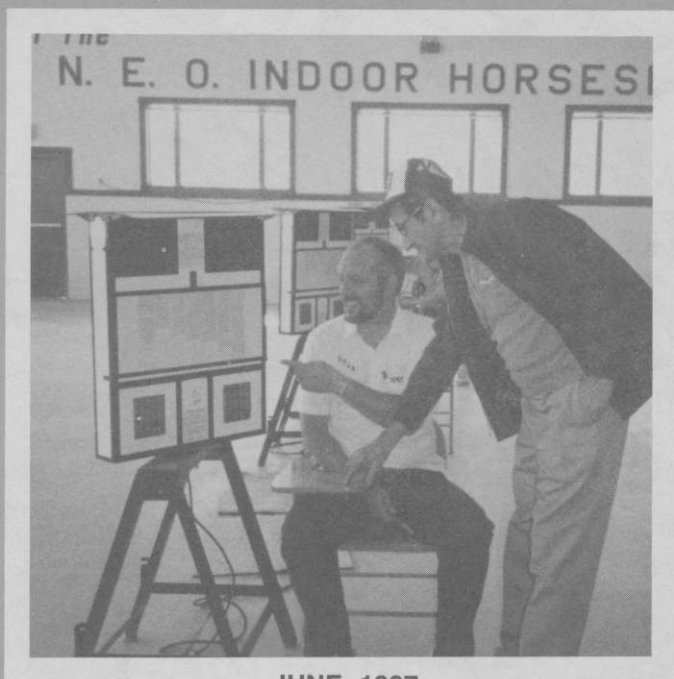

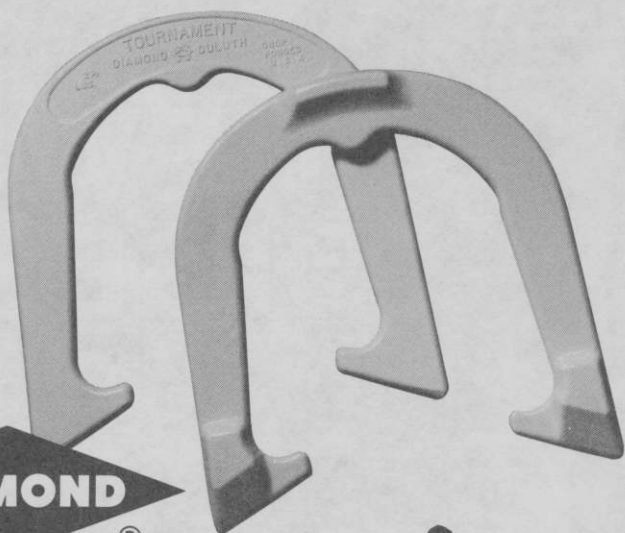

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT . . . DAVE LOUCKS

Over the last few months, several members have written me about an item that has from time to time, appeared in the Digest under the monthly financial report. This line item expenditure has been listed as "IRS". The purpose of this article is to explain that expense, how it came to be and what I have done about it.

The NHPA is filed with the Internal Revenue Service as an organization exempt from income tax. Our fiscal year ends March 31st and we have until the 15th day of the 5th month following or, August 15th, to file the appropriate tax form 990 with the IRS. Federal Law provides that failure to do so can be cause for a penalty of \$10 a day up to a maximum of \$5,000 for a tax year.

Timely filing of any tax form is important. Unfortunately, for the tax years 1981, 1982, 1983, and 1984, the IRS said our reports were not received on time. As a result, they began in late 1985 to assess us penalties and interest on these four tax years. By February 1987, the NHPA had paid the IRS more than \$13,500.

Shortly after becoming NHPA President in August 1985, I received word of the first penalty. I immediately began an investigation. It was only a short time later when the second penalty notice arrived followed by the third and fourth. By this time, I had selected a professional accounting firm as the NHPA Auditor and they proceeded to do our tax report for the year ending 3/31/86. The IRS has advised that this report was received nearly 2 months before the deadline.

Why, then, had the IRS taken several years to tell us their records showed our tax reports for prior years to be, in some cases, two years late? It did not make sense. It was difficult to determine with any degree of certainty where the problem had taken root. The NHPA Secretary/Treasurer during that time had two different Auditors to work with, both appointed from the membership. Their reports, which may or may not have always been timely, were in turn given over to a Small Business company that was providing assistance in the filing of the 990 Tax Forms. The filing dates on some of the forms did show us to be from a few weeks to several months late. But, nowhere near the time for which the IRS was assessing us penalties.

With the guidance of our Auditor, David D. Tobkin and his associates, we paid the penalties and began an appeal process through the Problem Resolution Office of the Internal Revenue Service. I am now very happy to advise the membership that we won our appeal and in April, the IRS refunded to us \$13,664.92.

RECOGNITION OF SANCTIONED CLUBS

MARK SEIBOLD—TOP GUN

This heading will immediately call for a lot of controversy as to who is "Top Gun" in Men's Class A of the World Horseshoe Tournament . . . and that is as it should be. So I will add to the heading in this way . . . "Mark Seibold—1986 Top Gun." Of that, there can be no doubt. With a 31-0 record and an 82.2% ringer average (2% above arch rival Walter Ray), there are few who can argue that Mark was not Top Gun for 1986.

But what about the last 5 years? Immediately, I hear voices asking, "Why just go back five? Why not 6 or 7, etc.?" Five is chosen as an arbitrary number because if a definite number is not taken, we could go back to the Ted Allen, the Fernando Isais, and the Elmer Hohl days. The last five years is a *fair* comparison because we have the players still competing . . . and in five years, each will have had his ups and downs.

With the help of Kevin Cone, our NHPA statistician who provided me with the '85 and '86 figures, I have come up with some interesting figures for competition in the W.T., which in my mind are the only stats which should count. I have taken only 4 players—Seibold, Williams, Knisley, and Steinfeldt. I have thrown in Carl even though he has pitched in only three of the last 5 years.

Many will argue that Carl should not be considered and perhaps he shouldn't be . . . because the projection could be quite inaccurate. However, as Steinfeldt is one of the greatest pitchers of all time (at least in my opinion), I have included him. Who else of our legends is pitching as good as ever at age 69?

As you can see from these figures, our top pitchers are so close, you could choose any one of them to win the '87 event. Williams, with 3 World Titles and impressive, mind boggling percentages of 85.7, 88.1, and 84.9 in winning them, could be considered the one to beat.

However, Seibold, with two W.T. titles won with 82.6 and 82.2%, has a good chance to repeat because when these two meet, *anything can happen*. No, I'm not forgetting Carl Steinfeldt, Jim Knisley, Kevin Cone, or Alvin Perry. All can pitch extremely good and any one of them could take it all. Jesse Gonzales? Yes . . . *if the breaks are right*. He is one of the greatest . . . year after year.

So . . . Top Gun for '87? Your choice! But don't bet a lot on any particular one.

PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGES —ATTENTION: 1987 DELEGATES—

Dear Mr. Cobb,

There is a small, but active faction of the NHPA membership that still believes that cancellation scoring prevents horseshoe pitching from becoming a popular, media sport and wish to do away with it. This belief persists in spite of the existing option for count-all tournaments and no one seems to wish to promote or pitch a count-all tournament.

Now they hope to *legislate* away cancellation as an option, so that count-all is all that is left. believe me, horseshoe pitching needs all the options open so competitors and promoters have a choice.

If an NHPA charter or the media wish to promote a special event with count-all scoring, the option now exists. There is no reason to change our By-laws on scoring systems.

To support my thesis as to why count-all is unpopular, I have listed facts below:

1. In count-all, most games are over in 20 innings or less. That is, the loser has no chance of catching the opponent in the next 10 shoes. Therefore 20 shoes will *not* have competitor or spectator interest. The winner can “throw-off”—a sandbaggers delight!

However, in cancellation there is no loser until the winner reaches 40 points. You always have the chance to come back and win!! As Yogi Berra said in baseeball, “You're not out 'til you're out!” You can win with a hot hand in horseshoes or the 9th inning in baseball!

2. There is no reason to rotate first-pitch. If you earn honors with a double, you should keep it. You can always get it back with a double. Rotation is a concession to mediocracy! Two 70-80% pitchers pretty well rotate anyway.
3. Two persons reporting scores to a third person will cause more confusion. It is a communication reality that there will be *more than* twice as many errors when the amount of information is doubled. There is already too many errors and time-consuming corrections in tournaments.
4. All existing scoring machines would be obsolete with count-all. They would need to be modified for 3-digit scores instead of two-digit.
5. Count-all horseshoes would reduce a highly competitive tournament game to a sterile, free-throw contest. We could all stay home and send our scores in on a post card.

In summary, let's keep the By-laws on scoring as they are. Media, if it ever exists, can choose the scoring method they want.

What we really need to make horseshoes a media sport is more spectators, not a rule change. More participants *will* make spectators—let's keep our game options open and flexible.

Vote *against* proposals 12 and 29 on pages 12 and 16 respectively in the April 1987 News Digest.

Dear Editor:

In regard to the proposal to "delete cancellation" I would like to say that I'm in favor of keeping the thrilling act of topping ringers to cancel your opponent's points. That's what made it the unusual game that it is. I'm a member of two horseshoe clubs and drive over 100 miles each week to pitch in a league. On weekends I average about 200 miles driving to other clubs. I am committed to 34 tournies in 1987 not counting other trips I'll take to get on a clay court which is about 200 miles away, at Hillsboro and Wichita.

One of our clubs tried "count-all handicap" for a season, but we dropped it for cancellation handicap. A man could come in off the street, throw 3 games, set a big handicap, and the next time out he is almost assured of "being a winner." I've seen these winners either so shocked or embarrassed that they don't come back for several tournies. I believe this act helps destroy the incentive to work hard and advance in class.

Our first tourney this year was April 5th, 90% of the participants were the original, trusted pitchers who drove 60 to 75 miles one way. I believe in placing a pitcher in his class, if he is out-played he will not complain and if he is diligent he can progress and raise in rank or class.

As for "T.V." the colorful bowling ball is easily seen as it rolls down the shining alleys and strikes the flying pins. In golf the science settings, the water, the big crowds on the hillsides, are nice to see. It is very hard to follow the flight of a horseshoe to the stake, so it may not be an easy game to portray to an unseen audience.

I feel that we need to build up our image to the public. I see people come on "T.V." promoting "cow chip throwing" contests and similar events, but seldom does anyone appear to support our game.

We all have it marked on our calendars, we can count on our close friends being there, and perhaps we know we are somewhat "misunderstood" so we just let it go at that. Our lack of being appreciated is not due to cancellation, but due to lack of advertising. We have the greatest outdoor family sport in existence, but we need to tell the world about it.

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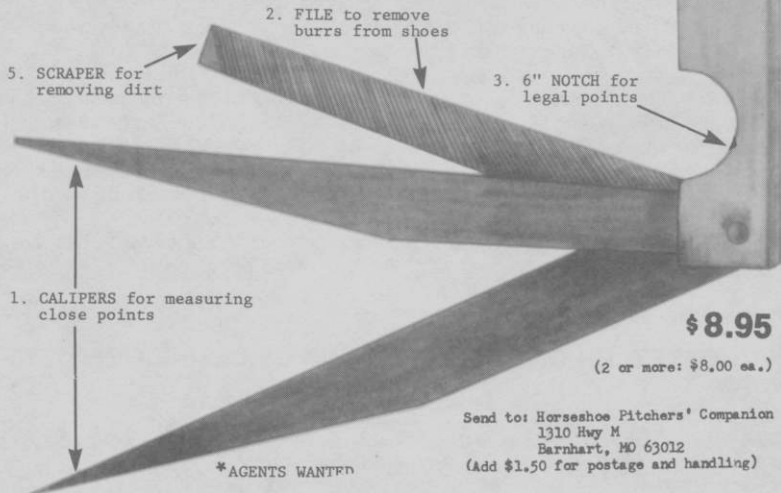

“STAR” PRECISION MADE HORSESHOES

In an effort to try and explain why a precision-made horseshoe is superior to others. I will first tell you that it takes 8 weeks to make a pair of Star Stainless Horseshoes. Every new shoe made requires a separate precision impression making it a very costly process.

Using stainless steel to make horseshoes is an idea that evolved from my work as a steel fabricator. I knew through experience that stainless is tougher than regular steel and when heat treated to dead soft, it reacts no different than regular steel when hitting the stake. This toughness also protects the shoe from burring up as much as mild steel, resulting in less filing. After two years of field testing Star Stainless Horseshoes I have found that they don't warp out of shape as soon as a mild steel horseshoe either.

Precision-made means that all aspects of each horseshoe are alike; not only that they weigh the same, but the overall thickness of each shoe is within a few thousandths of being the same. Also, the left side of each horseshoe is within a few thousandths of being like the right side in its design shape. No other horseshoe can claim this advantage except the “Star” because all other shoes require grinding by hand on every side to remove the rough flash edges. This means that with other shoes you can never be sure where the weight distribution is.

The level of competition today is so high that even the smallest improvement in equipment used will be a very large factor in your overall performance.

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YUCATAN ANGEL

As people grow older, they remember with extreme clarity many things that happened in days gone by . . . things they had not thought of in years. I guess I could say that I'm no different than others.

Something always triggers those memories. In my case, it was Ann Murray singing "Yucatan Cafe" . . . then Marty Robbins with "Adios Amigos." Scenes of long ago came flooding back. I was a 2nd Lt., young, unmarried, gung ho, and like most Lts. in those days, looking for worlds to conquer. We were on a navigation mission from the States to the Panama Canal Zone when we ran into a severe storm over the Gulf. Weather forecasting in those days was not the greatest and we had no radar which would have allowed us to pick our way through. (If you've never been in a plane in a real bad storm . . . don't)

Our plane came out of the storm still in one piece and flyable . . . but barely. The pilot asked the navigator (me) for a heading to the nearest place he could set the plane down. I didn't know where we were. (I wasn't lost. A navigator will never admit *that*. I *knew* we were somewhere over the Gulf of Mexico!) However, I acted as if I *did know* so gave him a heading of 180 degrees, figuring (and praying) that we'd hit the Yucatan Peninsula where I could pick up a pilotage point and pinpoint our location.

Luck (and the Good Lord) was with us and we set the plane down on a grass strip near the Mayan pyramid of Chichen Itza and the nearby small town of Sotuta . . . with dirt and cobblestone streets, cement-type buildings, a central well . . . and, a bar . . . Pedros! A heavy wooden door guarded the interior of Pefros from the stifling, humid heat of the day and on this door was a small horseshoe . . . one which Hall of Famer Lee Davis would no doubt have called a "mule" shoe. As we entered, a small man with a flashing smile, accented by a large gold tooth, welcomed us with a "Buenos dias, Senores!." Pointing proudly to the horseshoe, he said with a broad smile, "Muy suerta, Senores." (Good luck!). As we had no other place to go while waiting for parts to arrive from the States, we made Pedros our headquarters.

It happened the second day we were there. We were playing cards . . . just passing the time away. I looked up and *she* was there . . . standing barefooted just inside the door. She had the most beautiful brown eyes I had ever seen . . . her legs long and straight . . . her body well-proportioned . . . tapering down to a narrow waist.

Our crew of 5 was sitting at the table. She walked over and looked at each one. She didn't say a word . . . then came and sat down by *me*. I guess it was right then I started to fall in love with her. Pedro came by with his umpteenth round of drinks and said, "Isn't she beautiful, Senor? Her name is Angel. She was 18 years old yesterday."

I guess in a way you could kind of say she "took up" with me. For 3 days and nights we were together . . . particularly at night when we took long strolls in the moonlight and went swimming . . . sans clothing . . . au naturel . . . or, in other words . . . *nude!* Shocked? Don't be! (You were young once, remember?). And . . . as long as I've decided to tell you this story, I'm going to tell it *exactly as it was*. Angel would come out of the water, shake the water out of her hair, lay down beside me, put her head on my chest, and look at me with eyes full of love. But good things always come to an end. Our plane was ready. We had to go.

I wrote Pedro about a year later asking about her.

"She's dead," he replied. "*She died of old age.*"

Yes, that's right! My Yucatan Angel *did* die of old age . . . because, you see, she was a dog. I didn't forget to tell you *that*, did I?
