President's Message

There are some important items in this issue of *Newsline*. Several are to remind members of some significant changes now in effect due to the revision of NHPA Bylaws. Dates were changed for the submission of World Tournament bids and announcements of candidacy for NHPA Office. All member pitching averages shall be based on a revised formula. All tournament results are to be sent to the new NatStat Center in a revised and precise format. If the results of the tournaments you pitch in are not sent to NatStats and we therefore cannot substantiate your pitching average or tournaments played, you may be denied entry to NHPA run events, such as the World or Regional tournaments.

The Bylaws now contain specific language as to providing a pitching opportunity for 30' players in regular and state championship tournaments. Tournament directors will no longer be able to always exclude a certain segment of pitchers. A charter officer or tournament director will find it more difficult to ignore NHPA policy or playing rules. They may still try but those that deliberately violate or allow to be violated, any NHPA Bylaw or Official Playing Rule, will now face possible suspension from the NHPA.

All Charter officers must now subscribe to *Newsline*. If two officers live in the same household, one subscription is fine. The intent of this should be obvious. To make sure that as a minimum, the officials elected by association members to guide the NHPA affiliated Charter have no excuse for not staying informed of NHPA matters that would effect the general membership. Good communication is the coagulant that holds together the lifeblood of any successful organization.

Those of you who have come to know me or follow my articles in *Newsline* should by now realize that I am constantly seeking ways to bring improvement or change for the overall betterment of the NHPA. You may not always agree with me, and that is to be expected since we all have different points of view and opinions. However, with the support of my Executive Council and the majority of you, the NHPA has taken some major steps in recent years to bring exciting changes and improvements into being.

There are still challenges to confront; still many tough decisions to be made. As we grow in membership, so too do the association needs grow. It was several years ago that this column began to speak of the possible future need for a central NHPA office, Hall of Fame, World Tournament facility, stat center, insurance, etc. Some we now have. Others remain in the discussion and investigation stage because our association just does not have the resources available to undertake certain projects.

In the last few years we have had discussions with various parties who have shown some interest in the NHPA locating in their area. Some were just about a small Hall of Fame site while others have been about a site large enough to house all our projected facility needs. Obviously, any facility,

large or small, will not come without cost or financial risk to the NHPA. We have managed to put aside over \$100,000 of NHPA money in CDs with the belief that one day we will use that money toward our own facility. But, for what we believe would be needed, our CD money would be just a drop in the bucket. As a small nonprofit association surviving on volunteer membership dues, we do not have the collateral needed to obtain large loans nor can we project the ability to repay them.

I believe we need to know more about the thoughts of our membership before we decide to pursue any major project that could possibly put the organization and/or its officers at financial risk. In fact, the NHPA knows very little about its members other than we share a common interest in horseshoe pitching. There have been many occasions where we have wondered about your opinion or have been asked to provide statistical data on the makeup of our membership. Perhaps one day we will have a membership data bank that will be able to provide such answers but at this point in time we do not. Because we still face a real present need for this type of information, I have formulated a plan to get it from a good cross section of our membership. The following will explain my plan.

Newsline Reader Survey

As our organization grows, it becomes increasingly more important for us to have pertinent statistical data on our membership and their opinions on specific issues. More and more, we are being asked for such data by potential World Tournament sites, sponsors, promoters and the media. Additionally, this information would be helpful to the NHPA as we set our goals and lay the plans for our future. With that in mind, I have developed a three part questionnaire to obtain the needed data and gain some insight on our membership. It will take only a few minutes to fill out and your complete privacy is assured as no name, phone or return address is required on the form or mailing envelope.

All adult members are asked to complete the first two parts of the form while part 3 is only for those who have attended a World Tournament. If your household has a second adult NHPA member, please make a copy of the blank form for them to complete. More responses will mean more accurate data. A future issue of *Newsline* will print a compilation of the data received. Please help the NHPA by taking part in this survey.

Dave's Court Report

■ If you haven't noticed, I would like to point out that Ed Domey, NHPA National Buyer and Director of the Game Related Sales Program, has for years been running a very successful and profitable program for the NHPA. In addition to providing a much needed service for the membership, the program has also been instrumental in providing funds to purchase several pieces of office equipment needed to support the administration of association business. Most recently, the cost of the "NatStats" computer system and two NHPA fax machines were paid for by funds from the GRSP account. Previously, this program had also funded the purchase of four computer systems, two copy machines and 42 sets of portable courts used at the last two World Tournaments. Thanks Ed.

■ Most game related items purchased through official NHPA distribution channels puts a little profit into the association account. Sometimes we give a little back by offering an item at a "Special Sale" price. One such item now available is the popular book, *The Official History of the World Tournaments*. ■ Sol Berman, longtime NHPA promoter, film maker and distributor of many NHPA videos has just reached a milestone. Sol has now been an NHPA member for 50 years and becomes a lifetime paid-up member of the association. Our sincere congratulations to you Sol.

■ Ed Quigley of Pompton Plains, New Jersey, just recently became the newest member of the NHPA Speakers Bureau. Never one to be caught standing still, Ed has already put his speaking skills to work. He was the featured speaker at a meeting of the Rotary and most recently, a Tennis Club. Ed tells me there is a large audience out there and he already has been asked to speak in another state this spring. Any members desiring more information on the Speakers Bureau should contact NHPA 4th Vice President Bonnie Seibold.

■ Occasionally we have had members question, "why isn't horseshoe pitching in the Olympics?" The reason is obvious once you know the official criteria of the International Olympic Committee. "Only sports widely practiced by men in at least 75 countries and on 4 continents and by women in at least 40 countries and on 3 continents, may be included in the program of the games of the Olympiad." Once a sport meets this criteria, the International Federation which governs the sport internationally, must petition the IOC for inclusion, a process which takes several years. While the criteria to become a demonstration sport at the Olympics is a bit less stringent, horseshoe pitching is light years away from being part of the Olympic games.

Letters to the Editor

To The Editor:

The controversy between 30 and 40 foot pitchers goes on. In response to the November/December issue letter from Mr. Wayne Schorzman where he proposes decreasing the opening of the horseshoe from 3.5 inches to 2.6 inches for 30 ft. pitchers to compensate for the 25% increase in accuracy, I figure it makes little difference in competition. It would equalize accuracy within a class, but at the same time it would only lower the 30 ft. pitcher's percent ringers so the pitcher would only be competing in a lower class.

What is the difference? You are competing against a ringer percentage - not accuracy. The only advantage as I see the shorter distance pitcher has is the velocity of the shoe will be slower thus decreasing the chance of the shoe bouncing or carooming off the stake and increas-

ing the chance of closer points. It would be interesting to know how many games are won by close points for equal percentage pitchers at 30 ft. vs. 40 ft.

I enjoy pitching horseshoes with anybody at any regulation distance. The satisfaction of seeing elders pitching from 30 ft. and maintaining the ringer percentage they had in their younger days makes pitching horseshoes an enjoyable sport. Youth gain experience at 30 ft. Women are tough competitors at 30 ft. Possibly this is the one reason many men object to pitching with 30 ft. pitchers—they hate to be beat by a woman. I enjoy the challenge and always try harder to do my best. Meanwhile, let's compete following NHPA rules and stop complaining.

Dear Editor,

Numerous articles have been written regarding the advantages of the 30' vs. the 40' horseshoe pitcher.

Let us get on with the game under our present rules and dispense with physics, geometry, ballistics, etc. We are playing a competitive horseshoe game, not going to the moon!

The majority of pitchers I have talked to on the subject believe the only advantage the shorter-distance pitcher might have is under windy conditions. Also, it is believed that if you match two 20%, 50% or 80% pitchers you will have a fair competitive game notwithstanding that one pitcher's distance is less than 37 feet. The equalizer is the percentage or point average, not a geometrically different horseshoe.

I noticed the anxiety of a 40' pitcher while playing a 30' pitcher. He would stand on his pitching platform and swing his shoe before the 30' pitcher returned to the 30' pitching area. In talking with this pitcher it was suggested that he remain on the opposite platform until the 30' pitcher had delivered both shoes, then as that pitcher walked back, move to his platform in the same manner he would if pitching a 40' pitcher. The pitcher now admits this is very helpful for his own pace.

A Year of Expectations

1993 will be our third season of an active Junior promotion program and the Junior Window. As this is the beginning of the year and the appropriate time for planning, a listing of things to do, objectives, and plan for "93," is being presented. This is an outline that hopefully Junior Program Directors can accept as a charter plan, and many others will choose to get involved. No individual is expected to do it all, but if many individuals will accept some of the tasks, progress will continue.

Recruiting is the key step to increasing our Junior member enrollment. Many individuals view this as a difficult task, when it is nothing more than asking a youngster to join a league or inviting them to become an NHPA member. At times, recruiting may be addressing a youth group, at times it may be just looking next door to invite a neighbor or even a grandchild. Recruiting is a task that all NHPA members can do and accept as their way to contribute to the future of our sport. Just think of the results if each NHPA member would invite and welcome just one Junior member in 1993.

Establishing Junior Leagues is the premier effort NHPA members can provide. Certainly this requires more adult time and dedication. Starting and conducting a Junior League is very gratifying. It isn't so difficult if you are able to share your time. Often, daytime leagues are more workable for Juniors and retired Seniors who wish to assist. Remember, you don't need 30 or 40 kids to start a league, 6-8 Juniors can form a league and then grow from there. By all means, make sure Junior Leagues participate in the NHPA Sanctioned League Program.

Let's take a quick look at the NHPA Sanctioned Junior League Program and all that it offers:

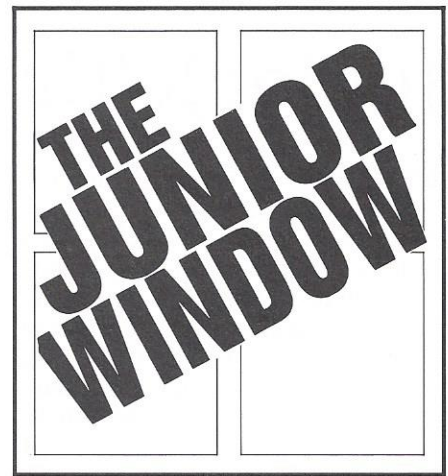
- Insurance coverage for sanctioned events
- Scholar Pitcher Patches and Certificates for all honor students (12 years and older)
- Junior League Member Patches for each member

- League patches include: High League Average, High Game, Champion, High Game Over Average, Sportsmanship, Most Improved, Rookie of the Year.
- National Top Ten Awards Program (10 categories)
- Certificate of Achievement for each member
- Class Champion Patches for the season ending class tournament

All this is provided at no fee beyond the Junior NHPA membership fee of \$5.00. That same membership allows a Junior to participate in sanctioned open events, state tournaments and the World Tournament. The Sanctioned League Program does require some forms to be completed but only with information that you routinely maintain in any form of league. The only difference in conducting a Junior League would be that games can be shorter and the younger and smaller pitchers (starter pitchers) can move up to closer distances while they learn the game. Junior pitchers need to develop 30' skills to qualify for game patches, entry for National Top Ten Awards, or pitch in open tournaments. Starter pitchers are entitled to Junior League Member Patches. The Presidential Sports Award Program can also be a feature included in a Junior League. Those awards do cost \$6.00 and require director verification.

Promotion is an important key to recruiting and maintaining successful Junior programs. While promotion efforts will vary from charter to charter, here are some suggestions based on what is taking place elsewhere:

- Sponsor a pitcher program—for local tournament, league or any other event.
- Demonstration and coaching programs—can be scheduled through school physical education programs or as a summer event.
- Scholarship funds—there is a whole host of variety in this application.
- Escort and chaperon programs for



state tournaments and the World Tournament.

- Junior only tournaments.

All these items are enhanced by charters appointing Junior Program Directors to share the news, enthusiasm and to encourage fellow members through charter newsletters and correspondence with league officers. Presently, there are 46 charter JPDs. That means there are a few charters left to step forward and appoint this position.

Junior Sanctioned Tournaments and the emphasis is on "sanctioned." Each year there are more and more Junior tournaments, yet most are non-sanctioned. Sanction those events! The NHPA membership fee is only \$5.00 and often can be covered through league funds, sponsor-pitcher program, or other forms of sponsorship. If every young participant who pitched in a Junior tournament this past summer, had been a 1992 NHPA Junior member, our Junior membership total would have been tripled. Remember, Regional Directors will provide Tournament Champion and Class Champion Patches for sanctioned Junior tournaments. There are many tournament format potentials and can be left up to the creativity of the event director. One format I haven't seen yet is a Senior/Junior team competition where the Senior partner sponsors the Junior partner.

The *Junior Window* is our opportunity to project the news and success of Junior member promotion efforts. Material has been provided about many leaders working with our youth. News and interesting

■ From Pat Park, club originator and ongoing organizer; the Ashville Horseshoe Club (Ohio) began a Junior class for league play during 1992. There were 8 Junior boys and girls, ranging from 12 to 15 years of age. With no clear expectations, all went very well, and our new members took the sport rather seriously. They soon learned to fix their own courts, keep score, and by the second week were making reference to opponents as "Sandbaggers." The Junior league will be continued in 1993 and additional Juniors are expected.



A highlight for the season was having a foreign exchange student as a member. Herwiyanto, from Indonesia, had never seen horseshoes played before he happened by the courts and witnessed tournament director Larry Smith practicing. Larry invited him to give it a try. Harry, as we came to call him, immediately fell in love with the game and joined the league. Harry has returned to Indonesia and

plans to introduce our sport to his school and community. Donnie Roberts gave Harry a new pair of shoes, and pamphlets on rules, the NHPA and league play. The Ashville Club gave Harry two sets of shoes and stakes to take back to his home.

■ Betty Lapping (JPD Western Pennsylvania) provided an update of 1992 progress and success. Twenty-eight Junior boys and girls requested state and national cards. This is a good sign of progress for just two years of concentrated effort. It is also clear to see that we can be doing better. As a recruiting incentive, the state fee was waived and the charter paid for the NHPA membership plus the \$2.00 stipend to our Sec/Treas. It was interesting to note that of the 28 Junior members, only 18 participated in sanctioned tournaments. Hopefully club coordinators can prompt sponsors to purchase membership cards for on-going Junior membership.

■ Matt J. Hoyt (Pekin, North Dakota), a previous Junior trust fund winner, has been accepted by North Dakota State University, with honors, to the Electrical and Electronics Engineering Program.

■ More schools have requested game rules and information about the NHPA: Lorraine Johnson, Bassett Middle School (El Paso, Texas); Marilyn Matson, Oldham-Ramona School (Oldham, South Dakota).

■ From newly appointed Steve Hatch (JPD Iowa), John Pletchette and Russ Bricker held their second annual Junior horseshoe pitch at Winterset with the cooperation of the Parks & Recreation Department and the 8th grade Physical Education department. Three bus trips a day, for 3 days, transported 126 boys and girls to the Madison County Courts. A doubles and count-all format was used while students were introduced and tested on the fundamentals of scoring, the hold, safety and stats. Local pitchers loaned 25 pairs of pitching shoes for the event.

Mel and Opal Harms hosted a successful Kids' Day Tournament at the Plymouth County Fair. They ran a

newspaper article, talked on the radio and posted flyers. Forty-six kids, ranging from 4-17 years of age, participated. The Harms also helped their daughter, Kathy Grienke, conduct a Kids Tournament at the Buena Vista County Fair in July where sixty-four kids participated. Next year's plans include holding a "Kids" event at the Clay County Fair.

Recognition is due Russ Martin (1992 Iowa Junior Program Director) for his efforts as well as the IHHPA for the increasing attention and efforts in Junior promotion.

In summary, 1993 is a year of expectations. Goals for Junior promotion can be simple, basic and require only that all charters and clubs work towards bringing youth into our sport. Some charters and local clubs will always be leaders and ahead of the rest when it comes to numbers of Juniors etc., but the overall strength and greater success is when there are Junior programs in each and every charter, and each and every club. For objectives in 1993, how about:

- All charters have an appointed Junior Program Director
- All charters have a Junior Champion(s) at the 1993 State Tournament
- Each charter have at least ONE sanctioned Junior league
- Each charter hold at least ONE sanctioned Junior tournament

These things can't be too much to ask for and surely are reasonable expectations.

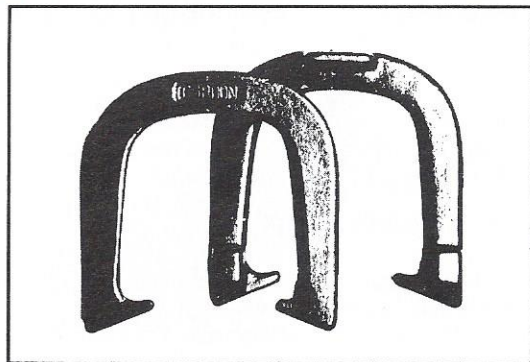

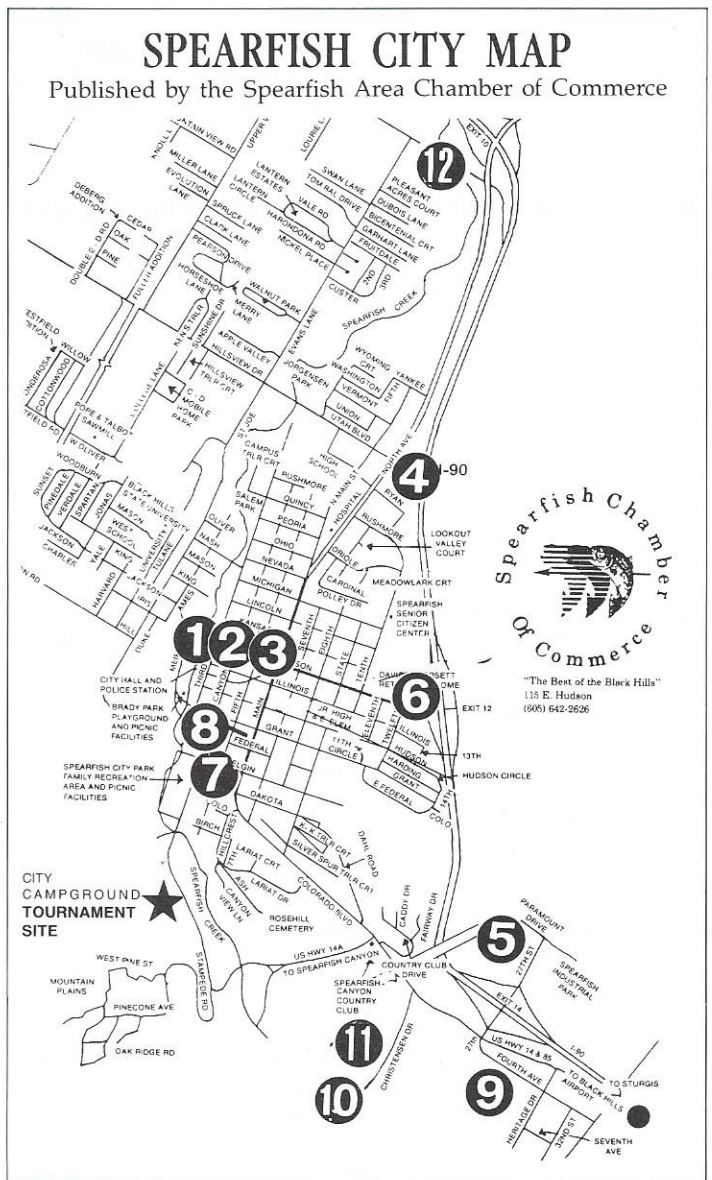

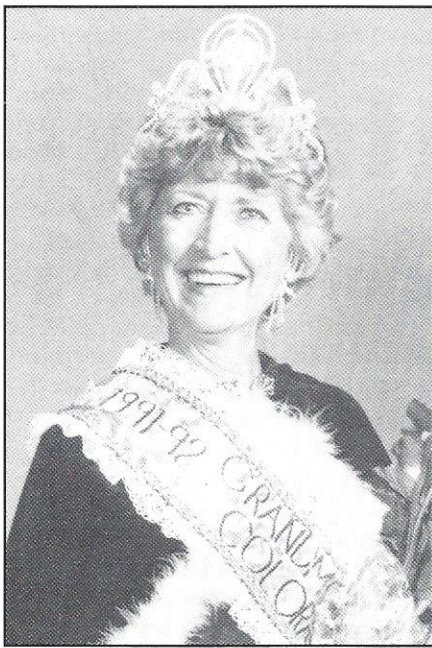

And in this corner Royalty Reigns—Queen Nancy Jones. It happened one night before her birthday, when on September 7, 1991, she was crowned as the new Grandmother Colorado for 1991-1992 at the second annual Grandmother Colorado Pageant held at the Sheraton Graystone Castle in Thornton.

Finally the Master of Ceremonies says, "Nancy Jones of Aurora," and the growing suspense was over. A year of excitement had begun.

The preliminary competition began that morning and included being judged in business wear and sportswear, plus judges' interviews, a talent and previously submitted essay, and a picture for "most photogenic." The evening program concluded the events with each contestant again

being judged in evening wear and responses to a question from each of the five judges.

Now, during her reign as Grandmother Colorado, Nancy will be making special appearances to promote the pageant. The first was Aurora's Gateway to the Rockies parade September 21 where she rode in a restored 1925 Model T Ford convertible. She was dressed in "period" clothing as it is Aurora's Centennial celebration and theme of the parade. Other events planned are Denver's St. Patrick's Day parade, plus other parades in Golden, Littleton, Colorado Springs and Central City.

Nancy says, "It looks like a lot of fun and I'm looking forward to it and hope to find the energy for it all." Nancy will crown next year's Grandmother Colorado at the pageant in Denver.

One of the guests at the gala event was Millie Harvey of Aurora, her special teammate in the horseshoe doubles tournament in 1991 and 1992.

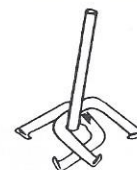
The 1991 Queen has been a member of the CHPA and NHPA since 1985 and enjoys pitching horseshoes in leagues and tournaments.

Walter Ray Williams won his 11th California State title hosted by the Yolo Horseshoe Club in Davis. Steve Wyrill of Lakeside finished second. Walt's winning percentage as 78.37.

Interesting to note that three Williams' brothers again competed. Jonathon finished fourth and Jeff came in 10th. Two flippers, Jesse Gonzales and Allen Oviea were fifth and seventh.

Former World Champion Diane Silva went 9-0 with a 75% figure to win the women's title. It was Diane's fifth state title.

CANADA

Andre LeClerc (Quebec) captured the 1992 Men's Canadian Championship, and Myrna Kissick captured the ladies' title. LeClerc finished sixth in the 1992 World championships at Columbus and Myrna was fifth in the women's division. Myrna is from Alberta.

Four other Canadians were among the top 16 women in the World: Former World Champion Sandy McLachlin (Ontario) was second; Sylvianne Moisan 3rd, Diane Cantin 12th and Angeline Moisan 15th are all from Quebec.

COLORADO

Colorado now has an even dozen clubs. The new club in the state is the Western Colorado Horseshoe Pitchers Club in Grand Junction. They have 16 new clay courts in an outstanding park in the city. Grand Junction happens to be in the south central part of the time zone and possibly could be the host city for an NHPA Regional.

Thirteen teams competed in the sixth annual Team League playoff won by the Denver Summer league team. Members of the team were state junior champion Walter O'Dell, Millie Harvey and Dan Brunt.

IDAHO

After an absence of two years, Dean Curry of Lewiston is back on top as "king of the hill." Curry took his first State Championship in 1964, ending the straight 12-year reign ('52-'63) of E.J. Wiley of Nampa.

After that first win in 1964, Curry was state champion in 1968-69, 1971, 1978, 1982-85, 1987-89 and now again in 1992.

Charlie Ault, formerly of Colorado, had a 6-1 record and 57.7% in winning the Silver Valley Classic. Charlie tossed 23 ringers out of 28 shoes in his game against Del Driskell. That's 82.1%, the best in Idaho in 1992.

McCue, editor of the newsletter *Four Dead*, was presented a plaque in appreciation for his editorial efforts with this fine newsletter.

ILLINOIS

Veteran secretary Bob Switzer filed his final report for publication to all members in October. Taking over the duties is William Marvin of Mechanicsburg.

Other officers for 1993 are Charlie Marit, president; Marilyn Korte, 1st VP; Patty Stotler, 2nd VP; Jim Korte, 3rd VP; Donald Baily, publicity director.

Clifford Baker, 1992 State Champion finished with a 15-2 record and 72.5%. In the 1992 World Championship Baker came out in 24th position, with an almost identical percentage—72.36.

IOWA

1992 World Champion Kevin Cone from Alta is the third World Champion from Iowa. Frank Lundin took the 1922 crown and Putt Mossman was champion in 1924 and 1925.

Logsdon's Market of Maxwell topped Honda of Ames in the 2 out of 3 finale to become the 1992 team champion. All members of Logsdon's and Honda are members of the NHPA Sanctioned Central Iowa Traveling Horseshoe league.

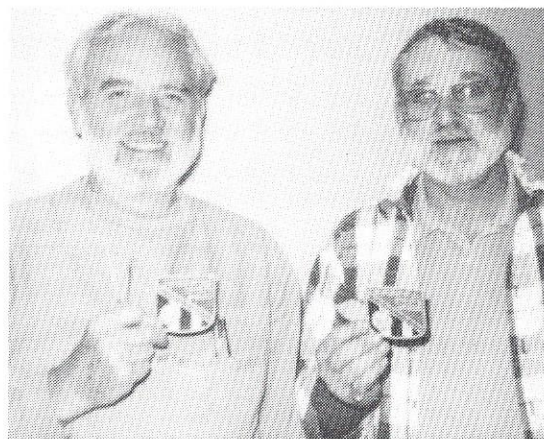

MICHIGAN

Not many people receive a word of "thanks" for a job well done, but NHPA regional director John Decker personally thanked all the Michigan pitchers that helped at the World as scorekeepers, judges, office help and especially those who helped weigh and measure shoes.

Another "Thank You" went to the members who sat through 10 hours of the national convention. John and Jan Decker, Ernie Miller, Judy and Gary Dennis, Ken Warner, Dick Pelton, Paul Wishon and Ed Schultz were the state's representatives.

MINNESOTA



Minnesota may be the leader in junior participation in the nation. They had 44 juniors playing in junior horseshoe leagues this year in only one community—West St. Paul. They competed in three 10-week leagues at the sports center in Wentworth and Oakdale.

At the Metro District meeting, the Smith Brothers, better known as Dick Dvorak and Bob Dunn (shown on previous page), showed off their Presidential Sports award patches they both earned. The program was developed by the President's Council on Physical Fitness & Sports in 1972 in conjunction with national sports organizations and associations, which includes the NHPA. Its purpose is to motivate all Americans to become more physically active through life, and emphasizes regular exercise rather than outstanding performance.

MISSOURI

Wayne Henderson leaves the office of president. Vicki Winston, the charter secretary stated that the Missouri membership was 371 in 1987 when she took office. Wayne had been president for a year and it was his goal to see the membership increase. These two dedicated people, with help from others, have boosted the state membership to over 1000 for 1992. What began as a labor of love suddenly has become the same as a part-time job for some of their officers. This probably is true in many states as they endeavor to improve horseshoes in their charters.

Earl Winston has been working and pitching horseshoes for over 40 years and was awarded the Arch Stokes Memorial Award for service. He continues to serve both state and NHPA associations. He currently is NHPA 1st vice president and chairman of the Hall of Fame committee.

NORTH CAROLINA

Like many other charters, N.C. now has a computer for the North Carolina Horseshoe Pitchers Association, thanks to a \$500 donation from Paul Barlow toward the purchase. The remaining money came out of the state treasury.

J.B. Fuller from Asheville has been the Regional Director for North and South Carolina for the past 14 years. He is now stepping down. Newsletter editor Paul Stewart, who rates B.J. as the "Ted Allen of Horseshoes" in North Carolina is taking over as Regional Director.

NEW MEXICO

Things are moving in the Land of Enchantment. Socorro has 16 new courts constructed in 1992 and the promise from the Parks and Recreation that 8 more will be constructed for the 1993 season...and the State tournament was held in Socorro this past year.

KLUZ Radio invited five members of the 78 member Socorro Double Ringer Club—Joe Zumora, Peter Baca, Carl Zumora, Joseph Zumora and Mary Ann Zumora—to talk horseshoes for nearly a half hour.

OREGON

The state's horseshoe pitching season has wound down to once-a-month tournaments at the indoor courts in Wren.

Ben Weidrich repeated as Men's champion, JoAnn Loy won the Women's crown and Tony Umbarger repeated as 1992 Junior titleholder. The state doubles champions were Barry Chapelle and Roger Christianson.

Corvallis has the distinction of being the first in Oregon

to try sanctioned league. We trust that more leagues will follow as sanctioned next year.

Starting in April 1, 1993, Oregon will have tournaments somewhere every weekend until October 23.

1993 officers elected finds Charles Anderson of Rogue River as president, Elmer Otner, Oregon City, 1st vice president, Lee Wallace of Dallas, publicity director, and David Brown of Mt. Angel as program director.

TEXAS

Recently the city of McKinley, at great expense, built nine lighted courts. The THPA and those who enjoy the sport of horseshoes would like to thank Larry Offerdahl, director of Parks and Recreation, and John Redd, assistant director. Because of the vision and effort these two people put forth, Texas now has another place to pitch horseshoes.

Texas president Hazel McCall, a former teacher now retired, found horseshoes a great way to keep in shape. Following up on a newspaper ad, Amazing Hazel found her way into the winner's circle several times in her first year of competition. She took on some of the best in the World in Columbus, Ohio. There she pitched 64% in her first five games. That was one of her "highs."

UTAH

Northern Utah had a fine pitching season in 1992 and are looking forward to an increased membership and schedule for 1993. They are looking for some tournaments in the local city celebrations with a city night, county night and State Tournament.

For 1993 Gary Wood is the president; Phil Jensen, vice president, Central; Steve Elwood, vice president, North; Chris Olson, women's representative; Tito Archuleta, junior director; and secretary-treasurer Marguerite Buchanan.

VIRGINIA

Alvin Perry won the State Men's Singles Championship for the 13th straight year. The event was hosted by the Winchester Club.

Art Tyson of Mt. Vernon, New York, successfully defended his Class A Championship in the 26th annual Raymond Frye Memorial Horseshoe Tournament, sponsored by the Winchester Horseshoe Club at the 24 lighted courts. 164 entrants from nine states competed.

Tyson posted a 14-1 record and an 84% average for the 2-day affair.

WASHINGTON

Jed Pexton, Colorado's junior champion in 1980 and 1981, won the Washington State Class A Championship in 1992 with a 56% figure. Jed was elected 1st vice president of the Washington State Horseshoe Pitchers Association for 1993.

Ken Carvo of Yakima was elected into the State Hall of Fame for 1992. He was invited to join the Yakima club in 1950 by former World Champion John Monasmith, who won the World title in 1963.

Henry Knauff won his 14th State Championship in 1992.

WEST VIRGINIA

Many of us wonder why the United States has not issued a stamp honoring our sport of horseshoes. A few

Clint Bryson, RD from **North and South Dakota** reports that they had 31 NHPA tournaments in SD and 10 in ND last year. Gene and Yvonne Ficek were named to the SD Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame during

the State Tournament. Congratulations to both Gene and Yvonne.

Earl Waggy, ARD from **Virginia** reports that Marvin May of Lynchburg, VA was inducted into the VA Hall of Fame at the October meeting.

Ray Matlock, RD from **Maryland** reports that 1992 was a record year in MD. They had 2 new sanctioned clubs and are looking forward to 1993 with a lot of new members.

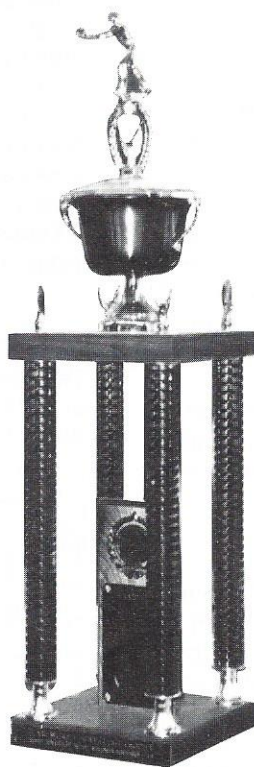

Special Alert to Charter Officers

from Dave Loucks

The start of 1993 brings with it several changes to the National Bylaws which will have a direct effect on some things in your charter. I want to make sure you are aware of the most important ones that can impact you or your state members.

The "high three tournament averages in the past twelve months" rule still applies, but in modified form. It now includes the statement "or the last ten tournaments during the same period, whichever occurs first."

What this means is that ALL PITCHERS' averages for ANY SANCTIONED tournament entry will be based on their 3 highest tournaments pitched in the preceding twelve months or their last 10 tournaments if those 10 were pitched in a time span less than the last twelve months.

Don't think that this rule applies only to NHPA run tournaments. It applies to ALL NHPA SANCTIONED TOURNAMENTS, including those of your charter. You cannot use a system that is contrary to the NHPA standard without violating National Bylaws at which time you place yourself in jeopardy of NHPA suspension should a complaint be lodged.

The NHPA has set up a National Stat Data Base called "NatStats" to receive, record and compile tournament pitching averages on all members. The last issue of *Newsline* explained this in detail as did a letter sent to all Charter Presidents by this office. It is your responsibility to see that the interests of the NHPA members in your charter are protected as relates to tournament entering averages and the filing of results.

If NatStats does not get your results in a timely manner and correct format, the data bank may not have an up-to-date history on one of your members who is seeking entry into the World, Regional or any other sanctioned tournament. Don't let that happen. Set the procedures now that are necessary to ensure that your charter is in compliance.

Don't overlook the part of the compliance factor that says "all entrants must have a current NHPA membership card." Not only do you or the tournament director want to see the card but the card number must be indicated alongside the name of the pitcher on all results reported.

For known members who enter tournaments regularly, your charter

may wish to keep a master log of card numbers handy so they don't have to be shown at every local event, just logged later on the results form.

However, when a new member or an out of state member enters your tournament, make sure their NHPA card is presented and the number indicated on the results.

Special Notice To World Tournament Bidders and NHPA Office Candidates

Don't overlook a change to our Bylaws that became effective January 1, 1993. Sites intending to bid for a World Tournament and members seeking election to the NHPA Executive Council must now submit their official notification to be received no later than March 15th.

Bids for the 1995 World Tournament must be in the hands of the NHPA Secretary-Treasurer by March 15, 1993. The written bid must be accompanied by a check in the amount of at least 1/3 (33%) of the total cash bid being offered.

Candidates for NHPA office are to send their written announcement to the NHPA president and *Newsline* editor to be received by March 15th. At the 1993 convention, the President, the First, Third and Fifth Vice-Presidents will be elected. Dave Loucks will seek reelection as NHPA President. Gary Minnick, current 5th VP intends to run for President

as well. Bev Born will seek reelection as 3rd Vice President. Richard Hansen, current President of the Wisconsin Charter has announced his candidacy for the 5th VP position.

Any NHPA member wishing to run for office may do so. Merely submit your written announcement in accord with the previous paragraph. All announcements of candidacy will be printed in the May/June *Newsline*.

As long as at least one candidate has announced their candidacy by the deadline, for a particular office, no nominations from the floor of the convention will be accepted for that office. Only when an office has no candidates by the March 15th deadline, will the chairman open the convention for nominations from the floor.

As this procedure has been the established practice of the NHPA, it is in accord with Robert's Rules of Order.

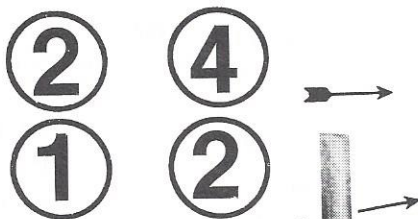
SHENANDOAH VALLEY HORSESHOE CLUB GROTTOES, VA #88-C-9

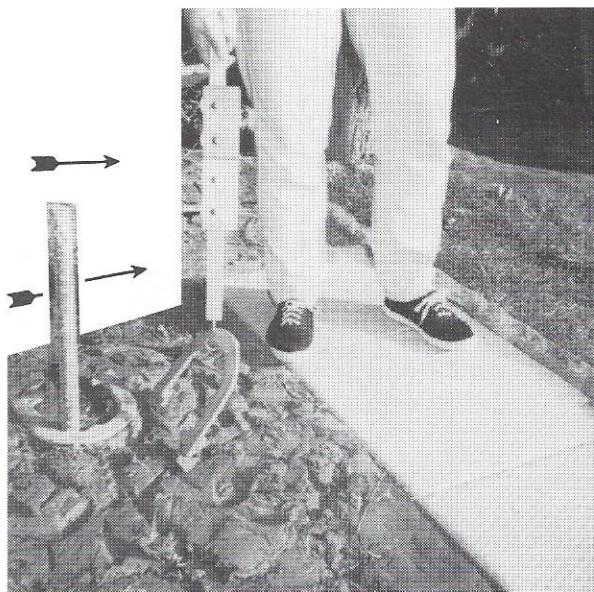

The game featured a combined ringer percentage of 82.27%, 9 consecutive four-deads, 27 total four-deads, only 5 single points, 23 open ringers and 158 canceled ringers.

Other highlights: Winston had 33 ringers out of 34 shoes in one stretch and 27 out of 28 in another. She had 28 ringers in a row. Francis had 31 ringers out of 32 shoes in one stretch and, also, had 28 ringers in a row. Total ringers, Winston 92, Francis 89.

How many 40 point games go 110 shoes? In the Marshall Fall Open Alan revenged the 110 game loss by winning a more traditional game.

years back Len Lipovsky from Bloomington, Minnesota wrote several letters to the postal service requesting such a stamp. And now West Virginia's "Mr. Horseshoes" Charles M. Bunner has the government office on the line.

He received a recent letter from Norman Sherstrom, Senior Specialist, which reads, in part: "Each year the Postal Service receives a large number of letters recommending literally thousands of new stamp subjects. Unfortunately, only a limited number of stamps—usually 25 to 30—can be issued each year."

"This proposal has been brought to the attention of the Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee for consideration. At the present time the committee has completed work on the 1994 stamp program and is considering proposals for subsequent years. Be assured your proposal will be given every consideration.

WISCONSIN

The "Pitcher of the Year Award" went to Tom Steinke of Waukesha and he received a \$50 check and plaque from WHPA President Dick Hansen, as part of the awards ceremony during the state tournament.

Steinke criss-crossed the state from Muskego to Eau Claire and Platteville to New London working hard for the Number One position.

The Toll of Time

ED CHRISTIANA

New York member Ed Christiana died on election day 1992, but not before he recorded his vote. It was important to him as was just about everything Ed did. Just two weeks prior, Ed was pitching his best horseshoes ever. His artwork was also never better. No one, including Ed, could believe he was 80 years old.

Ed was a great person in so many ways. He was a great artist with a widespread reputation in the art world for his watercolors. He was a generous person and an excellent horseshoe pitcher, who amazed many a younger player with his skill. The Floyd Horseshoe Club was an important part of his life and many are richer for having known him.

DALE DIXON

Former NHPA President (1953-55) Dale Dixon died on December 4, 1992 in a Mesa, Arizona nursing home. He was 85 years old. A long time Iowa resident, Dale pitched in events for over 50 years. He was Iowa State

Champion 11 times and for many years a top competitor in the Championship class of the World Tournament. He designed and built what many believe was the first portable court with rubber pads. He designed and manufactured the "Dixon Victory" pitching shoe. Dale was inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame in 1973.

MILTON EVERHART

Brownell, Kansas resident Milton Everhart died on November 27, 1992. He was 75 years old and the Kansas State Champion in 1992 and 92 in the Elder 70+ division pitching 30 feet. Milton was one of the top pitchers from the western part of the state where he participated in the mid-Kansas horseshoe league.

O.A. LINDSEY, JR.

The members of the Alabama HPA were deeply saddened by the unexpected death of friend and fellow pitcher O.A. Lindsey, Jr., who died November 9, 1992 at the age of 77.

Retired from the Postal Service, O.A. started competitive pitching in the early eighties and was instrumental in the organization of the Homewood Club where he served many years as President. O.A. was also past president of the Alabama HPA from 1984-86. The entire association extends its sympathy to his wife and family.

LORAN A. MAY

Akron resident Loran May was Ohio State Champion nine times, winning his first crown at the age of 13. He learned the art of horseshoe pitching from his uncle, two-time World Champion George May. Loran's best finish in the World was 3rd in 1923 and 4th in 1924-25. After the 1925 championships, Loran and his brother James signed to tour with the Ziegfeld Follies, performing trick shots in variety shows which included Will Rogers and W.C. Fields. Loran died Nov. 20, 1992 of heart disease. In 1984 he was inducted into the Summit County Sports Hall of Fame. He was also a member of the Ohio Horseshoe Hall of Fame.

NORMAN (BUD) PRANGE

Canadian members and Horseshoe Ontario suffered a tremendous loss with the death of Norman Prange on August 3, 1992 as the result of a massive heart attack at age 57. Bud was very instrumental in the organization of the Ontario Horseshoe Association and will be greatly missed. He is survived by his wife, son, two daughters and two grandchildren.

WALKER SHANEYFELT

The Alabama HPA suffered a great loss with the sudden and unexpected death of Walker Shaneyfelt on October 18, 1992. Walker was just 56 years old when struck down by a massive heart attack. He started pitching in 1980 and won his first of nine State Championships in 1982. His last performance in the state was on September 20, 1992 where he finished second averaging nearly 72%. Walker pitched in five World Tournaments, twice in Class A and twice in the Championship Group. He was born and lived all his life in the community of Owens Cross Roads, located in North Alabama. The heartfelt sympathy of all is extended to his wife of 28 years, Margaret and family.

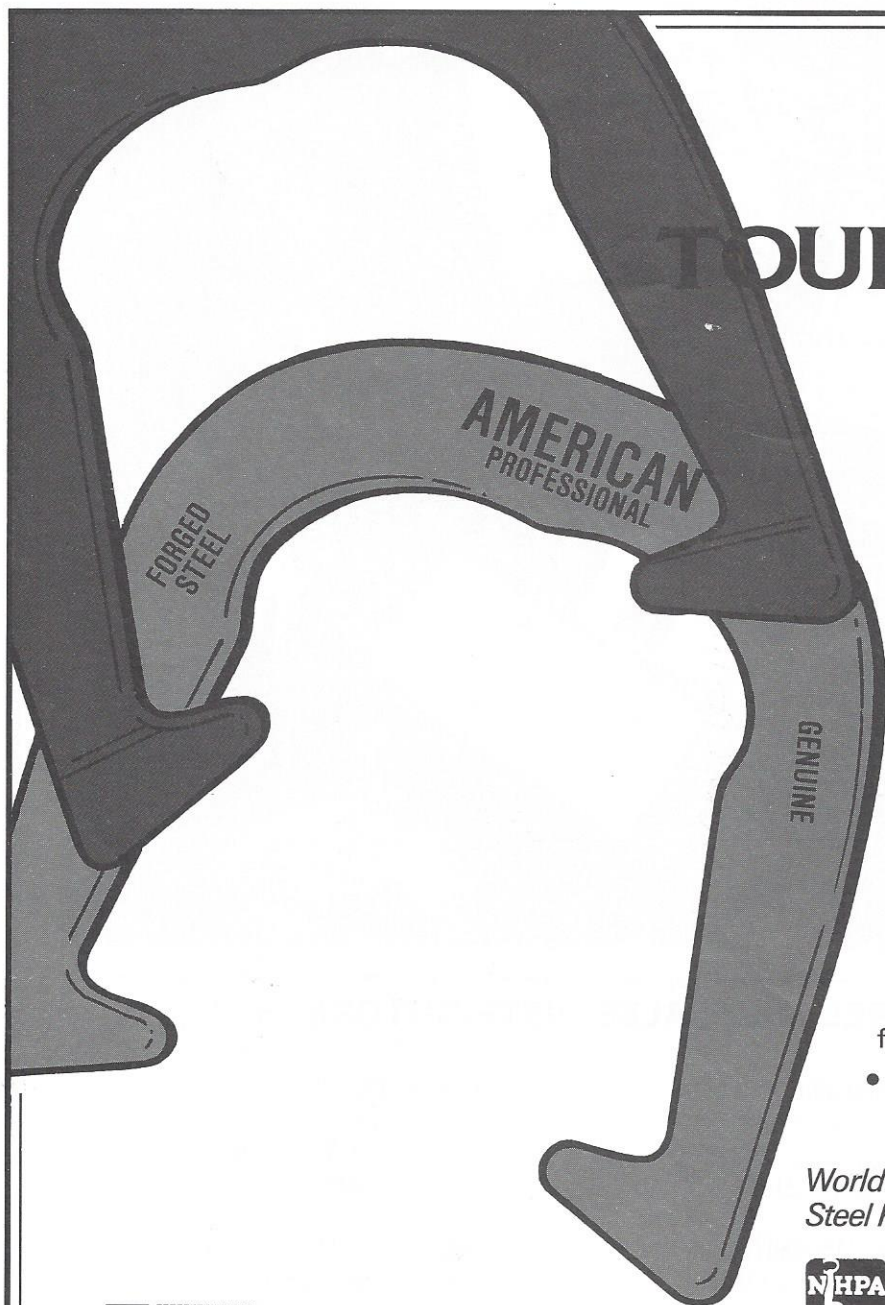
