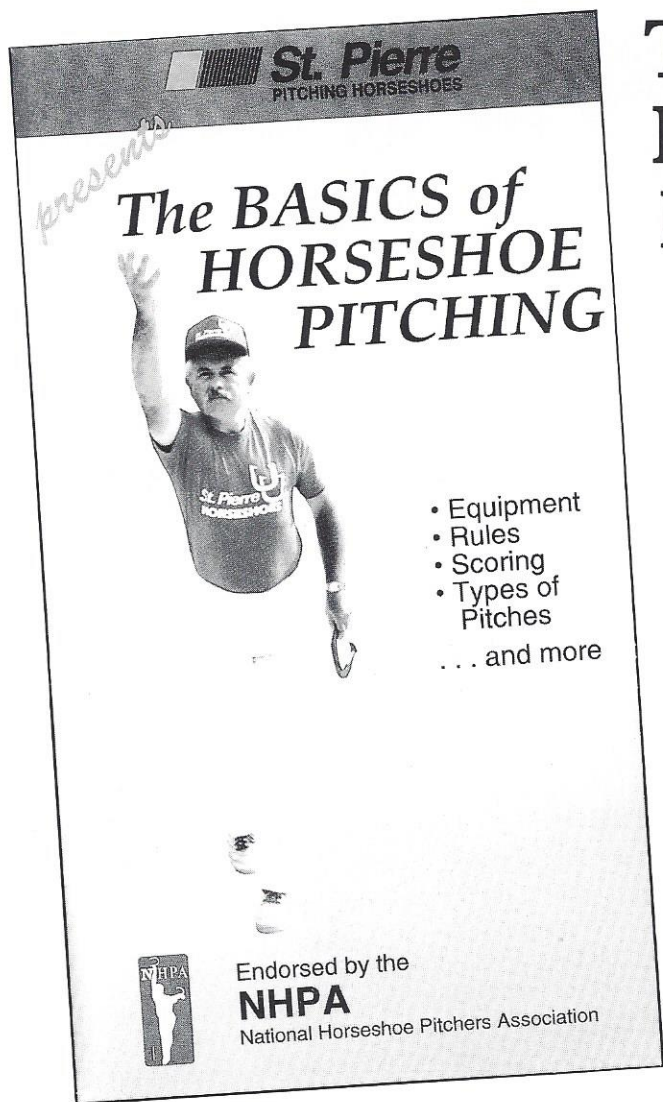

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# President's Message

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**O**ur current method of determining where a World Tournament will be held two years out is to solicit bids by mail, get an overview presentation by the bidder at the current World and then have the delegates in convention vote for the best presentation, or more likely, where they want to go on vacation. Is this the best way to select our World Tournament site? Does this method give us the best assurance of adequate facilities for pitching and administering the tournament? I think not.

There is no argument that we have had some very good sites for the World with nice facilities and hard working people supporting it. We have also had some sites with facilities that were marginal for our largest tournament, the one that we showcase as the premier horseshoe pitching event of the year. No disrespect is aimed or intended upon any past or future bidder, or host, as we certainly appreciate their interest and desire to do a service for the NHPA. Rather, I merely want to suggest a method of selection that the majority of your Council feel would ensure a greater degree of confidence and success in all aspects of the event.

I know of no other sports association or organization that selects the site of their premier playing event and convention by member vote. Too many things have to be considered beyond the actual event itself. In our case, space for horseshoe courts in comfortable surroundings is only part of it. True, it's important for the actual pitching, but the World Tournament goes beyond that. Is the facility really large enough? Does it have adequate room for not only a proper layout of courts but bleachers as well? Does it have the required space and secondary rooms needed for the tournament office staff, publicity, computer, check-in, shoe checking, first aid, awards and photo, trophy storage, results posting, committee meetings, convention, banquet, game related product sales, host souvenir booths etc. Are these rooms conveniently located so as to provide a smooth flow from one to the other as the tournament is administered? Can some of these rooms be secured in times of no pitching?

Is there adequate parking? Are the RV sites adequate, convenient and reasonably priced? Are there adequate and affordable motel rooms and restaurants in the area? Is public transportation available into the city and within the city coming to the tournament site? Are there things to do and see in the area that will interest the vacationing pitcher

who wants to spend more than 3 days around the tournament site? Has the local business community and media shown an interest in having the event in their town or is it just the local club that is pushing for the tournament?

Under our present selection method, only the surface is scratched in trying to determine answers to the above questions and we never know for sure that what we hear is really what we'll get. Often, things are not as expected and last minute adjustments have to be made to the inconvenience of both the pitchers and tournament administrative staff. Much of this could be avoided by selecting the World Tournament site in a more professional way, a manner that is preferred by the NHPA Officers and the bidding sites themselves.

Our World Tournament location should be determined by a site selection committee. Investigation should be done by a site planner or two who visit potential facilities that have already indicated their interest and been pre-qualified by letter and phone. During the visit the planner, who has the knowledge of everything required, can discuss, view and evaluate every aspect, not only for the tournament itself, but for the benefit of the members who will come to the event. This information is then taken to a small site selection committee (perhaps the Council) who will evaluate the information on all the sites visited and award the bid to one of them.

As I said before, every sports association or organization with a tint of professionalism selects their sites in this or a similar manner. The advantages are many. First, a visit beforehand is worth far more than a remote sales pitch from an individual paid to sell the city. Second, the NHPA could be much more confident that the facilities offered meet our requirements. Third, we would have first-hand knowledge of motel, RV, restaurant and entertainment sites as well as pricing. Fourth, the NHPA would carry a lot more clout in that we would be able to select a host hotel/motel and negotiate special rates for our members rather than be at the mercy of catch as catch can. Finally, it is the accepted method preferred and used by nearly all city convention and visitor bureaus and these are the folks who, more and more, through their sports development groups, are interested in the NHPA World Tournament and what we can bring to their city. It will help us improve.

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## *Dave's Court Report*

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■ Due to the format of play adopted by the delegates for use in Perry, the starting date of the 1995 World Tournament could be moved up a day to Sun., July 23rd and/or extended to August 6th. We won't know for sure if extra days are required until all entries are received. But with everyone pitching 3 days and the Championship Division finals being as much as 3 more days, we may well need more time to avoid pitching into the wee hours of the morning. The Perry officials are working with us as we explore these and other options.

■ Art Tyson of Mt Vernon, NY, was invited and represented the NHPA and horseshoe pitching at the Sports For All

International Fair held Oct. 1-9 in Tokyo, Japan. Our friends from the NHPA Division in Japan, who send pitchers to our World Tournament, have for the past five years, invited a representative. Past attendees have been Donnie Roberts, Walter Ray Williams Jr., Kevin Cone and Debbie Pickering.

■ In the 1994 California State Championships, Walter Ray threw a perfect 26 shoe game. In the Pacific Northwest Championships in mid-Sept., 1993 Senior World Champion Herb Criss pitched a 24 shoe perfect game. Both these perfectos were thrown on the first day of two day events and both Williams and Criss went on to win the tournaments.

Central Massachusetts Horseshoe Club uses an idea which you might want to pass onto your readers. We've made name tags for all pitchers, to be posted on center court scorekeepers' scoreboard. We have 16 courts which we have color coded. We use four colors, which works well for eight or nine person classes or less.

The backboards, center court scoreboards, round robin cards, scorekeeper score sheets and master summary sheets are four different colors. So far no pitcher has had to ask, what courts do I pitch on? When the scorekeepers turn in their colored score sheets, the results keepers know exactly what class it is and enter it onto the same colored master summary sheet. It also helps on that one game that everyone now and then gets, where a pitcher complains about the results of one particular game. The results keepers pulls the colored score keepers sheets for that class, instead of going through the whole stack.

We are trying to promote Horseshoes in our town (Woodward, OK). We had more the 40 pitchers at one time. Now we only have a few pitchers.

When we had a league only card, the cost was only \$5.00 to pitch in the league plus the club fee and trophy fee. This encouraged more pitchers, because a lot of them only pitched in leagues. Some went on to pitch in tournaments later.

Now for a couple to pitch in league it costs \$15.00 each for cards plus club fee and trophy fees so it ends up costing a couple around \$42.00 in league fees. The extra cost has made many drop out altogether. If they have kids it costs more.

I would like to see the league cards come back so we can get more pitchers to join league play again. We try to get people to come but when they see how much it costs they back off. I think we need to get them started in the league first, then they will later want to pitch in the tournaments. Now, the only way to get them to join us for league play is to have non-sanction league, they will come and pitch then.

I think this is why so many clubs have dropped their sanction leagues. So please talk about bringing back the league cards. Bev Born remarked in the July/ August *Newsline* that 164 leagues have dropped out. It could be because of the cost. Did you take this into consideration?

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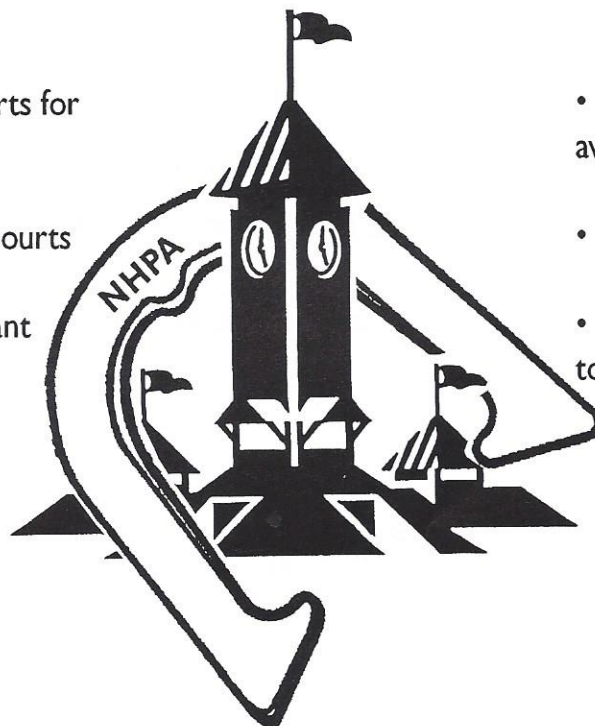

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# Regional Director's Report

I would like to take just a little space in this column to thank the Regional Directors and all of the others who worked, for the many long hours put in to check shoes at this year's World Tournament. They did an outstanding job for me and I just wanted them to know that it was appreciated.

**Helen Ouellette**, Regional Director for **New York**, has moved to Ohio. I have appointed **Lance Twyman** to complete this year and to become Regional Director for the New York Charter. I worked with Lance at the World Tournament and I am sure he will do a fine job as Regional Director.

From **Illinois** Regional Director **Dave Shreve**, I received another one of those reports of horseshoe pitchers helping each other out in a time of need. An indoor facility has been built by Jim McDaniel of Columbia, with three courts, excellent lighting and plenty of room. Not long after completing the building, Jim's house burned down. Jim got out with minor burns but lost the house and everything in it. The horseshoe pitchers in the area, under the direction of Bob Hinkle, got together and had a Burned the House Down Tournament to benefit Jim. The tournament was a complete success as over \$700 was raised for Jim. He has now completely recovered from his burns and is rebuilding the house. Dave adds that the horseshoe building was scorched but not damaged severely.

**Rick Rebman**, Regional Director for all of the northwest (**Washington, Oregon** and **Idaho**) writes that the Gresham Horseshoe Club now has 6 new courts at the Gresham Main City Park. Development and construction of the courts represents over 200 hours of volunteer labor, and \$7,400 in donated materials and services from the community, and an excellent partnership between the Club and the Parks and Recreation Department of the city of Gresham. They hope to add 6 more courts in the future and also plan to construct other improve-

ments. Club officers **Dick Speer**, President, and **Rudy Braun**, will be looking for new members next year to help complete the project. Rudy is a former real estate agent from Watertown, WI, my home state, and will be happy to know that **Felix Kubly** of Watertown, WI was placed in the Wisconsin Hall of Fame this year. Two very hard working Horseshoe Men.

Assistant Regional Director **Johnny Davenport** of Post, **Texas** reports that the Tumbleweed Horseshoe Pitchers of Lubbock have added 4 more courts, for a total of 20 in order to handle the Texas State Tournament. Their courts are built along the headwaters of Buffalo Springs Lake, southeast of Lubbock, and they are looking for a good turnout. Their State Tournament is mid October.

From **Southern California**, Regional Director **Leslie Burroughs** reports that their State Tournament had a record number of players with 342 entries and \$10,500 in prize money. This was done with the help of 44 business sponsors and 32 sponsors for tournament plaques. The tournament was held at Bakersfield with the help of the Bakersfield Shoe Crew Club on their 26 courts. The Orange Horseshoe Club also provided their new Horseshoe Tournament and Electronic Message Board.

From California ARD **David Garbani** comes a report on Fun & Benefit Tournaments. The tournaments are held in an attempt to benefit others, increase membership and increase our exposure all at the same time. The Inyo-Mono Club has chosen the Altrusa organization as their beneficiary and the High Desert Club has adopted the local Child Abuse Prevention Council. This was the first year for the Inyo-Mono Club to hold such an event and the second year for the High Desert Club. This type of exposure is very positive for the NHPA and the local Charter Clubs.

**New Mexico** Regional Director **Hal Mineer** reports that the Springer

Horseshoe Club is building 10 new courts for the club and the Double Ringer Club of Socorro has added 2 new courts to their existing 16. One of which has handicap access and was built for handicapped pitchers. Hal adds that the Springer Club just formed this year and that they now have many new NHPA members.

**Len Lipovsky**, Regional Director for **Minnesota**, reports that their State Tournament had some very interesting games. Dale Lipovsky and Mark Bauman were both 6-0 going into the final game, it was decided in the last two innings with Mark losing a few ringers, Dale won 43-35 78.7% to 74.2% for Mark.

The ladies event went to 5 time State Champ **Bev Nathe** with a tremendous 86.5% and probably an all-time State but also maybe a National record. World Junior Champ **Vance Harren** easily captured the Junior Boys. He's our all-time boys leader with 44 wins and 7 losses, including this year's games. Len reports they issued 681 adult NHPA cards and 147 Junior membership cards and had 329 entries in the State Tournament.

At the World Tournament in Syracuse I presented **Paul Stewart** of **North Carolina** with the Regional Director of the Year Award and upon my return home I received a very nice letter from **Rick Bolick**, one of Paul's ARDs. Here is a small portion of that letter as it reinforced my choice of Paul as RD of the Year:

"Paul recently informed me that he has been named Regional Director of the Year. I can't think of anyone who deserves this recognition any more than him. He has sacrificed his time and pitching to make North Carolina Horseshoes what it is today and it is an honor to be his assistant. Don't tell him I said anything good about him, so he won't have an excuse when I beat him the next time we pitch." Don't worry Rick, I won't tell him—you just did.

**M**y husband Richard and I have owned and operated a service station-convenience business since 1964. Back in the mid-70s I was playing ladies softball but was asked, on occasion, to fill in when the men were short a horseshoe pitcher. That is about the time I first met Phyllis Negaard and she introduced me to pitching from 30 feet. In 1976, we installed 12 clay courts behind our business. With the help of some members of our state associations and local pitchers, we set up leagues and started pitching three nights a week. At the present time our club holds one NHPA sanctioned tour-

nament a year and has two leagues.

In the past 15 years I have been fortunate to be able to pitch in the Ladies State Class A, and have been able to get close and finish second on three occasions. In Minnesota, of the top 12 ladies, 8 are from our courts, with high percentage pitchers such as Bev Nathe, Phyllis Negaard and Lu Cave.

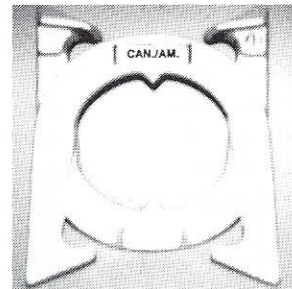
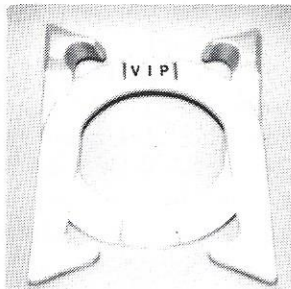

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# Sanctioned Club/League News

Another year drawing to a close. Where does the time go? It seems there are too few hours in each day, but I'm sure glad there are not any more. I apologize for not having an article for the World issue, just could not meet the deadline. We did not arrive home until August 11, as we took a trip through Niagara Falls, staying on the Canadian side. We stopped in Kitchener, who bid for the '96 World and looked over their facilities. I thought they were pretty nice, so if they do bid again, perhaps you can give them some careful consideration.

The Sanctioned CL/LG meeting at the World was casual, as usual. I like to keep them that way in hopes that everyone will be relaxed enough to speak their feelings. After campaign speeches from Marvin Grubb and Donnie Roberts we discussed the possible age limit and scholarship changes for juniors and how to start a new sanctioned cl/lg as the main subjects. Short, but nice, and my thanks to all who attended.

I am disappointed that the age limit for juniors was raised to 18. Truly did not think the Delegates would allow it to pass and wish that I had spoken about it before it was voted on. It just does not seem like a good way to encourage younger juniors, when they have to pitch with ones that are as big as adults. I hope that some of these older and bigger Juniors will still start pitching as adults, before they actually are forced to. I know some 17 years olds, in the past, chose to pitch with the adults, before their ages made it mandatory. Personally, an age limit of 15 or max of 16 would seem much better. Give it some thought between now and '96 rule changes. Your comments, both pro and con are invited to the Editor.

I sure liked the pitching format at World and am pleased that it was adopted for '95. The sudden death play-offs for Championship men and women were interesting. Some really good games were seen. Next years' limit to a sixteen person RR should be a happy medium between sudden death and the old, larger number RR.

Scorekeepers and judges at World—getting them was pathetic! The worst I've ever seen in the seven I've

attended. Doesn't it make you feel just a little guilty to see someone that probably kept score for you keeping their own score? Perhaps it hasn't happened to you yet, to have to keep your own score at World, but if things don't improve, your time will come. I hate it and it really distracts from my concentration to keep my own score. Remember, it could make the difference between a win or loss for a friend or family member.

Then there are the faithful ones that do more than their share, because they care that you may not have a scorekeeper. How many of you have complained because of being behind schedule? A lot of you! Well, this is partly due to waiting as long as we possibly can to fill the scorekeeper chairs. Games get behind when you need a judge and there are only two or three available to cover 40 courts. When you are pitching, do you like waiting for a scorekeeper, wondering if you are even going to get one, or waiting for a judge or waiting for one class to end so you can begin? Think about all of this and instead of trying to place blame on someone else, ask yourself "*Am I doing my part to help?*" Pitching and/or complaining at a tournament is not all you should be responsible or known for.

Another place you can be of help is to teach everyone the correct method of both keeping and calling the scores. Scoring mistakes should not always be placed on the scorekeeper. Perhaps you did not teach them the proper way or you did not call your score correctly or distinctly, so they could fully understand what you said. Talk directly to them, not to the clay pit or your opponent. League play is an ideal place to teach all members, both new and old, the correct way to keep and call the scores and also all rules of pitching and courtesy. Teach everything the correct way, from the beginning. It is a lot easier than allowing wrong ways, that are imbedded through habit. Bad habits are the hardest to change. Learn the rules, obey the rules, teach the rules and ALL will benefit.

One more issue you might want to consider for discussion again in '96 is the limit of entries in a World Tour-

namment. This proposal was, in NO WAY, presented to keep any of you from pitching nor was it meant to limit the number of entries below a certain percentage. I wonder if thinking this was why some of you voted against limited entries. Allowing the entries to be limited was strictly to assist scheduling, due to limited days, number of courts available in the space, and the time allowed. Remember you vote on the locations for World and if they limit our days or court space, what do we do if entries outnumber the facilities and time? I know many of us have to limit entries to our local events. None of us want to pitch and/or work around the clock. Being honest, just how many of you would actually like for your class to be scheduled to begin at 3:00 a.m., or would you be there to keep score or judge? Think about and discuss the issues, thoroughly, and then vote.

Floyd, Donnie Roberts and I were honored guests at the City of Socorro, New Mexico's Tournament of Champions in late August. The tournament was hosted and run by the Socorro Double Ringers sanctioned club and So. NM. HPA. We had a great time with terrific people, all of them who are now treasured friends. It was one of the very best run events I've ever attended. The rules were obeyed, everyone was friendly and courteous, no lack of scorekeepers and no disputes of any kind. These people really know how to run a pleasurable event. Donnie and I were both presented with a beautiful desk type plaque of appreciation. Floyd was given a plaque, for his good nature and sportsmanship and we all received very nice commemorative T-shirts. We want to sincerely thank everyone for the invitation, their hospitality and for making us feel so welcome.

One more thing—Floyd and I will again be going to Hawaii for the holidays, returning in time for the Hacienda, Las Vegas tournament. Therefore I will be unavailable from the 15th of December to around the 15th of January, 1995. Do hope this will not be an inconvenience to any

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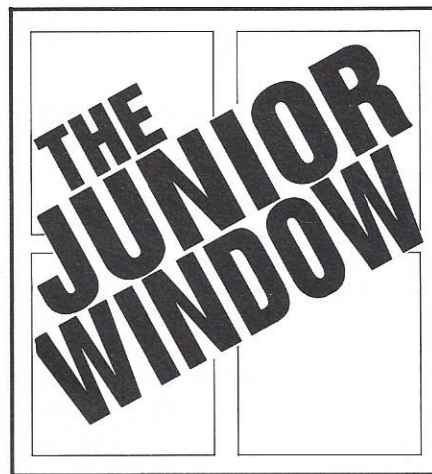
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# 1994 Junior Only Open Continues To Grow—52 Pitchers

The 4th Annual Junior Only Open (West St. Paul, MN) grew to 52 pitchers, and the most successful event yet. The 52 junior pitchers were not neighborhood kids rounded up at the last minute to have a horseshoe contest—these are NHPA card holders, league seasoned members, wearing official lettered tournament shirts, and most tournament veteran pitchers.

This year's event drew pitchers from most corners of Minnesota and one from Wisconsin. Desi Armstrong made the trip from Balsam Lake, WI successful by earning 3rd place in Class A with a 25.5% ringer average and a high game of 33.3%. Yet, the number of pitchers may not have been the major highlight and there were many.

The entertainment and amazement to the spectators and tournament workers, is the Starter Groups. Four of the eight classes were Starter Groups of younger, "shorter" and newer pitchers, pitching from distances less than 30'. It is amazing to watch 7 year old Aaron Mead (who still has to look up to buddies who are 4'0" tall) capture 2nd place in Starter Group A, with a 9.0% average and high game of 23.3%.

There was a great deal of pleasure in seeing Christina Neumann, a legally blind child, earn the 3rd place trophy in Starter Group D. Christina can find her spot to stand from about 12' away, make out the stake and fire. She has never seen her shoe in flight but with coaching by the West St. Paul Junior League staff, she has developed the motion to score points, and thrills from competition few other sports can offer. The Starters are mostly 8-10 year olds and while winning games and trophies is important, the number one thing on their minds is to grow some inches, gain some pounds, and improve pitching skills to get back to the 30' line like the big kids.

The Junior Only Open had more highlights. One being the surprise appearance by newly crowned Junior Boys World Champion, Vance Harren of Badger, Minnesota. Vance pitched out the first shoe for each of the first two shifts, did some judging and just brought awe to the expressions of the youthful pitchers.

Ward Lutz, Junior Program Director (MN), traveled up from Rochester to spend the day and was presented the NHPA Award for the charter with the most Junior members. This plaque was recently presented to Minnesota at the NHPA Awards Banquet, for having 133 Junior NHPA members in 1993.

Dave and Pat Senger, NHPA Game Related Sales Distributors for the area, donate MGSHPA collector pins for each entrant. Dave and Pat also saw to it that the nine entrants from the Brooklyn Park Junior League were wearing official NHPA caps.

The top three pitchers in each six player class earned trophies. Those not winning a trophy had their name put in a drawing for door prizes. Thanks to the Glory Horseshoe Co. as one of the tournament main sponsors, all participants went home with a game related prize, and many were lucky enough to win a new pair of Glory Horseshoes or a Glory T-shirt.

Tournament Director Jessica Dunn, conducted the concessions at the 1993 State Doubles Tournament, and the proceeds were used to purchase souvenir plates for the 1994 Junior Only Open.

The tournament champion is Randy Albrecht of Rochester. Randy was runner-up to Vance Harren in the 1993 MGSHPA State Tournament. Albrecht, now in his third year of competition, set tournament records with a 50.9% average and a high game of 70% while going undefeated. Tournament runner-up was Eric Pokornowski of Cokato. Eric also a state Junior Class A pitcher, averaged 32.4% ringers with a high game of 40% and posted a 10-1 record.

Lance Albrecht, the champion's younger brother, earned his first horseshoe trophy by winning Class D with a 24% average and a high game of 40%.

The Tournament had 21 girls and 31 boys pitching in mixed classes. Class A (a 12 player class) pitched 11 games of 30 shoes using cancellation scoring. The other 30' classes (6 player) pitched a double round robin of 30 shoe games. The starter groups used count-all scoring in their double round robin of 30 shoe games.

The Junior Only Open is ready to become a Mid-West Classic for Junior pitchers. All youngsters from neighboring states are welcome and encouraged to make the trip to West St. Paul. The courts are sheltered in a beautiful structure and there is no threat of rain-out. Clubs and leagues with newer Junior pitchers that are pitching less than 30', can gain tournament experience and thrills in our Starter Groups. The Junior Only Open is always two weekends before Labor Day, thus being a great warm-up for state tournaments. The dates for the 5th Annual Junior Only Open are Aug. 19-20 ('95), so mark your calendars now and start planning to attend.

A warm thank you goes out to the West St. Paul Horseshoe Club and Junior League Director Bob Chavie, who worked hard in hosting this tremendous event. Eighteen year old Jessica Dunn did a super job and has directed all four of these special events. And thanks to the Brooklyn Park Junior League Moms, who provided this year's concession stand.

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# The Magnificent Seven

**I**t was 10 a.m. Sunday, June 5 and the temperature was well on its way to the 100 degree mark. Out on the court stepped Bill Brown, horseshoe in hand as he readied to toss the first shoe of what was to be a 12 day, round the clock pitching marathon by seven members of the Tri-Valley Club in Pleasanton, California.

Bill Brown, Marty Dunn, Lee Henninger, Roy Heyden, Harvey Kooy, Gene Martin and Oliver Smith aren't seven young gun slingers from the old west, but seven senior horseshoe pitchers who had decided to generate a little publicity for the sport and set a record along the way. The recognized record of marathon pitching was held by a six man team from the Pomona Club in Southern California who had gone 200 hours in 1983. This Tri-Valley team was out to not only break the record, but smash it by pitching continually for 270 hours. That was an ambitious goal for this group whose age averaged 69 years.

June was Pleasanton's Centennial Celebration month and the Tri-Valley Club wanted to participate as a local organization in some way. Since the new Senior Center on First Street, a main thoroughfare into town, had installed four regulation horseshoe courts on their front lawn, why not use them during the celebration to attract attention to the Center and the sport. There would be plenty of traffic in the area due to a large shopping center across the street.

Team member Roy Heyden had rigged up special spotlights over one court for the night hours. A tarp canopy was set up so scorekeepers could avoid the midday sun. Two local newspapers and television were notified prior to the event and they cooperated with pictures and stories throughout the marathon. A free

lance writer took numerous photos at various times and submitted to story to the Senior AARP magazine.

The marathon record attempt would be undertaken by six team members who would each pitch a four hour shift every 24. As each shift averaging 800 shoes pitched was ending, the next team member walked onto the court and the pitching continued uninterrupted. The seventh team member and organizer of the event, Marty Dunn, had a different mission in mind. He set out to pitch 24 straight hours. Unfortunately, after 11½ hours and 2,214 shoes pitched without a break, the 71 year old Dunn had to quit because of pain in the pitching shoulder. Nonetheless, unless someone can prove otherwise, it is believed that Marty Dunn set a record for continuous pitching by an individual.

Hot weather, gusty winds, some light rains, blisters, soreness and monotony were all overcome by the remaining 6 members of the team. With the assistance of twelve other club members who shared score-keeping duties, a new record was set.

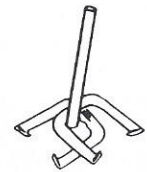
After 270 consecutive hours over a 12-day span, the pitching stopped at 4 p.m. on June 16th. During the course of those 270 hours, 53,138 shoes were pitched, 12,009 ringers were made and 55,471 points scored. All in all, this was quite a feat for these determined seniors who love the game and undertook an amazing way to prove it. Congratulations to "The Magnificent Seven."

The August 1 tournament at Turlock was a relative event. Father, mother and son—Al, Andrea and Gary Adams were in group 1. Brothers Del and John Stockstill competed in Groups 1 and 2. Husband and wife Jack and Connie Spurgeon played in Groups 2 and 5. In Group 2 were mother, father and daughter—Harold and Nancy Camp, plus Donna Camp Eisma. Son-in-law Vince Eisma was in Group 3. Husband and wife Bob and Gail Kane competed in Group 3.

Mo McNally writes that he received a letter from Mrs. Dick Hucke, from Nevada and a former resident of Dublin, California. It was interesting to hear that "Horseshoe Pitching" has been a part of the physical education program in a junior and a senior high school in Nevada. Her two sons are school coaches and regularly taught horseshoes in their P.E. program. These men attended Dublin School in 1958 and were taught by Mo's dad and mom, Bill McNally and Genevieve McNally Lavett.

Vandalism and horseshoe pitching do not mix. Vandals have won out by destroying old-time favorite courts in San Francisco and Oakland. These courts in Gold Gate and Mosswood Parks were, in their day, the premier pitching sites, hosting the biggest events in Northern California, but no more.

## COLORADO

Rich Pintor won his fourth state title and Virginia Sandoval annexed number six. Junior Walter O'Dell, who has two more years of competition, captured his fourth crown. Pintor also won the 2nd Annual Tournament of Champions earlier this year.

It was a double take for Sandoval, who was inducted into the Colorado Hall of Fame for Pitching Excellence. Norm Neumon from Fort Collins won the Hall of Fame Service Award.

The new president for Colorado, Hal Sheppard from Denver, won the Ted Allen Memorial Service Award. Former winners have been Rick Quilico, Longmont; David O'Dell, Edgewater; Bob Champion, Boulder; and Steve Ruddock, Boulder.

The Edgewater Horseshoe Club won the Annual League Tournament with the team of Joleene Elich, Betsy Lyle and Walter O'Dell defeating the Denver Winter Club, 6-3 in the finals.

Six Colorado pitchers won medals at the Annual Senior Games in Greeley. They were Don Schneck, Ray Heim, Dan Bauer, Robert Engel, Marilyn Whisenant and Fran Roth.

## FLORIDA

Sixty-six tournaments are currently scheduled for the 1994-95 season which began September 17. The State tournament will be hosted by the Clearwater Club. Covers over the courts were added—Cost \$22,000, shared by club and city.

The open handicap tournament format is becoming more popular in Florida. Six handicap tournaments are scheduled with the largest to be held in Winter Haven, December 8-10.

The men's state champion is Peter Peterson, Orlando (60%), the women's winner was Carrie Carpenter, Bradenton (66%), Frank Ward from Melbourne was the Elders champion (61%).

The awards banquet at the end of the season entertained 142, the highest in the history of the state. Everett Kelly, State Representative, was the keynote speaker and voiced his support for the addition of horseshoes as a sport into the Florida State School System.

## GEORGIA

The mixed tournament at Marietta, a suburb of Atlanta, had an unusual twist. The Championship class was comprised of the four state Champions, Richard Williams, Iris Sandham, junior Lee Presley and elder Milton Vinson plus four other notable pitchers all of whom are over 51%.

All was going smoothly until the men's champ got to the elders Champ. Then the battle started. The game between Richard and Milton was a 90 shoe affair, one of the longest games on record in Georgia. Richard won, 41-34, pitching 74 ringers out of 90 for an 82.22%. Milton hit 71 ringers for a respectable 78.89%. That's not the last of the story. That game resulted in a tie for first and a playoff between Richard and Milton. Williams defeated Vinson, 42-34 shooting 78.57% to the loser's 73.8. The temperature was a cool 90 degrees. One other contrast. Milton is 78 years old, Richard 27.

## IDAHO

The top ten tournament winners for this state as of August 1994 is headed by Linda VanGorder with 15 wins. The other nine are as follows: Nick Piva 10, Dean Blake and Bill Brown 7 each, Don Moser, Willie Thompson, Bob Thackery and Jim Taylor 6 each, and Lynn Johnson, Chester Whitworth, Don Manwill and Ray Grossaint 5 each.

Nick Pica won the Pocatello Open with a 6-0 record and 53.82 ringer percent. Bob Thackery went 6-1 and 54.01 to win Class A in the Jerome Spring Fling. Nick Piva took first in two other opens, 7-0, 54.03 in the Caldwell Open and 7-1, 54.43 in the Salmon River tournament.

When Jim Wiltse won his last game and thus the State Class A Championship, there weren't many dry eyes around. Jim worked very hard to win this championship and deserved it. White founded and edited the newsletter in 1977 and spent many years as the editor. The other three won state titles and served the association as officers many years.

## NEW YORK

Floyd, New York was the site for the state tournament and the local club hosted 250 pitchers, a new record.

Five defending champions reclaimed their titles including Art Tyson, Sue Twyman, senior John Kozic, Jr., juniors Tim Thurber and Marie Esperti. Art won his fourth straight title with a 10-0 record and 79.1%. His high game was 86.3. Sue won her third straight, posting 10-0 and 74.9. Her high game was 86.9. New to the championship circle was Ed Risley, who moved up to 30 feet to win with a 7-0 record and 64.9%. His high game was 76.7. Past state champion Mike DiMartino posted the best single game when he nailed 31 out of 32 shoes, while Joe Schultz could do nothing more than watch as Mike averaged 96.88.

Hall of Fame inductees were Helen Ouellette, Rod Pratt and Traci Hastings. New officers are Jack Sternberg, president and Sue Twyman, 1st vice president.

## NORTH CAROLINA

The 26th Annual Carolina Dogwood and Southeastern Regional tournament set a new all-time high for entries at 201 from fourteen states. Art Tyson and Lenwood Conner, Jr. represented the Region at the U.S. Nationals.

B.J. Thomas had his share of tournament wins early in the season. He won the Gumtree Open at Lumberton, the Capel Invitational at Troy, shared the State doubles with James Coggins, and captured the Peters Creek Open the Lumberton Open.

Lane Foley from Virginia copped four firsts: Statesville Club Number 1, Number 2 and 3 plus the NC Parks and Recreation tournament.

Rick Bolick, Sr., and Rick Bolick, Jr. finished one-two in the Blane Gurley Marion and the Blue Ridge Club Number 3 tournaments. Junior won the Blue Ridge Club Number 4.

## OHIO

The Ohio Northeast District Horseshoe Tournament at Painesville resulted in playoff in four of the six classes. Oscar Manns copped the Class A title in a playoff against Henry Hostetler. Oscar closed with a 5-1 record and 68.7.

Rich Knerwm went 7-0 to easily win Class B, John Palmer defeated Dave Justine in a playoff in Class C, James Adam was undefeated to win Class D (7-0, 46.7), Bill Calvert's playoff win nailed the Class E crown (7-1, 36.5) and Barry Long closed one game in front of Cindy Morgan (5-1, 30.4) in Class F.

Every pitcher received an "I Pitch Horseshoes" license plate frame. Special helpers in the tournament were "waitress" Peggy Dotson in the food department and scorekeepers Carrie and Brian Dotson, junior members who scored for the entire tournament.

The Tri-County Horseshoe Club finished their winter season last year at Sarbaugh's indoor courts and the winners were the Sarbaughs—Eldon, Rita and Kelly.

## OREGON

Henry Knauff defeated Art Sperber in a playoff to take Class A in the Oregon Money Open at Hermiston. Patty Sapp won the Class A 30 foot championship with a 10-0 record and 66.94%.

Royal Adamson from Belle Fourche is the new vice-president in the state, taking over the duties plus the newsletter from Gene and Yvonne Ficek from Spearfish. The Ficeks were the host couple for the World tournaments in Spearfish in 1989 and 1993. A super job by a super couple.

In junior competition Josh Farley nailed a 62% game. He has easily become one of the pitchers that everyone tries to beat.

## TEXAS

Most of the news out of the Lone Star State centers around tournaments won by Coke Bowker, Henry Carmichael, George Luketic, Wanda Morris, Marie Young, Bill Wade, Mary Ann Kramr, and Damien Moore, but the news note that caught "Chatter's" eye was a piece written by James Miller entitled "Respect for Our Seniors." In part it says:

"One of the reasons I pitch horseshoes is the people. I think horseshoe pitchers are some of the best people in the world. They are not stuck up and are among the friendliest people I know.

"What I really want to talk about is the 70+ seniors. One was talking about moving up to 30 feet and had been eligible for several years. He said 'I haven't moved up because I have been worried about what people would say.' I later observed exactly what this person was talking about. A 70+ senior was playing a younger man. Throughout the match the 'youngster' kept making an issue about the older man throwing at 30 feet. It made the senior uncomfortable and we all know some have quit pitching because of similar poor sportsmanship. It's not what the NHPA is about. Let's support our 70+ short distance pitchers."

## UTAH

The Southern Utah newsletter reveals some figures of the top pitchers in the state. Current ringer percentages as of August 1994 are as follows: John Bracken with a 72.3%. Others in the top 10 are A. Lee Jones 64.2, Lorin Condie 61.8, Shirley Steffen 57.8, Gordon Lytle 56.5, Cleo Wardle 54.2, Gary Wood 54.1, Robert Stewart 50.4, Nate Barney 50.2, and Dennis Ohms 48.6.

The top three juniors are Stacey Glendon 30.2, Jeffery Coulter 27.5 and Klerisa Newby 13.2.

Tola Peterson tops the money list with \$134 in winnings. Glen McAllister is second with \$127, Bill Thompson third \$122.50. Peterson has the most wins with 50 followed by Paul Rudy 47 and Lorin Condie 45.

Shirley Steffen had an 8-2 record to win Class A in the Heart of Kansas.

## VIRGINIA

Regional Director Earl Waggy presented 64 five minute sessions to 530 junior boys and girls at the Montevideo Middle School explaining the basic fundamentals of horseshoe pitching.

He explained how and who can join organized horseshoes and presented horseshoe videos, demonstrating the techniques of horseshoe pitching.

Between videos Earl talked about the 1989 June issue of the *Newsline* picturing the presentation by NHPA Dave Loucks of some horseshoes, plaques and NHPA jackets to then President George Bush and wife Barbara.

All of the children were intrigued by the presentations, the courts and the colored front page photos. The school has two sets of courts with plans to expand to four and on-going plans for horseshoes as part of the physical education at the school

Looks like Waggy has things moving in his area. He certainly has set a pattern for other charters to follow.

## WASHINGTON

Winner of the Oregon Open was Spokane pitcher and NHPA Hall of Famer Henry Knauff, who defeated Art Sperber in a playoff to win the title. Believe it or not, Henry has pitched in all 18 Oregon Opens and this was his first win. Bob Clark was the Class B winner.

Ben and Levi Wood are juniors who participated at the World Tournament in Syracuse. Jim and Phyl Quist stated they were pleased to have the boys in their care and offer a special thanks to Peter Clark, who chaperoned on the train trips and at the campsite. Thanks to each and every one who donated a total of \$680 to help the cost of transportation, lodging and food for the two weeks.

John Perucca from Seattle won Class A in the Spokane Open at Franklin Park. He went 5-0 with a 58.1%. The South Puget Sound Open was won by Margaret Byfield (6-1, 58.22) and John Reedy went 7-0 with 61.37 percent to take the Seattle Open. Jerry Gorton captured the USA Open at Marshall Center, Vancouver, Washington.

## WEST VIRGINIA

Charles Bunner from Fairmont resigned as the Publicity Committee Director for the State but continues to do his "thing" in the publicity department. He still collects articles and have sent news from the state activities to magazines and newspapers. "I would hope that the present officers serving the WVHPA Executive Council will make an effort to "sell" our membership so that local newspapers, secondary school officials, boards of education and even to church organizations and to senior citizens organizations.

The team of Ed Homcomb of Worthington and Paul McIntire from Enterprize won Class A in the mixed doubles horseshoe tournament at Worthington Park. Rick Cale of Masontown won the State horseshoe championship for the fourth straight year. He represented the 1993 NHPA Northeastern regional in the 1994 U.S. Nationals and was second to the champion of both this event and World Tournament winner, Walter Ray Williams.

Heidi Sternberg is the second Wisconsin junior girl to win a World title. The other was Debby Bestul from Eau Claire, who gained the crown four times—1984, 1985, 1987 and 1988. Her only loss in that five year span was to Sandy McLachlin, who followed her junior win with a Women's title the following year at Eau Claire, Wisconsin, Debby's hometown.

Randy Rein and Lorainse Sternberg repeated as Wisconsin State Champions. Shannon Rein took the boys crown and Penny Steinke outdueled 1994 World Champion, Heidi Sternberg, to win the girl's title. The Senior winner was Ralph Maylahn.

### WYOMING

Gillette, the host city for the 1996 World Tournament plans to do everything in their power to make it the best ever. Perry, Georgia will host the 1995 tournament and they promise the same. Looks like we have two big years for the World.

Something new was tried in Wyoming. In their last tournament they crowned 2 champions in each class—a 30' and 40' winner. Carlene Donnelly from South Dakota was 7-0 in Class A. She was called the grand Champion, since winning in the mixed class and having the best record. The 40-ft. winner was a man with the best record and the at-large winner was the man with the highest percentage.

Wyoming had their first state doubles with Harl Geer, Gillette teaming with Jim Duncan from Lingle to win Class A. Bob Douglas, Upton teamed with Nadine Sieg, Gillette to win Class B. Glen Cheshier and George Willey, both from Hulett too Class C and two Gillette pitchers Bob Mudge and Moni Thomsen took Class D.

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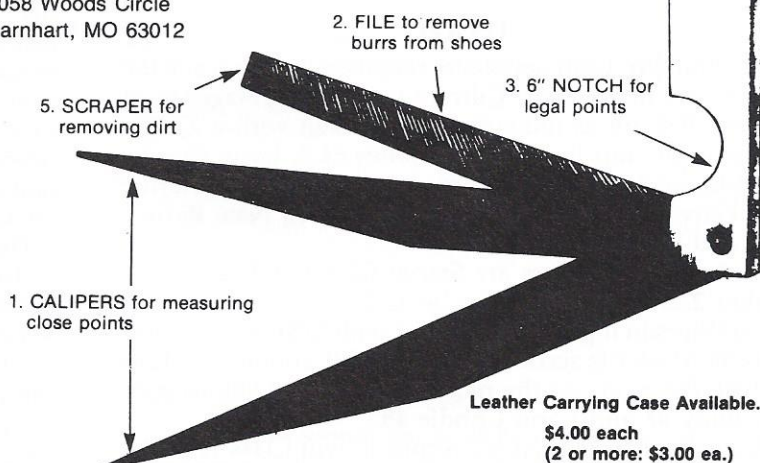
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# The Incredible Triple Flip Quarter Turn

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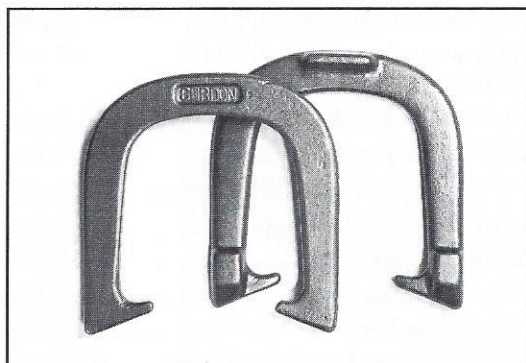

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# Hall of Fame

Our 1994 Hall of Fame Banquet in Syracuse, New York was a fun-filled experience. We had two 1994 inductees—Tari Powell of Illinois and Harold Darnold of Iowa. Tari was not able to be present, but Donnie Roberts gave a history of her records and pitching performances. I was honored to be chosen to give the induction speech for Harold Darnold, who responded with some interesting and funny experiences he has had since 1941.

Past articles of mine concerning various brands of old time pitching shoes have brought many interesting letters, phone calls and conversations. At the 1994 World Tournament, Frank Hiendlmayr of Ohio gave me 11 horseshoes. Some are marked Sears and have hooks. One is a Stallion (Manson Metal of Reading, PA) with a cut out hook. The rest are old round 2½ pound shoes with no hooks. Jake Hoff, of North Carolina, brought a pair of 1947 Lattore shoes in good condition.

John Decker, of Michigan, came up with a very unusual find. He had a pair of horseshoes painted green, that appear to have never been pitched, and they were in a cloth bag. They are imprinted Cadillac Malleable Iron Co., Cadillac, MI. They have a short hook and square heel calk underneath. Some people are wondering if Cadillac Motor Division, at some time, put out a few pair of horseshoes as souvenirs. There were playing rules included, that were still intact, that stated the peg height was 12" with a 2" incline toward the other stake. This dates the rules being printed in the late 1930s. Others spoke with me during the World Tournament and I could be receiving more interesting contributions in the months ahead.

Clyde Matthews, of Oklahoma City, called me and as a result sent me two real good pair of Hammer Forged Giant Grip of Osh Kosh, Wisconsin. One pair is stamped A and the other pair is stamped B on the end of the heel calk. He sent another shoe with two indentations in the toe end, an indented ringer hook on the heel end and a 2 stamped in a circle. We have not identified this shoe.

At our Missouri State Tournament, Roger Schnur, of St. Charles, gave me an old Gordon that had more of

an enlarged button under the heel calks and has a real short heel calk. There was also a half moon cut out and Roger thought that the pitcher who used this shoe must have hit the peg a lot to wear out such a hole. I advised him that this was the way the older Gordons were made. Mr. Gordon re-designed the shoe in the 1950s and the cut out was removed. I don't believe the shoes have ever been changed since Mr. Gordon's passing, but many of today's pitchers do not know about the older model.

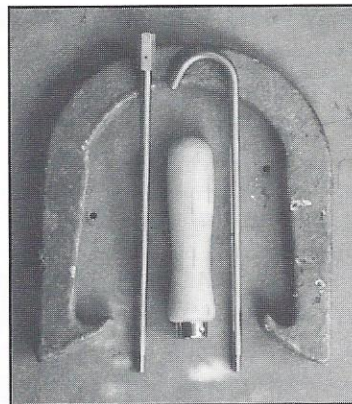
Our Hall of Fame display at the 1994 Iowa State Fair in Des Moines was enjoyed by many people. We had people from 20 states and 5 foreign countries sign our register. Wally Weiher, Fort Worth, TX came to the exhibit just to see his old pair of Gordons he ordered out of a Montgomery Ward catalog in the early 1940s.

Many thanks go to the Iowa State Fair, and its director, Marion Lucas, for giving us this space each year. This year they had even made us a new banner to hang over our exhibit. I do want to thank the Iowa Hawkeye President, Mic Wilson, for all of her help in getting the exhibit ready and for lining up the volunteers who manned the booth each day of the fair. We could not keep this exhibit alive without the help of people in the Iowa Hawkeye Association. I have much more material on hand than what is shown at Des Moines, but we are limited in exhibit space and also what I can get into my car. It is my desire to someday have a permanent home for the NHPA Hall of Fame and Museum, and we seem to be making progress toward this goal. In the meantime, we are pleased to have the opportunity to display only a part each year at Des Moines.

When Glen Portt served as NHPA President, several Hall of Fame inductees were given photo plaques that had their name and the year of their induction. There is a plastic plate under which you were to insert your photo and your instructions were to keep this plaque in your possession until it was called for by the NHPA. On the back of the plaque should be a sticker that says "Property of the NHPA." I am now asking all inductees who received these plaques to please

send them to me, with a photo included. I have been able to get some of them back in the past few years, but have many more to go. The plastic plate is 4½" x 6½"; so we need a photo of comparable size. I do not know for sure how many of these that Mr. Portt distributed, but I also have some for people that he was not able to locate. More recent inductees are asked to please send a photo and we will get a plaque made. In a later issue of *Newsline*, I will try to list the approximately 80 or so people whose photos we do not have. We have some wall space in our Hall of Fame exhibit to display these photo plaques each year. It is now time to begin trying to complete the collection.

As of this writing, I regret to report that one of our Hall of Fame Committee members, Ralph Dykes, is very ill. Please keep him in your thoughts and prayers.



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# The Toll of Time

## THOMAS R. HAINES

Tom Haines, an outstanding competitor in pingpong and horseshoe pitching in Kansas, died early Saturday evening, June 15, 1994 at his home in Hutchinson. He lived many years in Topeka, KS while serving in the National Guard, winning several City Championships and many local tournaments. After retirement he worked his own farm near Hutchinson until 1992. Tom (62) was married to his wife Barbara nearly 42 years and had 3 children and 8 grandchildren, all of whom survive along with his mother Dorothy Haines and a sister.

## BILL STONER

William "Bill" Stoner, age 71 of Ashland, Oregon died May 5, 1994 in Medford. Born in Outlook, Montana, Bill moved with his parents to California where he was raised on a dairy. In 1941 he went to work for the Southern Pacific Railroad in Ashland

and in 1942 married Ola Grimm, his wife for 52 years who survives him. Bill served three years in the U.S. Army and later became active in the VFW. Horseshoe Pitching and Bowling was his recreation and he helped build the horseshoe courts in Phoenix, Oregon, where he hosted many tournaments. He was also an active volunteer for disabled persons and did enough community work that in 1989, he received the Community Service Award from the Jackson County Board of Commissioners.

## WILLIE JOE THOMPSON

On July 19, 1994, Idaho lost a good friend and avid horseshoe pitcher with the death of Willie Joe Thompson, Nampa, Idaho. Willie Joe was born in Keystone, Oklahoma on July 20, 1929 and moved to Wilder, Idaho in 1941. He worked for the Owyhee Telephone Company in Homedale for 35 years, retiring in 1985. Willie Joe

served as President of the ISHPA for two years, 1992 and 1993, and was a winner of the Class A State Doubles Championship in 1994.

He is survived by his wife Verna, son, three daughters, twelve grandchildren, one great-grandchild, one brother, one sister and their families.

## FLOYD CLAYTON TOOLE

Legendary Arkansas Pitcher and NHPA Hall of Fame member Floyd Toole died June 11, 1994 in Little Rock. He was 76 years old and a retired engineer with the Missouri Pacific Railroad. In recent failing health, Floyd and his wife Genia, celebrated their 56th wedding anniversary just 2 days prior to his death.

While never winning a World Championship. Floyd Toole was one of the best pitchers of his day. He played in 13 World Tournaments and 7 times finished in the top 10 of the Championship Group. Eighty percent tournaments were common place for Floyd whose best World finish was a tie for 2nd in 1965 when he won 31 games while losing just 4 and averaging 84.5%. Skilled at trick shots and exhibitions, Floyd once threw 203 ringers out of 210 shoes in a demonstration. During his peak years, Toole sometimes practiced 8 hours a day tossing up to 1000 shoes.
