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# President's Message

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**M**aking this magazine come together is not always an easy task. One might think that because we publish only every other month, it should be a snap. I wish that were the case. Sometimes I have to scratch to find things to fill the last few pages. If it were not for the regular column contributions of Bob Champion, Bob Dunn, Dick Hansen and Bev Born, I would often have a real problem. Fortunately, things seem to trickle in, sometimes at the last minute and I somehow find enough to fill the standard 32 pages, and once in awhile, even more.

Contributions from members do help. I probably use better than 95% of what I receive, holding back only the occasional inappropriate letter from someone who has a personal axe to grind or wants to continue harping on a subject readers have grown tired of. I know, some of you want to see more tournament results. But, we long ago determined that other than World, Regionals, State and some other special events that appeal to a broader base of readers, local results, often many months old, would not be printed. State newsletters do a good job in that area.

The two most difficult columns for me to write are this one and The Toll of Time. It is tough to come up with a fresh topic for the President's Message each issue. It would be nice if there were always a new interesting and thought provoking subject on which to write, but that is just not the reality of things. Toll of Time is often difficult because I have to write about fellow pitchers, people I knew, some very closely, who are no longer with us. Such is the case this issue. Bob Rosa, my closest friend and fellow RV'er is gone, the victim of a very fast moving, inoperable cancer that took him in 3 months. Don Gregson, a good friend and several time teammate in out-of-state events is gone, taken by a sudden heart attack. Death is part of life and we all have had some encounter with it. When it is close, it's never easy to handle, though some do better than others. Fortunately,

horseshoe pitchers are like a second family to many and members will be there in time of need. I believe this camaraderie, this fellowship among members, is our strongest asset.

I flew to Gillette, Wyoming on August 22nd and stayed 4 days doing a site inspection of the facilities we will use and making calls on several motels in town. Cam-Plex is a multi-event facility on the outskirts of Gillette. Our portable horseshoe courts will be set up in the Central Pavilion which is air-conditioned. There is room for bleachers on only one side. The adjoining East Pavilion which is not air-conditioned, will house all the various administrative support functions including game related product sales and many display booths. Auto parking is just outside the buildings with some 160 RV sites just across the street. An additional 500 RV sites, all with hookups, are on the Cam-Plex grounds. All our members traveling with motor-homes or trailers are encouraged to make reservations for the Cam-Plex RV park. Rates are \$15.00 a day or a flat \$125.00 for the entire event.

Gillette is a popular stop-over during the summer for travelers on I90. Motels are normally booked to near capacity each night and because it is the only major place to stop for 100 miles on either side, motel rates appear to push the \$75.00 and up range. For these reasons, I spent nearly 2 days visiting with general managers of several motels to negotiate special room rates and room blocks for the NHPA. I was successful in getting six properties to work with us and set aside a total of 470 rooms at special rates until June or July 1st of 1996. The discounts in some cases exceed 25% of the normal rate. Four of the motels are less than 3 miles from Cam-Plex, two about five miles. You are asked to support the NHPA and these motel properties by making your lodging reservations with them. Complete details can be found in this issue.

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## *Dave's Court Report*

---

On October 12, I will fly to Tokyo, Japan as their guest to represent the NHPA and horseshoe pitching at the "95 Sports For All International Fair." This 10 day event will take me to several different cities to put on demonstrations and clinics for the Japanese people. In addition to Tokyo, I will be in Urayasu, Kobe, Kakogawa and Osaka. The "Sports For All" slogan means sports that can be enjoyed by everyone in all generations regardless of physical limits and/or strength. My wife Cathie will also make the trip, at our expense.

During the first week of November, I will be in the Nashville, Tennessee area to attend the Music City Team Tournament and meet with Jack Freeman and attorneys. We hope to be able to take the next step in pursuing the formation of a charitable NHPA entity that would allow Dr. Freeman to donate land and a 38 court complex to us. We envision this as one day becoming the site of a permanent NHPA Hall of Fame. Such a project would not be without

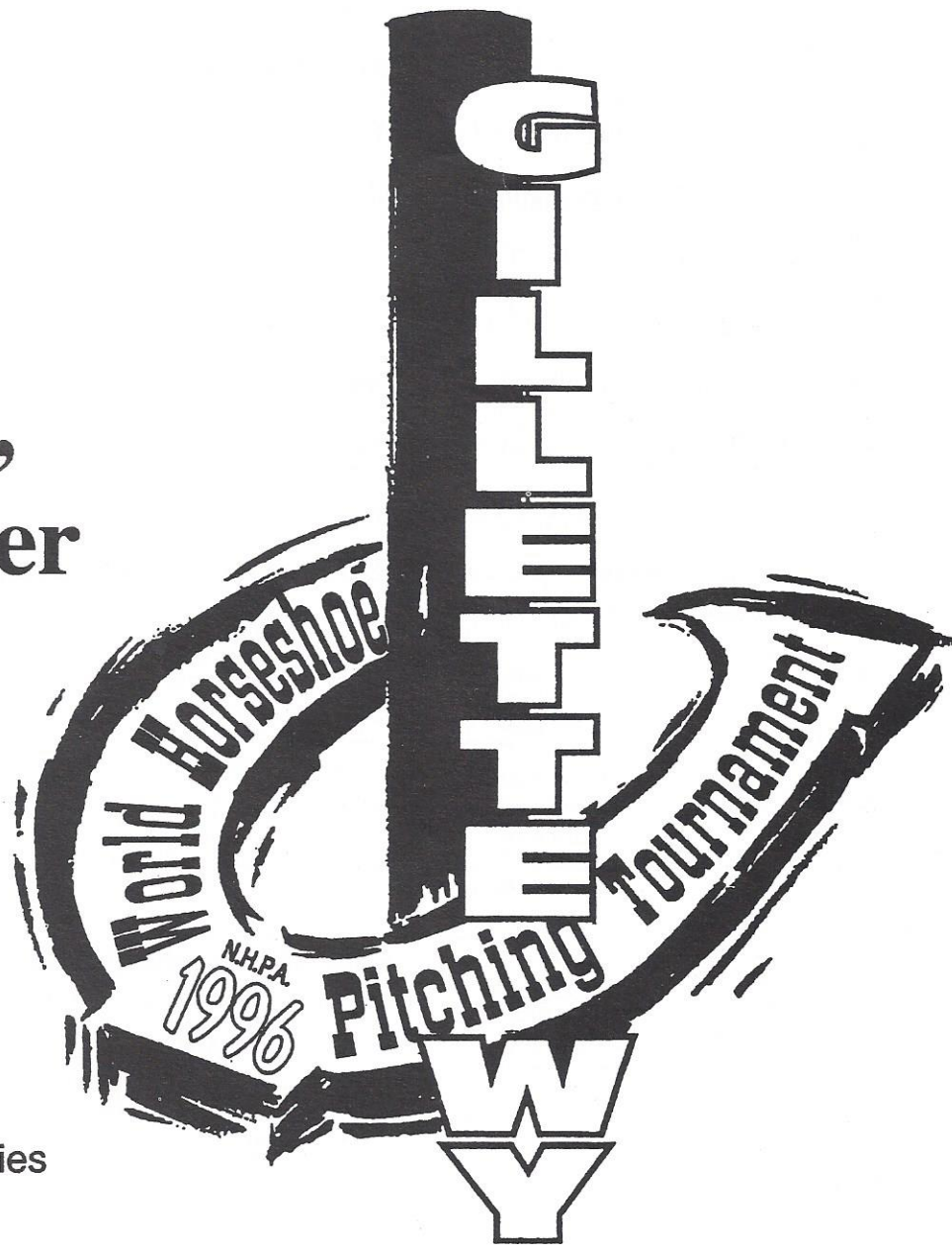
expense which I explained to the 1995 convention delegates. However, the delegates supported moving ahead despite many unknowns at this time. Hopefully, after the November meeting I will have enough details to publish a more comprehensive report of the project.

This word received from our friend Jack Whiting, President of Nova Scotia HHPA. Horseshoe pitching gained worldwide recognition when the G-7 Summit was hosted by Canada. One sport was asked to be demonstrated and play conducted. It was horseshoe pitching and for 3 days and evenings, Russell Barnes, Art Drisdelle and Clarke Brown organized and instructed all who came to the courts. The game was introduced for the first time to many, and the Canadian media took note. Congratulations to our Canadian horseshoe friends for all their recent promotional work, not only in Nova Scotia, but throughout the country, in their successful efforts to bring the 1997 World Tournament to Kitchener. We look forward to being there.

There has been a lot of talk in Canada and U.S.A. on pitching horseshoes 30' vs. 40'. I have a suggestion that should help all pitchers and cut down on the complaints.

#### **New Set-up**

Girls & Boys.....30' Courts  
(until 17 yrs. old)

(All) Jrs. to move up to ..35' Courts

Men's Professional.....40' Courts

Senior Men .....35' Courts

#### **New Rules**

Women: On 35' courts would release the shoe before the 32' foul line (women to have 3' advantage)

Men: On 35' courts would release the shoe before the 35' foul line

**Note:** I believe Jr. Boys would find it better to move up to 35' rather than the 40' courts. A lot of Juniors drop out because the 10' adjustment is too much. After they master the 35' courts they are ready to play 40' courts. It would be better for everyone to move up or down five feet at any one time.

This would be a system to help everyone play the game of horseshoe pitching a lot longer in life with less trouble. A change now is better for future players. I thank you. Hope I have helped out in some way.

Dear Dave,

I was a delegate at the 1995 NHPA World Tournament Convention in Perry. A motion for 50 shoe games in all class play for the 1996 World Tournament passed with little or no discussion though it was only brought up as you sought support to continue the present format.

Most of us like the idea of pitching more shoes and perhaps everyone was unprepared for this motion. I have since heard some people, including a member of the Executive Council who have voiced serious concerns about it. I enjoyed the 1994-95 format of at least 600 shoes over 3 days for all players more than any previous format of fewer shoes. However, I realize there is a limit.

If we added 10 shoes per game, that would have been at least 50 minutes per shift or almost 5 hours per day in 1995. That means a 19.5 to 20 hour day. We all know how difficult it was to fill the scorekeeper's chairs and find judges to start some shifts. I am afraid it will be much more difficult if we tack on another 50 minutes to their sitting time or ask for them at midnight or later. Gillette will probably attract more entries than we had in '95, and if so, something will have to give.

Our Bylaws **Article XI Section 2** says the Executive Council may authorize a limit to the number of entries "by any manner deemed suitable." I would be disappointed to have my entry rejected because there wasn't time for everyone to pitch 15 fifty shoe games.

Perhaps the Executive Council could shorten the games (rather than limiting entries) by using the 1st paragraph of the same section of the Bylaws mentioned above,"..the Executive Council may approve a waiver if it will aid in the promotion of the sport and/or success of the event." If it is decided to pitch 50 shoe games and limit entries, I have a suggestion for a limiting method. Why not put the names of all of us who partici-

pated in the convention in a hat and draw them out to determine the first persons who will be on a standby list. I would be very interested to hear what other members think about this subject.

#### **Editor's Comment**

Thank you, Gregg, for your astute observation. Moving to 50 shoe games could indeed impact the tournament in a negative manner especially if the entry level reaches 1,200 or more. If 50 shoe games had been used in Perry with just the 5 shifts a day that we had in the first week, the last shift in some cases where play-offs were involved would not have finished until around 3 a.m.

If six shifts a day are required, which we expect in Gillette, 50 shoe games would force us to start the 6th shift at around 3 a.m. in the morning. As you point out, we could not fill scorekeeper chairs or find judges let alone spectators or office workers at these hours. The 50 shoe game question will be discussed at the January Council meeting.

We cannot allow personal preference by some to pitch more shoes jeopardize common sense scheduling of the tournament. Above all, we will not allow it to limit the number of entries we can take. We do not want to turn away any entry that is received by the proper deadline. My guess is that 40 shoe games in class play will remain.

# FOCUS ON PROMOTION

## Prelude To Promotion Being Proud, Knowing Our Tradition

Few may realize that the majority of our members have been associated with the NHPA for less than ten years. A small percent of our members exceed twenty years, and very few were involved in the NHPA back in the 1950s or before. To most, what has happened in the last couple years is the level of awareness of our sport and of our association.

Our NHPA has existed since 1920 and surely there is a lot that has taken place during all those decades. Surely there is a lot to know, to talk about, but do we know about our history? Are we prepared to use information about our rich tradition in our promotion efforts? Promotion is just not being out there doing things—it is also knowing back information that can enhance our efforts.

The best promotional efforts will come from an organization that is proud and can speak fluently about its past, its history and its tradition.

Knowing where we come from, and where we have been will make our membership a more proud membership.

It is pretty safe to assume that few charters have documented histories of our sport in their states. Many states had state championships as far back as the 1920s and the 1930s. While there may be accurate lists of state champions, is there information available about these tournaments, where they were held, how many participated, what divisions were involved? This is all interesting information to be provided to charter members and may be very surprising to the actual details that might be uncovered in the research.

Nearly every newspaper ever published in the United States is now available to review from micro-film. State historical centers usually contain research centers that have files of film for all newspapers for the

entire state. Local libraries have micro-film of local newspapers. If you enjoy doing research, give this source a look and what you find will make excellent articles for charter newsletters and some may be appropriate to put in *Newsline*.

Gary Kline is the NHPA historian and has done some marvelous work in research. His book on World Tournaments 1909-1980, is an excellent resource and just plain fabulous to read. More members need to purchase this book and make it available to fellow club members. The books are available through all of our Game Related Sales dealers.

If we can only talk about the past five years or so of our sport to our members or the public, that is a shallow view in comparison to what we can present in sharing our full tradition. As NHPA members we also have an obligation to know about our history and about our sport beyond the scope of our own involvement of our local league or charter.

There is another link to our past—the collecting and preservation of early-day pitching shoes. There are some of our members that are avid collectors. Once into it, it can become a most interesting hobby in itself. Collections of old pitching shoes make excellent displays at tournaments and State Halls of Fame.

It is surprising how many members have never seen a hookless shoe, yet they were made into the 1940s. The first tournament shoe with hooked calks was designed and patterned by Putt Mossman of Eldora, Iowa in 1927. There are few Mossman shoes yet in existence. That is one of the reasons for making this point. The more members we have out there looking in antique shops and wherever to collect these artifacts of our sport, the better the chance to preserve these links to our sport's past. It is so unfortunate to hear about how these old collectables have been discarded through the years.

Just maybe we can develop a swap and trade series in *Newsline* to help those with collections or those wanting to begin a collection.



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# PROMOTION JOTTINGS

■ As the NHPA took official and sole governorship of the sport of horseshoe pitching in 1921, it was through the merger of two other major organizations along with several state associations that had been recently formed through the guidance of Art Headlough of the Ohio Buckeye Horseshoe Pitchers' Association.

The two organizations that had begun the formation of organized

events, although they had differing rules, were the National League of Horseshoe and Quoit Pitchers and The Grand League of Horseshoe Pitchers. From Mr. Headlough's horseshoe pitchers handbook published in 1920, we can be introduced to two individuals that gave our sport the start that made it a sport.

Here is, in part, the write-up provided by Art Headlough:



O.W. Anderson

O.W. Anderson was one of the pioneers in putting the horseshoe game on an organized basis. He is a loyal horseshoe booster, and partly to him some of the credit belongs for bringing about the first national horseshoe tournament ever held in the United States, in which the first national championship was declared in 1915. For many years he has been active in promoting the sport in Kansas; also he is a manufacturer of horseshoes of which many have been furnished to pitchers throughout the United States.

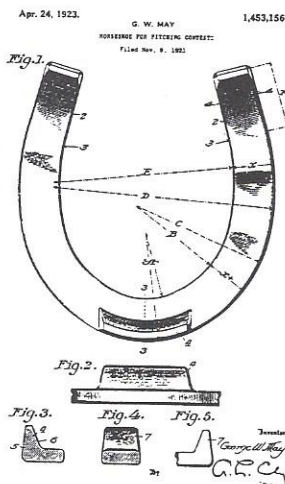
Harry G. Haynes is one of the best horseshoe boosters in the United States. It was him that organized the National League at St. Petersburg, FL. He spent several hundred dollars in the support of the game. He plays the game himself and enjoys attending a national tournament or big match.

Mr. Haynes is one of Akron's big men, being president of the Ken-

more Banking Co. and vice president of the Akron Realty Co. Through him the national tournament, 1920, was awarded to Akron, Ohio. Here is a photo of the actual approved patent application by George May. He filed application Nov. 9, 1921 and received approval on April 24, 1923. If you can find one of these, you have a treasure!

The NHPA negotiated special room blocks and rates with the following properties which you are encouraged to support. Make your reservations as early as possible by calling the following recommended properties direct. In all cases, be sure to ask for the special horseshoe pitcher rate which applies July 21-August 4, 1996. All rates subject to tax.*

## **Approximately 2.5 miles from Cam-Plex**

*On Hwy. 14-16, are two side by side motels separated by a breakfast/lunch cafe, a dinner restaurant and lounge.*

# Regional Director's Report

We get facts and figures every day, most of which is bad news. Not this time. The shoe checking at this year's World Tournament was shown a substantial improvement over last year. Of the 4,694 shoes checked last year, 310 did not pass—or 6.6%. This year of the 3,786 shoes checked, only 100 did not pass—or just 2.6%.

The credit for this improvement must be given back to the Regional Directors, Charters and the pitchers themselves. It looks as if we are learning that all shoes pitched in the World Tournament must comply with NHPA rules or they cannot be used. To make this look even better consider the fact that of the 100 defective shoes found, 1/3 were new shoes right out of the box. No pitcher wants to be sent outside to the grinder to make a shoe legal, and it looks as if the message has been heard.

I have had many people ask what kind of shoes the World Champ was using, so here it is. Of the 7 World Champs crowned at this year's tournament, two used Deadeyes, two Imperials, two Cal-flips and one used Hentons. I would like to thank all those who helped with the shoe checking at this World Tournament and a special thanks to Earl and Pat Waggy and John and Jan Decker for the many hours they spent checking shoes. Thanks.

## Regional Director Reports

**John McCormack, RD from Hawaii**, reports that their State Championships were held September 2nd through the 4th on the island of Oahu. They had contestants from the islands of Hawaii (Kona), Maui, and Oahu. Jack Frias won the State Championship with a 9-0 record. Jack has now won four state championships since 1988. John, who won class M at last January's Las Vegas tournament reports that they expect 20 contestants from Hawaii to enter the 1996 tournament.

From **New York State, Regional Director Lance Twyman**, reports that the Charter will maintain its membership at 500+ for the third straight

year. The officers of the State Charter have been working hard to achieve that goal and the results have been good. Having the World Tournament in New York State was a great impetus for the boosting of membership initially, but maintaining it at that level is the real challenge. One of the biggest reasons for the success they feel has been the introduction of a state newsletter. It has helped to bring the pitchers of New York closer together as a group, has sparked new interest in horseshoes and has brought many new members into the NHPA.

**Earl Waggy, Regional Director, Virginia**, reports that Jerry Shifflett was asked to be on hand at the opening ceremonies of the Virginia State Games to represent the sport of horseshoe and hand out NHPA literature. Jerry also spent three days at the State Fairgrounds last March during the Virginia Outdoors Seminar passing out NHPA literature. Earl reports that it is good to have Jerry back in horseshoe again.

**Regional Director Pat Wemhoff, Nebraska**, reports that Al Rosenbohn and the Lincoln Horseshoe Club had a very busy summer. They put on the Cornhusker State Games, with all classes full, and also held the Eastern Nebraska Tournament with a record 87 pitchers. Thanks should go to Steve and Cindy Barry, the Secretary and Statistician, for setting up the Eastern Nebraska Tournament.

**Dave Garbani, RD for Southern California**, passed along a report sent to him by Orville Lokken on the 2nd annual Jesse Gonzales Invitational Horseshoe Tournament. This was a \$2,000 tournament with the winner getting \$750. The fact that the event attracted 6-time Champion Walter Ray Williams, Jr. and Kevin Cone, the 1992 World Champion, coming all the way from Alta, Iowa, tells me that horseshoe pitching is still very much alive. They obviously didn't come for the money, they came to lend their talents for the promotion of the sport. They deserve our heartfelt thanks for their unselfish efforts. The rest of the 6 man field included Frank Farley, Phoenix, AZ; Jesse Gonzales, Los Osos, CA; Spud

Napier, Seal Beach, CA; and Allen Ovieda, Solvang, A. The two-day event had Walter Ray the leader after Saturday's play with a 5 and 0 record, but Kevin came back in Sunday's ladder round to edge Walter Ray in the final game 42 to 36, after falling behind early. They are already thinking about the '96 tournament and hope to make it even better.

Look for one of our Regional Directors in the movies. **Bud Schardine of Utah** got called to do a spot in a 20th Century Fox movie called Independence Day, which is why he was not at the World Tournament. Bud was in 4 scenes, one with movie star Randy Quaid. Bud said it is to be out next 4th of July and it was exciting, interesting, and with an 87 million budget they pay and feed you well. We will be looking for you in the movie Bud, but I hope he keeps his "day job," promoting horseshoes.

**Phil Zozzaro**, the long-time **Regional Director from New Jersey**, has decided to step down as Regional Director. Phil will be a hard one to replace. He is a good worker, and one you can always count on to help at the World Tournament for judging or anything else that needs to be done. Thanks for your many years of service to the NHPA and stay in touch with your friends in horseshoe, Phil.

# Sanctioned Club/League News

At this writing, the second day of October, there are still about 53 clubs unreported for '95. Three of these are junior leagues, some are leagues not ending until Oct. or Nov. In any case, all of them should have had their required, annual membership reports submitted, *long ago!*

This late in the year there should be no reason why the membership reports have not been sent to this office. It would be so considerate if all CL/LG Directors, people in charge, could only realize just how important it is for me to receive these reports as soon after your league play begins, as possible. This one form lets me know that you are still an active club and that you wish to remain in this program.

Notices will be sent to all that have not reported in late November and then those not reporting by December 31 will have their sanctions revoked. As always, I am still striving for a year without any cancellations. Sometimes extenuating circumstances prevent this. Things beyond one's control, such as losing courts because they are located on private property. This is happening to one

club this year. Most other reasons, except perhaps complete disbanding, can usually be worked out. Corresponding with me would be a good place to start and greatly appreciated. Please let me know your problems, your plans, your reasons, whatever, instead of just leaving me dangling.

I would like to remind everyone doing either tournament or league results/stats to please, always use the same name for each individual on all such reports. Using nicknames, first names one time, middle names or pet names the next time can sure mess up any records kept on a computer. This causes one person, listed under two different names, to come up in the computer as two people with the same card number.

This also may be the cause of some Charter averages not agreeing with NatStat averages. If you have 3 events listed as Chuck Doe and two listed under Charles Doe, you can see where your averages or events pitched would not be correct. This also happens when Jr., Sr., II or III is omitted one time and used the next time. How is anyone to know when John Doe's event comes in, if

it should be entered as Jr., Sr., etc? Which card number are the results to be entered under?

Are you one that is quicker to complain than to compliment? Unfortunately most of us are. Do we blame it on human nature or do we try to correct ourselves from being so fast to judge one's faults and not give credit for their good?

There are times when wrongs are done which need to be corrected and brought to the attention of those with authority to settle or make certain rulings. If or when we have what we may feel is a legitimate complaint towards a fellow member, league director, Charter or National Officer, put it in writing, date and sign it, then put it aside for awhile. Later, after thinking about it, if your feelings haven't changed, make copies and send to each of the officials that apply to the situation. Doing this will stimulate action to settle and clear up wrongs or misunderstandings.

Just voicing one's dissatisfaction among fellow members, is not the way to solve any problem. Contact, in writing, to the people in charge if action is needed and standing behind your convictions will usually bring much quicker resolution of any problem.

As another year comes close to its end, I sincerely want to thank each and every one of you that have given me your support for another term in office and most importantly, to all of you that have taken the time to put in writing some much appreciated "Kind Words." Nothing makes one feel better than hearing good words and getting encouragement from those they work with and care about.

My gratitude, for all of your good work, reports, time dedicated to this program, your club and to horseshoes, goes out to all of you. May you all have a very happy and healthy holiday season.

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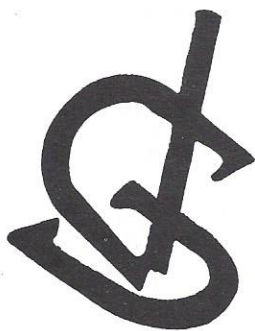
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# News Releases

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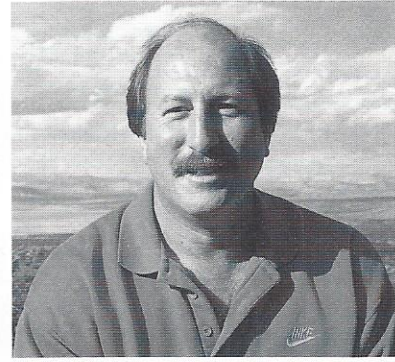
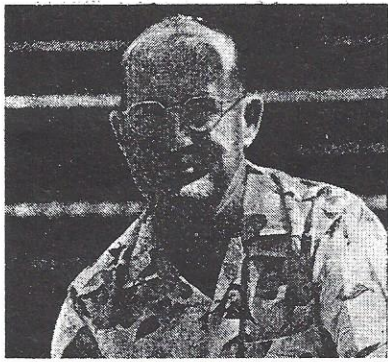
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## A Tribute To The Gregson Family

**H**orseshoe Pitching NHPA style has long been a family affair. That's not to say that Women and Juniors always had equal opportunity, because years ago they didn't. Prior to World War II, horseshoe pitching was pretty much a game for the men with the wife and kids, at least those who were interested, coming along to watch, keep score or just get together with the ladies and children of other pitchers.

There had been some World Championship play for women, but that had ended in 1935. After the War, things began to change, not rapidly, but at least noticeably with the re-introduction of a women's championship at the 1947 World Tournament.

Katherine Gregson, Katie as she was called, proposed at the 1947 annual convention to allow women back into the World Tournament. The proposal was unanimously passed and a few days later, with some hastily donated prize money, nine ladies competed for the championship which has continued each year since.

Katie was the wife of Archie Gregson. The two of them have long been considered to probably be the most valuable husband-wife team in the history of the NHPA. In 1941, Archie was elected Secretary of the NHPA, the same year Katie was elected Treasurer. They both served these offices until 1947 when family and job obligations made it difficult

to give the NHPA the time they felt necessary. During their time in office, the war was underway and no World Tournaments were held in the years 1942-45. It was a difficult time and holding the NHPA together without compensation in those years was no easy task.

In 1950, Archie again was elected to the position of NHPA Secretary. He held this office until 1955. For one year, 1958, Archie served as NHPA President. It was in this time span that Murray, Utah was the site of World Tournaments. Between 1947-1959, twelve World Championships were held in Murray. Much of the credit for the success of these tournaments went to Archie for his counsel and guidance but Katie was always there helping out.

The Gregsons had two sons, Jimmy the eldest and Don. Some 8 years separated the boys. Both pitched horseshoes, though there is much more data on Don than Jimmy. At the 1946 World Tournament in Des Moines, young Don, age 4, was able to pitch an occasional ringer from three feet. The next year in Murray at age 5, Don was throwing ten feet.

At age 8, Don began competing in tournaments and won the Southern California Junior Championship at age 11, taking the title from his brother Jim who had held it three years. Don continued to win the SCHPA Junior title until age 15, which was the upper age limit for

juniors at that time.

All of the Gregson family were good horseshoe pitchers. Archie played in the ever tough championship class of the California Opens which included the great names of Fernando Isais, Guy Zimmerman, Louie Dean and Lowell Gray, to name just a few. Not being of championship caliber, Archie pitched in some World Tournaments, but spent most of his time orchestrating the event. Katie was twice the Women's World Champion, winning in 1947 and again in 1954.

Data is not at hand to tell us much about Jim but Don Gregson became the best pitcher in the family. Not only did Don excel in horseshoes, but baseball as well. He was drafted out of college by the Minnesota Twins as a pitcher and played for eight years until an arm injury prevented further play. He then became a part-time baseball scout as he worked full time in the lumber industry.

In 1954 and 55, Don pitched in the World Junior Championships in Murray, Utah. He finished in 2nd place. As with most juniors then and still today, Don found that other interests and school gave him little time for horseshoes, so he got away from the game for nearly 20 years.

In 1984 he was back with a determination that could not be denied. Playing in Class C of the California State Championship that year, Don

## A Special Tournament

It was a round robin of seven, each round containing a bye. In the

very last round Dalton, who was undefeated up to that point lost a 1-point game to newcomer Dave Thomas, throwing Dalton into a first place tie with Hellerud; and Pittman dropped another unexpectedly to find himself in a tie with Koch, who he had defeated in the round robin. So the playoffs were set.

Dalton, who had defeated Hellerud, would play him one more game to decide first and second place and Pittman and Koch would do it again for third and fourth. Both games were close all the way, and decided by one point each on the last pitch.

That's also why this was a special tournament. Oh yes, Hellerud is Tournament Champion; Dalton, head-held-high second; Koch, third; and Pittman, fourth but for the difference of about 4 points could have won it all. Boy, it was fun to watch.

vowed to become a top notch pitcher. It was only five years later, 1989, that Don finished 17th in the Championship group of the World Tournament. He pitched in the championship group three more times, each time that work permitted him to attend the World. He was the winner of the Valley of the Sun in 1988 and California State Champion in 1993. In 1994, Don was one of the six finalists in the U.S. National Championships in Syracuse.

Like his mom and dad, Don also served horseshoes administratively. He was a past president of the Southern California HPA and a member of the NHPA Rules Committee since its inception.

Many awards were bestowed upon Archie and Katie for their service to the NHPA and horseshoe pitching. Both were granted lifetime membership in 1956 and in 1959, they were joint recipients of the Stokes Memorial Award. Archie was one of the 7 initial charter members inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame in 1966. Katie garnered the NHPA Hall of Fame honor in 1975. The SCHPA Hall of Fame inducted Archie in 1970, Katie in 1975 and Don in 1993.

The Gregson family lived all their lives in California, much of it in Crestline. Archie passed away January 7, 1966 at the age of 57, only days after his employment transferred him to Texas. Katie Died August 4, 1994 as Don was pitching in the championship finals of the World Tournament in Syracuse. Don died June 17, 1955 at age 52 only four months after his employment had transferred him out of state. Like father, like son, both Archie and Don died at young ages from heart attacks, shortly after having their employment transferred out of state.

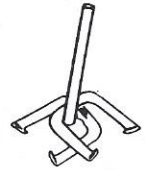
Perhaps no other family has given so much to the NHPA. They are missing from the courts in the physical sense but their spirit and dedication remain as an inspiration to all of us.

## ALABAMA

Jack Henderson is the name on top in Class A in most tournaments in the state, having won nine tournaments in a space from March through June. Jack was the winner of their annual Diabetes Tournament with a 4-1 record and 59.6 ringer percentage.

All donations from the tournament go to the Diabetes Association and the event was sponsored by the Huntsville Club and the State Association. Jib McClain from the Diabetes Association provides the condo at Gulf Shores and Bobby Holland from the Huntsville Club does all the planning, legwork, publicity and other important jobs. Other helpers included Jerry Craig, Michael Byram, Robert Maples and many others.

## CALIFORNIA

The Don Titcomb Memorial Library is a veritable storehouse of horseshoe pitching lore. The bulging collection originates not only from U.S. pitching folks, but from Canadians as well.

The library is fittingly located in an attractive little building on Don's former home courts in San Jose, California. Stu Snyder, the force behind the project, reports that among the memorabilia is a copy of the fine Canadian Pitcher's Yearbook and Paul Carriere's Coaching Manual.

Some copies of the Horseshoe Pitcher's Digest, edited by the late Ellis Cobb; NHPA President Dave Loucks' *Newslines*, including one autographed by the great Elmer Hohl, are on display.

The Library serves as a permanent reminder of Don's many unbroken pitching records as well as calling to mind his tireless efforts to promote and expand the sport of horseshoe pitching.

## CANADA

*Chatter* has received one of the 1995 Canadian Horseshoe Pitchers Yearbooks, a 136 page effort edited by Andre LeClerc. It is the finest Yearbook publication for the sport.

Husband and wife are Canadian Champions the same year for the second time! Andre LeClerc and Sylvianne Moisan won their respective 8th and 3rd Canadian National Singles when they defeated the defending champions, Colin Finnie and Diane Cantin, 2-0, in their best-of-three finals. The tournament was held in August in Wellesley, Ontario in legendary Elmer Hohl's hometown which is located about 10 miles from Kitchener, site of the 1997 World Tournament.

Many new records were set when Moisan (87.3%) met Myrna Kissick (82.54%) in the longest game ever pitched at the Canadian Women's Championship, 126 shoes. The final score was 42-23 and they had 38 four dead.

## CONNECTICUT

"Flipper" Don Maine is the 1995 Men's Champion, Elaine Hansen tops the women, Jimmy Pagliarulo is the Elder's winner, Mike Kenniston and Tori Eaton are the boys and girls winners.

In eight tournaments Pagliarulo leads the state in pitching average with 76.6%. Norm Rioux is second with 72.9 and Cathy Hansen is third with 68.2.

The Fall issue of the State's *Horseshoe Chatter* newsletter will be the last one for Jeanne Forti, who has been the editor since 1992. Husband John has been transferred back to New Jersey and they will be moving the end of the year.

Membership in the state has increased from 116 to 392 since 1989.

## FLORIDA

There are 66 horseshoe tournaments scheduled in Florida from October through May. Entry fees range from \$10-\$20.

Edward Senger from Clearwater was inducted into the Florida Hall of Fame in 1995. Former World Champion Carl Steinfeldt was inducted in 1985. Former women's World Champion Marge Spray entered the "Hall" in 1991.

Paul Scheub from Sarasota has won three Senior State Titles...1990, 1991 and 1993. Spray was the women's State winner in 1990, 1991, and 1993.

The Dean of State winners was Steinfeldt, who copped the crowns 13 straight years from 1980 through 1992. John Rademacher from Plant City won 10 titles.

## GEORGIA

Seventy-seven pitchers competed in the Annual State Tournament, held this year at Perry, the site of the 1995 World event. Perry will also host the 1996 State Tournament.

Jim Haley was inducted into the Hall of Fame for 1995, and he gives his heart and soul for horseshoes. Joanne Kennedy was Georgia's Player of the Year, Milton Vinson was second. A tribute to Haley was written by Glen Portt before his passing and was read by director Al Sandham.

## IDAHO

The fifth seeded team of Kathy Poppleton and Bernice Kissel of Pocatello, pitching less than their season average, still walked away with top honors in the Championship Class of the 5th Annual Idaho Doubles Championships at Pocatello. Their spouses, Ed Poppleton and Lyle Kissel, took top honors in Class D.

Jim McCue and Lyle Anderson won Class B and Mike McNabb and Sam Hernandez took Class C.

As of August, 1995 the State's Top Ten winningest is based on winning, not on percentage. First 3 points, 2nd 2 points, 3rd 1 point. Number one is Kirk Jacobson 22, Gary Kollman has 18, Sofia Corn 15, and Gene Tarr 14.

## ILLINOIS

Two members of the ILSHPA were inducted into the State's Hall of Fame during the state tournament. They are Art Ulrich of LaSalle and the late Charles "Cookie" Cook of Casey. Cookie was an active pitcher in Southern Illinois for many years, promoting the sport and getting the state tournament in Casey along with the new courts.

### KANSAS

The new State champion is Jerry Holt, the NHPA Chaplain for many years, and former resident of Oklahoma. Jerry is a member of the Sunflower Club and a super nice guy, writes Buzz Jones in the State Newsletter.

The Ladies Champion is Mary Ann Peninger, another Sunflower Club member, better known as "Ma." It is her 7th state title.

Harvey Washburn, "the bucket man," is still hauling his shoes in that famous bucket...*Chatter* sees him every year at the World.

### LOUISIANA

The Harahan Spring leagues were completed by July 1 and Johnny Bye was on the winning team in the Tuesday Nite Men, Wednesday Nite Men and Thursday Nite Mixed. Seems like you always win when you have a "Bye."

Ron Latiolas finished first in Class A in the Harahan Open and Memorial Open with 58.8 (7-0) and 54.0 (5-0).

Ricky Richard has been a "hot" commodity in 1995. He won two Welsh League tournaments, the Welsh K.C. Open, teamed with Ricky Bergeron in the K.C. Doubles, and teamed with Don Holland to win the State A-Men doubles.

### MICHIGAN

The "Top Ten" pitchers by percentage as of September 14 are led by Duane Govitz, Jr. with 68.93. In second place is Jim Wiltse with 63.88, only a few percentage points in front of Tom Williams 63.18. Rounding out the top five are Bob Williams, Jr. 61.21 and Larry Kemp 61.03.

Topping the women is Anne French 68.14, followed by Dorothy Falk 66.0, Judy Curtiss 65.61, Kathy Yaworski 58.90 and Becky Perryman 57.10.

The Elder leader is Kent Rundell 66.03. Claude Shannahan has 63.48, Bob White 60.89, Al Morris 60.20 and Lowell Rollins 55.99.

Jim Urie tops the juniors with 51.34. George Quillen has 38.79, followed closely by Frank Quillen 38.68. Dale Gore, Jr. and Diana Gore have 28.09 and 26.90 respectfully.

### MINNESOTA

Sixty years ago, the first horseshoe pitching club was organized in Minnesota by the St. Paul Ramsey County Club. The 16 sand courts at Como and Elfelt served the 66 men well. After lights were added by the city, membership grew to over 100 pitchers who competed five nights per week. The players would pick up the stakes each night and take them home.

In 1959 the club was given space in Maplewood, starting with 16 clay courts, plus four added later along with lights, fences, a new sign and paved parking lot.

The September issue of the state newsletter *The Ringer Digest*, includes a photo and story about Len and son Dale Lipovsky. Both are World title holders and Len is Regional Director for the State. Dale was inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame at Perry, Georgia.

### MISSOURI

It's Alan Francis and Vicki Winston on the top of the list of State Champions again in 1995. Francis now has won 10 straight titles in the men's division and five as a junior. His total won-lost record is 118-1 in men's competition and 30-0 as a junior. Only Dave Baker with 14 titles tops the youthful Blythedale pitcher.

Vicki has won 19 state titles and tops the all-time list with 124 victories followed by Loree Meier with 48, Pam Henderson 41, Joyce Francis 40 and Judy Sappington 26.

Dave Baker is the men's all-time leader with 251, followed by Charles Killgore 191, Earl Winston 157, Sam Carter 142 and Paul Lattray 123. Francis is 9th with 118.

### NEW MEXICO

The state's athletes brought home 81 medals at the U.S. National Senior Sports Classic held at San Antonio in June. Gold Medal winners for horseshoe pitching were William Canfield from Casa Blanca (men 85-89), and Dorothy Payne, Carrizozo (women 70-74). Silver medal winners were Emilia Maes, Belen (women 75-79), Edward Martin, Mimbres (men 70-74), and Jim Sanchez, Albuquerque (men 55-59). Bronze winner was Roy Clark, Artesia (men 80-84).

### NEW YORK

New York State Champion Art Tyson proved ringer-tested tough in the Annual Syracuse Pioneer Club Open. Art won a thrill packed playoff with "Iron Mike" DiMartino of Rochester in Class A.

Tyson finished on top with a 7-1 record and 81.1%, with DiMartino closing at 6-2 and 77.6. John Bogardus was third.

Canton's Sue Twyman had an eye-popping 80.4 to win the women's crown. Canada's Angeline Moisan was second, 4-1, 75%, and Sylvianne Moisan placed third, 3-2, 77.5. Angeline had a high single game of 86.7%.

The Pine Grove Courts in Camden was the site of the 1995 New York State Horseshoe Pitching Championships. Tournament directors Fred and Rosie Wright, Newburg, officiated over the 258 pitchers who participated in the Labor Day weekend event. Art Tyson, Sue Twyman, and junior Marie Esperti retained their titles, while senior Stan Towne, elder Hubie Curtis, and junior Keith Wilkinson dominated their fields for the first time.

This was Art's 5th consecutive win with a 10-0 record and an 81.2%. Highlighting Art's pitching were games of 94.7% and 90%. Sue won her 4th consecutive title pitching 74.2%, with a 10-0 record. Sue posted 2 games of 88.2%. Marie retained her junior girls' crown with a 4-0 record, pitching 25.3% overall. New senior champ Towne averaged 47.5% with a 5-1 record. Wilkinson, the boys' champ posted a 6-1 record, pitching 67.4%.

### NORTH CAROLINA

Lloyd Hathaway was organized, dedicated, wise, friendly and a real horseshoe man. He established Winston-

Salem as the first hub for horseshoes in the state. He was personally responsible for getting organized horseshoes started at the state level in 1921.

The American Directory of Horseshoe Pitching shows that E.Z. Jarrett was the Carolina AAU State Champion in 1922. He was born September 6, 1896 and died in 1979.

Percentages have increased in State Tournament play by decades as follows: 1960s—59.5%, 1980s—60.5%, and 1990s 64.9%.

### OKLAHOMA

From May 1994 to May 1995 three pitchers have improved their ringer percentages the most per NatStats. Junior Rebecca King, 6.73-26.25 up 19.52; Brick Roberts, 12.17-27, up 14.83; and Tom Gibson, 36.54-48.33, up 11.79.

Tom Goff from Woodward, Oklahoma likes to go on rattlesnake hunts in his state. This year he was bitten by a snake. Tom is just fine, but according to Glenn King, the rattlesnake died.

### OREGON

Early tournaments in 1995 found Patty Sapp winning five with victories in the Strawberry Open, 8-0, 77.77%; Evergreen Open, 7-0, 70.89; Douglas County, 6-1, 68.51; Valley of the Rogue Bank Open, 10-2, 66.31 and Roseburg Open, 7-1, 73.16.

A full page article on Horseshoes, featuring Elmer Otnes, president of the Oregon Horseshoe Pitching Association, prompted this short note from Elmer's wife, Neta. "This article on my husband, Elmer, promoting the game of horseshoes in our area did an excellent job of getting the message to the public. Since the story appeared in the Oregonian, we have had many inquiries about horseshoes, and also have gained new members in the club."

### PENNSYLVANIA

Four perfect games have been pitched in sanctioned play by Pennsylvania players—Don Kuchcinski 1984, Fran Carnahan 1985, Steve Kuchcinski 1989 and Ron Kuchcinski 1989.

Carnahan won eight state titles in a row, 1980-1987; John Fulton 10 consecutive wins, and four straight by Junior Fred Powell. The highest ladies average in a state tournament was turned in by Carnahan in 1986, 83.3%. The highest winning average by a man was an 82.8% by Al Zadroga.

### SOUTH CAROLINA

The Lockhart Horseshoe Club is making leaps and bounds with their facility this year. The area now sports 12 courts, fencing, shelter and lights on the courts. This is the first lighted court in the state.

New York's Art Tyson competed in the Sun Open in Clover, the first time the popular World class pitcher had competed in South Carolina. He hopes to return to the state in the future.

### TENNESSEE

Fred O. Perry from Signal Mountain became Tennessee's first "Horseshoe Pitcher of the Year." He was awarded a plaque, a certificate of Achievement, a year's subscription

to the NHPA *Newsline* and will be given his 1996 NHPA/THPA dues card by the state association. Perry pitched in 17 tournaments to win this title.

The outdoor courts at the Jack Freeman courts are nearing completion. Twelve of the 20 courts were ready for state tournament.

### VIRGINIA

The State's Association recognizes and presents awards for "Most Games Won" and this is calculated on games won from the State Singles from the previous year to cutoff date to register for current year. The following winners were presented plaques—Ray Barb, 41 wins; Amy Monday, 79 wins; Junior Lenwood Conner, Jr., 41 wins; and 30-footer Bob Dean, Sr., 25 wins.

Al Perry went 9-0 to win the state title. He won the title 13 straight years, but lost in 1993 and 1994.

### WASHINGTON

The 1995 Hall of Fame awards went to Mel Page, longtime pitcher and organizer from Walla Walla and Verl Webb, Olympia, pitcher and club president since 1980, the first year of the organization.

"George Sala won Class B and Orrin Underwood won Class C in the Spokane Open. Both are in their mid-80s. This is a good example why the 30-foot rule was created. Neither could throw at the 40-foot distance, but they still can have fun and that's what it is all about," writes Pat Quinn, WSHPA president.

### WEST VIRGINIA

One of the top promoters of horseshoes is Charles Bunner from Fairmont. In 1995 he wrote a long letter to the Postmaster of the United States. In part it said—"Admittedly, I am not a Bible toter, but it is very odd, in my opinion, as to why the U.S. Postal System is releasing new Commemorative stamps with individuals, now deceased, and especially for those who have died under other than natural causes, or, at least being very suspicious reasons."

"For several years, attempts have been made to have the Postal System issue a commemorative stamp for the sport of horseshoes, an activity that provides fun, competition and fellowship for all ages. The National Horseshoe Pitchers Association sanctions leagues and tournaments on the local, state, regional and international levels."

### WISCONSIN

Dick Hansen, NHPA 5th Vice President and President of the Wisconsin Horseshoe Pitchers Association had this to say in his column in the October issue of the State Newsletter—"The 1995 State Tournament will always be in my memory, from inducting Rick Pritzlaff into the Hall of Fame to surprising Jim Haupt and Susie Pritzlaff with the President's Award for the Wisconsin newsletter. It was great to see all the champions, but I must single out Lorraine Sternberg's championship at almost 82% which will make her one of the top 4 or 5 pitchers in the World—truly something to be proud of."

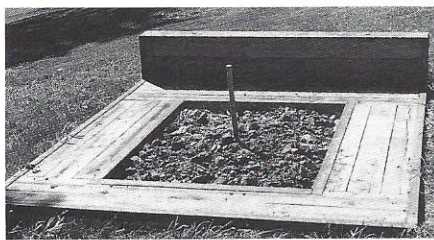

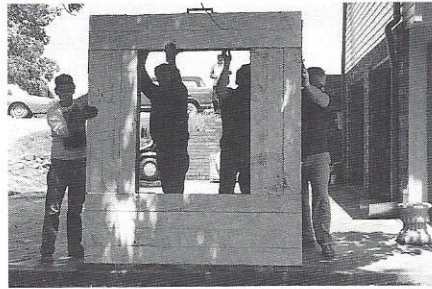
## Bismarck Woman Joins Horseshoe Hall of Fame

Mavis Olson of Bismarck, became the first woman elected to the North Dakota Horseshoe pitchers' Hall of Fame with her induction on 9/2/95. Mavis began pitching for fun in 1977 and played in her first State Tournament the next year. She has attended two World Tournaments and was instrumental in starting a junior horseshoe pitching league in 1986 which is now the largest in the state and in 1991, was the largest in the nation.



## One Tough Court

Jon McKnight of Amazonia, Missouri undertook a court building project that took him all summer to complete. It was in a very serene setting on a sloping grass-covered hillside that Jon decided to place his court. Jon wanted something that was heavy duty and well built to set into the hillside. He decided on 6"x6"x8' oak timbers and it took twenty two of them—eleven for each end. Each timber was bolted to another with 1/2" all-thread. When



finished, each box, trimmed with angle iron for edge protection, measured 6' x 7' on the outside and weighed 800 pounds. They had to be pulled into place by a pickup truck. Jon had some fellow pitchers help with the project. No doubt this tough court will outlast them all.

Halifax Cable TV likes the show so much that they are approaching sponsors and hope to have up to a \$10,000 jackpot.

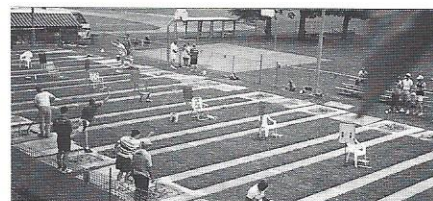

## Shhh? — People Pitchin'

by Stewart Snyder

Who said "Silence is Golden"? A divinely inspired Persian Prophet so stated this altruism in the 8th century A.D. Surely he was not a horseshoe pitcher, nonetheless, that significant motto bears full meaning today, some 200 years later, in tournament play on horseshoe courts.

Talking on court among pitchers is a discourteous act that adversely affects all pitchers within hearing range.

Concentration is the name of the game; means more to good pitchers than lesser folks can observe; it's a silent weapon, so to speak.

An authority speaks in defense of concentration—Don Titcomb, 1960 World Champion horseshoe pitcher, holder of unbroken world records, has the following to say in this

regard: "If a pitcher steps up to throw and says to himself several well-known dos and don'ts regarding feet placement, arm swing and throw; with this self-talk the pitcher destroys his concentration; takes thought away from the prime object of the game, to hit the stake with an open shoe."

Don's advice should not be taken lightly. His outstanding records prove his point, this one in particular—he threw 97 ringers out of 100 consecutively thrown shoes during a stretch of a 200-shoe World Tournament qualifying round in 1960.

New pitchers, in particular, are not aware of the unwritten rule of silence while tournament pitching, and their interest in the game should not be reduced by a proper reminder of the need for silence.

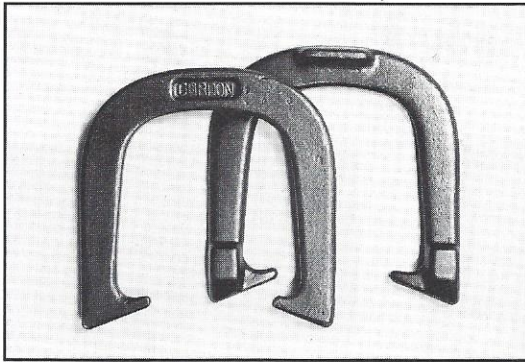

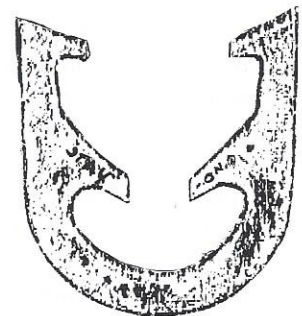

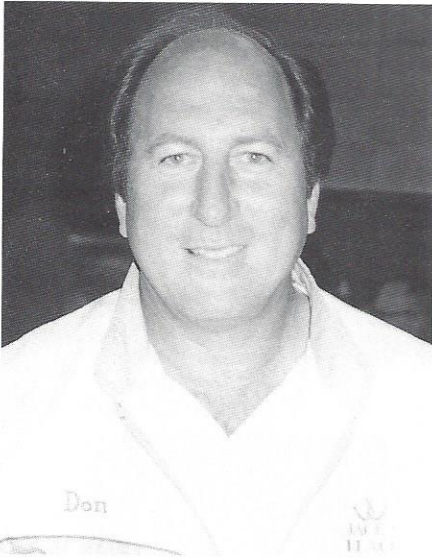

# The Toll of Time



**DONALD GREGSON  
(MOUNTAIN GOAT)**

The Southern California Charter and the NHPA suffered a great loss with the sudden and unexpected death on June 17, 1995 of Don Gregson. Known as Mountain Goat, Don was the son of former NHPA Officers and Hall of Fame members, Archie and Katie Gregson, both deceased. Don made friends easily and had a friendly greeting for everyone. He was always ready to help.

He was the California State Champion in 1993 and a top championship competitor in each World Tournament he attended. A former president of the SCHPA, Don was inducted into their Hall of Fame in 1992. He worked hard to support the game he loved and the people in it. Don was both an inspiration and mentor to many fellow competitors.

Born July 20, 1942, Don Mountain Goat Gregson died at age 52 after suffering a massive heart attack at home. Memorial Services were held outdoors overlooking Lake Gregory in Crestline, California with his family, friends and fellow horseshoe pitchers in attendance.

## **DWIGHT A. (DEE) HANSEN**

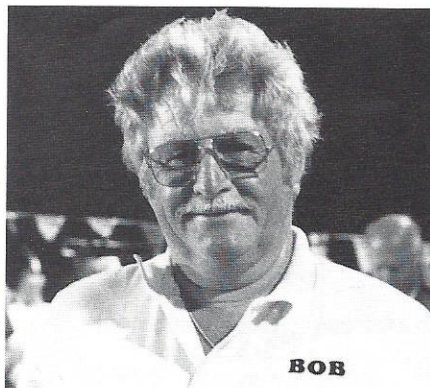

He won both Class C and B titles in the State Tournament but his goal to pitch in the Championship class was never attained.

His cheerful spirit and positive attitude will be missed by all who knew him. He is survived by wife Evelyn and family.



## **ROBERT LOWELL ROSA**

The Northern California and Nevada charters of the NHPA were surprised and saddened to learn of the death of Bob Rosa on August 11, 1995 in Nevada City, California. Bob, 62, died after a valiant, but short fight

against cancer which had been detected less than 3 months prior. Born September 1, 1932 in Gilroy, California, Bob attended schools in that area before serving in the Air Force from 1949 to 1953. He retired in 1981 as a Monterey County Sheriff and started a successful Private Investigations business in Nevada City. Bob was a member of the NHPA and Gold Country Horseshoe Club.

He was an avid pitcher and keen competitor who also enjoyed fishing and traveling in his RV. In 1989, Bob won the World Class "L" Championship in Spearfish, S. Dakota. For a two year period, 1992-93, Bob and wife Billie moved to Las Vegas where he won the Nevada State Championship in 1993. Still active in PI work, Bob's experience was in demand and a move back to Nevada City was made in 1994.

Bob is survived by his wife, Billie, two sons, a daughter, four step-daughters and their families.

## **EDWARD J. ST. PIERRE**

*Newsline* has belatedly learned of the August 31, 1994 passing of Edward St. Pierre in Bakersfield, California. Born January 22, 1927 in Manchester, New Hampshire where he spent his early years, Eddie settled in the Los Angeles area in 1955 following service in the Korean War. 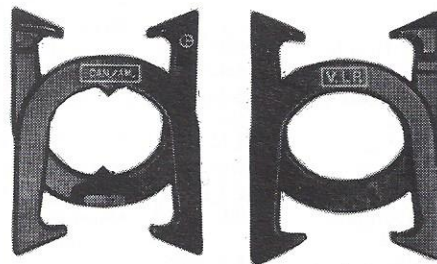

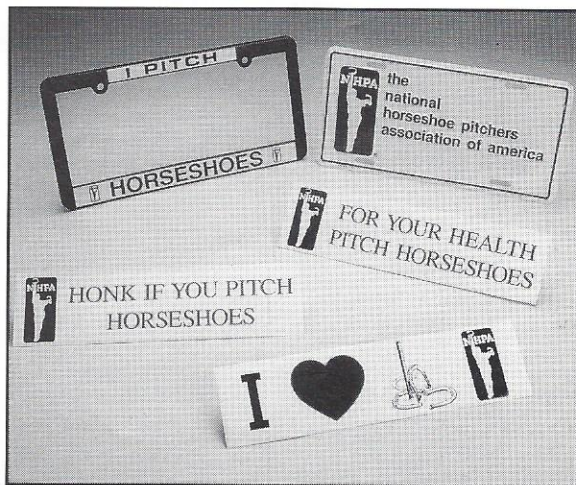
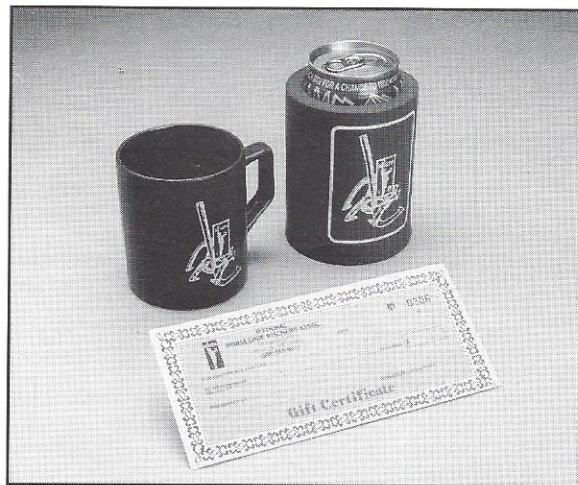
