

#### CONNECTICUT STATE OPEN TOURNAMENT

The Third Annual Connecticut State Open Tournament had five states taking home awards this year in the tournament held at Beardsley Park, Bridgeport, on July 20th. Massachusetts took top honors with E. Landry present New England Champion losing only one game to E. Domey of Massachusetts. J. Comeau also of Masachusetts gave Landry a close game but finally lost out 50—49. Both men pitched over 70%. P. Heroux of Rhode Island with two losses was second place winner. Besides losing to Landry his other loss was to J. Comeau. Third place honors went to W. Kolb of New Jersey on percentage after he and A. Bourgeios of Rhode Island tied with three losses each.

E. Landry had a high single game of 80.4%, but W. Bagley had the high single game for the day with 80.6%. A closs third was W. Kolb with 80.0%.

W. Bagley of Greenwich, Conn. is Class B champion having won all his games. A. Popp of Byram, Conn. in his first tournament play took second place with his only loss being to W. Bagley. A New York man, T. Kirk, took third place on percentage from J. Rose of Conn.

#### ILLINOIS

Casey Jones, Waukesha, Wis., rated one of the four best horseshoe pitchers in the nation, took top honors in Class A of the Daily-Ledger-Neumanns horseshoe tournament, Sunday, at Athletic park. Melvin Utley, Chicago, was the Class B winner.

Jones, who was a surprise entrant in the Sunday tourney, received seven wins against no defeats. Utley had six victories and a lone defeat.

Jones was high qualifier for the tourney as he tossed 82 ringers out of 100 chances for a total of 263 points.


John Lindmeier and Earl Bomke give Jones his roughest competition. Lindmeier finished on the short end of a 50—46 score in his game with the champion, and Bomke had a 73.9 percentage compared with Jones' mark of 82.5 in their dual.

Ellis Cobb, second place winner in Class B, had the highest percentage for one game, 92.5. Cobb tossed 37 ringers in 40 attempts.

Two local pitchers, Howard Collier and Truman Standard, placed among the top eight winners in the two divisions. Collier was seventh in Class A and Standard finished sixth in Class B.

Forty-five contestants from four states battled for the prize money and trophies awarded winners in the two divisions. Jones won \$20 and a trophy, while Utley earned a trophy and \$10. The other top pitchers were awarded lesser prizes.

#### **PROMOTING HORSESHOES**

#### By DR. SOL BERMAN

Am spending my vacation at a boy's summer camp, Camp Mendota, in Casco, Maine. It's a fertile field for horseshoes. Am building them regulation horseshoe courts, then I'll teach them the correct scoring system. The boys in Maine should organize a group and put on exhibitions in the camps. I have already gathered a group here who want lessons in technique, etc.

Each issue of The Horseshoe Pitcher contains excellent suggestions on improving the game, bettering the organization, etc., but nothing is ever done about it. The NHPA has only one meeting a year and only a small group have any voice and a feeble one at that. I believe all horseshoe pitchers in the NHPA should have a vote. I suggest The Horseshoe Pitcher be used as the medium for unofficial votes; perhaps later we can make it official. I further suggest that every subscriber get a vote by printing a ballot in the magazine. Each subscriber can then vote on what the Editor believes are good suggestions. In that way we can get an idea as to what the average pitcher wants. Here are my suggestions for the first ballot:

1. Increase the annual dues to \$3.00 to include The Horseshoe Pitcher.

2. Each State submit name or names for one or more candidates for National Office. Print the names in The Horseshoe Pitcher and allow

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each member to vote on them. The top two names for each office, greatest number of votes, to be placed on the final ballot at the convention and a revote is cast.

3. That the balloting on suggestions and voting be made official. (This of course, doesn't make it official but only expresses public opinion; only the National organization itself can vote this official.)

4. All pitchers to be classified into groups. Doug Fogal's idea— AAA, 80-90%, AA, 70-80%, A, 60-70%, B, 50-60%, C, 40-50% and so on. Pitchers group to be determined by the highest percentage he pitched in a tournament consisting of 1,000 shoes or more. If he falls down to a lower group in three consecutive tournaments then he is dropped to the next lower group. This would eliminate qualifying and avoid a pitcher with a 63% average from winning class C and a pitcher whose average is 59% winning class B as happened in a recent New York City tournament.
