

#### **NEW JERSEY**

Borrowing Jersey's slogan of "First Again," city-slicker Joe Zichella, the up-and-coming New York horseshoe artist, ran off with his second straight fat Jersey tournament Sunday July 12, at Branch Brook Park, Newark. Winner of last months' Rosselet Memorial, Joe came through a tough field, losing only to Dale Carson, Baltimore 50-34, (78.9%-71.1%)to rack up the ivy covered crown steeped more deeply in tradition than any other tournament on the eastern circuit. This "oldest open" has been in annual competition since the birth of the Jersey association over twenty years ago. Zichella gained one leg on the trophy to join Carson as a one-third owner. T. P. O'Gara, with a New York tradition of his own, made the presentation.

Top game of the day was pitched by the winner as he averaged 89.2% in dropping Terry Early 50—10. Carson placed second, losing to Bill Kolb, Newark, and John Fulton, Carlisle, Pa. Farmer Fulton, while placing only third, actually outsmarted the city boys by going home with the real bacon because the \$80.00 piggy bank was sliced on the split-the stakes plan and the Quaker Stater copped \$28.70 to lead the .pack Zichella took home \$22.10 and Carson \$13.90.

Class B was captured by Paul Hanas, Midland Park in easy, routine fashion with a 6-1 record, and Class C went to Jack Waltz, Keansburg, who survived three round robins for the title.

This meet was held under Jersey's popular no-qualifying plan, and the evenness of play indicated its value. At the midway point, four men were tied for first in A and in B at the finish, the second through seventh men were but one game apart. Regular play started at 1:30 and ended at 5:10. There was no need for the entrants to arrive before 1.00 P.M. and everyone, including the officials, had a good lunch and were finished in time for early supper. Eight man classes with no pre-match qualifying is certainly shaping up as the ideal answer to the many demands for Sunday sport that leaves the competitor time for breakfast, church and paper in the morning and still on his feet at the end of the day.

The no-Q Plan, coupled with split-the-stakes prize distribution (at one point Joe Zichella had an \$11.00 Risk-on-the Line against Fred Lut ter's 10c R.O.L., and at every point it had Editor Jake wearing a path between his seat and the score board) made the the Jersey open, though moss covered in tradition, one of the most modern, enjoyable and exciting tourneys every held.
