TOURNAMENT NOTES

Wayne Nelson regained the Indiana State championship. The 33 year old roly poly Hoosier ringer artist from Eaton had prewon the title in 1946, 1947, and viously 1952. His two losses in this year's tourna-ment were sustained at the hands of Curt Day, the defending champion, and Bill Neilson, another ex champion.

Ed Sharp of Mulberry was the runner up for the second consecutive year.

Curtis Day of Frankfort, the 1953 cham-pion, placed third but had the solace of defeating both men who ranked ahead of

Bill Neilson of Dugger, who won the tournament way back in 1940, made a fine who won the comeback and placed fourth after a long absence from competition.

Graydon McFatridge of Rushville, state

Graydon McFatridge of Rushville, state champion in 1949, 1950, and 1951, had an off day, finishing in ninth place. McFatridge and Neilson tied for high honors in the qualifing round with 382 points apiece. McFatridge threw 121 and Neilson 118 ringers in the 150 shoe test.

Henry LaFollette of Sullivan, who is 73 years old, was the oldes player in the tournament and placed eleventh in Class A.

Youngest players in the meet were Virgil Taylor of Greencastle and Robert Brum-field of Markleville. The 18 year old Tay-lor placed third in Class B with an average of 67.8 per cent ringers. Eugene "Red" Brumfield, a brother of

Bugene Red Brumbed, a produce of Bob, was the youngest player in Class A. He placed tenth and is 25 years old.

A record field of 96 players entered the meet, making the third consecutive year the number of entries has exceeded 90 and

establishing the Indiana State Tournament as the largest in the entire country.

Wayne Nelson, the new champion, posted the highest single game in the meet when he tossed 91.3 per cent ringers in his final

Ed Sharp hit 40 consecutive ringers for the high mark in that category.

A rather steady concern of the day in the minds of horseshoe players is the lack of public esteem and newspaper appreciation for the game. There are continual references to the yearnings felt by all, in the printed themes of our magazine, The Horseshoe Pitcher. The letter to the N. Y. Times, page 10 September number was a fine effort. May such be multiplied.) We fine effort. May such be multiplied.) We want and feel we merit much greater recognition for our game. Don't worry too much, gentlemen and ladies, sometime it will come. In the meantime we point out different difficulties of the game, and propose remedies or suggestions to help make it charm all the people that ought to be drawn to it. Our trouble phase that faces the horseshoe game seems to be the champions themselves. They work and grind, to get to the top. They thereby gain a personal satisfaction of being superior. This superior pitcher, however, doubtless causes discouragement among the many who may make a try at pitching. Their efforts, compared to the champs, may cause disgust at themselves, and even aversion for the game. The champions are few, but the medium and poorer pitchers are the wanted many. Our problem is to make the game inviting to the inexpert, and at the same time give incentives to develop champions. We do not want to kill off the champs by slipping prizes from under them to the lowly pitchers. Some tournaments during the past year have caused champions to be "handicapped to death." Let's avoid such things, and think out means and methods to lure the low percentage man into the game, yet at the same time not forget the necessity of developing champions and giving them their earned rewards.

In the Iowa report, page 8 of September, doesn't it appear that group A should have had Jones, Standard, Tate and Anderson (maybe Lindmeier) in its set-up? That's rating them by the ringer percentages of their games. We don't know their class determination method,

wasn't it wrong?

At the risk of playing too much on a one-string harp, it may be of some where-withall to speak of another particular that shows the logic of the Behind Pitcher (behind in the game score) being generally given the Choice (Earlier, really) of Pitch, or commonly called "first pitch." The 3-hander game proves the right (and decided convenience of keeping track of the 1-2-3 pitch) of Behind pitchers having the Earlier pitches. The 3-man game shows all the clearer why it is fairer that the man who is ahead in the score should pitch last in each inning.
