Ed Landry of Fall River, Mass. continued his winning ways in Conn. tournaments by taking first place in the Conn. Open held Sunday, June 19, at "Freddy's Place," Southington.

Roy Pearson, of West Kingston, R. I., New England Champion came in third. Here are some of the highlights: Pearson, pitched the highest ringer game in Connecticut, he connected the stake with 33 ringers out of 38 shoes, for 86.8 per cent. John Dudek, the darkhorse who hails from Hartford, Conn. took the second spot honors, his only two defeats were from Ed Landry and D. Smith. The final round between Landry and Pearson was an interesting game, Landry won 50 to 29. Landry's percentage was 75.9 against Pearson's 73.1.

Ray Barrows of Bridgeport, Conn., has an 8 and 1 for first place in the "B" division; Fred Smith, of Southington, second; and William Schustek of Bridgeport, 3rd. The top three winners in each class received trophies.

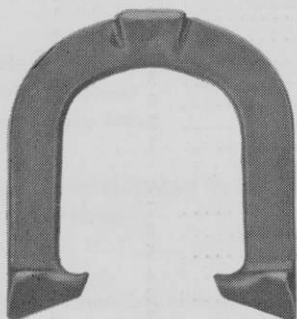
NORTHERN CONNECTICUT HORSESHOE TOURNAMENT

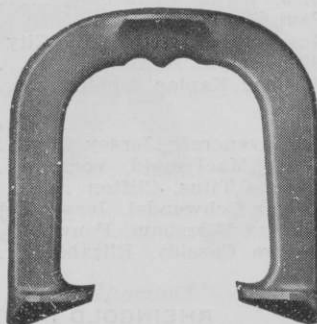

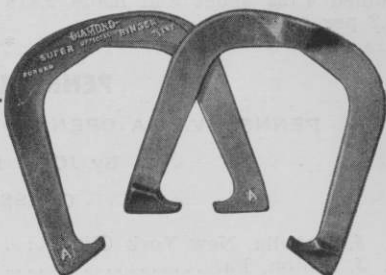

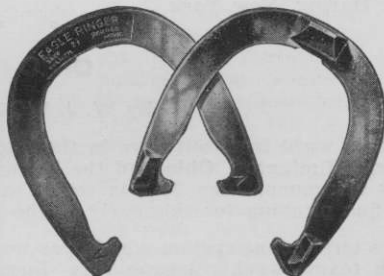

Just a word from out here in the middle west. The inter-city match between Wilmington, Ohio and the Norwood, Ohio clubs at Norwood on Sunday afternoon, June 26 was easily taken by Wilmington after some pretty fine pitching for this early in the season.

The total count system which was used in the match and is followed in each teams weekly league play, forms an ideal method of scoring. Expert scorekeepers, who are always hard to find, are not required, and it is a simple matter to prove the correctness of the score sheets while the next round is in progress. (Shoes pitched, plus two times the total ringers pitched, less the total points pitched equals the total shoes lost. Prove the total shoes lost by adding the number of "1" cores, plus the number of "3" scores, plus two times the number of "0" scores.)

Attached are the match results. It will be observed that the entire Wilmington team pitched very well particularly Reno, Manker and Wolfe, while West and Dunn were doing fairly well for Norwood. We were outclassed but never gave up the ship.

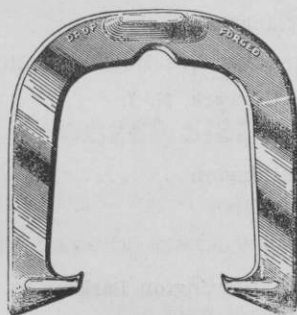
