PRESIDENT'SMESSAGE by Dave Loucks

prior to their being issued material to sanction a league and/or tournament.

Many have by now put away their horseshoes, as we are about to enter the winter season, generally a time of little pitching for much of the NHPA. Still, the snowbirds flock south for the winter where they will join others in the warmer weather charters that play the bulk of their tournaments during these coming months. So, NHPA activity while definitely slowed, does continue in the south and those colder areas fortunate enough to have indoor courts. Things for the NHPA Council also slow a bit but do not stop as we still have daily operational tasks to handle and the conclusion of many 2002 administrative items that may affect how we enter the new year. One of these items, a delegate voted bylaw change is so controversial that charter feedback has forced the Council to make a decision that some may not agree with but we feel is definitely in the best interests of the NHPA.

During the 2002 convention, delegates discussed, amended twice and then voted to pass a bylaw change that would have the first sentence of Article VII, Section 13 reading as follows:

All officers of a charter, Regional Directors, Sanctioned Club/League and Tournament Directors within an NHPA Charter must be NHPA members and shall be required to subscribe to the NHPA magazine Newsline

It was not long after the convention that charters began to complain that this new wording was going to be difficult, if not impossible to enforce, would severely affect their ability to get tournament directors and most likely result in the cancellation of many planned tournaments.

The NHPA Council unanimously agreed that this wording is not in the best interests of promoting horseshoe pitching and can't be enforced. What then could we do? Could it be rescinded or just not enforced? I contacted a national certified parliamentarian to discuss options as they might relate to our bylaws and Robert's Rules of Order. The conclusion is not totally without debate but a step the Council by a 7-0 vote has decided to take.

First, the delegates two years ago, voted down a proposal that said all tournament directors must be NHPA members. Second, several times the delegates have voted down proposals that all members must get Newsline, the argument being that only Charter Officers, Regional Directors and their assistants should be required to subscribe. Third, there exists no nationally printed, distributed or

enforced procedure for tournament directors to follow. There are some general guidelines suggested on the website but nothing that heretofore was mandatory NHPA policy. How then could we now force a non-member or even a member to subscribe and then hope to police such a bylaw? What would be gained by trying to? The answer is we can't enforce it and shouldn't try because horseshoe pitching in some charters would be negatively affected.

Thus, the wording of the bylaw amended in convention will not be put into effect. In its place, the following wording will go to print. All officers of a charter, Regional Directors and Assistant Regional Directors must be NHPA members and are required to subscribe to the NHPA magazine, Newsline. A single subscription only, is required per household to fulfill this requirement.

While this wording is only slightly revised from the current bylaw reading, Regional Directors and Assistant Regional Directors have been included because they have been required by NHPA Standing Rules and RD Guidelines to be subscribers. It may be controversial but the Executive Council feels this unusual action is in the best interests of the NHPA membership.

DAVE'SCOURT REPORT by Dave Loucks

Hall of Fame Committee.

Vicki Winston has been named co-chairperson of this committee. The other cochairperson is Vicki's husband, Earl. Together they will solicit nominations for the NHPA Hall of Fame and oversee the make-up and activity of the committee.

Bio for Hall of Fame Members.

In the near future, members of the Hall of Fame will be receiving a letter and a biographical sketch form to be completed and returned. This project, under the direction of NHPF Vice-President, Ward Lutz, is to gather data and career highlights in a uniform manner for all living Hall of Fame members. This information is needed for the printed statements that will be displayed with in-

ductee photos when the Hall of Fame opens in Joelton, Tennessee.

NHPF Grant Application.

In their August meeting, the NHPF Directors approved the format of a Grant Application Form, which is reprinted elsewhere in this issue. The NHPF will begin a modest program of issuing grants for the construction of new or the upgrade of older horseshoe courts. Initially, up to 8 grants a year will be issued at a maximum of \$1,000 each. There will be two application deadlines a year, March 1st and September 1st. The directors will review applications during those months and issue their decision by April 1st and October 1st. It is realized that projects may cost more than this but with volun-

teer labor and good planning, \$1,000 could be the difference between getting started and doing nothing. It is hoped that if the program goes well, the dollar amount of grants can grow as financial contributions to the NHPF increase.

Japan Open Visit.

Two NHPA members made a long trip to Hokkaido, the northern most island of Japan. Dave Loucks and Tom Munoz were invited to assist the Japanese charter with the running of the 2002 Japan Open. More than 100 pitchers from various corners of Japan flew in for the annual event, which for the second consecutive year, was being held on the grounds

RULES CALLING THE SCORE by Bonnie Seibold

It is very important to learn the proper way to call the score in a game. This is a big help to the scorekeepers. The proper way is as follows:


(a) The contestant scoring the points shall call the score.

- 1. No ringers with the closest shoe in count call "one point".
- 2. No ringers with the two closest shoes in count- call "two points".
- 3. One ringer with either no shoe in count or the other contestant having the closest shoe in count call "one ringer, three points".
- 4. One ringer with the closest shoe in count call "one ringer, four points".


- 5. Two cancelled ringers with the closest shoe in count call "one ringer each, one point".
- 6. Two cancelled ringers with one uncancelled ringer call "three ringers, three points".
- 7. Two uncancelled ringers call "two ringers, six points".
- **(b)** No points shall be awarded in the following situations. The score shall be called by the contestant who pitched second.
 - 1. All four shoes out of count call "no score".
- 2. Two cancelled ringers with no shoes in count or with the other two shoes an equal distance from the stake call "one ringer each, no score".
- 3. Four cancelled ringers call "four dead".

NHPFNEWS & CONTRIBUTION UPDATE by Dave Loucks

We have just three months left in the year as I write this report. Not much time to see a needed increase in contributions unless members really get in a charitable mood as the holidays approach. At this point, nine months into the year, individual contributions are coming in at a rate of less than half of the level this time a year ago. Since our last report, just 27 individual contributions along with the NHPA Money Market interest, a total of \$3985, was received.

If one looks a bit more closely at the State Rankings report, a couple of things worth comment will be noticed. First, there are at least 30 states that judging from their level of contributions over five years, are really lagging in their financial support to the NHPF. The top ten states continue to do their share. Of the 27 contributions mentioned in the above paragraph, 19 came from the top ten, 5 from the next seven and just 3 contributions from the remaining thirty-three states. Interesting to me was the fact that of the top 15 states, 11 border on the Pacific or Atlantic Oceans, the Gulf of Mexico or the Great Lakes. Members of the three Pacific Coast states live the greatest distance from Joelton but yet they account for a full 19% of all individual contributions made to the NHPF.

One can play games with numbers but that is not my point here. I only wish to emphasize that a big portion of the NHPA membership has yet to be heard from and their support is needed if the NHPF is to succeed in meeting the purposes of its charter as filed with the State of Tennessee and the U.S. Government. All public charitable organizations, which the NHPF is, need financial contributions to carry out their work. The NHPF is the only horseshoe pitching related foundation in the world, so won't you please consider sending an annual contribution. You will be doing your part to preserve the history of the sport and secure its future. This will be put in the Regional Director guidelines during the next revision.

New Regional Directors

Lance Twyman, New York Regional Director - has resigned as RD because Lance and his wife Sue are retiring and are going to do a lot of traveling and relaxing. Lance has done a great job over the years for the NHPA and I wish him well! Jack Stenberg is taking Lance's place and I know he will do a very good job.

Dexter Stallings, Tennessee Regional Director - has appointed Paula Hunsicker as his Assistant Regional Director. Paula will concentrate her efforts on middle and west Tennessee.

Bud Schardine, Utah Regional Director - has appointed Gary Gilbert as his ARD who will be covering southern Utah. Gary is also working on building a new horseshoe complex in Utah.

From the Mail Bag

Jim Haupt, Wisconsin Regional Director - reports he has sanctioned courts for the Coulee Region Horseshoe club. Recently, they completed the LaCrosse Open (no connection to Paul but if he ever enters, his fee would likely be waived). Ted Rohde, an ace promoter, lobbied the Park Commission until he got a tencourt asphalt slab installed with lights and a fence. Jim says that asphalt actually looks cool! PUBLICITY PROMOTION by Casey Sluys

Which promotional ideas have worked well in your charter? To this date I've only heard from four Charters as to what has worked well for them. The emphasis in this column has consistently focused on generating ideas to increase the membership of the NHPA. Although many thoughts have passed through these articles many of you have yet to respond. Please let me know which promotional ideas have worked well for you. Unless and until we compile an accurate list of positive ideas will we know that perhaps one suggestion we've received has some merit?

This thought entails spending some of the NHPA money to

hire a nationally known publicity firm to assist us with a nationwide publicity campaign. What would that look like, you might ask. Perhaps it would entail compiling a list of all Parks and Recreation Departments to set up a meeting with them explaining the benefits of horseshoe pitching. Maybe a media blitz such as pitching demonstrations on "Good Morning America" or the "Today Show"along with a question and answer sessions. Radio spots are another avenue to reach millions of listeners. National magazines advertisements are yet another. But first, we need to develop some idea of what works and what does not. During the off season I will be investigating some of the costs associated with this venture and will report in a latter issue as to the results. There may be some consultation fees, but I believe these would be minimal compared to the actual cost of a nationwide campaign. Certainly some of you are saying "wow, this guy is talking big bucks" and that assumption would most likely be right on target.

Needless to say, this would take a significant amount of preliminary work on our part also. That is one of the main reasons for the first paragraph. It would entail having a clean, presentable video of instructions and tournament play. Tournaments with players in club shirts neatly tucked in of course, scoreboards with name cards on them and well-groomed courts. In other words broadcast quality video. Above all, it needs to show people of all ages genuinely having a good time pitching horseshoes. This may have to be done professionally, although with the recent purchase of the NHPA video camera we could probably accomplish that. It may require a little professional editing, but generally speaking we could handle the photography. We would need about 500,000 nice, colorful brochures with very basic and general information in them. These would be sent to anyone who could possibly help bring the awareness of organized horseshoe pitching to the public. Let me know what you think of this sort of campaign, the address and email are on page three of this issue.

We have a very well put together presentation that is available for anyone to use. All it takes is for someone willing to make that first call to the various clubs in your city such as, Lions, Rotary International, Kiwanas, Boy/Girl Scouts, almost any organization including physical education classes at schools. Most of the clubs are continually looking for interesting guest



speakers. In fact, I would be willing to do this personally if we could guarantee a 200 plus person attendance. Anything less than 200 would be difficult for me to justify the travel expenses involved. (Although I'd do it gratis on my motorcycle, summertime only though.) Even though the above-mentioned organizations have perhaps, at most, 50 or so members per meeting, a larger regional meeting would probably muster 200 plus folks.

Whether or not we would garner new members from such a venture remains to be seen. Unless we are dedicated, enthusiastic and energetic about gaining and retaining new members we are doomed to stay in the shadows and remain a game rather than a bona fide sport.

In fact all the publicity/promotion team needs to do is convince the NHPA council that it is a worthy cause. Let me know how many you need and we will be glad to send them to you.

2002 RINGER CLASSIC GREENVILLE, OHIO

The Darke County Horseshoe Club hosted it's 41st Annual Ringer Classic Tournament under the tall trees of the Greenville City Park over the July 4th week-end with 236 horseshoe pitchers, including many of the world's finest, competing. Blessed with clear skies for the duration, the typically warm July days cooled to comfortable evening temperatures that made for great pitching. And while all of the classes in every division were evenly matched and hotly contested, the championship classes especially were equal to any "pay to see" sporting event.

The Men's Class A Championship was decided by an eleventh round game between defending Ringer Champion and 2001 World Champion Alan Francis (Ohio) and 2001 Ohio State Champion Jim Walters. Both Alan and Jim entered the eleventh round with a 10-0 record, pitching 81% and 80%, respectively. Alan emerged the 2002 Ringer Classic Men's Champion with a score of 40-24. Bob Hayes (New York) with an average of 73% took third place.

This year's Women's Division was, from top to bottom, the finest group of pitchers ever to attend this event. In a pitchoff, defending Ringer Champion and current World Champion Sylvianne Moisan (Quebec, Canada) defeated Amy Hall (Virginia) 41-38. After Amy Francis (Ohio), averaging 81% for the tournament, defeated Sylvianne to take 3rd place and force the play-off, Moisan threw 84 ringers in 100 shoes and Hall threw 83 to finish with 82.9% and 83% for the tournament. Amy Hall, competing in only her second Ringer Classic, showed great skill, confidence and determination and we hope to see her at this event in the future.

In the Juniors Division, Josh Brooks (Ohio) won all six games and averaged 70%. Tony White (Pennsylvania) finished second with 64%. The Elders Class A Championship was taken by Bob Logan (Indiana) with a record of 4-1 and an average of 78%. He was able to win in a group of pitchers who are going to be a force in the future.

Each year the Ringer Classic attracts the "best of the best" in horseshoe pitching...this year counting 49 world championships and numerous state champions among its participants. If you would like to compete with the best horseshoe pitchers in the world, we'll see you in Greenville next year!

2002 JAPAN OPEN

Wednesday, August 28th, another warm day in Northern California as my traveling companion, Tom Munoz, and I leave for the San Jose airport. We have a 1pm flight on American Airlines, nonstop to Tokyo, Japan. Our final destination is the Hidaka Kentucky Farm on the northern most Japanese island of Hokkaido. We are going to put on pitching clinics and assist our friends in the Japanese NHPA Charter with the running of the 2002 Japan Open Horseshoe Tournament.

It is Thursday afternoon when we arrive at the Narita Airport in Tokyo after an eleven-hour flight and 16-hour time difference crossing the International Date Line. We clear customs and head for the check-in counter of JAL as we still have another 1.5-hour flight to New Chitose Airport, near Sapporo on Hokkaido. When we arrive at Chitose, we are met by six people who inform us we must wait nearly one hour more for another plane that is bringing the Japanese language interpreter who will accompany us during our week-long visit to Japan. She finally arrives and nine of us depart in a van and two cars for the hour drive to Hidaka Kentucky Farm.

Thankfully, Friday is a day of rest as we try to shake off the effects of jet lag and acclimate our bodies to the time change. Hidaka Kentucky Farm is a Japanese recreation resort of some 100+ acres that provides lodging in rustic log cabins set in a beautiful area of trees among the rolling hills. The resort offers guest activities such as horseback riding, fishing, boating, miniature golf, archery, bike riding, tennis and horseshoe pitching. It is on an expanse of lawn, normally a soccer field, that some 24 portable, sand-filled horseshoe courts have been set up. Each has a 2-foot high portable backboard and long 2x12 boards set on low crates surround the entire layout. These will be the seats for players and spectators.

On Saturday morning we make the first of many visits over several days to various government offices. Protocol is very important in Japan and several offices have played a part in bringing the 2002 Japan Open and us to Hokkaido. Before we leave the island, we

will have had appointments with two town mayors, the Executive Director of the Hidaka Policy and Planning Department, the Speaker of the Hokkaido Assembly and the Director General of the Hidaka Subprefectural Office of the Hokkaido Government.

Saturday afternoon we begin a 2-hour long clinic on horseshoe pitching. Tom who is a 70% flip thrower demonstrates that grip and toss while I demonstrate the grip and release of the 1-1/4 and 1-3/4 turn. There were over 100 people at the clinic and most had little or no pitching experience. The flip was definitely more appealing to those who took the second hour to actually try their hand at the game. That evening, there was a welcome party at the Kentucky Farm restaurant where two groups of youngsters had been brought in to demonstrate some native dance and dress. The party contained many government people and many speeches were made including one by me.

Sunday morning dawns with a light rain falling. The tournament

with 114 entrants is scheduled to begin at 10am. But first, there is an hour-long reception and opening ceremony to conclude with more introductions, more speeches and thank-yous.

The tournament begins a little past 10am. The light rain has all but stopped. Every entrant and official has been issued a very lightweight vest to wear with the words "Japan Open 2002" printed across the front. Men wear a blue colored vest; women and officials have been given a yellow vest. There are 23 classes in this event. One has 4 players, all the rest have five. The tournament has Divisions for Open Men, Senior Men (Elders) who pitch short distance at age 65 and Women. Each class is assigned to one court. Each player will pitch a 30 shoe count-all game against all the others in his/ her class. In a class of five, while two play their game, one other walks with them keeping the written score and judging. The other two players rest and socialize on the bench. This format of play had all class preliminary play finished by continued on page 14

1pm. Everyone then took a break of about one-hour for a free barbecue lunch provided by Kentucky Farm. It consisted mostly of corn on the cob, vegetables and fish. By 2pm all the class winners are back on the courts. They have again been seeded into 3 division brackets. This time it will be 30-shoe cancellation in head-to-head play. Win a game and you advance to play another winner. Lose a game and you drop to the loser bracket where one more loss eliminates you. In the end, the final player in the winner and loser brackets play for the Division championship.

During the tournament, Tom and I served as roving judges and liaison to a group of young English speaking teachers working at schools on the island but pitching their first horseshoes. Yes, the Japan Open was just that, open to all Japanese and foreigners living in Japan. One lady from New Zealand on a 3-year teaching contract was such an apt pupil that she took 3rd place in the Women's Division, averaging nearly 20% on the first day she ever pitched horseshoes.

Horseshoe pitching in Japan is much more a social event than one normally sees in the United States. While the scoring is the same, opponents root for one another and extend admiration when their opponent gets a double ringer or wins the game. We did not observe the compulsive drive to win that is seen in the U.S. Even on the courts, the Japanese bow in respect several times during a game. The top man pitcher in Japan averages only about 35-40%. Most players are below 20% but it is difficult to practice or improve because there are no permanent courts in Japan and only about 10

events a year in the whole country. NHPA-J is doing it's best to build the sport, but lack of money and facilities makes it difficult. So, when you see a Japanese player at the W.T. help them and try to understand that they do not have near the opportunities that the sport offers in the U.S.A. Many, many thanks to our Japanese horse-shoe friends.

DENVER METRO HORSESHOE CLUB

"How the West was won?" By a pair of horseshoes, not six shooters! The Denver Metro Horseshoe Club (DMHC) was formed prior to 1920, although records are unavailable as to the official year. The first Colorado State Championship was held in 1921, which included many pitchers from Denver. We've only been able to locate the DMHC Secretary-Treasurer records beginning 1926, which indicated club membership at 52 men (no women). They pitched on two courts located in Denver City Park. In 1928 Mr. Putt Mossman (World Champion in 1924, 1925) was invited to perform an exhibition in Denver for the sum of \$25.00. He requested blue clay since this is what was used when he won his world titles. Denver Club began searching for clay to replace their sand courts. About this time, the city of Denver installed six new courts, making a total of eight. Pitchers would gather on Saturdays and Sundays just to play against one another. With the expansion of courts, the DMHC began hosting the Denver City Horseshoe Tournament and Colorado State Tournaments. For many years the city park was the hub for horseshoe pitchers.

In 1955 the Denver Metro Horseshoe Club crowned their first and only world champion, Hazel Russell. Hazel was the inspiration for other women, but it wasn't until 1969 that Colorado had enough women to begin the women's class at the State Championship Tournament.

In 1965 the Denver Parks and Recreation Department added ten new,

lighted courts on the south side of Denver at Washington Park. These courts are still used for summer leagues.

In 1972 Paul LaCrosse, a pitcher from Minnesota, decided to pull up stakes and move to Colorado. In 1974 Paul started the first DMHC unsanctioned league. From 1974 through 1978 Paul and Russ Gadoury (Massachusetts) waged a campaign to urge NHPA to change their thinking beyond tournaments to offer league play to non-tournament players. The league play program has been the biggest contributed to NHPA growth. The DMHC league has been sanctioned since 1978. As charter members, the DMHC grew rapidly and in 1981 added an additional twelve courts at Rocky Mountain Lake Park in north Denver. At this time, there were two summer leagues at the two locations. Ten years later the north club moved to the newly constructed twelve courts at Edgewater, CO.

In 1989 the DMHC pitchers rented an old maintenance garage in Commerce City, CO. for \$300 per month. DMHC purchased six wood portable courts used at the Eau Claire, WI. World Tournament. Many volunteer hours were needed to prepare the indoor facility for six fall and winter leagues.

Thanks to the NHPA Sanctioned League Program, the Denver Metro Horseshoe charter club has over 100 members and continues to grow.



Both shoes were of unusual design and that may have impeded sales rather than impress the pitchers of the day. Poor sales would mean items are more elusive 65 years later, but not necessarily impossible to find.

The Madison shoe had the most innovative design and received patent approval November 3, 1936. The design by William Madison, Rochester, New York, had an inner set of large barb hooks in addition to the customary hooks on the points. Certainly this design should have appealed to some of the pitchers of the game. There should have been some sales, especially from the national advertising in the Horseshoe World. The




ad in 1936 boasted of 17 consecutive double ringers. At least someone claims to have pitched the shoe!

The Issacs Air-Flow shoe was advertised as early as 1935 in Horseshoe World. The patent application was filed by William Frazier (Hamilton, Ohio) on November 19, 1935 and was approved May 11, 1937. Why the shoe bears the brand name of Issacs is not understood, other than the shoes was distributed by W.L. Issacs, also of Hamilton, Ohio.

Interesting but little note, after the patent approval, the model name spelling was changed to Issacs Air-Flo. Advertising in the Horseshoe World continued through


some sales success and there some specimens would be found. At least none are known.

The Issacs shoe offered a very interesting ad in 1936. The manufacturer of the Issacs Air-Flo shoe offered \$100 in additional prize money at the National Tournament. Up to \$25 would be paid to any class winners



that would be pitching the Issacs shoe. That same ad showed a Canadian distributor W.A. MacKenzie, New Westminister, B.C. Other than Diamond shoes, this is only U.S. made shoe that had a formal Canadian outlet.

If you find a shoe that appears very different and you for a moment think you have found an Issacs shoe, you can quickly make the determination, by the three-notch ringer breaker. The Issacs shoe is the only shoe known have such a feature. The patent draft does not show this feature but the pictured ads clearly show a triple-notch breaker.

JUNIOR PROGRAM by Munj Manhas, Junior Director and V.P.


I had a few inquiries about the junior program in Victoria so I thought I would write a little something about it.

About two years ago I was asked if I was interested in directing the junior program at the Greater Victoria Horseshoe Pitching Association; I said yes. I'm glad I did.

I remembered what it was like when I was a junior. I was 14 years old in my first year of horseshoes playing in the B.C. Summer Games at Kelowna and I really didn't know anyone at the tournament. Before my first game, I went for a walk by myself and I saw a member of our club standing by her van. It was very hot that day. I walked by the van and she said hello and asked me if I would like a drink. I said yes. I'm glad I did. We talked for an hour. When I left I thought that that was very nice of her to give me not only a drink but to show me what most horseshoe players were like, warm and friendly and very hospitable. I felt that was sort of my introduction to a lot of people I might meet playing horseshoes in my life. I won a gold medal at the summer games and by the way, the woman's name was Shirley Vaugeouis.

Anyways back to our junior program. When I showed up for my first junior league night two years ago, we had two juniors. I realized we had a lot of work to do. The first thing that I did the next day was join the executive and started drilling it at them that we have a junior program and that I needed support in running a successful program in our club. That was pretty easy with Dorothy Butts as our President and members like Joe Ianerrilli and Chester Czostak helping the program out. After that I tried to get the members involved and to put out the awareness that we need juniors! Tell your children, grandchildren, neighbors' children and any others about the kids program. The next step was to contact the Royal Canadian Legions and other organizations in town that could help out in any way. Many members of our club belong to the Legion (and the Legion executives) and they could put in a word about our clubs junior program. Joe Ianerrelli was instrumental in that department for our junior program with the Legion and I thank him for that. After writing to all the legions in greater Victoria the response was \$1550 in less than 3 months. That figure was repeated this year. I put a sign in our clubhouse and in our clubs newsletter which read that I had put a barrel in our clubs shed and that that if you wanted to help out our junior program you could place your empty beer, juice or pop containers in there all year round. I have collected over \$1000 in empties so far. It seems that every camping trip by one of our club members produces a large bag of beer cans. Thank you Claude Cliché and Chuck Kerr. The program went from two kids to ten pretty quick. I was happy but I knew I could do better. I had to work on the kids that had showed up. I offered a free pop on every league night to each junior that showed up. I also put out the challenge that if we had 12 or more juniors show up on a league night that I would give

them a slice of pizza as well as their pop. I received support from some local pizza places that gave us ten free lunches to our players of the week in the program. I also received cash donations by members and families. It was great having that response from our members and I thank them. We have 27 juniors that have played in the program in the 2002 season. The most in one night has been 17 and the least has been 12. Averaging 14 kids per night has been great. We play ten regular season weeknights (every Monday) and two playoff nights to follow. I cannot compete with baseball and other summer events with the kids. I have to realize that we do not have a glamour sport and that we are not on T.S.N. primetime with the highlights. I can only offer an alternate sport with some fun - so that's where I'm at - MAKE IT FUN SO THEY WILL COME OUT AND PLAY AND TREAT THEM WITH RESPECT SO THEY WILL COME BACK WITH THEIR FRIENDS.



WORLD TOURNAMENT

AND OTHER HORSESHOE STATISTICS By Bart Sargent

In 1994 I received an Achievement Award for what I have done. I wish I had prepared my acceptance speech better. First I forgot to thank Beverly Born for the kind introduction but not only for that, also for my selection as the Sanction League Club Award prior to this.

I want to also thank the following people for helping me with all that was needed in compiling this hobby. First and very helpful has been Earl Winston. He has provided me with much information needed including copies of covers of old programs plus a list of Hall of Fame Committee Members from the past. A list of these appears in Volume One of my books. Also for the kind article in the November/December issue of Newsline. Also, I want to thank the following: my older son, David, for this word processor he gave me as a gift a long time ago and my younger son, Brad, who sorted many of the names alphabetically on his computer. Also thanks to the late Bones Hastings for the first names of the players who pitched in the 1981 Tournament in Minnesota. Only last names were listed in the Digest. Thanks also to Gary Kline for providing copies of the individual scores of the 30s, 40s and 50s. This helped the work I did on Volume Three. Thanks also to Debby Michaud for providing me with all the scores of her games in the Women's Championship Class. These

scores were not listed prior to 1981. Thanks also to Steve Kuchcinsky for helping me sort out the names of the many members of the Kuchcinsky family correctly.

I have always been interested in statistics on sports, especially baseball. There are many books and encyclopedias on this and other sports. So I thought I would attempt this on horseshoes. As Earl said in his article, Volume One lists almost every player who has ever pitched in the World Tournaments through the years. Upon completing this I started on Volume Two, which comes in four sections. The first section lists where the tournaments were located plus the number of entries; the oldest and youngest each year; errors in the Digest, plus pages I call "Did You Know That". The other three sections are many lifetime, tournament and game records. While doing this I started wondering how certain players did against others during their lifetime. So Volume Three lists almost every player who has pitched in the Championship Class two or more times: men, women, boys, girls, seniors, elders and senior ladies. There are over 350 players listed in this Volume. I have selected a few results and listed them below, mostly of players from the past. Listed are the names, years, scores, shoes pitched (ringers omitted), and ringer percentages. The top player's score is on the left.
