SANCTIONED CLUB/LEAGUEREPORT by Lorraine Sternberg

It's the time of the year when most leagues are finished with pitching or at least one would think so. I know this sounds like a broken record, but there seems to be a lot of clubs this year that still have not even sent in their membership report. Membership reports need to be submitted when your league starts its season, not at the end of the season. The most important reason for this is that your club is not covered under the NHPA insurance until I receive this report. Please remember this for 2004. Also, another thing of importance to remember; all pitchers must be sanctioned when pitching on a sanctioned league. If you allow any pitcher not carrying a current NHPA card to pitch on your league, you are not covered by the NHPA insurance and you can also have your sanction pulled.

Junior Scholarship forms are due November 15th. Along with the scholarship form, please send a full copy of their report card and a copy of the junior's birth certificate. Top Ten reports are due December 1st. If you have taken on the duties of league director for your club, it's important to complete all the forms and to complete them on time. It's how your club gets the most out of the sanctioned league program.

NHPA CO-OP PROGRAM

The NHPA co-op program will continue through 2004. Please make every effort to seek out your charter president; he/she can supply you with details regarding this program or see previous issues of Newsline for more details. This program can only benefit us with the gains we might achieve in new members. It will certainly strengthen a club that might be faltering by bringing in new members. Start now with the composition of your advertisement for new members so that you are receiving phone calls by the beginning of your 2004 season. Winter is fast approaching and our 2004 season will be here before you realize it.

We're all looking forward to 2004 already! It will be great to meet all the new NHPA members that Idaho has recruited. Last we heard it was over 200 new members! Virtually tripling the size of their charter!

DISPARITY IN PERCENTAGES

Back as early as 1987 when we, (Gail and I) began pitching, the Northern California Horseshoe Pitching Association (NCHPA) had mostly women separated from men type pitching. The disparity in percentages among the women was huge! It was a matter of get better or get beat. To rectify this blatant unfairness the mixeddistanced pitching format was created. After 17 years it certainly has brought some parity to the tournaments. This coincided with more of our members qualifying and entering the Elder Division (short distanced and over 70 years old).

My personal belief is that mixed distanced pitching must stay as part of the NHPA sanctioned tournament structure. If it were not available, I dare say that a significant number of women and elders would give up this sport. This would have a catastrophic impact on our membership.

Certainly a charter can hold separated events if they choose, BUT each charter should let the individual clubs decide which format they wish to use. Charter Constitutions or By-Laws should not dictate this choice.

If you choose to run mixed pitching formats please look at the attendance of those events and measure them against non-mixed events. If, by normal reasoning, you want a great turnout for your clubs event then I am convinced you'll become an advocate of mixed pitching.

For those that have an adversity against mixed pitching there is an alternative. That is to recruit more members into this organization. When there is some parity amongst the various Divisions, then it may be worth considering separating distances. Ladies, talk to your neighbors, tell them what fun you are having pitching horseshoes and entice them to join. Elders, likewise, talk up horseshoe pitching at your local VFW hall, your Elks, Moose, Eagles, Rotary clubs, your churches. Teach the young peoples clubs of your various youth organizations about horseshoe pitching. Full-distanced pitchers do this also; we must find a way to increase our membership. Sheer numbers will eventually dictate whether or not we ever can separate distances into distinct categories. If everyone simply brought in one member annually, we would have a great organization in a few years; one that sponsors would seek out to become part of.

Presently when one mentions our organization to potential sponsors, their first question is what is your membership? Much to our chagrin we have to say 12,500, that's a shame isn't it? There are an estimated 17 million people that pitch horseshoe recreationally. Where are they when asked to join the NHPA? Perhaps this game needs a major overhaul, something to make it more appealing to everyone? Any ideas?

So,,, where does this article leave us with the mixed-pitching aspect of this game? Probably not anywhere near a conclusive agreement, I realize that. What it does do is give all of us more reason than ever to recruit new members. Mixed pitching came about because there was a need in our organization for fairness and equality for all. As long as our membership remains static, mixed pitching will remain part of this organization's effort to promote fairness and equality.

Then there is the issue of our nine year old and under group pitching from 20 feet. What is your charter doing to facilitate this group of children? Concessions need to be made to accommodate these children. Please use whatever means necessary to encourage these youngsters. Give them a participation award when they enter an event! Whether that is a ribbon, plaque, trophy, medal, certificate, whatever, let them walk away from a tournament with something in their hands other than their own horseshoes! Continue to encourage the younger generation to carry on the sport that has given us so much enjoyment in our time.

REGIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT by Allen Baptist

Unfortunately, two Regional Directors have sent me their resignations. Jim Haupt from Wisconsin has done a wonderful job and has been RD since 1987. He was also a recipient of the Regional Director of the Year Award. Ken Jaeger, who is stepping down as Wisconsin Charter President, will be taking over for Jim. Ronnie Frederick is also resigning as Regional Director of Oklahoma. Ronnie has done an outstanding job and I will miss working with him. The Oklahoma Charter officers have not contacted me with their recommendation for a new Regional Director.

From the Mail Bag

Darle Esh, Pennsylvania Regional Director – reports that he has sanctioned the new Shiloh Horseshoe Club Courts in the town of York located at the Sunset Park. They have nine clay courts with lights.

Pat Wemhoff, Nebraska Regional Director – reports that at their State Doubles Tournament, Gordon Fuhr pitched a perfect game. Pat watched the game up close and personal because he was pitching against him!

Bernie VanLerberg, Kansas Regional Director – reports that he has sanctioned new courts in the city of Iola, having nine clay courts and one in Bonner Springs which has five clay courts; three are inside and two are outside. Bernie has also sanctioned twelve existing courts in Bonner Springs.

Myrtle May Kamoku, Hawaii Regional Director – reports that she is working with incoming NHPA president Paul Stewart on having an Hawaiian Web

Page. The Hawaiian Charter is considering making a bid for hosting the World Tournament possibly in 2006/07. They are currently having fundraisers to raise money for the World Tournament bid. Myrtle is working with the county of Kauai Department of Hawaiian Homelands to acquire land to implement a horseshoe-pitching site (possibly 8 to 10 acres).

Don Weaver, Nevada Regional Director – reports that he had 310 participants at the Corporate Challenge Horseshoe event that was run from September 15th to the 19th. This event also drew hundreds of spectators.

Elwyn Cooper, Missouri Regional Director – reports that in the Springfield area, through the efforts of Brad Eldridge, who is the Executive Director of the Greater Springfield Sports Commission and Foundation and Ron Armitage, who is owner of the Exotic Animal Paradise, had 32 permanent courts built to hold this years' State Tournament. Elwyn hopes that this complex will generate a lot of enthusiasm for the sport of horseshoes.

CHARTER CHATTER by Debby Michaud

ALABAMA

In Alabama, they are welcoming some new members in a new club. The Lacey's Spring (coon hunters) Club built six new, covered courts with three more planned. They have 14 new members already - a terrific increase for the state of Alabama and an excellent start for a new club. Hope they had a great year.

BRITISH COLUMBIA, CANADA

In British Columbia, Canada, they are training Cadets to keep score at their tournaments, providing for a smoother tournament AND helping out the Cadets' organization with some money. President of the organization, Vince Herkel, encourages all the clubs to think about the *quality* of their tournaments and not just the quantity of pitchers.

KANSAS

The Sunflower Horseshoe Club had 15 pitchers in its summer league. One of the two new players has a Missouri license plate and the "new guys", Jim Nieses and David Jackson, appear to like the handicap system. There is also a morning league comprised of ten senior pitchers and two of them are over 80 years old.

MINNESOTA

Minnesota has one of the largest memberships in the NHPA - one of the reasons may be their award winning efforts in attracting and keeping junior pitchers. When some adults in Minnesota accompany their grandchildren to the awards stand, it is for the grandchildren to pick up their own awards! Jackie Hughes, a former junior pitcher herself, is the Junior Promotion Director. She states that almost every club has junior pitchers - part of the reason may be that they try to get the youth involved with their ideas and to be recognized, not just to pitch. They publicize the juniors in a profile in most newsletters and have a "Junior only" tournament every summer. They also give college scholarships to the juniors at the state banquet. It definitely seems to be working - kudos to the folks in Minnesota!

MISSOURI

This state already has a fine indoor arena, the Harris arena in the Kansas City area, the money for which was donated by Don Harris who wanted to see his legacy in place and enjoyed WHILE he was alive. Now Missouri will have another indoor arena in the southwestern part of the state - the Hudsons are proud of this one. It is a great boost to any area to be able to pitch horseshoes year round.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

The Northern California HPA is understandably proud of its efforts in hosting the 2003 California State Tournament. Sounds like a real team effort and a successful one. There were several chairpersons who each had a part in pulling it together for the 155 pitchers. To help the host club, individuals, clubs and even some businesses sponsor trophies. The NHPA Hall of Fame exhibit, although not complete, has been organized enough to be shown during those tournaments. Mary Bastian and Jack Freeman have spent many hours on this exhibit.

WASHINGTON

The Washington State HPA bid farewell to its first lady president when Phyllis Quist handed over the reins to Vic Magnus. There have not been many women who have held that position in the state associations - the pitchers showed their appreciation for her job performance by presenting her with a diamond horseshoe necklace.

And in Tacoma, Bob Hoerner spearheaded a horseshoe clinic for 90 boys and girls ages 7 - 12. On two consecutive Mondays, the youngsters were introduced to horseshoes and other activities, learning the basics of horseshoe pitching as well as the rules of the game. An investment in the future in more ways than one!

WISCONSIN

Finally, let us all thank the Eau Claire, WI club and the Wisconsin HPA for their fine effort in hosting the 2003 World Tournament.

HALL OF FAME

We would like to remind everyone that nominations to be considered for the 2004 Hall of Fame ballot must be submitted to us by March 31, 2004. We don't yet have a standard nomination form. That is a goal in the months ahead. Therefore, type a resume listing the achievements of your nominee that make them worthy of consideration for the Hall of Fame. Their pitching accomplishments or their promotion and service to the sport of horseshoe pitching should have been noteworthy on the national level and not just in their local area. Send the nomination to us at the address listed in the front of this magazine.

Some of our Hall of Fame inductees have passed away in recent months. Those include Ruth Hangen, Sol Berman and Phyllis Negaard. All have played a major role in the evolvement of our sport and we know they are greatly missed by their families and friends.

Again, we are indebted to the authors and historians of our sport who aid us in making the Hall of Fame Quiz possible. Answers are on page 28.

HALL OF FAME QUIZ:

- 1. In 1948 he set the record for the highest ringer average for a complete world tournament with 87.5%. However, this only earned him second place. This record stood until 1968.
- 2. During his tenure as NHPA Secretary/Treasurer, classes C & D were added to the world tournament in the Men's Division, B & C to the Women's Division and B, C & D to Junior Boys. The Intermediate and Senior Divisions were also begun.
- 3. She played in seven world tournaments, winning six of them and finishing second in the other one. She was the second woman inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame.
- 4. This left handed pitcher won the world title three times and was part of a husband and wife trick pitching act that toured the country and appeared on national TV.
- 5. He was responsible for incorporating the NHPA and originating the NHPA magazine entitled "Barnyard Golf." In partnership with William Weis, he wrote the standard rules for horseshoe pitching in 1920.
- 6. As NHPA Secretary, he was responsible for running the 1940 world tournament. He put together the "Horseshoe Compendium" that was published by the NHPA. He opened many world tournaments with his singing of our national anthem and the Canadian national anthem

- 7. In the 1968 world tournament he pitched 2869 ringers out of 3586 shoes for a ringer average of 80%, which is a record for total ringers and shoes pitched in a 36-man championship class. This averages out to 102.5 shoes per game, but he only placed 12th.
- 8. He served as NHPA President for ten years and has sold lots of game related items.
- 9. A two-time world champion, she has won more state championships than any other woman. She also held the qualifying record when onsite qualifying was eliminated from the world tournament.
- 10. Active in world tournament play in the late 1940's and most of the 1950's, this one term NHPA President and former high school superintendent compiled a record of 242 wins and 129 losses in the championship division and a ringer average of 71.8% for those games.
- 11. He was author of "Science At the Stake", which traced the history of the game and provided instruction.
- 12. Not a horseshoe pitcher, he was still very active in keeping the world tournament alive throughout the 1950's when it was held in Murray, Utah.

HORSESHOE PITCHING MEMORIES

Iowa State Fair Des Moines, Iowa

The World Book Encyclopedia tells of the days of Jesus when Roman soldiers played games with the shoes off their horses. When the Iowa State Fair began in 1854, farmers showing off their livestock brought this game to the fairgrounds. A great game that is thousands of years old. Now we can look back at some of the eight world champs from Iowa with eleven in the National Hall of Fame and one in the Iowa Register Sports Hall of Fame.

Who from horseshoes is in the Iowa Register Sports Hall of Fame? None other than the very first world champion and also the first Iowa State Champion at the Iowa State Fair in 1920 from Kellerton, Iowa, Frank Jackson. In Kellerton, Iowa every street corner has his name on it. This man is in the National and Iowa State Hall of Fame. Each year the Frank Jackson Award goes to the person who does the most for horseshoe pitching in Iowa.

Do you remember the daredevil motorcycle driver who pitched in the 1920's? It was told he drove his cycle upon the roof of the grandstand at the Iowa State Fair; I have no proof. In 1924 and 1925 he won the World Horseshoe title. He also won the shortest game ever played in the World Tournament. He was from Eldora and was inducted into the National and Iowa Hall of Fame. Our indoor horseshoe arena in Eldora is called the Putt Mossman Arena. Which state did the winning players come from who hold the world record for the shortest and longest horseshoe games? Read on.

A horseshoe promoter from Des Moines (not for playing) is in the National Hall of Fame. Leland Mortenson was 21 when he became director of the Iowa State Championships in 1927 at the Iowa State Fair. Mortensen gradually improved the competition to Midwestern and then a World event. The Midwestern event was to attract all of the greatest pitchers in the world. When the National

could not find a sponsor for the World Tournament from 1935-39 the event was at the Iowa State Fair. When the army drafted him during World War II the army made him special services director of a recreational horseshoe program for soldiers.

Do you know the name of the Junior State Champion who was a famous basketball star for Iowa State University? Would it help to know he was called the Roland rocket. Yes, it was none other than Gary Thompson who now does play-by-play broadcasting on television. He was Junior State Champ in 1950 and 1951.

Lucille Hopkins of Ottumwa was elected to the National Hall of Fame. She was superintendent of horseshoes at the Iowa State Fair until 1973. She was for fifteen years the state secretary of Iowa Horseshoes. She never played, but she would go and watch her husband play and one day was asked to help. She was also inducted to Iowa Hall of Fame.

My time in horseshoes began in the 1960's playing in the backyard with dad and my brothers. A visit to Birdland Park in 1972 would begin my organized career. Soon I was elected secretary of horseshoes in Iowa. For six years, from 1968 to 1973, horseshoe pitching was inside the sheep barn at the Iowa State Fair. In 1973 I saw the portable inside horseshoe courts with rubber mats on springs crowded in a building. These portable courts were designed by Dale Dixon a former Iowa State Champion. He was state champion eleven times. He was a member of the National and State Hall of Fame from Des Moines.

This all changed the very next spring as horseshoes moved to its current location. For years it was in the cattle barn area then moved inside for six years. Kenny Fulk and Jerry Coughlin met with me and other horseshoe pitchers in 1974. It was March of 1974 when we were told our new place would be on the Teen Town spot we now have. My job was to create a schedule to have horseshoes everyday at the Iowa State Fair. We are still playing every day of the Iowa State Fair.

In 1978, the World Horseshoe Tournament was held on the Iowa State Fairgrounds; the first time on this spot. In the 1930's it was held down near the cattle barns. This was hailed as the most successful World Tournament ever by the Secretary of the National Association. Never before had there been such a turnout of players from the host state. There were 200 entries from our state. Over 800 players from all over the country were here. This would be the last time qualifying would take place at a world tournament. After this, ringer percentages of tournaments played would be used. This practice already was in place

at the Iowa State Fair tournaments, beginning in 1974. In the 1980's regional tournaments were held during the Iowa State Fair. In 1988 four former world champions competed.

Who from the state of Iowa was the winner of the longest game of horseshoe ever pitched? There was 194 shoes pitched and he had 175 ringers. They call him the lion of Iowa horseshoes. This man has seven world records to his credit and is listed in the World Book of Guinness. Eighteen times the State Champion, elected to the National Hall of Fame and the Iowa Hall of Fame in 1978. An award each year is given to the Men's State Champion in his honor. This award is the Glen "Red" Henton award. He lives in Maquoketa and was a visitor again last year to the horseshoe courts. My grandson who has just begun to play horseshoes remarked to his mom, "I have met a horseshoe legend".

Three junior player champions from the Iowa State Fair went on to become World Champions. Care to guess? The first was Kevin Cone of Storm Lake; Iowa Junior Champion in 1979, Men's State Champion seven times and Men's World Champion in 1992. He was asked to go to Japan to get the game started over there by the National Association. He is in the Iowa Hall of Fame. Our second person of course is Cathy Carter of Council Bluffs, also a member of the Iowa Hall of Fame. Iowa Junior Champion six straight times, Ladies Champion 17 times for a total of 23 State titles and Women's World Champion in 1993. The third one to remember is Joseph Smith of Gladbrook. He has seven junior state titles and was the 1995 World Junior Champion.

There was a record 559 entries at the Iowa State Fair in 1976, the year of the Bicentennial for the state of Iowa. There is a picture of all the players for 1976 in the Iowa State Fair Museum. In 2003 we came close to the record with 558 entries. It will only get better. Our Open Singles tournaments have become very popular. Every year will bring more memories. Our greatest comment came this year from a contestant who said they never ever imagined their whole family could play the game of horseshoes together at the Iowa State Fair. Keep up the great work Iowa State Fair. This old game is still going great at the Iowa State Fair.

The horseshoe pitchers of Iowa thank you.

Where Are They?

The Anchor Horseshoe Company, Fresno, California, first appeared as a horseshoe manufacturer in a list of sanctioned shoes published in a 1936 Horseshoe World magazine. Later a pictured ad of the Anchor-On shoe appeared in the 1940 NHPA publication, "The Horseshoe Compendium." That is the extent of the information we have about this shoe.

As the company was in business for at least five years, there should have been enough shoes produced that some Anchor-On would show up in collection, at least in the western states - but none so far. The shoe is a cross between a Gordon and an Ohio shoe. The Anchor-On had the double notch ringer breaker of an Ohio and the calks of a Gordon. That should have led to some sales success as a tournament style shoe, adding to the mystery of why none are showing up in collection.







OLD BUCKS

The term "Old Buck" is familiar to many Pennsylvania hunters. It describes a deer whose wisdom has enabled him to successfully navigate multiple hunting seasons; a veteran whose experience and wisdom is then passed on to younger generations. That same term applies to the sport of pitching horseshoes.

How does one recognize an "Old Buck" at a horseshoe tournament? Impeccably dressed, he shows up in plenty of time for his class. He readily shares advice when asked, and unobtrusively smiles or nods his support as he keeps score for other classes. Declaring at 30 feet is not a criterion, even though most have earned the right to do so. Old Bucks have forgotten more about horseshoes than most of us will ever know. They also understand that how the game is played is more important than the final score.

My uncle competed in NHPA tournaments back in the 60's. As a teenager I showed little interest in the sport and my only horseshoe-related memory is the time Uncle Dale said that he pitched 55% ringers in a game and was nearly shut out. When asked how he could pitch that well and almost get skunked, he grinned and said, "The other guy pitched better". I have since come to understand that Uncle Dale qualified as an Old Buck, and I regret having missed the opportunity to learn the game of horseshoes from him. When he passed away, Aunt Audrey gave me his beautifully engraved leather horseshoe bag and two pairs of Ted Allen shoes.

It is embarrassing to admit that the leather bag and horseshoes were placed on a shelf in the garage and forgotten. A number of years later I noticed a sign for the Dallas Area Horseshoe Club near our home in Pennsylvania. I found eight clay courts at the Luzerne County Fairgrounds and a business card tacked to the wall that simply said "Al Long - Horseshoe Pitcher". I called the listed number and Al invited me to his home to pitch that same night.

I arrived at the Long residence with some hesitation, only to hear the familiar sound of a horseshoe game in progress. Al (Peanuts) and his wife Jean made me feel incredibly welcome. Both of them beat me handily, and not getting skunked that first night had much more to do with their sportsmanship than it did with my pitching skills.

As a result of that positive first night experience at the Long residence, I joined the NHPA and became a tournament junkie. Peanuts is a mentor to all of us at the Dallas Club and has continued to teach us about the game he loves so much. What he has taught us goes well beyond the technical aspects of throwing ringers: lessons such as sportsmanship, demeanor, humility, and most importantly, how to enjoy the game.

When Peanuts introduces me to his friends at tournaments, he thoroughly enjoys telling them about my first night at his house, and how I threw so low and hard he was afraid that I would break his backboards. He then goes on to say, with a twinkle in his eye, that Dallas Club members don't show him any respect because now we beat him (truly a rare occasion)! However, he knows how deeply we all respect him, and all those like him that stand tall as the grand gentlemen of this great sport.

Uncle Dale's beautiful leather horseshoe bag and those old Ted Allen horseshoes can once again be found at a tournament nearly every weekend. My uncle is one Old Buck that is surely missed, but I am forever grateful for the opportunity to learn from those that remain.

As for the Old Bucks who have declared at 30 feet; I applaud your decision. Thank you for staying with the game you love so that the rest of us can continue to learn from you. I have never begrudged a loss to someone pitching at less than 40 feet, and often come away from those particular games smiling at something heard, learned or observed.

STATE HORSESHOES RECAP

Sept. 11, 2003 Press

GENOLA -- The Minnesota Gopher State Horseshoe Pitchers Association (MGSHPA) held its 77th Annual State Singles Horseshoe Tourney Aug. 29 through Sept. 1 in Genola and as always, the Wright County area was well represented. The state tournament was a four-day event that featured pitchers from all over the state. New champions were crowned in the Men's, Women's, Seniors, and Junior divisions.

First-time entrant Jim Wagner of St. Michael was perhaps the most successful area pitcher, as he endured a three-way playoff to earn the Senior division championship. Wagner posted a 48% ringer percentage to beat Bert Logsdon of St. Paul in the final game and capture his state title.

"It's a pretty prestigious accomplishment," said MGSHPA president Jerry LaBrosse of Greenfield. "You're going against people with the same skill level as yourself."

LaBrosse nearly joined Wagner in the championship ranks, but fell just shy in the Men's division. LaBrosse upset 22-time

state champion (and 3-time world champion) Dale Lipovsky of Apple Valley during the round-robin tournament, but lost a couple of other matches to keep him from the title. Still, he was excited with his effort.

"It was one of the highlights of my career," said LaBrosse. "There have only been a few other people in the state who have beaten him."

LaBrosse may take some credit in helping Gerald Stangland of Deer River continue the upset trend, as well. Stangland also beat Lipovksy head-to-head to win the Men's title in a shocker.

"I think I knocked him off balance and he never really recovered," said LaBrosse. "I was a spoiler."

LaBrosse did finish third with a 5-2 record and 54.63% ringers. Stangland was 6-1 (66.66% ringers) while Lipovksy was 5-2 (68.36% ringers).

In other men's divisions, Robert Stewart of Cokato finished first in the Class I with a 5-1 record and 36% ringers, Ron Mead of Rogers captured second in Class K with a 5-2 record and 24% ringers, Annandale's Dean Hedlund won Class N with a 7-0 record and 26.28% ringer percentage, Buffalo's Glen Berglun took second in Class O at 6-1 and 22.57% ringers, and Doug Bollman of Dassel finished second in Class P with a 6-1 mark and 12.28% ringer percentage. Marvin Timm of Loretto and Dennis Opsahl of Annandale finished first and second in Class M, respectively. Timm was perfect at 7-0 with a 28.57% ringer percentage and Opsahl was 5-2 with a 25.14% day.

Edi Holland from McGregor shot 57.51% ringers and won the Women's title in a dramatic playoff game with Mary Matuke of Brooklyn Park.

In other women's divisions, Michelle LaBrosse of Greenfield defended her title in Class E with a 4-1 mark and 28.80% ringers. Buffalo's Mary Denzin took third place in Class B (3-2, 40.80%), just beating out a pair of other area pitchers in Marlys Timm of Loretto (fourth at 2-3, 42.00%) and Delano's Joy Sandquist (sixth at 1-4, 38.00%).

Harold Schrader from Easton repeated as Elder's division champion, and posted a 60% ringer average. Dassel's Gerald Piehl finished fourth with a 2-3 record and 53.25% ringers percentage.

In Elder's Class C, Cokato's Orion Hanson placed second to Glen Werk of Herman. Hanson posted a 4-1 record and 33.60% ringer average.

Kayla Larson of Evansville won her third consecutive junior girls' title, posting a 49.64% ringer percentage. In the junior boys' division, Matt Korpela of Squaw Lake posted a nice 58.89% ringer average and captured first place, edging out Corey Hughes of Cambridge.

The MGSHPA state tournament is held every Labor Day weekend and is scheduled to be in Genola for the next five years. The area hosted the state championships for 10 straight years into the 1980s before it was eventually moved away. Now, the MGSHPA is back at a new facility owned by the City of Genola.

"There is a lot of horseshoe background in that area and we're hoping to see a resurgence there," said LaBrosse. "It's one of the nicest pitching facilities in the Upper Midwest."

Minnesota boasts the largest state membership in the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association, with over 1,000 sanctioned members. They have also had the largest junior membership in the nation for the past ten years. There are sanctioned tournaments are held every weekend nearly year round. Thirty-five clubs from around the state send pitchers to compete in this event, the largest state tournament in the country.

MENTORING/VOLUNTEERING

Three years ago, the State of Florida offered an opportunity out to young people and assist them in a variety of ways. My for State employees to donate one hour of paid work time per week as mentors in various school systems. Herb Heesch, a Forester at Goethe State Forest, signed up for the program as he was already volunteering his time by teaching a class in the sport of horseshoe pitching at the Forestry Youth Academy (FYA). According to Herb: "The class that I am teaching exemplifies a partnership between an individual and the State, whereby a state-sponsored activity has served as a catalyst for additional volunteer work. My goal is to reach

work schedule has been arranged so that on one afternoon each week, I leave my normal work place at 3:00 p.m. and drive to the FYA, which is located here on the State Forest. I continue to remain 'on the clock' until 4:00 p.m.; then, the next hour is volunteer time that I donate. The result is that the students are able to receive about 1 ½ hours of actual class time each week, as about ½ hour is lost in travel time."

To date, three horseshoe courts have been built, using materials purchased by the FYA, student labor and Herb's concrete mixer. Each court has been built to National Horseshoe Pitching Association standards, including pitching platforms at 30 feet and 40 feet, stakes set in concrete and pressure-treated backboards. During this past month of December, 2002, a small storage building was purchased by Mr. Roy Miller, Maintenance Mechanic at the FYA, to be set up at the horseshoe courts and hold various game-related items, such as shovels, rakes, scoreboards and, of course, horseshoes.

Mr. Bob King, Coordinator at the Forestry Youth Academy, has stated that he has plans to expand the horseshoe program in the future. This would include fencing the horseshoe area and setting up bleachers to allow the Academy to host tournaments. He states that: "At this time our youth are invited to tournaments, and in the future I would like to see us return the invitation. This would be a good experience for the FYA and our youth. Additions and expansions to the program will be built by our youth under the direction of FYA staff."

The horseshoe class at the Forestry Youth Academy consists of a combination of classroom study, training videos, homework assignments, opportunities for the students to practice different methods of throwing horseshoes, and opportunities to throw various different types of horseshoes. Herb has developed a horseshoe class notebook that consists of nine separate chapters, with an emphasis upon teaching the students about sportsmanship. The classes are kept small, with a limit of 6 students per class. Each student is provided with a course notebook that, in addition to sportsmanship, introduces them to pitching techniques, rules, scoring methods, handicaps, equipment sources and tournament play.

As an incentive for the students to learn the course materials and to practice, the Forestry Youth Academy offers a National Horseshoe Pitchers Association membership to each student who successfully completes the horseshoe class and attains a 10% ringer average. Additionally, the top two students receive a paid entry into one NHPA-sanctioned tournament each month. On December 14, 2002, two students entered a tournament in Beverly Hills (Citrus County), one as a Junior and one as an Adult. The student entered as an adult won 3rd place in his class!

WORLD TOURNAMENT SUGGESTION BOX

A suggestion was sent to me last spring that it would be a good idea to place a Suggestion Box at the World Tournament. As it turned out it was a Suggestion Jar, but the end result was that we received 95 suggestions in that jar. When someone asked me at the World Tournament what I was going to do with them, my answer at the time was that I planned on printing them ALL in Newsline, be they good, bad or indifferent.

Well there is just not room to do that, as some were a page long. So instead I will recap them and only comment on some of the more interesting. Most were not what I would call suggestions. They were more along the lines of complaints. But that's okay, if we don't know something is wrong we can't fix it.

Because of the hot weather, twelve comments were about the pitching conditions inside. Yes it was hot, but there is not much anyone or I could do about that. Just had to remind them that the year before in Red Deer we had snow in the air at the tournament on one day. That seemed to cool them off a little. Also with twelve in the jar were comments about pitching times and scheduling. Such as "Elders should start earlier than 8 P.M. In the morning or afternoon would be better." And. "All the Elders, Sr. Men and Sr. Women should be scheduled to pitch the second week." When you look at scheduling you must consider what is best for the whole tournament. There were thirteen classes of Elders and only room for six on each shift. At some point you just run out of room to put them. Scheduling a tournament this large is not an easy task. No matter how you schedule, it we will never make everyone happy. We will try and keep the Elder's and Sr. Women out of this time spot next year but remember, because of the number of Elder's that have been entering the World Tournament in the past couple of years, this may not be possible.

There were some suggestions that stated that all the entry fee money should remain in each class and not be used to fund the Championship Classes. Every dollar of the \$100 entry fee stays within the class. It covers the prize money, trophy costs, scorekeeping and expenses for each class. None of your entry fee is used to fund the Championship Classes, unless of course you are in one of those classes.

Some of the suggestions will be used next year, such as adding the NHPA Web Site address to the schedule and also a map showing the location of the courts. Although we try to keep the cost of mailing the schedule to 37 cents, sometimes just adding one small item can make the cost go to 60 cents. When mailing out over a thousand schedules that is something that has to be considered.

Many suggestions were made about the scorekeepers and most of them sounded as if they came from the scorekeepers themselves. Such as "Let the scorekeepers sign up for a whole class instead of session by session." We may also try this next year. If someone wants to sign-up to score all three days for the same class, we will see if we can arrange for that to happen.

It is apparent with some suggestions that the writer just does not know the rules. For example, the person that asked that the 40-foot distance be shortened on raised courts. In the NHPA Official Rule Book under Rule 1 section C it states in part "the 40-foot distance on raised courts shall be measured at floor level before the clay is put in the pit." Because of the lean of the stake the distance if measured from the pitching surface is now about 39' 10" give or take depending on the depth of the clay. So in fact this has already been done.

I am going over all the suggestions and those that have some merit will be looked into. Until such time that we start getting suggestions to get rid of the Suggestion Box or Jar, it will be at every World Tournament. So keep the suggestions and/or comments coming. I will look at them all. But you don't have to wait until next year's World Tournament. I will take them anytime.
