

For all of you who have requested a copy of the program on CD, I apologize for the delays and will get your copy mailed out as soon as Kurt gets the new version ready.

We encourage all of the Secretaries, Tournament Directors and League Directors to use this program or a program similar that will create your reports in an ASCII file to send results to NatStats and the memberships to the NHPA Secretary. This software is free and downloadable on the website or I can mail it to you on CD on request.

SANCTIONED CLUB/LEAGUE REPORT by Lorraine Sternberg

Top Ten List this year. This is a special honor for your league pitchers to make this list and is for sanctioned leagues only.

Gert Wilcziek, from the Eau Claire Club in Wisconsin pitched the highest game of 92% for the adults. She also carries an impressive ringer average of 82.49%. From the Classic City HSC in Indiana, Tadd Chrisman had the highest ringer over average of 43.18.

In the junior division Trevor Sipma of the Bismarck Junior League in North Dakota had a high ringer game of 90%. It looks like we had some great pitching in leagues this year. The complete Top Ten List is in this issue. All of the top ten pitchers receive a certificate along with a patch. NHPF NEWS VIEWS & DONATIONS

Due to some personal travel plans, I am writing this article in early January. Thus, it will not be as lengthy or with a large list of contributors. That will probably make some readers happy.

In the last issue, I mentioned some things about our planned building and construction start in St. Charles County, Like any building project, ours has been subject to a lot of design discussion and changes. This has been especially so for two reasons. One, we are dealing with a government entity, the County of St. Charles and two, the NHPF doesn't have deep pockets. Since my last writing, revised plans have been submitted to the County to down size the project from 24 indoor courts to 16. The prime reason for this down sizing is escalating construction costs and concern that the overall project cost might exhaust the assets of the NHPF. Regrettably, 2005 was not a good year for donations. Whether this was due to two years of uncertainty with the Jack Freeman courts in Joelton because of the lingering estate settlement or financial concerns of members or even a sign of the times, the NHPF did not get strong member support in 2005.

While growing the NHPF endowment fund has been a slow process, I would like to acknowledge and share with you some positives. Twelve states have contributors who have donated \$2,000 or more. Three are from North Carolina, two from California and Oregon and one each from Colorado, Georgia, Massachusetts, Minnesota and Tennessee. We currently have 108 names of individuals, families, clubs or charters, who have reached or exceeded a \$500 level in contributions. Each of these has an engraved nameplate on one of several plaques that will hang in the Hall of Fame recognizing these major benefactors. These 108 special recognition plates currently carry names from 34 states. California is the current leader with 14 plates. Following with seven plates each are the states of Missouri and Minnesota. North Carolina and Michigan each have six plates while Oregon and Wisconsin have five. There are several contributors in these states and others that are very near the \$500 level. I hope that we can add their names to the plaques in 2006.

The NHPA Hall of Fame will become a reality this year. The project will initially include 16 indoor courts, eight outdoor courts and a food and drink service center for the general public. Please take this opportunity to show your support for the construction of this facility and our great sport by sending a tax-deductible contribution to the NHPF, the charitable arm of the NHPA. Mail your contribution

to P.O. Box 1628, Penn Valley, CA 95946. Those that donate \$25 or more will receive an acknowledgement letter of thanks.

Horseshoe Pitching Facts and Folklore

This enjoyable story has been provided by 91-year-old Orval Madden, now residing in Springfield, MO. We now know that horseshoe pitching existed, if only for a while, at Yankton College in South Dakota, in the mid 1930's.

"HORSESHOES IN YANKTON" 1936

Presented by Orval James Madden

I read your article in the Newsline pertaining to "Horseshoe in College." You may be interested in the following.

My home was at a little town, Worthing, South Dakota, population 200. We had two horseshoe pitchers in town who have been state champions and watching them play got me interested in pitching horseshoes. Those days, the players did not give out much information, as to how to hold the shoe, what turn to make, etc. I took up the ¾ turn which limited me in how far I could improve.

I went to Yankton College which was the oldest college in South Dakota. We had a fellow by the name of Giovanve Colao who had played Horseshoes in the World Tournament and he organized a tournament made up of college players. Calao and I laid out two courts under the football stadium; nothing fancy. We had no sand, so we used dirt, slightly moistened. The first tournament was in 1934; won by Colao. Then in 1935, the second tournament was held with 32 players signing up. Calao and I set it up with only Yankton students eligible. In the pairings, you had to win two out of three games. The tournament was much talked of on campus. A faculty member donated a gold medal. I won the tournament and was presented the medal in front of the entire student body.

Horseshoes was becoming popular and Colao and I tried to play other schools but they were not interested. For the year 1936, we were going to make up several teams and play horseshoe clubs in the nearby towns, but Calao and I left school. I transferred to Morningside College in Sioux City and so for a lack of leadership, there was no more horseshoes at Yankton.

I have been a member of the NHPA for over 20 years and have won my class in the World Tournament two times and finished 3rd in the 40-foot championship of age 70 and over.

We moved from Iowa to California and last year moved to Springfield, Missouri. I am now 90 years old.

I am enclosing the tournament pairing for 1935. The medallion was purchased in 1934 and dated as such, but I won it in 1935.



This tournament meant a lot to Mr. Madden. He still has that medallion also. Thank you Orval, for this interesting story; and to the rest of you readers, there are many other stories like this one from our yesterday. BYLAW PROPOSALS

Bylaw Proposals to Be Voted On At the 2006 NHPA Convention

1. ARTICLE IV - Executive Council, Section 3c -Meetings

Current Reading - The Executive Council may conduct business by mail or telephone when necessary.

Proposal - Insert the word email after the word mail.

2. ARTICLE IX - Section 10 - Last sentence of first paragraph

Current Reading - No bids will be considered unless all of the following conditions are met.

Proposal - No bids will be considered unless all of the following conditions are met and approved by the Executive Council.

3. ARTICLE IX - Section 11

Current reading - The convention shall award, by a majority vote, the privilege of conducting a World Tournament two years in advance. If three or more sites are bidding and none receives a majority vote, the two sites receiving the most votes will have a run off in a second ballot. In case no W. T. bid is received by the NHPA deadline, the Executive Council has the authority to award the tournament for that next open year only.

Proposal – After first sentence, ADD full sentence: Absentee voting for the World Tournament site only shall be allowed for any charters unable to send delegates to the NHPA Convention. That voting shall be confidential and the absentee ballots will be opened only after the voting on the floor of the convention is complete. Absentee ballots for this World Tournament site vote must be received by the president of the NHPA on or before the Friday prior to the convention.

Reason: When a World Tournament is held on the "far side" of the country, esp. for years in a row, representation from some parts of the country falls lower with each successive year. It diminishes the opportunity to have a vote which may change that trend.

4. ARTICLE 10, Section 2, First sentence

Current reading – A World Tournament shall include separate championship divisions for Men, Women, Senior Men, Junior Boys, Junior Girls, Elders and Senior Women.

Proposal - Delete the words Senior Women.

Reason: Can we justify a \$2,000 prize fund for the Championship money when we are getting only around 30 entries into this division?

5. ARTICLE 10 - Section 5

Proposal – Add to the end of this section the following: "Percentage ties for all move-up positions into a championship class shall be broken by a 40 shoe play-off"

Reason: Something needs to be in the Bylaws so it is stated what to do for ties for move-ups.

6. ARTICLE XII - Section 3

Proposal – At the end of the first paragraph, ADD: If a Sanctioned League average is one of the three highest NHPA sanctioned events, that Sanctioned League average shall be converted to an average based on 400 shoes.

Reason: The potentially high number of horseshoes pitched in a sanctioned league can unfairly skew the overall high three average and not reflect what an actual tournament average is for a pitcher.

PUBLICITY PROMOTION by Casey Sluys

NHPA Free Stuff

Due to a lack of participation in the Co-op Advertising Program that we've attempted to run for the past several years, something new will be tried for 2006. Since the Co-op programs inception, only about 8% of the funds were used in any given year. In fact last year was only 6.7%. For those charters that have used these funds though, it has proven beneficial as they have gained new members with this advertising program.

What we will try this year is something that will assist in publicizing your local club. We will offer a banner for all NHPA clubs holding two or more sanctioned events. The events can be either sanctioned league play and a sanctioned tournament (that would count as two events) or any combination of sanctioned tournaments and sanctioned league play. If you have a brand new club within your charter that might only hold one event please include them in this offer. We certainly would not want to discourage potential new clubs. The banners will be 2 x 4 feet, will include the NHPA

logo, the website, and then your clubs name. (See picture) All will remain as it is on the banner except for your club name, of course. The wording 'Horseshoe Pitching Club'



preferred as it indicates quickly exactly what we do. The NHPA logo, the website address, and colors are standard on each banner. We will add the words "Join Today" directly underneath horseshoe pitching club. The colors blend starting with a white frame around the whole thing then going from yellow at the top, fading into orange in the center and fading to purple on the bottom. The NHPA logo is blue and white, Horseshoe Pitching Club is blue letters, Join Today in white letters, horseshoepitching.com in black letters; the two lines above horseshoepitching.com fade from white to blue in opposite directions. Who's interested?

If the response is such that it would be beneficial for all parties then we, the NHPA, will offer these banners for your clubs. At least 50 clubs would have to participate in order for this project to be implemented. This project will remain in effect until August 2006! My preference is to work directly with the Regional Directors, so if you can give them your clubs information they can send it to me. Be certain that you specify that you are the"-------Horseshoe Pitching Club" or the" ------Horseshoe Club" or the ------Horseshoe Pitchers' Club please? Please use your Regional Director as your point of contact. All of them have received, either by email or regular mail, the instructions for ordering these banners.

It's difficult to gauge the affect these banners will have on our membership, but it certainly will make your local club more noticeable to all who see your banner. They will also let everyone know that there is a website that they can visit for information about organized horseshoe pitching. We will keep you updated on the progress of this alternative venture to the Co-op Advertising Program for 2006. If we do not get 50 clubs to participate then we will not go through with this, so talk it up within your charter and get a nice fancy banner for your club, courtesy of the NHPA. If it proves to fall on deaf ears then we might implement the Co-op program again in years to come?

Brochures

Many of you have very nice charter specific brochures, some made from use of Co-op funds. How are they being used? Do you have them available for the local Parks and Recreation Departments? In most P&R Departments offices they have a brochure rack filled with activity brochures; is yours included? If not then it's time to insert your information into that rack.

Radio

Did you know that talk radio is a free form of advertising? All it takes is a phone call to your local radio talk show. Explain to the producer that you have a local horseshoe pitching club here in town and that you would like to invite anyone that is interested to your practice nights. Then answer any questions that they have regarding organized pitching. Better yet, go to the studio for oneon-one conversation with a talk show host. You'd be surprised You can either go into the studio to do a brief synopsis of the sport or it can be done by telephone hookup. In either case, you know the subject better than any of the listeners so there's no need to be hesitant about any aspect of this sport. Explain to them that it's a family oriented sport for all ages, explain the various distances, mention our website for further information, and so on. Most of the questions you will receive will pertain to the very basic fundamentals of the game which anyone associated with the NHPA could answer. Have some names, numbers, and a few statistics at hand in case you're asked who they need to call for more information. Imagine reaching hundreds even thousands of people in the comfort of your own living room and explaining this wonderful sport to people. Give this a try everyone; it's great free publicity and you'll be amazed at the response that this will generate. Generally it's a lot more comfortable for people to speak on the telephone than it is to an assembly of people. Here is a great method to promote horseshoe pitching and your local club.

Bumper Stickers

There are, once again, bumper stickers available. If you need some please send your requests to me. Those of you that have them, be sure to hand them out. They do not do anyone any good lying on someone's desk or tucked away in your briefcase. Let's display them; every member should have one on their vehicle. They are vinyl and will peel off in one piece if you happen to change vehicles.



THPA MEMBERS COMPLETE PAVILION

A Horseshoe Pavilion has recently been completed in the City of Crossville's (TN) Centennial Park. This pole barn type building is 164 feet long and 56 feet wide and has 12 clay courts with otherwise solid concrete floor. Scissor trusses were used with a ceiling height in the center of 14 feet. The roof is metal with skylights over each court. The THPA held the 2005 State Singles tournament at this site although a third of the metal roof was not in place. Fifty nine pitchers participated. Crossville's Mayor opened the tournament and welcomed all to Crossville.



Most of the labor for this project was from volunteers. The excavation preparation was begun by the City in early March 2005 and the last screw was put in the roof in mid October. The total cost of this facility is estimated at \$150,000 although the City has spent about \$70,000 with Crossville's Bob Hassan donating \$28,000 of this \$70K. Hassan was there for every day of the construction and Pikeville's Bobby Fields was there most days. Jo Ann Stanford from Celina (1 mile drive from Crossville) donated a great deal of time and effort beginning in March with wiring rebar for the footers to being the main help with putting up the 2x4 stringers for the roof. Lancing's Bob Griffith, Crossville's Garo (GB) Swicegood and Pikeville's Irv Detweiler were "main men" on this project. It is estimated that \$70K worth of labor was volunteered.

The trusses were set by crane in mid August. On this day about 20 folk volunteered including THPA members Woody (DW) Story from Mt Juliet (100 mile drive), Paula Hunsicker (THPA President from Springfield - 130 miles away), Jeff Birchfield (Lancing), Bob Young (Kingston), Bill Neal (Fairfield Glade), Roger Kenyon (Fairfield Glade), and Allon's Jack Conner. Hassan got his neighbor Dan Gleason to work this day as well as members of his Senior Softball team (Crossville's Ed Seely, Bill Harris and Bill Wiren) and his table tennis buddies (Pikeville's Dan Colvard & Lake Tansi's Mike Camacci).

Along the way many others helped. LaFollette's Frank Jones was there several days (100 mile drive to Crossville) as well as Hank Irwin from Chattanooga. Shannon and Herb Foster (Chuckey) helped with putting metal on the roof the evening before the State Singles Tournament. Crossville's Elmo Cox spent three days just before the tournament painting the foul lines on the floor. Crossville's Dewayne McGuire and Earl Wyatt helped with


placing the OSB on some of the trusses. White Pine's Harold Morgan (110 mile drive) spent a couple of days helping with X brace construction (Harold threw the first pitch in the pavilion although the stakes and clay weren't in the pit then).

Many City employees pitched in also (their time wasn't calculated in the cost figures). The inspectors helped pouring the concrete footers. They did the excavation and some of the Parks employees helped with the truss setting project. Kevin Oakes from the City Engineers office oversaw the whole project, ordered materials and spent many, many hours working with us.

Many, many thanks to all these folks who drove many miles and donated time to make this pavilion a great place to pitch. Phase 2 is now being planned which will winterize a portion of the building and get some permanent lighting installed. The THPA has donated \$6,000 for this phase. Six sanctioned THPA tournaments will be pitched here in 2006 plus the TN State Doubles in Oct 2006. It is hoped to begin an annual national tournament in June 2006.

The City of Crossville (pop. of about 10,000) now has 30 blue clay horseshoe courts with full concrete walkways. In 2002 there were no courts. How did this happen? Crossville's Bob Hassan was the culprit/instigator. In early 2002 he entered the Senior Olympics for the first time and went to the TN State Finals in July 2002. There he met Dexter Stallings who is the founder of the THPA and THPA secretary/treasurer... This is how Hassan was first introduced to the THPA and NHPA. Stallings told Hassan that Crossville's Elmo Cox enjoyed horseshoes and pitched in Crossville regularly.

Cox has an indoor heated and cooled court at his home and six to eight people came there regularly on Thursdays to pitch. Hassan joined them. He was told that Crossville used to have six courts and THPA tournaments, but that the City had built softball fields in their place. The city had said that they would rebuild, but hadn't. Hassan contacted the City Park's Director and that following spring of 2003 convinced the Park to build 15 new courts. THPA members volunteered time and money to this construction. Elmo Cox donated several hundred dollars for hardware for this project and probably spent the most time




constructing these courts. Bobby Fields, Jeff Birchfield, Earl Wyatt, Dewayne McQuire and Jack Conner donated a great deal of time to this project. By early summer of 2003 these courts were completed with two groups of six courts - stakes 16 feet apart. The City spent about \$5,000 on this project.

In the end only 12 courts were constructed. There was no shade and rain at times interfered with pitching, Hassan decided that he'd like a roof over six of these courts. Cost estimates led him to believe that a pole barn building could cover six courts for about \$15K. He went to the City Council in early 2004 and offered to build and pay for this project. It was approved by the Council with a 5 to 0 vote. But, they required that an architect draw the blue prints for this building.

In the meantime Hassan wanted a few more courts in town to have a better chance to get the TN State Singles tournament. He had also pitched in the County Fair every August where 40 to 50 people participated on four temporary sand courts which were on the side of a hill. Hassan went to the County Fair Board and offered to build and pay (\$1,700) for six courts. The Board approved this and in the fall of 2004 THPA members Fields, Cox, Jeff Birchfield, Conner, Swicegood and Stanford helped build these courts. Hassan got Dan Gleason and Mike Camacci involved in this project also.

Hassan and Swicegood went back to the Crossville City Council in November 2004 because they had decided that they might at some time have to build a community center/swimming pool at the site of the current 12 courts. They had found another site and had agreed to build new courts there. This new site was about 600 feet away from the current site. At this meeting Hassan offered to build the 12 court pavilion and offered \$25K. The total cost was projected at \$50K. The Council approved this project again with a 5 to 0 vote and agreed to maintain these courts for at least the next 25 years.

This is how Crossville, TN got 30 horseshoe courts, 12 of which may (unlikely) get bulldozed. In 2004 ten sanctioned THPA tournaments were held there and in 2005 we had nine tournaments including the State Singles in which 59 people pitched in one shift. Hassan has been running a sanctioned league here on Thursday afternoons and a non sanctioned league on Tuesday evenings.

Since the last update in the January/February issue of Newsline, the rules re-write committee has been working hard reviewing each comment and recommendation received from the Charters and members. A "special" thanks to all of you for your time in reviewing the proposed new rules re-write document. I can assure you every comment has been and will be carefully reviewed by the committee for consideration.

January 1st was the deadline to submit comments to the rules re-write committee. Since the deadline, we have been going through all the comments and making the "final" changes before submission to the NHPA for printing of "draft" booklets to present to the delegates at this years meeting. The final proposed revision will be published on the NHPA Website at www.horseshoepitching.com and in the next issue of this magazine.

I really think everyone will benefit from this new booklet and its "new" format. You will find that it will be easier to read and search for particular items. The new booklet will have a cover similar to the blue By-Laws booklet and the red Sanction League Booklet. The font size will be increased for easier reading. The booklet will include a table of contents, the three sections (rules, guidelines & specifications) and a glossary of terms. The finished booklet includes "new" rules that will have to be voted and approved by the delegates in July. The committee has also moved some of the by-laws which we felt would be more appropriate to be included in the rules and guidelines sections of the booklet. Again, these by-law changes will also need to be voted on and approved by the delegates. The list of these changes was listed in the January/February issue of Newsline.

As the chairperson of this committee, I have really enjoyed working with the committee members on this project and want to express a "special" thanks for all their time and efforts. I can assure you each member has worked extremely hard making sure the document is something everyone will find easier to use and understand.

When you receive your delegate package, (if you're a delegate for your charter) you will find the "new" rules-re-write draft booklet, a list of all the proposed rule changes and also a list of the proposed by-laws which were moved to this document. I am asking the delegate to review this very carefully. At the meeting in Gillette in July, the NHPA will be asking the delegates to approve the document as proposed.

Look forward to seeing all of you in Gillette!

OP OF THE WORL

by Bob Champion

Ted Allen, a competitor in 31 World Championships, winning ten and finishing in the top ten many, many times, has been dubbed the "Legend" for many years now.

Ted won his first four World titles and four out of the first five. Starting his legendary record, he finished in the "top ten" 23 straight years from 1933 through 1963.

From 1940 through 1964 Ted was in the 80% bracket except for two years when he dropped to 79.5 and 78.5.

Due to the top-notch competition in those first 20 years, Ted only had perfect records three times and it is interesting to note that in the first 19 years, he never lost more than five games in any tournament. In 1955 Ted fired 72 consecutive ringers.

State Horseshoe Competition

Believe it or not, Ted Allen won his first Colorado State Championship in the men's division at the age of 14.

You figure it out. Ted was born in 1908 and won his first state title in 1922---that's 14, and he won three before reaching 18. In those days they did not have a junior division.

Ted won eight state titles before his first encounter in the World Championships in 1933 at the World's Fair in Chicago against the "big boys".

Allen did not compete in the Colorado State Tournament many years when he was breaking 80%. He was earning a living in exhibitions at places such as the Madison Square Garden and Boston Garden, and with celebrities as Roy Rogers. During this time Allen earned nicknames as "The Babe Ruth of Horseshoes", "The Machine" and "The Legend".

Interesting to note that Ted use Ohio, Mossman and Gordon horseshoes prior to the introduction of the Allen shoe in 1938.

Alan Francis's Record

We are now entering the "Modern" time for horseshoe pitching, and eleven-time World champion Alan Francis from Ohio is now on the top of the heap.

Since 1981 Francis has won four junior championships, plus eleven men's titles, finishing in the top ten 17 times. He won his tenth title at age 34, while Allen was 42 when he was the men's World Champion. Since 1993 Alan has finished first or second

eleven times.

Since 1990 Frances has been over 80% overall in every tournament except two but was the champion with percentages of 78.86 and 77.07. In 2005 Francis collected a 30-shoe consecutive ringer perfect game.

To date Alan has competed in 18 men's championships. In 2005 Alan was the only 80% pitcher in the finals. Two other top contenders, Brian Simmons from Rhode Island and Joe McCrink from New Jersey did not compete.

Francis has won 18 state titles, ten in Missouri and eight in Ohio. Ted Allen won 13 state titles, ten in Colorado, two in California and one in Oregon.

Like Ted Allen, Francis has now introduced the "Alan (AF) Francis" horseshoe to the market. Alan pitched the Deadeye regulars through his entire competition until his new shoe hit the market.

The future is at the stake.





The Passing of a Great Horseshoe EnthusiastBy Fred Smith

Marvin E. Falk Michigan

On December 15, 2005 Marvin E. Falk from Michigan passed away. Rarely has there ever been a better friend, and a greater role model for the game of horseshoes, or a more dedicated horseshoe pitcher than Marv Falk. During his 28 years of membership he participated in nearly 1000 tournaments, kept every result card from those tournaments, saved all the newsletters the Michigan charter published, attended every membership meeting and was present at each Michigan - Ontario International Friendship Tournament. Marv and his wife, Dorothy, a two-time women's state champion, attended many Ringer Classics in Greenville, Ohio and Eastern Nationals. In 1997, Marv was elected to the Wolverine State Horseshoe Pitchers Association Hall of Fame because of his love, dedication and enthusiasm for the game of horseshoes and the people who play it.

In 1977, Marv purchased a backyard horseshoe set in which he found a small pamphlet with the rules of horseshoe pitching. Within that pamphlet was an address and he wrote the NHPA inquiring about organized horseshoe pitching in Michigan. The information was sent to him, and in 1978, Marv joined the WSHPA and NHPA. In 1979, Marv received the WSHPA's most improved pitcher award by increasing his ringer average by 17.9%. Marv won his class at the state tournament a total of eight times. His highest average for a season was 47% and he was able to maintain an average in the upper 30% and lower 40% range for most of his pitching career with his 1 3/4 turn.

Marv had a major impact on the rules of horseshoe pitching not only in Michigan but nationally. It was he who proposed the 27 and 37 foot foul line that was adopted by the NHPA. One of the greatest problems with the foul line being 3 foot in front of the stake was keeping the stakes exactly 40 feet apart. This rule that Marv proposed made it possible to always have an accurate foul line. Many of his proposals became WSHPA rules and by-laws. Marv served as chairman of the committee that established the criteria for WSHPA lifetime membership, and served as a member of the Hall of Fame committee.

Marv was most proud of the accomplishments of Dorothy. The love that the two shared for each other was of epic proportions. Even if Marv and Dorothy were apart for just a few moments when they saw each other their faces

lit up as if it were the first time each beheld the other in their eyes. Upon the announcement of Dorothy's selection to the Hall of Fame tears of joy and love long flowed from Marv's eyes, and the same can be said when she won her state championships.

The last tournament Marv competed in was the Michigan Doubles State Championships this past August. Larry Murdzia asked him to be his partner and Marv told Larry, "I don't know what I can give you but I will give you everything that I got." At the time of the tournament Marv needed the help of an oxygen tank to breathe and was very weak, however, he and his partner won their class. Marv averaged just 4% for the tournament, but he was able to keep most of his shoes within scoring distance, which is very important in a count-all tournament. The last game that Marv played came down to the last pitch. He needed to throw a ringer in order for them to win the championship, which Marv did. This was an unbelievable performance, and it demonstrated the true character of a man who deeply loved the game of horseshoes.

Marv will be sadly missed by all of the members of the Wolverine State Horseshoe Pitchers Association. If there was a tournament, whether it be summer, winter, spring or fall, surely Marv Falk would be there. Horseshoes will not be the same without him and the WSHPA family will never quite fill the hole that Marv has left upon his passing. The next time you are on the courts gaze upon the foul line and give a wink, a smile, a whisper of thanks, or perhaps even a little prayer in remembrance of a man who gave as much as he possibly could to the great game of horseshoes.

HORSESHOE CLUB PITCHES IN TO HELP MRC STUDENTS by Sam Tomasevic

A group of Calgary horseshoe enthusiasts has found a unique way to invest in the future of students at Mount Royal College and help secure a future for their sports club at the same time.

The Calgary Horseshoe Club wants to add a youthful element to its aging membership and decided a good way to do that was to set up a scholarship at Mount Royal to help students pay for their education.

"We feel fantastic about being able to do this", said Ivan Crerar, President of the Calgary Horseshoe Club. "Most of our members are seniors and we feel we should be helping the young people."

The club established a \$10,000 endowment fund that, beginning in 2007, will provide an annual scholarship for a student in the Sport and Recreation stream of the Bachelor of Applied Business and Entrepreneurship program. The money was left over gaming revenue from the club's charity bingos and casino. Members looked around for a good cause to support and decided the future of Mount Royal students was the best choice.

Crerar considers the scholarship arrangement a win-win for the College and the club. Pamella Fearon, Senior Development Officer with the Mount Royal College Foundation, agrees.

"A relationship has definitely been established with the club and its members. Along with the scholarship, they are also looking at hiring a Directed Field Studies student next summer to help them with their marketing and organizational work", said Fearon.

She says it's unusual for a recreation club like the Calgary Horseshoe Club to get involved in scholarships at Mount Royal, but the group's generosity is greatly appreciated.

"It's good because it increases the College's profile with club members and they will now have a greater awareness of Mount Royal and feel a greater connection with our students," she said. "They know that young people are their future."

In fact, Crerar is blunt about the clubs prospects if it doesn't draw a younger crowd to the sport and to the 20-pit horseshoe centre located in southeast Calgary.

"We have to start attracting young people or we're going to be dead in the water", he said. "We would like the student we hire this summer to help us increase membership in the younger age bracket".

The Calgary Horseshoe Club is already involved in several community outreach projects including the Calgary Corporate Challenge and a children's program through the Boys and Girls Club, which promotes horseshoe pitching as a fun activity that people of all ages can participate in.



DOWN AND BACK IN THE JUNIOR DIVISION

I guess I can't use the "I'm the new guy" excuse anymore. Yes, I've completed my rookie year as National Junior Promotions Director and I must admit, it zipped by faster than any year I can ever remember. All I can say is that I wish I could have slowed it down some so I could have had a chance to get everything done that I'd have liked to. I'm sure you all know the feeling of just not having enough hours in the day... no need to go too far down that road, is there? Well, I may not have accomplished everything I'd have liked to this year, but I think some real headway was made towards developing a solid elementary school horseshoe pitching program that can soon be duplicated and implemented all over the country. As soon as we had introduced the program to a few school districts in the Erie, PA area, having begun instruction in several schools simultaneously... well... it seems that word of our amazing success is spreading very rapidly.

Jim Connell, site manager at Emerson-Gridley Elementary in Erie had this to say about our efforts there, where they have formed a horseshoe activity club in their "CHAMPS" after-school program:

...The students enthusiastically participate in weekly sessions led by Dan Kuchcinski. They are inner-city residents with limited opportunities for organized recreation. Over 80% of our students qualify for the federal free lunch program. Through their participation in the horseshoe club, our students have had the opportunity enjoy a new sport that they could potentially enjoy for their entire life. The horseshoe club helps students to build character, develop discipline and goal setting skills, increase student self-esteem and contributes to an overall positive image...

Things are now happening so fast with this effort that it's just about got my head spinning... I seriously wasn't expecting this kind of success this fast and definitely not this easy... We had hardly even really got this thing out of the gate, when we had an offer from one of the state's education officials (who is involved in our effort here in the Erie area) to make presentations of our program at several education conferences

in Harrisburg, PA, in the spring of 2006. She immediately saw the value and potential our horseshoe program has for our kids and asked us if we'd be interested in attempting to present it to school & district reps statewide at these upcoming conferences. Some of them may be done and over with by the time you read this and I hope I will have a lot to report in my next article. Truth be told, I wasn't expecting to be statewide with this for at least a year or so. But I guess there's no sense in trying to slow it down, is there? This could possibly mean instant exposure to thousands of schools in the state... What an opportunity for horseshoes! Well, I promise to do my best to keep up with this demand and I sure hope the success we've seen here in the schools in Erie and potentially across the state of Pennsylvania can be easily duplicated in every state... Let's all keep our fingers crossed...

I've been involved in NHPA horseshoes since I was twelve years old... It seems like only yesterday, but actually, I threw my first shoes in NHPA competition over twenty-six years ago. There were less than a handful of juniors competing in PA in the NHPA tournaments back then. So it was hardly anything you could brag about to your friends or anyone else who wasn't involved in the sport. Mentioning NHPA horseshoe pitching in conversation with people outside of the sport always meant that you'd have about a fifteen minute explanation followed by a question and answer session before anyone got the idea of what it was really all about. At the time, I wasn't quite as outgoing as I am now, so, often, to avoid all that talk, I mostly kept my involvement in horseshoes to myself. It seems that I'm not the only who felt that way because, sadly, the sport has hardly developed much since then. I'm guessing that the kids involved in horseshoes today, like me, will tell you that it's been one of the most inspirational and influential things in their lives to date and they will probably also admit that they also don't talk about it much with people not involved in the sport. Well, if all goes well, soon our kids will be able to talk about horseshoes with anyone they meet and that person will know all about it already... wouldn't that be cool? What we're doing right now definitely has that kind of potential to positively affect this sport so don't be surprised when this soon takes on a life of its own. It is already happening!

I'm guessing that, like me, a lot of state junior directors also have a completely unstructured program with little or no direction or expectations from their leaders. It seems that, across the board, junior pitching has always been basically an after thought... something we'll get to when we get the time... and that time seems to never come... For the ones currently in this situation, I'd suggest that you make a list of clubs in your association and find out who in each club is responsible for junior promotions. If, in some clubs, no one in particular is designated for this, then you should work with those clubs to assign someone these duties. From there, you should work with those people in each club to, for starters, hold some sort of "junior day" for all the kids/grand kids of club members to come in and learn a little about the game for an afternoon. The ones who show a strong interest should be formed into a group that could eventually become a kid's league. Once you've got them pitching regularly, you should have a day when they can bring their friends... Before you know it, each club will have their own nice group of kids pitching and some of them will go as far as to pitch in tournaments. With a little more encouragement and support of these kids from each club, your state tournament junior division will quickly grow from just a few entries to probably more than thirty and all that can happen in one season with hardly any effort if everyone pitches in a little and really makes a commitment to do this... even the smallest charters should see this kind of success.

It doesn't take much... all you really have to do is get the shoes in their hands and the rest is like magic... it just kind of happens. I've seen it time and again with kids... This sport is very alluring to most kids... It's just a matter of getting them started... There's hardly any more to it... It will shock you! Give it a try... I'm sure you'll see exactly what I mean!
