

The National Horseshoe Pitchers Association will be celebrating the 100th Anniversary of its World Championships in Springfield, Illinois, July 27 through August 8, 2009. We are looking forward to a very exciting and successful World Tournament in Springfield.

The Capital Area Sports Commission, the Illinois Horseshoe Pitchers Association and the whole town is on board in preparation of welcoming all the horseshoe pitchers. Bill Marvin and the Illinois Horseshoe Pitchers Association have been working all winter getting workers lined up to help with the courts setup, court maintenance, court tear down and a lot of unseen work that goes on after all the pitchers have gone for the day. All this work has to be done every day for a successful world tournament. You can be assured that the facilities and the tournament set-up and tournament maintenance are in good hands with Bill Marvin and the Illinois Horseshoe Pitchers Association.

A reminder to all Charter Presidents: By-Laws, Article IX: section 3. The Charter President must provide to the NHPA President, at least 72 hours prior to the start of the convention, a written and signed (or email) list of delegates which names the delegation Chairman. The list of delegates must be submitted by the Charter President. I will be leaving for Springfield on July 23rd. Please allow several days if submitting your list by US mail to insure that I receive it prior to this date. After July 23rd and at least 72 hours prior to the start of the convention which is August 2nd at 8:00 a.m. your delegates list can be e-mailed to me at: HYPERLINK "mailto:nhpapaul@yahoo.com" nhpapaul@ yahoo.com. Once again this list must be submitted by the Charter President. Our Convention and Business meeting will be held August 2nd at 8:00 a.m. at one of the meeting rooms facilities at the Prairie Capital Convention Center.

Two NHPA Officers have announced that they will be running for re-election for their offices; those being Dan Sanders for 1st Vice President and Lorraine Sternberg for 3rd Vice President. Since I announced late last year that I would not be seeking re-election for NHPA President, we have only one candidate, Stu Sipma, that notified me as well as Newsline before the February 1st deadline that he is running for the office of President of the NHPA. Since Stu is currently the 5th Vice President, this will leave his office open for election. Two very capable candidates have announced that they will be running for the 5th Vice Presidents office; those being, Ron Kohn of Michigan, and Debby Michaud of Massachusetts.

Times and dates for all meetings will be posted on location at the tournament. There will be a Regional Directors meeting, State Officers meeting, Club/League Directors meeting and Hall of Fame Committee meeting. Awards will be presented at our annual Hall of Fame & Awards Banquet on Sunday, August 2nd at one of the banquet rooms facilities in the Prairie Capital Convention Center. This year's Hall of Fame inductees are listed in Vicki Winston's article in this issue of Newsline. At this time, all other awards have not been finalized. When available this information will be posted on the website and included in your World Tournament packet. Please make plans to attend the Hall of Fame & Awards Banquet. I promise that you will have fun and enjoy the evening.

At our recent winter meeting we discussed and agreed to create a new program and a committee director for this program. The new position will be called, "Charter Communications". The basic function of this position will be to establish an open line of communications with each charter president, with high emphasis on charter growth. NHPA 4th Vice President, Jerry LaBrosse, has been appointed to fill this position as Committee Director. More details on the Charter Communications in another article in this issue of Newsline.

# **NEWS VIEWS & DONATIONS**

In the March/April issue I spoke about grants and explained that the NHPF cannot provide money to build or improve courts on private property. Despite that, we still received one request for just that purpose. The NHPF Directors of course had to turn that request down, but we did approve four other grants.

The Pretzel City Horseshoe League in Freeport, IL, received \$1,000 to help offset the cost of six portable courts that are already in use as members prepare for the coming World Tournament. The Los Angeles County Parks Foundation was sent \$1,000 to assist in the construction of 24 new courts in Richard Rioux Memorial Park in Stevenson Ranch. California. A new NHPA club is being formed there to use the courts after the 14 western states police and fire Olympics competition is held at the courts this June. The Minnesota Gopher State HPA also received \$1,000 to assist in the construction of 24 new portable courts that will be used during the State Tournament and other promotional events. A \$500 check was sent to the small City of Cole Camp, MO, to help in the construction of six courts in a city park. The Missouri HPA is providing assistance to ensure that the courts are built to NHPA specifications.

All the above grant recipients pledged to hold annual fundraising tournaments so some money could be returned to the NHPF. While there is no legal obligation to repay grants, by holding fund-raisers to repay some money, past recipients help the Foundation continue its work and support of other clubs in need.

Outside of the annual one-dollar per member NHPA donation, contributions to the NHPF over the past two months have been pretty light. There has been no change in the State Rankings so that list is not being published this issue. ## NATIONAL SANCTIONED CLUB/LEAGUE REPORT

The summer league season is upon us. With the start of leagues, remember, it's time to get your membership reports in. You need to get those in as soon as possible so your club is covered by the NHPA insurance.

I know times are very hard these days, with so many people losing thier jobs and the rising cost of everything, but everyone still needs some sort of hobbies. Joining a horseshoe league is still one of the most inexpensive sports that you can participate in. I think this could be a good time for sanctioned clubs and leagues to take some time and do some things to help others in your community. If you are able to support a new member, why not do it. Or maybe your league could have each pitcher bring a non-perishable food item each night of league. At the end of the season your club could take the food that you have collected to a food bank in your community. Horseshoe people are very caring people and this is the time for all of us to help someone else, how ever we can. Let's all try and do our part.

Lots of the clubs will be holding their spring meetings now. At your meetings, club members should decide certain things before the leagues begin. One of those things, are how your league will handle forfeits. This can be one of the biggest problems, when a league member cannot make a night of pitching. There are several different ways to deal with this situation. One would be to have a substitute, although this is not always an easy solution for leagues, as all pitchers on a sanctioned league must carry a NHPA membership card. If your club prefers to have subs, one way to help out your subs is to have the club purchase their NHPA membership. It's a great way to get new members started.

You can also go with dummy scores. If a player has no opponent he may be required to pitch against a dummy score equal to his average or a set number of points. He must exceed that total to gain a win. If all possible, forfeits should be avoided.

Other things to be discussed at your spring meeting are league fees and the number of weeks that you will be running the league. The most important thing though is keep your league FUN!

The National Sanctioned League Tournament entry form is in this issue of Newsline. The tournament will be held at the NHPA Hall of Fame Facility in Missouri. The dates are October 10th and 11th. In the next issue I will have a list of motels in the area. The tournament will be limited to 24 teams. Don't hesitate to enter this tournament. Fill out your entry form today and get it in the mail. You will need three people from your club to enter. The tournament is

#### **VERMONT**

Huntington, Vermont has had a horseshoe league for twenty years but never ran a sanctioned tournament. In 2006 they added courts to the existing ones - they now have 12 beautiful courts, right next to a small river (hence, the name "Riverside Horseshoe League"). In 2008, they had their courts checked for possible sanctioning. The courts are excellent and are within one inch of perfect everywhere, even with the cold weather of northern Vermont. They have to adjust some stakes every spring because of frost heaves. When they passed inspection, they began to plan their first ever NHPA Sanctioned Tournament, which filled the courts in October of 2008. For 2009, they are planning three sanctioned tournaments. Right now, Vermont may be the fastest growing NHPA Charter in New England.

### **IOWA**

Iowa is getting ready for the 2010 World Tournament to be held in Cedar Rapids. Committees are in place and volunteers are being recruited for the effort. In addition, this state is one of the lucky ones to have indoor courts for winter pitching. Winter tournaments are held as often as twice a month at the Putt Mossman arena in Eldora, Iowa. These culminate with the Indoor Championship in April. The arena is named after Mr. Mossman who was a good horseshoe pitcher, a very generous man, and an entertainer. We are told he loved to laugh and wanted others to enjoy themselves. Well, Iowans do have a good time! There are approximately 50 tournaments scheduled for 2009. We wish them well in their preparations for 2010!

### NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

Northern California has 132 tournaments scheduled this year. Play begins as early as February and ends in early December. They also boast a nice array of annual awards – in addition to the Rookie of the Year and Most Improved pitcher; they have the Top Dog award, given to the pitcher who pitches the most tournaments in Northern California. They also honor their juniors AND their scorekeepers - yes, there is a Scorekeeper of the Year award!

### **COLORADO**

The "Double Ringer" newsletter in Colorado has been in existence since 1982. Bob Champion continues to be its very capable editor. As a sports buff, Bob inserts all manner of sports trivia into the newsletter along with the horseshoe information. There is a large production staff assisting him for the six times per year publication. Bob is always drumming up newsy information as well as some "old news" in sports, making it interesting reading. The results of Colorado tournaments and yearly statistics are also in there as well as flyers for current tournaments. Kudos to Bob Champion and his staff.

### **MINNESOTA**

Minnesota has voted to try a new membership incentive In 2009, state dues for all members of a NEW program. CLUB will be waived. If someone can start a new club with all new members, those new members will only have to pay the NHPA dues. This will be tried for 2009 and is only good for a club in the first year coming into the association. Last year the Minnesota HPA spent \$2,000.00 in cash awards for a membership drive - this association is SERIOUS in trying to get new members. It will be interesting to see how this club approach works. Good luck with it - we will try to keep you informed.

Another success story of the Gopher State is its success with juniors. It annually has the most juniors of any charter (110 in 2007) and in 2007 had 933 adult members. Excellent! There are 33 indoor and outdoor tournaments planned for 2009.

Through my attendance at the various sports marketing events, I have created a network of contacts from CVB and Tourism Groups throughout the US, Canada and Puerto Rico. I have instructed these groups to get in contact with their area Regional Director or local Charter President to work together in a "team" effort to put together a bid to host this event. If you should receive a call from any of these groups, please work with them and see what you can jointly do to bring this event to your community. With the March 15th deadline for submitting World Tournament bid proposals behind us, I am proud to announce five locations who have met the requirements for contention to host the 2011 NHPA World Tournament.

## LITTLE ROCK, ARKANSAS July 11<sup>th</sup> – July 23<sup>rd</sup>

# HORSESHOE PITCHING FACTS AND FOLKLORE

## **Paul Lattray**

The following articles tell about many great pitchers we are familiar with, including our Hall of Fame Chairperson, and ten-time World champion, Vicki Winston and several other Hall of Fame members and state champions. At the top of the heap in both contests is Paul Lattray, and yet this article is not featuring his pitching skills, but his artistic skills. The first article is from the News Digest in 1964 and tells of a very formidable tournament held in Kansas. Then comes the article which tells of Lattray winning the 1957 Missouri state championship. This article also names some pitchers that we are familiar with, including our dear friend Earl Winston winning Class B.

Paul Lattray is referred to as a commercial artist in one of the articles. Besides being a championship class pitcher, indeed he was an artist. Featured with this article are copies of some his artwork that graced the covers of Horseshoe World magazines back more than sixty years ago.

First, from the Horseshoe Pitchers News Digest in 1964...

## Lattray, Champion of "Heart of Kansas" Tournament

Paul Lattray, Webster Groves, Mo., went undefeated in 15 games. He also had the highest ringer percentage in one game, 88.2%, to win that special award.

M. Tamboer, of Wichita, lost only to Lattray for runner-up spot. In the 16 round-robin Class B Vicki Winston won great applause when she defeated Marvin Reheis, Kansas State Champion in a one-game playoff. Each had a 14-1 record. She pitched brilliantly in the meet to prove why she is the World Champion Lady Pitcher. Ray Calvin, St. Joe, Mo., won the award for highest qualifying score of 256. All six States were represented with players. Classes C, D & E had to be added as about 60 pitchers were in the meet. More color was added to the tournament when the referees appeared in black & white striped shirts & caps to match.

Don Koso, Regional Director, attended and expressed satisfaction and pleasure in our operation of such a fine and colorful tournament. State champions from Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Iowa easily demonstrated why they

are champions, but the Colorado champion failed to appear. 32 trophies, 6 special awards and cash sent the players on their way home in a happy mood.

The entire tournament committee and many others also, functioned efficiently, and space forbids mentioning all their names. To all horseshoe pitchers, the Committee extends thanks for coming and some so very far. Without your loyal support our first "Heart of the Kansas" tournament could never have been such a definite success. Their relatives and friends also enjoyed beautiful Gage Park and all its facilities for entertainment of visitors.

The writer presented Park Commissioner Goodwin who spoke and mentioned he is expanding horseshoe grounds and facilities over in Topeka in 1965 to meet the increased demands for courts by Topeka citizens. This Heart of Kansas meet will be an annual

event in Topeka and in 1965 we plan to increase it to cover more states.




## LATTRAY DETHRONES ELKINS TO WIN MISSOURI TITLE

He dethroned John Elkins of Stella, who was defending his title and ended in eighth place. He also had to win over Bob Bales of Kansas City in a best 2 out of 3 play-off.

Lattray by trade is a commercial artist and 2nd place Bales is an employee of Union Wire Rope.

During the tournament, Lattray set a new ringer record for qualifying on the Sedalia courts by throwing 81 ringers in 100 shoes for 258 points. In Class B, Earl Winston of LaMonte captured top honors.

In the play-off for first place Bales won the first game throwing 80.6% by a score of 50-28, but Lattray came back winning the next two games 55-41 and 51-49 averaging 76% ringers against Bales' 72%.

Trophies and certificates were awarded first place winners in both classes. Second place contestants received silver medals in both classes and thirds were presented bronze medals in addition to premium money by the Missouri State Fair. Premiums and ribbons awarded to twelfth place in both sections.

In having an article remembering Paul Lattray, we would be amiss if his performance at the 1964 World Tournament was not mentioned. In 1964, a record-setting thirteen pitchers averaged over 80%. Paul Lattray was among those 13 pitchers, placing 10th, winning 25 games, losing ten and averaging 80.1% ringers.

# WOMEN'S HORSHOE PITCHING ACTIVITIES IN MISSOUR

(Note.... Vicki wrote this article in 1996 when asked if she could give us some history of women's horseshoe pitching activities in Missouri as she remembered it. She recalls very vividly what obstacles she faced sometimes being the only woman pitching in a tournament.)

Missouri was way behind times in encouraging women pitchers. They were okay for doing stats or keeping score, but women just didn't belong in the game itself. I met many fellows during the 1960's who said they did not mind if I pitched against them, but I also met some who did. I was personally responsible for at least one man hanging up his shoes and never pitching again because I beat him. There were a couple of tournament directors who invited me to their tournaments just because they knew it would make some of the local pitchers mad if I beat them and they wanted to be able to rub it in. That is one reason that I decided to stick to only the World Tournament for several years. I didn't need that kind of hassle. In those years entry to the World Tournament was by pitching qualifying shoes on site. Women had to pitch 100 shoes. Men had to pitch 200 shoes. There was no requirement to pitch in a certain number of sanctioned events. Pitching only in my own backyard was hardly adequate preparation for Women's Championship Division pitching. In fact, a couple of years I did not qualify into the Championship Division at the World Tournament and that is probably one of the reasons why.

I'm sure that eventually someone would have come along to start a Women's Division in our state tournament, but Earl and I finally pushed one into existence in 1976. That was way behind the times, but it was a start. Some other states had all women leagues going with 100 members. They weren't part of the NHPA sanctioned league program until it began in 1978, but interest among women pitchers was already being promoted very strongly. By getting a women's division added to our state tournament, I created another difficulty. I then had other ladies petitioning to have me barred from playing in it, because I was too good for them. It's been a rough life.

I have seen no records of Missouri having a female NHPA member before 1960 when I arrived in the state. However, I cannot state this as a fact. With World Tourney's for



Women available starting in 1920, there may have been someone from Missouri who did take part sometime, although I've never been told of any. Throughout all of the 1960's, except for 1966 and 1967 when David Baker's wife was also a member, I appear to be the only woman NHPA member. I had to keep my card current to participate in the World Tournament. Records will show that I did compete in the Missouri State Championships with the men for a few years. I quit competing in the Men's State Tournament after 1965. I can't remember if by request, NHPA mandate, or just my better judgment. The fact that my husband was the president let me get by those years I dared.

Horseshoe enthusiasts at that time had a lot of rural background where women still had a "certain" place and there were just some things that women didn't even think about trying. The women's lib and women's rights movements were yet to come. Also, pants and jeans were not really in vogue for women and playing horseshoes in a dress just didn't cut it, although there were a few ladies back in the yesteryears of World Tournament competition that did wear dresses when competing.

Way back in the 60's I was invited to pitch in an event when the Kansas City courts were first installed. I remember Paul Lattray was there. A truck had been driven thru the middle of the courts during construction and there were ruts cut in the grass, right where I needed to stand. I remember standing in a rut and stepping up out of it, throwing 80% to beat Paul. He was one unhappy camper! There was a fellow there from St. Joe that remembered that to his dying day and every time he saw me, he had to mention it. Oh, the good old days. No nice pitching platforms for women and juniors in those days and the Elders Division was yet to come.

Sometime in the late 1960's, or maybe it was actually passed in the 1970's, there came a ruling out of the NHPA annual convention that mixed distance pitching was not allowed in any sanctioned tournament. Sanctioned tournaments were very scarce in our state. Probably only our state tournament was sanctioned at that time. However, I pitched in very few tournaments throughout those years, other than the World Tournament. There were a few where I was especially invited, but for the most part I stayed away, unless I was helping with stats. With the founding of the NHPA Sanctioned Club/League Program in 1978, there soon arose a cry to allow mixed distance pitching in leagues and it wasn't too long after that before the rule banning mixed distance pitching was abolished.

Missouri actually allowed junior girls to pitch in mixed competition with junior boys when we started up junior classes again in 1968 at our state tournament. We got two girls to enter in 1969. One came back in 1970. More girls showed up in 1975 and 1976. However, until 1976 we had no official division in our state tournament for women. Below are the numbers of entrants for the Women's Division in the state tournament since it began:

I arrived at these figures by attempting to count the number of participants on the Final Results printouts.

Membership totals thru 1980 and 1981 were pretty much representative of the actual number of women participants in the state tournament. Everyone had to have a card in order to pitch. Then came the start of some sanctioned clubs and leagues within our state. The first into the program was the Greater St. Louis Club sanctioned in 1980. It didn't offer much opportunity for women pitchers. However, the Golden Triangle Club followed in 1982 and the Independence Club in 1983 and both of them offered league opportunities for the ladies. As the years progressed, more clubs and leagues were formed and most continued to offer pitching opportunities for the female gender. With the additional sanctioned tournaments becoming available as the years went by, the interest in tournament play also grew. We are now reaping the results. A brief history of numbers of Missouri Women NHPA members follows:

1960 - 1965 = 1	1976 = 6	1990 = 79

I believe Missouri has caught up with the times in fine fashion, as the figures will show. The ladies seem to be doing quite well. I hope it continues.

## A VISIT TO THE NHPA HALL OF FAME



The QRHC members are privileged to welcome our guests and show them around the facility. Playing host and hostess is a fun part of our duties as we meet and greet new friends from far away places. Daisy, president of the West Liberty Horseshoe Club in Ohio, and a 23 year veteran of the game, and her husband John, a beginner of the game, wanted to check out the NHPA Hall of Fame while on this trip. Daisy found the QRHC webpage (quailridgehorseshoes.com); saw my name and called. We quickly agreed to meet them at the courts at 10:00 am the following day.

Greeting them as they arrived, Daisy informed me that her horseshoe club had purchased a brick in the plaza and she would love to see it. So before taking their coats off, we slid out to the plaza walkway only to find it was covered with a sheet of ice and some snow on top of that. Let's see, where is the state of Ohio located? Checking the brick map inside we found its vicinity. Using a snow shovel and broom we were unable to get through the ice. We went back inside to warm up and make a new plan. # NATSTAT

The new season/year has started for just about everyone with many tournaments having been pitched and reported, or in some cases tournaments have been cancelled because of weather and other reasons. I still have a few tournament results not reported for last year. Please check the REPORTED EVENTS list. Many states are on the ball and get tournament results turned into Natstats real quick with results reaching me the same evening after the tournament has been pitched. In some cases results are not being turned in for three or four months after the tournament was pitched. LATE results don't affect me in any way; it only affects the pitchers averages that pitched in those events. So please - everyone - if you don't see results posted to your record, it will probably be that the results have not been sent in to Natstats. All results that I receive by Wednesday noon (California Time) will be entered and will be included in the results that are posted on the NHPA web page Wednesday late afternoon/evening depending on what time zone you live in. I send files out to the NHPA web master every Wednesday and he puts the averages on the web site.

For those of you that are new to pitching, — we update averages for all the states every Wednesday, and we update the Individual Search files twice a month, usually the first and third week of the month. So check out all the information on the NHPA web site at horseshoepitching.com.

All Regional Directors; if you haven't sent me a copy of your 2009 schedule, please do so now. There are many times I get tournament results without a name or where the tournament was pitched, so I need to refer to a schedule so I can include that information in my files.

If you have any questions about your average, you can write or email me to check it out, but please tell me what

you think is wrong. Don't just say "please check my average it is wrong". I need to know what might be wrong. Is it the ringers or shoes? I can't correct anything if I don't know what I am correcting. My email and mail address is on the inside of Newsline on page 3.

Some of you that use the HSMaster program are having problems in sending the correct file of your tournament results to Natstats. I need the file that is for Natstats, not just a file of your tournament results that show all the groups, wins and losses, place finish, high game, etc. I don't need all that information, plus with that file I have to manually enter all the information. The program makes a specific file just for Natstats, which lets me import all the information within seconds.

For some of you that are not using a computer horseshoe program, I can mail or email you a form you can fill out and mail or email back to me.

Again — I ask — anybody that does the record keeping for your charter — PLEASE — when you change information for your pitchers — I probably need that information also. Many of the new short distance pitchers I only find out when new tournament/league results come in marked 30. I don't know for sure if it is a mistake or if that person actually did re-qualify at short distance as I have not been notified. It can make for wrong averages and may take some time to get everything figured out. Also, I need to know when people move from one state to another, or when changing from Junior to Adult, or when getting married and changing their name. Please check the Natstats files on the NHPA web site and let me know of any corrections that need to be made.

However, the Hall of Fame Committee proceeded with business as usual and I am happy to announce that three very qualified persons have been elected to the NHPA Hall of Fame in the 2009 voting. Some brief bios of the 2009 inductees follow.

#### Frank Bohun

Frank started pitching horseshoes sometime in the 1960's and in his best years as a forty-footer was averaging over 60%. It was when Frank decided to move into Elders competition that he really made his mark in the horseshoe pitching world. He did this at the age of 78 years. It is wondered what he could have accomplished had he made the move when he turned 70. Frank won a total of four world championships. In 1992 he averaged 77.5%. In 1995 he averaged 84.2%. In 1997 he averaged 80.2% and his last win came in 1999 when he averaged 82.4%. His name still appears nine times in world tournament records listings for the Elders division. His win loss record in world tournament play stands at 78.5 wins and 6.5 losses. Frank also holds many records for the 30-foot division in the state of Pennsylvania and has won the 30-foot division in the prestigious Eastern National Tournament in Pennsylvania and Dogwood Festival Tournament in North Carolina many times. Frank was inducted into the PA Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame in 2000.

By the time you read this, Frank will have celebrated his 94th birthday. He says he has many good days and some that aren't so good, but he is hoping to be able to make it to Springfield, IL for his induction ceremony. Frank was elected in the Player category.

#### Joan Elmore

Joan was born in Tennessee and has lived there all of her life, except for the 13 years that she and her husband James lived in Ohio. They moved back to Tennessee in 1982. A relative newcomer to the sport of horseshoe pitching, Joan has already made her mark in the highly competitive Women's Division of the World Tournament. In her ten

World Tournament Women's Championship appearances, Joan has already won the world title twice. In 2006 she had a record of 18-2 and a ringer average of 82.2%. In 2007 her record was 19-1 with a ringer average of 81.4%. She also has two second place finishes. In 2004 she was 20-3 with a ringer average of 82.4% and in 2005 she was 21-2 with a ringer average of 84.3%. This talented pitcher also has two fourth place finishes in the Women's Championship Division. In 2003 she had a record of 15-4 and averaged 80.8% and in 2008 she had a record of 14-5 and averaged 84.4%. This is quite an achievement to have finished no lower than fourth place and to have averaged over 80% ringers for the last six years in Women's Championship Division play.

This talented pitcher has also won championships in other well known tournaments such as the Eastern Nationals, the Greenville Ringer Classic, the Dogwood Festival and the Danville Open. She is a many time Tennessee State champ and has the honor of being the first Tennessee pitcher to pitch a perfect game. Joan is looking forward to the 2009 World Tournament in Springfield, IL. She is planning to attend the Hall of Fame Banquet and is also looking forward to the tough competition she will encounter on the courts. Joan was elected in the Player category.

#### Jack Freeman

Dr. Jack Freeman was born in Danville, KY and was one of a family of 13 children. After graduating from Danville High School, he attended the University of Kentucky on a full football scholarship and played under Coach Bear Bryant. He then went to Vanderbilt University Medical School and became Board Certified in the field of Pathology.

In 1988 Jack played in his first sanctioned horseshoe tournament and in 1989 attended his first world tournament. An idea was born and he bought land in Joelton, TN suitable for the construction of an indoor pitching facility and the plan began to take place. He received an NHPA Achievement Award in 1993 for Outstanding Contributions to the sport of horseshoe pitching. In 1996 he was the recipient of the Arch Stokes Memorial Award

for having done the most during the preceding three to five years to promote, foster and build the sport of horseshoe pitching. An idea was forming in Jack's mind that this land should be donated to the NHPA by parcels and as a future site of a NHPA Hall of Fame. The National Horseshoe Pitchers Foundation (NHPF) was established to make this gift possible. As the NHPF acquired more of the land, a small building was constructed for the Hall of Fame near the outdoor court pavilion. NHPA memorabilia and Hall of Fame materials were taken to Joelton, TN to be put on display. Jack was busy working on displays when he died of a massive heart attack on December 28, 2003 at the age of 69.

Jack's untimely death brought an end to that dream, but eventually made possible the fulfillment of the dream in another location. Through his gifts of money and land to the NHPF, it became possible to seek other locations and the end result is the beautiful facility

that now stands in Quail Ridge Park in Wentzville, MO. The new building features the Hall of Fame room, 16 indoor courts and a concession stand. There are also 16 top notch outdoor courts available. The attractive Jack Freeman Memorial Plaza lies directly across from the main door of the facility. This is the site where all of the engraved bricks are located and more are still available. As you enter the main door, a picture of Jack Freeman is displayed on a wall of the entryway. How fitting that a photo of this hard working promoter of our sport will now be enshrined within the Hall of Fame room of the facility which was made possible largely by his generous donations and gifts of land.

The induction of these deserving people will take place at the NHPA Hall of Fame and Awards Banquet to be held Sunday evening, August 2, 2009 in Springfield, IL. Hope to see you there.

# REGIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT

## **New Regional Director**

I recently received word from the Georgia Charter that Ronnie Miller has been selected as their new Regional Director. Ronnie has been a Charter member there for a number of years, attends a lot of tournaments, and is well-known among the Georgia pitchers. Be sure to congratulate Ronnie on this new appointment next time you see him, and also extend "many thanks" to Jerome Kennedy for his many years of service as the Georgia Regional Director.

### **Regional Directors at World Tournament**

As has been the policy through the years, Regional Directors who attend the World Tournament are asked to help with shoe checks at the beginning of each session. Please let me know if you are planning to attend the World Tournament this year and if/when you might be able to help out with shoe checks or other work.

### **World Tournament Shoe Checks**

Anyone who has ever pitched in a World Tournament can tell you something about the requirement of having your horseshoes checked before tournament play begins; if only to say that it involves standing in a long line. For most, this is the only tournament during the entire year where their shoes will be checked... for maximum length, width, height, opening size, and weight requirements (see RGS Book Specifications, Section A for details), though


these measurement checks could be a requirement for any sanctioned event. For the most part, it is a three-step process involving the placement of each shoe into a shoe-check, metal "box". If the shoe fits inside the box, it meets the length, width, and height requirements. Next, the shoe opening is checked before it is passed on for the maximum weight check. For shoes that don't meet one or more of the specifications, they may be ground, bent, or hammered in an effort to bring them back into specs, but if this isn't possible, the shoe must be declared "illegal" and cannot be taken onto the courts or used during the tournament as this may give the user/owner an unfair advantage in scoring. Though this policy hasn't been finalized for the up-coming

World Tournament, shoes that do not meet one or more of the measurement specifications may be held until after the three days of their competition. More information on this will be posted at the shoe-check location.

In addition to checking for shoe specifications, we record the number and kind of shoes that are too wide, too long, and/or too heavy and, looking at these totals, may notify horseshoe manufacturers where there seems be a problem with meeting certain measurement requirements. Interestingly, some brand new shoes that have never been pitched do not pass the shoe-check!

We also make an attempt to record the make and model of all horseshoes that are checked, though this is difficult to do, with a lot of different helpers and with the rush of getting everyone through the shoe check and on to picking up their round-robin schedules and then to group pictures. It's always interesting to see what kinds of shoes are the most popular each year, and a lot of good statistical information could be obtained and summarized if we had the additional time and help for gathering this data more carefully.

I hope that a lot of you will be able to make it to the World Tournament in Springfield later this year, and if so, perhaps I'll be seeing you in the shoe check area.

### Martin Birkholz Minnesota

Reverent Martin Birkholz pasted away on January 21, 2009. Mr. Birkholz was inducted into the Minnesota State Horseshoe Hall of Fame in 1993 as a pitcher. He played many years in the Mankato League and the East League while pastor at St. Mark's Lutheran Church of Mankato. After retiring from the ministry Mr. Birholz moved to St. James and continued to

play horseshoe in the East League until his 91 birthday.

Martin Carl Birkholz, son of Ernst and Anna (Lindloff) Birkholz was born August 12, 1916 in Roscoe, South Dakota. His family moved to Olivia, MN where his mother died in 1918. Two years later his father married Margaret Braun. In 1923 the family moved to St. James, MN. He was baptized September 11, 1916, at St. Paul's Lutheran Church Roscoe, SD, and confirmed at St. Paul's, St. James, MN. # VICKI CHAPELLE WINSTON

The Chapelle family from Portland, Oregon became household names as father Cletus, daughter Vicki and younger brother Barry joined the NHPA horseshoe courts, and for four decades of World Championship competition, Vicki was in the news following a game that made horseshoe pitching front page news.

Cletus was playing against World Champion Ted Allen of Boulder, Colorado at Murray, Utah in 1955 when Allen set a World record that still exists, as he pitched 72 consecutive ringers in a 51-9 victory.

Ted mentioned in later years that his remarkable feat was possible to complete since Cletus was an excellent pitcher and helped continue the game long enough to set the record. Ted had 89 ringers in the 92-shoe game, and a super 96.7 ringer percentage. Cletus tossed 75 ringers in the 92-shoe game and closed with an 82.6 ringer percentage.

Ted's and Cletus Chapelle's remarkable game started the four decades of World Championship competition for Vicki as the 17-year-old pitcher captured the first of ten World titles the following year with her first World effort which eventually led to "legend" status.

The Chapelle family became deeply interested in horseshoes from that time. After one year as vice president of the NHPA, Cletus was elected president in 1957. In addition to her active pitching schedule, Vicki served as vice president and member of the Hall of Fame committee. She now is the chairperson of the committee as she assumed the duties from husband, Earl Winston, whom she married in June of 1960.

Barry, who developed into an excellent pitcher, served the NHPA as vice president for five years. All three are in the NHPA Hall of Fame. In 1970 Vicki was the first woman to be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Vicki started her legendary career as she watched her father practice on the court he built in a vacant lot near their home. She practiced many hours and captured that first World title as a high school senior in 1956 at Murray, Utah. She added her second and third titles in 1958 and 1959 and her fourth title two years later as Vicki Chapelle Winston.

Incidently, the 1957 winner in the women's championship was Gertsie Lou Selby, a 17-year-old high school senior from Boulder, Colorado a sister-in-law of Ted Allen, who was her pitching coach at the time...Who else could it be?

Vicki was a headliner in the next eight years, winning the

World title in 1963, 1966, 1967 and 1969 before Ruth Hagen from Buffalo, New York took top honors four years in a row.

Vicki jumped to the top of the pack in 1975 with her ninth victory and added her last hurrah and tenth title in 1981 in her first indoor event at Genoa, Minnesota. She fired an even 80%, second highest percentage to her 79.6% at Erie, Pennsylvania in 1969.

Vicki had been in the spotlight since 1956 and now a new crop of "stars" hit the NHPA World circuit---names like Phyllis Negaard, Tari Powell, Sandy McLachlin and Sue Snyder.

To date Snyder presents the lingering threat to reach the "legend" status along with Vicki in the women's World circuit. Vicki's record will be challenged by Kentucky's Sue Synder, who has won seven World titles.

It is unusual for outstanding athletes in any sport to become active in the service category during their athletic careers. The Chapelles are unusual since they joined in service becoming officers in the NHPA and serving on committees for many years. Vicki has been serving on the Hall of Fame committee and now is chairperson on that committee.

Cletus, Barry, Vicki and Earl have been inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame---Cletus and Vicki for pitching excellence and Barry and Earl for service.

In those early 50-point games, the hot sun forced evening competition until the 40-point game schedule was adopted in 1982 and tournaments moved indoors.

Vicki began to pitch in more weekend tournaments when the NHPA adopted the sanctioned league program and they allowed mixed distance pitching in sanction events.

Some years she pitched so many shoes that she tried wearing gloves because her fingers were so tender. It was amazing the success she accomplished during her long career considering her lack of practice at certain times.

Being able to compete in the championship division for so long is noteworthy. "Very few women were available in those early years", Vicki remarked. "NHPA officers had to encourage some women to compete in the World Tournament. They had trouble finding eight women for the championship class."

In those early years Vicki pitched Gordon horseshoes.

Then in 1960 she switched to Allen's and closed her competition pitching the Deadeye Easy Grip horseshoe in 1982. She started out with the flip pitch and changed to a  $\frac{3}{4}$  turn and finally the  $\frac{1}{4}$ .

"There were large groups of spectators early in my early days of pitching. They filled the bleachers and at some times stood ten deep behind the fences during many World Tournaments. There were tremendous crowds at Greenville, Ohio; I remember one time when the NHPA had an early evening meeting and scheduled play after the meeting. A big crowd was there waiting", Vicki remarked. "It was certainly a different atmosphere."

Vicki always enjoyed the super action at the World. Her success is notable and her ten World titles record has held up many years. She was a reliable competitor on the courts and in the service of the NHPA through the years.
